



It sounds fantastic, but it's going to happen. And since it is so fantastic, it naturally is another give-away scheme brewed in Washington.

Beginning Jan. 1st in four states, the United States Department of Agriculture is going to make long-term contracts with ship. farmers to take their land out of production and get up to \$10,000 a year for doing it.

This should cause the greatest back-to-the-farm movement since Columbus discovered America. Imagine being able to sit in the comfortable rocker on the front porch and watch for the mailman to bring soil bank checks from the federal government.

The test of the new plan is to be made in Illinois, Nebraska, Tennessee and Maine. Why the poor farmers in Texas and other states have been left off the trial run of this gravy train hasn't been explained. Maybe the Republicans have some choice political contests coming up next year in the four favored states.

Under the plan, farmers in the four states will be able to make an offer to the federal government on what they will accept to take their farms out of the production of crops and plant them in grass and trees under the conservation program of the soil bank plan. The farmers will be able to sign up for three, five or

To make the project more attractive, Benson and his fellow schemers in the Department of Agriculture have decided to raise from \$5,000 to \$10,000 a year maximum payments which can be made for taking farms out of production.

Talk About Utopia.

The federal government created the problems which now exist in American agriculture. The social planners with their government control programs have caused a chaotic mess. Instead of trying to get back to the old tried and true plan of supply and demand, the social planners think everything can be solved by giving away more of the taxpayers' billions.

The government's subsidy programs for farmers have resulted in enormous surpluses being produced. Using more billions of the taxpayers' hard-earned money, the government has bought up the surpluses. It spends huge sums to store them. And while the government was buying up the overproduction through the Department of Agriculture, other agencies of the government have been spending billions on reclamation projects, to get new land into production. Then the Eisenhower administration came up with the truly brilliant idea of reducing production- the government would pay farmers handsomely to take their land out

But the original soil bank give-away wasn't going fast enough to suit Benson and his crowd (the surpluses still are piling up), so Benson now apparently has decided to compete with the big television shows. Since he has tax money at his command, he can make the quiz sponsors looke like pikers.

It doesn't take any genius to win Benson's give-away. All it takes is the effort to fill out the application blank for getting \$10,-000 a year while sitting in the old rocker.



The secret is in the handling before arranging: Soak your plant heavily overnight, then cut and dip immediately in alcohol from 5 to 10 minutes. This sears the ends, and your poinsettias should last in arrangement from 1 to 3 weeks, depending on the woodiness of the stem. Try it yourself.

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#### Extending A Great Discovery



Mention fermentation to most people, and they think of beer - or maybe sauerkraut. But to the great French scientist Louis Pasteur, fermentation was the key to a whole new concept of life - a startling insight which enabled him to lay the foundation of modern medicine.

Just a hundred years ago, Pasteur plunged the scientific world

into frantic controversy when he declared that fermentation is caused by living micro-organisms. Until Pasteur's discovery, most scientists believed that fermen-tation - which produces alcohol, lactic acid and many other important substances — was purely a chemical process. The yeasts or other "germs" found in profu-sion in the brews were regarded merely as accidental invaders. No one suspected that microbes were the very essence of the pro-

The notion that living things too tiny to be seen without a microscope could cause wholesale chemical changes and produce new substances seemed an ab-surdity at first. Once scientists accepted it, however, it made them receptive to the idea that such minute creatures could also cause drastic physical changes in man and animals — Pasteur's

cause drastic physical changes in man and animals — Pasteur's monumental germ theory of disease upon which most of today's medicine is based.

Even today, Pasteur's work continues to guide scientists into new fields of research. Recently, distinguished scientists from all parts of the world gathered in New York for the Pasteur Fermentation Centennial, an event marking the anniversary of the publication of Pasteur's paper of 1857. The conference, chaired by Dr. James A. Shannon, director of the National Institutes of Health, was sponsored by Chas. Pfizer & Co., Inc., world leader in fermentation chemistry and antibiotic developments.

It was this study of fermentation which turned Pasteur, a chemist by training and profession, to the study of the processes of life — a turning point with enormous consequences for the health of the world.

Today, an entire branch of the

Today, an entire branch of the

chemical industry is based on fermentation, and from this industry comes one of the world's greatest boons – antibiotics. They bring Pasteur's researches full circle: the fermentation process he studied now helps fight the disease germs whose importance he established.

One subject which Pasteur wanted to explore, but never managed to find time for, was the chemical interplay between the

managed to find time for, was the chemical interplay between the sick patient and the germ that invaded him. Modern research into this subject was discussed at the Pasteur Fermentation Centennial by Dr. Rene J. Dubos of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research. Dr. Dubos, a pioneer in antibiotics studies, also has written a biography of also has written a biography of Pasteur.

Among other eminent scientists from six countries, including Russia, who took part in the Centennial program was Dr. Louis Pacteur Vallery-Radot, grandson of the great French scientist and President of the Pasteur Institute of France. Dr. Pasteur Vallery-Radot, who looks amazingly like his eminent grandfather, also discussed modern investigations and applications of Pasteur's key discoveries.

Participants included scientists from the United Kingdom, the USSR, France, Japan, and Cuba, as well as the United States. The conference was attended by more than 800 scientists from colleges and universities, scientific foundations, industry, Federal and state governments and United Nations organizations.

Thus, though a century has passed, the genius of Pasteur continues to influence the mind of science throughout the world.

Food makes a difference, reminds Thelma Wirges, county HD agent. Start family members with a good, wholesome breakfast every day. Follow through with simple balanced meals at noon and at night. Eat at regular times as much as possible Reserve the sweet or rich foods for mealtime dessert. Keep in between meal refreshment bits light and nutritious. Fruits, fruit juices, crisp colorful vegetables served with special dips can be just as tasty and appealing as rich, heavy foods.

Tension and fatigue may be hard to control during the holiday rush. But proper food during the busy season will help keep resistance up.

Mrs. W. E. Karstetter, Park Area HD club president, surely makes good uses of her home freezer at all times, not just during the holidays. She keeps attractive, nutritious and delicous foods on hand at all times. No matter how many come in, Mrs. Karstetter can go to her freezer and have a meal in a matter of minutes.

In case your family has tired of the turkey and dressing, why not freeze them? They will be mighty good in a few days. This is how it is done: Leave in large compact pieces whenever possible. If frozen in small pieces cover with gravy or sauce to prevent stale flavor. Package in moisture-vapor proof containers. Freeze dressing separately. Thaw turkey frozen dry in the eriginal wrapping in the refrigerator at room temperature, or by setting container in water. Serve cold or re-heat. Turkey frozen in gravy may be reheated in a double broiler, covered cassorole or over direct heat. Place dressing, before it is completely tnawed, in a greased casse-role. Add a small amount of water, cover and heat at 350

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
