Toxan Authors New Textbooks For Arithmetic



If your child suddenly shows greater interest and an improved understanding of arithmetic in the future, this could be one of the reasons.

Making arithmetic more enjoyable and easier to grasp has, for many years, been the work of expert Herbert F. Spitzer, professor of Education at the State University of Iowa.

"Exploring arithmetic", a newly published series co-authored by Dr. Spitzer, uses many successful techniques for helping youngsters "reason through" each new number process and use it in problems directly related to everyday arithmetic needs.

Games, puzzles, number tricks and other recreational activities help to make arithmetic interesting and important to youngsters who are fortunate enough to use these new books. Semi-stylized, cartoon type pictures, which attract the child's immediate interests, are used to full color throughout the books which are rampant with beaming little boys in saddle shoes and girls with pony tails.

Educators feel that these new books with their varying approaches will provide long range social benefits as well as immediate improvement in arithmetic teaching results. It was recently pointed out by the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics that "greater enjoyment and understanding of arithmetic may lead more youngsters to choose scientific and engineering careers—fields where our most critical manpower shortages appear to lie in the future."

Mothers and dads, along with America's teachers, may find "Exploring Arithmetic" to be the answer to many prayers.

Inspectors visit the dairies every few months during the year and a general survey over all the state is made every two years.

Marine Traveling Exhibit On Display Here Friday, Jan. 17

When the Marine Corps traveling exhibit arrives in Burkburnett tomorrow, residents of this area will get their first close look at how Marines would assault an enemy-held island in an atomic war.

Visitors will be allowed to view a three dimensional model of a vertical assault by helicopter, a maneuver pioneered by the Marine Corps. Recorded battle sounds add a touch of realism to the diorama.

According to Sgt. Bill Gallegly of the Marine Recruiting Office in Wichita Falls, details of the table top invasion have been deliberately altered for security reasons but, he explains, the basic tactics of the recently developed amphibious assault by helicopter have been retained. Spectators will also be able to view the latest combat weapons and body armor being used by Marines.

Sgt. Gallegly announces that the red, white and blue trailer will be located directly across the street from the City Hall. He invites adults, teenagers and youngsters alike to view the exhibit between 9:00 a. m. and 6:00 p. m. Friday. There is no charge for admission.

The Marine exhibit contains seven major displays besides the vertical assault diorama. One of these is a cockpit from the latest type aircraft assigned to Marine aviation units. Other visual displays include the latest weapons and body armor used by Marines; a panel containing highlights of Marine Corps history; an automatic device that answers questions about the Marine Corps; and photographs of Marines who have won the Nations highest military award, the Medal of Honor.

Sgt. Gallegly stated that the exhibit is brought to Burkburnett through the efforts of his office and the staff of the 90th Infantry Co., Wichita Falls' Marine Corps Reserve Unit.

"I wish to publicly thank officials of the Burkburnett Chamber of Commerce for their assistance in bringing the exhibit to Burkburnett," Sgt. Gallegly said.

During the time the exhibit is on display M-Sgt. Arthur L. Booker and S-Sgt. Robert Carrigan, members of the staff of the 90th Infantry Co., will be on hand to answer any questions about the exhibit, or the Marine Corps.

Entertainment and Serious Thought In Store for Those at C-C Banquet



Once a trooper, always a trooper.

This is a trite yet apt description of Chester Lauck, Houston, Texas executive assistant, Continental Oil Co., better known as "Lum" of the famous radio and film team of Lum and Abner. Mr. Lauck is principal speaker for the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet, Friday night, January 17th.

Like newspaper men with the proverbial printer's ink in their veins, "Chet" Lauck is wed to grease paint. Now a business executive, and a good one, he nevertheless remains a showman.

With Conoco in 1955, in a five month period alone, he traveled 40,000 miles talking at annual Chamber of Commerce dinners, also business meetings or state and national conventions. In addition to special assignments for his firm, he has found time to deliver as many as eight speeches in one week in five different states.

Although an entertainer for a quarter of a century, Lauck is no Johnny-come-lately in the business world. Born and raised in southwestern Arkansas, he was associated with the Union Bank of Mena following graduation from the University of Arkansas. He later became manager of the Citizen's Finance Corporation in Mena and was a leader in the city's business and civic life before deciding to give radio a try in 1930.

