Four Inches Rain Here This Week

Hundreds of acres of wheatland has not been sowed yet because the land has been too soft for planting.

Burnett Ranchhand Recalls Early Days

Jim Snoddy still has that lean and hungry look characteristic of cowboys even though it has been more than a half century since he rode the ranges on the old Burk Burnett Ranch. Snoddy, now retired on his farm six and one half miles west and north of Burkburnett, speaks fondly of his days as a cowboy but strips bare the glamor usually associated with the cowpoke in movies and television stories. "When you worked for Burk you worked 24 hours a day," Snoddy said. "Most of the cowboys would get to town only once or twice a year, then the visits were short."

Speaking of his old boss Burk Burnett, Snoddy said, "there was none like him. He'd help you at any time and friends and strangers alike were always welcome at his place." Of the cowboys, Snoddy said they were good people, rough but good. "They were as good as people are now," he said, "and perhaps a little better."

Snoddy has lived in Wichita County since coming to this area from Tennessee in 1890 with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Price Snoddy. His parents farmed 3 miles northeast of Iowa Park. Snoddy's father died shortly after coming to Texas and some five years later he went to work for Burnett to support his mother.

During the Burkburnett oil boom, Snoddy leased enough land to buy his present farm and other land. "I didn't have enough money to go into production myself and in a way I'm glad I didn't," Snoddy said. "Many people around here went broke in the oil business. I put my lease money into land."

Snoddy said times were difficult in this area prior to World War One, then, he said, "money began to loosen up." Prior to the war, he said, land could be bought from \$5 to \$6 an acre. "You couldn't buy the same land now for \$100 an acre he added. When he came to this county Snoddy said there was no town of Burkburnett and Wichita Falls was only a small community. He said Henrietta was next to Wichita Falls in size and the nearest high school was in Fort Worth.

After 67 years as a cowboy and farmer in this area Snoddy says he still likes it fine and will stay where he is for the "remainder of his days."

'Prefab' Kits Cut Building Costs

Families planning to build or remodel a home would be wise to investigate prefabricated building kits now on the market. These components range from patio kits and packaged bathrooms to complete wood window and door units plus knock-down closets and cabinets. Complete roof and wall assemblies are available.

The value of these components to the homeowner and builder is two-fold: 1. The units come assembled or are pre-cut and can be put together quickly, saving hours of expensive labor. 2. Components such as the ponderosa pine pre-hung panel door units and ponderosa pine windows with frame and sash fitted together, are made of parts machined for each other with factory precision. They work better and fit tighter.

Soft Green Blend Best-Liked Color On U.S. Rooftops

Americans still prefer green on their rooftops, although their tastes run more to soft, muted tones than they did 15 years ago, a national study shows. The study, undertaken in 1956 by the Asphalt Roofing Industry Bureau, a manufacturers' association, shows that almost one-third of the asphalt shingles shipped from plants were in soft, blended greens.

A similar study made in 1941 revealed that 20 percent of the asphalt shingles that year were in a bright, solid green. More than 20 percent were hexagonal in shape. The new study shows a trend away from hexagonal shingles, with only 5 percent sold in 1956. Most popular today is the square-tab strip shingle.

Preferences for color differ in various regions of the United States, according to the study. In the Pacific Coast, light gray was most popular, while homeowners in the Northwest preferred solid black or blue-black and gray blends. In the Southeast, straight white led with 24.8 percent of the shingles sold, and in the Southwest, white shingles totaled 16.9 percent. In both the Southern regions, solid color shingles were preferred.

Of the total asphalt shingles shipped from 68 manufacturing plants during the survey period, 11.3 percent were white.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

LAKEWOOD, N. J., CITIZEN: "It has been suggested that the reason there were fewer wrecks in the horse and buggy days was because the driver didn't depend wholly on his own intelligence."

CUERO, TEXAS, RECORD: "Lebanon is a small, attractive country, militarily weak but with a now ingrained Western cultural influence. Intellectually, it can play a role in Arab affairs far beyond its size or strength. And its pro-Western intellectuals are a force and a factor in this situation. It has survived, and democratically, an assault similar in intention to that which nearly toppled Hussein. The Eisenhower Doctrine was but one factor in the election. More deep was the healthy influence of Western culture."

