Burk Defeated By Terrell 28-12 In Class 2A Playoff

Quick striking Terrell ripped 88 and 99 yards for touchdowns on its first two possessions and smashed Burk Burnett, 28-12 in a second round class 2A playoff game in Denton Friday night before 3500 fans.

Halfback Bill Flowers powered the fast breaking Tigers, gaining 159 yards on 23 carries and scoring twice on blasts of one and two yards. Terrell tallied once in every quarter and owned a 21-0 lead before Burk found the range late in the third period.

Halfback Paul Lea and quarterback Jimmy Keller got the other Terrell touchdowns on one yard smashes and Keller tacked on the four extra points. Fullback Donald McKinnis countered Burk's markers, diving over from the two and the one.

Terrell rolled up 320 yards rushing behind the flying feet of Flowers and Lea. The Tigers made 163 of it in the first half, when Flowers produced 78 yards in eight tries.

A costly fumble early in the second quarter proved a terrific blow to the Bulldogs. After Terrell had scored its first TD eight minutes deep in the opening quarter, Burk drove from its 21 to a first down on the Tiger 8. McKinnis fumbled as he hit the left side, and John Clemmons recovered for Terrell on the one.

The supercharged Tigers zipped the 99 yards for their second score in nine plays, and Burk never got back into contention.

Lea and Flowers made 76 of the 88 yards in Terrell's first scoring maneuver that required 11 plays. Lea got 42 in four carries, with his 26 yard dash putting the Tigers on the one yard line. Flowers banged out 34 yards, half of it on his first attempt.

After a fumble killed Burk's 61 yard drive, Terrell surged 99 yards for its second TD five minutes deep in the second quarter. Flowers' 31 yard sprint pulled the Tigers out of the hole and Keller's 19 yard pass to Eddie Curtis put them on the Burk 29. An offside penalty against Burk, Tom Waggoner's eight yard smash and Keller's twelve yard scamper gave Terrell a first down on the Burk four and Flowers cracked over from the one.

Mike Lacy's pass interception on the goal line stopped Terrell on its third possession after the Bulldogs were guilty of roughing the kicker, the only time Terrell had to punt in the game. Waggoner's 42 yard return of the second half kickoff started Terrell rolling again, and the Tigers covered 38 yards in eight plays for the third TD after three minutes. Flowers got 22 of the yards in five carries.

Jerry Boren recovered Flowers fumble on the Terrell 42 to set the stage for Burk's first tally. McKinnis, who gained 101 yards in 28 attempts and Doyce Walker alternated in pounding out the 42 yards and McKinnis scored with two minutes left in the third. Billy Baker missed his first of two extra points.

Burk drove 72 yards in six plays for its second score after eight minutes in the fourth quarter. Walker's 20 yard pass to Gary Jennings and McKinnis' 37 yard toss to Boren paved the way. Terrell recovered the on-side kickoff on Burk's 49 and got its final TD with 23 seconds left.

Outstanding defenders for Terrell were Jimmy Rushing, Clemmons, John Keller and Bill Marshall, while Burk's standouts were Johnny Veach, Otis Waddell and Jerry Gee.

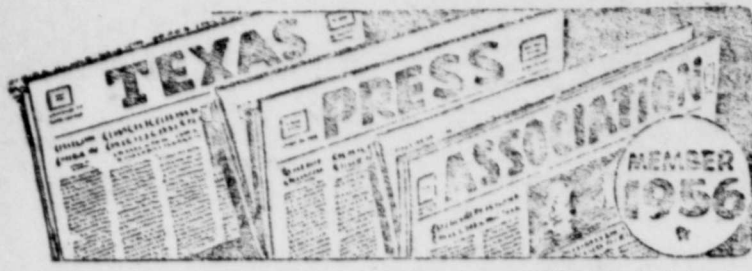

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

PORT HURON, MICH., Times Herald: "Whether you call it a democracy or a republic, whether you judge it benefits by the car in your garage or by the freedom to worship at the church of your choice or by your freedom to speak out in public without fear, you are living under a system of government based on the dignity and freedom of the individual, that derives its powers from the bottom up rather than from the top down. Like the stars in the sky, the continuation of this system is too often taken for granted."

ABILENE, KANS., Daily Reflector-Chronicle: "After listening to speakers of both parties belabor one another you wonder whether they are describing rival candidates for office or men wanted by the police."

SILVERTON, ORE., Appeal-Tribune: "The people in it make up a town," writes an ed. Yep, and then they import experts to mess it up still more."

GOUVERNEUR, N. Y. Tribune-Press: "Farm income is on the way up. One of the reasons is that the farmer himself, through his trade organizations, is going after the markets he lost some years ago under government paternalism. Once again he is on the gain, because as an independent citizen, with intelligent government guidance and steadily decreasing government interference, he is helping himself and literally running his own farm."

Back The Attack On Traffic Accidents

From coast to coast, America is rallying forces against one of its greatest enemies — traffic accidents.

The tragic rise in the death toll this year has made 1956 the darkest year in traffic accident history.

