AN EDITORIAL

A Thousand Times No

By grapevine and by direct pipeline, we learn of a move to colsolidate the four road precincts of Wichita County in one unit, headed by a county roads manager, or some other title of significance with a salary to match. It is further proposed that all road building and maintenance machinery be pulled in and operated from one location. The location for storing all this equipment is not mentioned, but we presume it would be "centrally" located —in Precinct 1, Wichita Falls. This hogwash has the same merits as some of the federal grabs. The current policy seems to be to centralize everything. Get the seat of authority just as far from the people involved as possible.

There is no county manager who can look after the needs of the people of Precinct No. 2 as well as our own commissioner. He is in our midst all the time and knows our problems best. And another thing. We certainly do not want to integrate our precinct funds with those of the other precincts.

When the last county-wide bond election was passed, for the purpose of issuing bonds for the purpose of buying right-of-way, Burkburnett voters went along with the proposal, although our precinct did not necessarily need the additional money. At that time, the proposal was made that all the money be put in one fund, "to be used as and where needed." Our commissioner, and those from Iowa Park and Electra flatly said no and stayed with it. The money was divided on a pro rata basis, the only fair way it could ever be divided. Let's keep it divided from now on.

Precinct 1, Wichita Falls, has spent nearly all its right-of-way money-one million plus-and still the estimates are that only one-half of the necessary right-of-way has been acquired. Where in the world will the money come from? Another centralization idea could take care of that, at least temporarily. Why not issue some certificates of indebtedness? This money would also be prorated to the four precincts. Of course we don't need or want the money, on which we would be paying 4% interest. Under this arrangement, there is one bright sideperhaps our precinct could find some way to transfer its certificate money to Precinct 1. In that way we would be relieved of the worry of trying to figure how and where to spend it, but we would be permitted to continue paying the 4% interest!

Of course we sympathize with our friends to the south. They really have growing pains. But, so long as they try to funnel all the traffic in north Texas right into the middle of Wichita Falls, their money worries will continue and the pains get bigger and bigger. There is every reason to believe that the money already spent in Wichita Falls for right-of-way would have been more than enough to buy a super-duper six or eight laner highway to completely ring the city. Then by carefully planning one-way streets in the congested areas, and doing a little widening and paving here and there, the problem could have been licked for years to come.

Recruits Needed — Not Apologists

In the consternation following the Russians' launching of their original sputnik, and the confusion-compounded resulting from the successful orbiting of the 1,100 pound encore with its sacrificial canine passenger, there were some pretty rash statements about the desuetude of American scientists, if we had any.

Whether or not our rockets could have hung a satellite in the sky six months before the Russians, or whether we merely had the wrong people in charge of our Operation Vanguard, is beside the point. American scientists need no apologists. Their contributions to the ever-increasing volume of human understanding are impressive in any company. Further, our best scientific minds are concerned with "basic research" and have been for many years, even though our leaders in Washington appear to have just discovered there is such a thing and are urging us to get going.

As a single example in the vast field of scientific inquiry, we would like to mention the Gordon Research Conferences, affiliated with the American Association for the Advancement of Science, which command the participation of the world's greatest technical minds. Langmuir, Urey, Seaborg, Baekeland, Carothers, are but a few of the great who have participated.

The conference began twenty-six years ago when the late Dr. Neil E. Gordon, professor of chemistry at Johns Hopkins asked a handful of other researchers to join him at Gibson Island in Chesapeake Bay for informal summer discussions. These meetings became an annual event, outgrew Gibson Island and moved to New Hampshire, where, presently, conferences are held on 36 different subjects at three different schools over a 12 weeks period each summer.

Applicants, who are carefully screened, with particular reference to their contribution to a scheduled subject, come from the academic world, from Government and industry. Young or old, the requirement for participation is scientific attainment, and for those who have something to give, financial assistance is available if needed. They gather to exchange fundamental knowledge on the frontiers of science, for "cross-fertilization" of ideas, philosophies, backgrounds. They seek no immediate solutions to practical problems, yet out of the basic research which is life to these men, have come new materials, new medicinals, new approaches to metallurgy, therapy, nutrition and the use of nuclear

What we need today, even as much as expansion of basic research, is more, many more young people with science degrees who can sit at the feet of the great scientists we now have. But we can not have the number we need until we teach Young America once again to do its sums in grade school.

Shabby Root Spoils Effect Of New Paint

Cast a critical eye at the ap-pearance of your roof before you paint your house.

This is the advice of New York color stylist Beatrice West, who says: "Putting a new coat of paint on a house with a shabby, worn-out roof is like wearing a fur coat and diamonds with dungarees. They just don't go together.'

Miss West, who color-styles thousands of new and remodeled homes every year, says she al-ways examines the roof of a house first before deciding on a color scheme because: "Nothing spoils the appear-

ance of an attractive home more than a weather-beaten roof. This is especially true when a house has been freshly painted. The new paint actually accentuates the shabbiness of the roof."

If the roof of a house shows signs of wearing out, Miss West says, she usually recommends a new roof of asphalt shingles in a color which will provide a basic shade for other colors on siding, trim, and accent spots. "As for the added cost," Miss

West says, "I explain that when a roof begins to look worn, chances are it will no longer be serviceable in a year or two. The family will have to reroof then, anyway, and they might as well do it now and enjoy a com-pletely color-styled house in-stead of doing the job only half-

The many colors available in asphalt shingles are a big help to color stylists, Miss West says. "For example, by choosing a roof of blended green with a fleck of yellow in it, I can pick up the yellow for an accent color on doors, window boxes and shutters, while the trim and windows can be painted in a harmonizing

Another trick with roof color, Miss West adds, "makes houses look taller or longer and lower. You simply reroof a tall, awk-ward-looking house with a deep, ward-looking house with a deep, dark color and it appears lower. The opposite is true of a small house that seems to be built too close to the ground. Light-color roofing gives it a lift, making it seem taller and larger."