The transition from entertainment to business was relatively easy for the celebrated Arkansan. "Lum always had lots of ideas about organizing a big business and becoming president," he says with his familiar Arkansas twang. "Guess Lum and I are actually quite a bit alike. Real ambitious."

Chet Lauck is enjoying his role of businessman. He always had a yen to be in the oil business. Of course, working for a major petroleum organization like Conoco with 10,000 employees and widespread and varied activities is a far cry from running the Jot 'Em Down Store. Yet he likes meetings and working with people. . . talks to everyone as if they were friends from Pine Ridge.

Wherever Lauck goes, he is still the lovable Lum. As a business executive, he is meeting more of his fans

and listeners than he did as Lum. In the entertainment field, his personal appearances were limited by time. The bustling studio or motion picture set provided few outside contacts.

Now he is circulating throughout the country for Conoco. And winning new fans with his homespun humor and engaging charm.

Lauck is a study in contrasts. Calls himself a split personality. An executive of a major oil company, he is at the same time better known to most folks as a country storekeeper. He majored in journalism at the University of Arkansas but for 25 years made his living using back country English which would horrify college professors. Raised in "a wide spot in the road" in Arkansas, he achieved his greatest acclaim in places like New York, Chicago and Hollywood.

Though casual and unassuming, the Conoco executive possesses a restless and keen analytical mind. He is constantly searching for new ideas to help the oil company's business. He admires industrial leaders for their "hard work and horse sense and what they've done to improve our living standards."

He has definite ideas about business and believes, for one thing, that business needs more showmanship. His radio and television commercials for Conoco are examples of the congenial, low pressure salesmanship he likes.

Lauck's native friendliness and desire to do the best job possible on everything he tackles add to his value to Conoco. Some of the same qualities that made Lum popular in Pine Ridge are spelling success for Lauck in the oil industry.

Gaither Report Should Be Released

If the Gaither report is anywhere near as menacing as the leaks indicate it is, Congress and the people should be informed of its contents immediately.

President Eisenhower ordered the report stamped "top secret" when it was submitted at an extraordinary session of the National Security Council last Nov. 7th, four days after Sputnik II was sent into space.

The President is said to have made this decision because he feared publication of the report would panic the American people.

If the American people have gone so soft that they would panic over the Gaither committee's report, then panic is no better than they deserve. We reject the idea that they would go to pieces. If the report is as grim as is indicated, they would be sobered, they would be alarmed, but to say that they would panic is to libel their fortitude.

According to the "leaks", the Gaither committee, consisting of industrialists and scientists, find the United States under immediate threat of Soviet missiles and losing armaments race at a rapid pace. It takes a dismal view both of short-term and long-term security of this nation and the free world unless spending is stepped up drastically.

The group is said to have recommended a rapid rise in the military budget, to reach an outlay in the years 1960 and 1961 of \$8,000,000,000 a year over the present \$38,000,000,000 level and to increase above that total through 1970.

As second priority the committee asked an expenditure of \$5,000,000,000 a year for several years for civilian shelter program.

If the Soviet threat is so acute as to call for any such program by this country, the people and Congress should know it. They should know, too, the sources of the committee's information. It seems strange that Congress had no inkling that the threat was so great. How is it that an appointed board has access to information that Congress does not have, when it is Congress' duty to provide for the national defense? Can it be that the committee has been unduly alarmed? Or perhaps its engaging in propaganda.

In any event, the leaks have revealed that an extremely disturbing report has been submitted to the administration. If the committee is deemed to have facts to back up its recommendations and to be competent to judge the facts, then the people and their elected representatives should not be kept in the dark for a single day.

It is outrageous that a committee having no responsibility to the public, being no part of the government, should be given information that is kept from the people's elected officials. Congress should refuse to appropriate a dime until it is given the facts that have been withheld thus far. We want government by responsible officials, not by a mysterious committee. It is time Congress resented being treated as children and demand the consideration and respect to which it is entitled.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

OXNARD, CALIF., NEWS: "Power-hungry bureaucrats with control of our tax dollars pour our money down an ever-increasing stream of non-essential federal programs which give them control over vast areas of government activity. Of course the taxpayer pays the bills."

SOUTHOLD, N. Y. TRAVELER and WATCHMAN: "When you hear the fire trucks coming, pull off the road, give them the right-of-way, and give the firemen every possible advantage in their always dangerous assignment. Don't make their job that much harder by your desire for excitement or lack of consideration for the life and limbs of others. It may be your property they are trying to save."