BLAIRSVILLE, PA., DISPATCH: "Publicly supported schools lose more students than the private colleges. But it is maintained by the University of Kansas, that it would not be wise to reduce dropouts by limiting admissions. In a graduating class of 1,006 students, 208 scored below average in tests given their freshmen year. Had they not been admitted, the loss would have included 40 teachers, 22 engineers, seven lawyers, seven doctors and seven pharmacists. Most of the graduates entered professions in which they were badly needed."

PILGER, NEBRASKA, ENTERPRISE: "The products of American industry—undreamed of luxuries a century ago, could not be disturbed until advertising created new demands. The early communist government in Russia considered advertising to be an economic waste. However, the Russians found that people accustomed to doing without would not buy even necessities once they became available without advertising. Today, consumer advertising is common in Russia."

The Christmas Seal Campaign

Each year, as the Christmas season approaches, the National Tuberculosis Association carries on its annual Christmas Seal campaign. And it would be hard indeed to find a cause more worthy of public interest and support.

Great strides have been made in fighting tuberculosis—due in no small part to the work of the Association, and to the financial success past sales have achieved. But a great deal more remains to be done and must be done. The latest estimates indicate that 250,000 Americans have active TB, 100,000 of them unknown to health authorities. In addition, there are 1,750,000 people with inactive TB, and 550,000 of them are still in need of medical supervision or public health follow-up. And an estimated 55,000,000 Americans—a third of the population—are infected with the germs that cause TB. Some 2,700,000 of this huge group will develop TB in their lifetimes, if the present rate of development of disease from infection continues.

Early diagnosis and immediate treatment are essential in the control of TB. Education of the public and continued research are other vital weapons in this war. The Christmas Seal Sale supports the work of the 3,000 voluntary tuberculosis associations in this country and its possessions. Significantly, of the money raised each year in local communities, 94 percent remains within the state.

The campaign begins November 15th and will continue through December. Do your part by buying seals.

When A Fellow Needs A Congressman

The real success of the visit of Her Majesty Elizabeth II to these shores began to be apparent as Americans again unrolled the red carpet to receive her Prime Minister, Harold MacMillan, for three days of White House conferences.

At the Washington National Airport, where Secretary of State John Foster Dulles greeted the arriving Prime Minister, both made pretty little speeches assuring all and sundry that whatever might happen would be good for "the freedom all the free nations." But it should be noted that the meetings were very much of a British-American tete-a-tete until the last day, when Secretary General Paul Henri Spaak of the North Atlantic Treaty Organizations was invited to join the huddle.

Early reports indicate agreement of the conferees on the pooling of nuclear and missile know-how and resources so that they may be "utilized to maximum efficiency" and so that this country and Britain "can be of greater service to the free world".

But decisions are not quite as simple as that. No matter how expansive President Eisenhower may be feeling, he can't go around sharing out atomic secrets with foreign countries while the McMahon Atomic Energy Act remains on the books—even though he can, perhaps, tell our British cousins all about our missiles and rockets if he wants to. Thus the word is that the President will start working on Congressional leaders now so that the Congress that convenes in January may be disposed to remove or remodel any laws that stand in the way of giving Britain what she wants.

It is to be hoped, however, that the Congressmen will consider realistically what it could mean to ship our most hush-hush military data, equipment and skills to a land that Russia can crush at will, and too quickly for outsiders to be of help. If there is pooling to be done, let it be done on our continent, where the chances for resisting surprise attack are somewhat better. Let the British scientists, whom we need, come here and work with our technicians, production specialists and facilities, which Britain needs.

"These bold new cars are both a tribute to GM's Golden Jubilee and our own 50th Anniversary," S. E. Knudsen, GM vice president and General Manager of Pontiac Motor Division, said in announcing the new cars.

