The Flu Epidemic

It is generally expected that Asian flu will reach epidemic proportions in this country this fall or winter. But there is no cause for panic or wild fears. The illness is of short duration, is generally mild, has few complications, and has a very low mortality rate. An effective vaccine (safe except for patients with a known allergy to eggs) has been developed, and the supply will gradually increase.

In this connection, the American Medical Association has made an important statement, asking for the cooperation of American Business and industry. If the expected epidemic materializes, business firms will experience a marked increase in absenteeism. Even so, the AMA emphasizes, industry "should not get panicky and rush into a program of mass inoculation for its epmloyees until essential priority groups in the community have been inoculated." First priority on available vaccine should go to those persons vital to the community, such as health, police, fire, communications, transportation and utility personnel, and to those who, in the opinion of physicians, constitute a special medical risk. Individual physicians are urged to adhere to local priority systems, which may vary from place to place for one valid reason or another.

As for those who get Asian flu, the AMA points out that there is no specific treatment. Bed rest and fluids are necessary. All patients should be isolated so far as it is convenient. And during the acute stage of the disease, the patient should not be allowed

Germany Re-enacts A Story

West Germany is the leading industry nation of Europe, the world's largest exporter of automobiles and is possesed of a currency so sound that she has served as a banker for two of the victorious nations of World War II, Great Britain and France.

East Germany, under the iron-bound control of Communism, still lies in ruin, hunger and poverty, although Germans with the same skills and abilities to work hard live there.

The key point accounting for this difference past nine years West Germany has followed an aggressive freeenterprise policy and taken advantage of the tremendous constructive force of private initiative backed by the assurance of profit from successful ventures. Timed to come at approximately the same period as drastic currency reform, nearly all the rationing and myriad government controls which had shackled the West German economy were lifted at one stroke in mid 1948. In the words of U. S. News and World Report: "The combination worked wonders from the start. There was an immediate surge in business activity. Overnight, empty shops weere fill ed with commodities that before had been hoarded or hidden for barter deals. Money once again had meaning. A free market guided prices to more realistic levels. Debts had been reduced by 90 percent. A policy of sound money received priority.

"Sound money in a free market that determines prices were basic to the whole story of West Germany recovery.

The contrast between conditions in East and West Germany could hardly be more startling. In capsule form, with a new setting and different characters, this divided country has in a few years time, re-enacted the story of America's development as contrasted with the countries of the old world. The story of the two Germanys proves once again that with the suitable ground rules everyone benefits most when individuals are allowed the freedom, opportunity and incentive to work out their own problems. This is a lesson which should be taken to heart by every American and acted upon before the principals of individual freedom, responsibility and opportunity, which built this country are

Unusual Merit

comprised too severely.

A bill which is strongly supported by both parties in Congress, including the liberal and conservative wings of those parties, obviously has unusual merit. That was the case with a measure which was approved in the closing hours of the first session of the current Congress. Its purpose is to protect the files of the Federal Bureau of Investigation-a protection which J. Edgar Hoover and other authorities regard as absolutely vital if this Bureau is to continue to deal with subversion and other grave crimes.

Need for such a bill was brought about by a supreme Court decision and a subsequent series of decisions by lower federal courts. Under precedents thus established, the government could be forced to open all its files on demand of the defense. In the case of the FBI, this meant that its sources of information and methods of investigation would become known to all-to the vast benefit of criminals. It also meant that serious harm might be done to innocent people if the contents of its "raw" or unedited files which naturally contain unproven rumors and charges, were made public.

The matter was a very delicate one. On the one hand, it was necessary to protect defendants from proceedings of a Star Chamber nature. On the other hand, it was necessary to save the FBI from potential disaster. The new bill is designed to attain both objectives. It states that defendants are entitled only to report relevant to a witness' testimony. Then it authorizes trial judges to examine wanted reports, and to decide which parts should legitimately be given to the defense.

Here is a bill which is really in the public interest.