In an all-out effort to halt the mounting toll of dead and injured, the National Safety Council is launching a nationwide campaign called "Back The Attack on Traffic Accidents," which will continue through 1957.

The title for the new campaign symbolizes its purpose — to unite public officials and private citizens in an all-out fight against highway disaster.

Public officials are asked to back the attack by stepping up traffic law enforcement. Private citizens are asked to back the attack by setting a better personal example in their own traffic behavior, and by demanding, supporting and accepting more rigorous traffic law enforcement.

Since December is the most dangerous month of the year in traffic, the special hazards of the holiday season will be emphasized in the first month of the new campaign. These are speed, drinking, night driving and the risk to pedestrians.

We can't build an expressway to traffic safety, but we can keep our highways from becoming human "toll" roads if public officials and citizens will unite and "Back the Attack."

SHOP EARLY

Each year about this time merchants begin to advise us to "Buy early—and avoid the Christmas rush." That is always good advice. And this year, it would seem, it is better than ever. For, according to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, Christmas sales, auto sales excluded, will total more than seven percent above those of the 1955 season, for a new all time record. The dollar total for November and December is forecast at \$31.1 billion. The chamber also observed that the 1956 retail boom is healthier than last year's, reflecting a more normal expansion in population and personal income.

This season the millions of people who flock through America's retail stores, in search of either holiday gifts or the routine things we buy at all seasons, will be offered an almost bewildering assortment of wares from which to choose. They will see the best and most attractive standards of display, sanitation, advertising and promotion. They will, with few exceptions, be met by friendly, courteous and helpful sales people. They will—unless their wants are unusual indeed, find exactly what they are looking for. And they would do well to consider what has made all this abundance possible. The most important force in that has been the competitive, free enterprise system, in which no one has a monopoly on anything, and in which the rewards go to those who please the public most, and who offer the best value for the dollar.

Mail Packages Now No Disappointment At Christmas Time

Burkburnett's Postmaster, A. H. Lohoefer said today that while the Post Office still has a tremendous job ahead of it, efforts are being redoubled to deliver all mail on time and in good condition by Christmas Eve. He points out that by taking a little extra care with your Christmas mailings now, you'll avoid disappointing friends and loved ones at Christmas time.

He asks for your special cooperation to be sure that your return address and the recipient's address are plainly typed or written on all labels and Christmas cards. Use zone numbers and it's a good idea to include an extra label inside your packages. Parcel Post size and weight limitations vary according to destination. Ask them when you go to the Post Office to buy stamps.

Speaking about stamps, the Postmaster said, "Use three cent postage on all your Christmas cards. This way they will be delivered promptly, and forwarded, if necessary, providing you include your name and address on your Christmas card envelopes." First class postage on your Christmas cards enables you to include handwritten messages, thus making your Christmas greetings more personal. By including your name and address on each Christmas card envelope, both you and your friends can keep your mailing lists up to date.

The Postmaster urges that you mail all your out of town Christmas cards and packages immediately and certainly not later than December 10th. Christmas mail for local addresses should be started on its way at least a week before Christmas.

News From The County Agent

The Wichita Valley DHIA As-
sociation ranked third in the
state in average pounds of milk
which was 840 lbs and second in
the state in average lbs of but-
terfat, which was 30 lbs.

In the Wichita Valley DHIA
Association there are 21 herds
and 801 cows. Mr. H. R. Chand-
ler is our local technician. This
is a good record for our associa-
tion.

The October 1 crop estimates
for pecans places Texas at 27-
500,000 pounds, slightly below
the ten year average of 1945-55.
This is slightly below the Septem-
ber estimate, the decrease being
primarily due to drought.

Rural boxholders who find in
their mail boxes this week a card
from the Texas Statistician, Agri-
cultural Marketing Service,
will be rendering a service to
Texas agriculture if they will
fill out the card and return it
to the statistician.

Livestock, says B. T. Haws,
county agent, is a gamble at best
but herds infected with Brucel-
losis make the gamble even

more risky. Infected cattle pro-
duce less milk, calve a third less
and up the cost of herd replace-
ment by 30 percent to say noth-
ing of the many other troubles
which can come from Brucello-
sis. The disease has got to go,
says Haws, if the state's livestock
industry is to continue making
progress.

The larva of the heel fly, the
cattle grub is now appearing as a
lump under the hide in the back
of dairy and beef cattle. Now
is the time to control them. Lo-
cal county agents can supply
formulas for dipping, spraying
and dusting, says B. T. Haws,
county agent.

The annual Texas Dairyman's
Short course is scheduled for
Dec. 6-7 at Texas A&M College.
All meetings will be held in the
Memorial Student Center and
subjects of great importance to
the state's dairy industry are up
for consideration. All persons
interested in the industry are
invited to attend.

In 1955, 25,000,000 Americans
fished and hunted and spent a
healthy \$3 billion in connection
with their activities. In Texas
1,825,000 hunted or fished or
did both and spent more than
\$165,000,000. Hunting and fish-
ing are big business, says B. T.
Haws, county agent, and land-
owners can help the business by
joining their friends and neigh-
bors in wildlife conservation as-
sociations.