"Fifty years ago America's pioneer motorists welcomed the new Oakland, predecessor car to Pontiac. But outside of having wheels, engine and a body of sorts, the 1908 Oakland bore no resemblance to the sleek 1958 Pontiacs we will present in our dealers' showrooms Nov. 9th. These cars are lower, longer, wider and combine high performance and comfort with high style and luxurious interiors," Knudsen said.

In addition to the top of the line Bonneville convertible and sport coupe, Pontiac offers other new innovations for '58. Among

them are a convertible in the lowest priced Chieftain line, air ride suspension as an option on all models, along with improved fuel injection, introduced by Pontiac last year.

The new "Tempest 395" V-8 engine is bigger than ever, with displacement increased from 347 to 370 cubic inches, and designed to deliver power where most needed, in the traffic range.

Pontiac engineers list 88 new features in the 1958 models and 135 separate safety features.

Striking "new Direction" styling accentuates the car's longer, lower, wider look. The low horizontal grille is topped by dual twin head lamps and rises above the heavy bumper, which incorporates massive parking and signal lamps. A new gold, rectangular crest featuring a "V" on a grooved background above the name, Pontiac, in block style lettering, is positioned in the left side of the grille. Delta wing ornaments ride atop each front fender with twin windplis continuing along the fender.

The missile type mouldings sweep back to concave flares in the rear fender and frame distinctive series markings. The Bonneville has, in addition, four simulated front fender louvers.

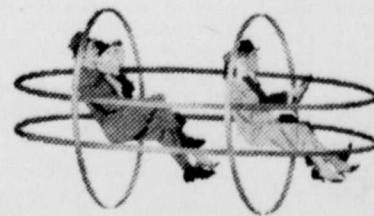

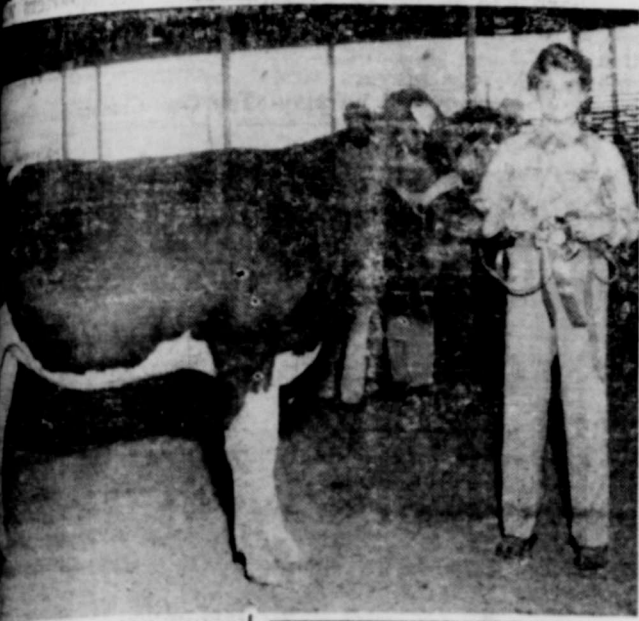

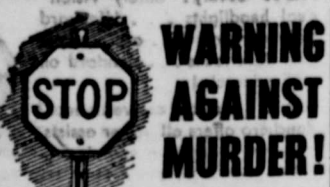

Floyd Lynch, state 4-H club leader, released the names today and said the winners along with Wichita County agent, B. T. Haws would receive all-expense trips to Chicago.

Donors for the program is the Chicago Board of Trade, which in addition to the state awards, provides up to four gold-filled medals for county winners. The three Texans will join other state winners in Chicago in mid-January to observe and hear discussions on the Board of Trade and the many varied activities and processes followed on this great grain market.

Purpose of the program, as explained by Lynch, is to encourage 4-H club members and leaders to learn the fundamentals of grain marketing and the relationship of the various segments of the grain industry in moving grain from the farm to the consumer. At least the major processing plant in the Chicago area will be visited by the winners.

Terry is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Dean Harman of Route 2, Tullia, and has been an active 4-H member for nine years. In addition to his work in grain marketing, the state winner has also completed demonstrations involving swine, beef cattle and field crops. He has served his local club as reporter, vice president and president. He is a Gold Star boy and in 1956 was named the most outstanding 4-H boy in the county.

Young Baley is the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. O. Baley of Route 4, Wichita Falls. He is a member of the Friberg-Cooper 4-H club

and a student in Burkburnett High School. For six years George has been conducting demonstrations involving field crops, beef cattle swine, poultry, electric, tractor and grain marketing. He was a county and district winner in 1955 in the Electric program and repeated these winnings in 1957 and also was named first alternate in the state contest. This year, too, he was named county achievement winner and was awarded a trip to the International Livestock show.

George has served his local club as an officer each year and is now a member of the county 4-H council. He is active in church, school and community affairs and is described by County agent Haws as an outstanding member and leader in his community.

Both boys, in their grain marketing work, have visited local elevators to see how grain is handled and prepared for storage or movement on to terminal elevators or for use as food for either humans or livestock. Too, both have become familiar with the many tests which are used to insure the consumers that they are getting a quality product. They have also studied the various steps and marketing processes which grain goes thru in its movement from the farm to the ultimate consumer, and both feel that the information gained and the friends made as a result of their grain marketing studies will be of much help to them in the future.

Haws was selected to chaperone the winners to Chicago because of his interest and the high type of grain marketing program he has supervised in Wichita County.

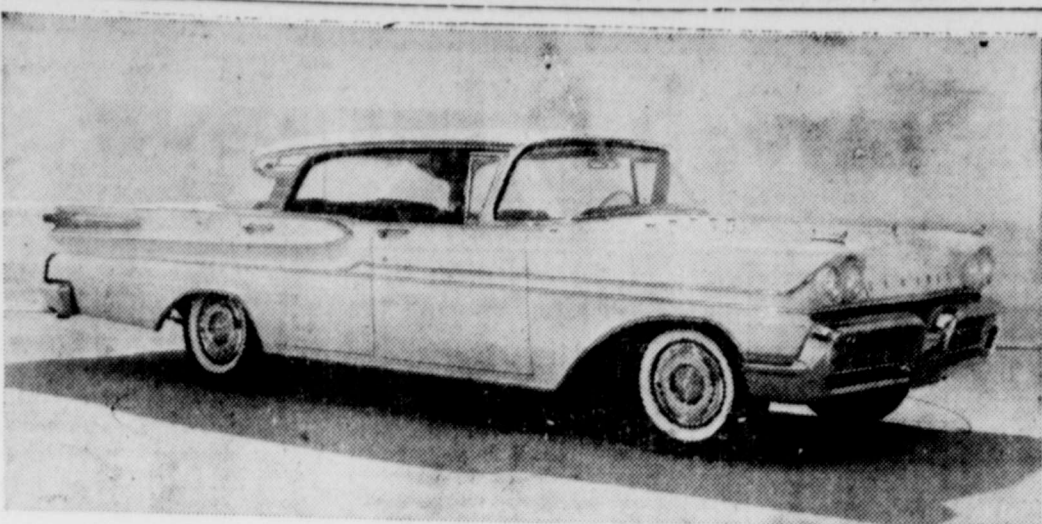

News From The County Agent

The cotton farmers in the county would like to see some sunshine in order to complete cotton harvest. There has only been about 25% of cotton harvested.

Recent rains have stopped farmers in the county from planting small grain. We still have lots of grain to be planted in the county.

A large percentage of home fires start by burning trash. B. T. Haws, county agent says that a good trash burner helps insure the safety and beauty of your home.

For convenience, locate the trashburner near the kitchen, but far enough away for safety. It does not have to be large, if trash is burned every day or two.

Sparks fly easily, so cover top and front of the trashburner with one-fourth inch wire mesh. It should be surrounded by shrubs that will not burn easily.

Plans for building your own mortarless trash burner are available from your local county extension office.

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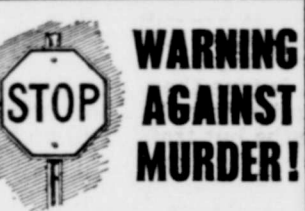