DUBLIN, GA., COURIER-HERALD: "With the current exposures by the Senate Rackets Committee of the squandering of funds paid by union members, the average American must realize that he was the one who paid the money that made these lush funds available. Whatever funds find their ways into labor racketeers' pockets are added costs paid by the American public. Whatever wage demands are made by labor union are paid by the American public."

Support For Scientific Education

The Esso Education Foundation—which was established in 1955 by the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey and some of its domestic affiliates—has announced a wide variety of grants to 84 privately supported colleges and universities to stimulate science teachings at the elementary, secondary, college and graduate school levels. This is being done under a special three-year \$1,500,000 program, of which the first part has been put into effect. The new grants are in addition to 345 other grants, totaling more than \$1,330,000 which the foundation gave last October to educational institutions.

This action is perfectly in keeping with the spirit of President Eisenhower's Nov. 13th address in which he called for "a system of incentives for high aptitude students to pursue scientific or professional studies; a program to stimulate good quality teaching of mathematics and science; provision for more laboratory facilities; and measures, including fellowship, to increase the output of qualified teachers."

There is alarming evidence that we are lagging in scientific education, particularly at the grade and high school levels and the Esso Foundation, with its special science program, has set a precedent that great numbers of American enterprises should enthusiastically follow. If we are to avoid federal support and federal domination of education, non-government sources must do more and more to help carry the financial load.

A resident of Burkburnett for 40 years, she was born in Bluffton, Ind., on April 19, 1880.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Tuesday from the First Methodist church with the Rev. Leon Turner officiating. Burial was in the Burkburnett Cemetery.

Survivors include her daughter, Mrs. A. C. Houser of Burkburnett; a sister, Mrs. John F. Quick of Iowa Park; one granddaughter, Mrs. Kathryn Johnson of Dalhart, and four great-grandchildren.

News From The HD Agent

Basic clothing workshops will be held for all Wichita County homemakers in 1958. These workshops will be for any homemaker wanting to learn to sew or wanting to improve their clothing construction methods.

Everyone attending will construct a dress and receive instructions on pattern alterations, cutting, marking, staystitching, collars, sleeves, interfacing, joining a skirt and waist, buttonholes, zippers, making a belt and putting in a hem.

The workshops will be held in Burkburnett, Electra and at the Wichita Valley Farms. They will be taught by Miss Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent. If interested in more information, contact Miss Wirges at 305 Federal Building, Wichita Falls or one of the clothing committee. The committee members are Mrs. Gail Mitchell, Valley Farms; Mrs. Bill Mitchell, Electra; Mrs. E. J. Simons, Burkburnett and Mrs. D. D. Mendanhall, City View. This committee made and presented the plans for these workshops.

Preliminary meetings will be at Electra, Jan. 21 at 9:30 a. m. in the Flippen building; in Burkburnett, March 5th at 9:30 a. m. in the Town Hall and at the Wichita Valley Farms Community house, March 20th at 9:30.

Lovely fabrics are available for school, sport and dress garments, with so many blends of synthetics and natural fibers to choose from, the label becomes more important than ever. Look for a good descriptive label when you buy. It should tell you what the fabric is, how to handle it, and what service you can expect from it.

A good dressmaker knows that pressing is just as important as the way in which a dart or seam is stitched. In fact, the most meticulously handled dart or seam can look "homemade" if not properly pressed.

Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent, says to get a really professional look, press as you go. Begin by pressing the creases out of you fabric before cutting and carefully press after each step. The time and effort will be well worth while.

Pressing technique is important, too. In general, the agent says work on the wrong side of the fabric. Occasionally this is impossible and you may have to press such things as pocket welts on the right side. For this use a press cloth. Always smooth material carefully under the iron and press on the straight grain of the fabric whenever possible.

In sewing cotton or linen, press when well dampened or use a steam iron with high heat. Press woollens with a damp cloth between iron and dry woolen, or use a steam iron. Use high for wool, but don't press too dry. To shrink out ease, pat with hand to hold steam in the wool fibers.

Press silk or rayon with steam iron or use a pressing cloth, dampening cloth as you work. Use medium heat and press with a light touch. Open seams with point of iron lightly before using presses cloth. Be careful not to water spot the fabric.

Press velveteen, corduroy or velvet with a turkish towel over the ironing board or stand an iron on end, cover it with a damp press cloth and draw the wrong side of fabric back and forth over the steaming cloth. Brush lightly while steaming to remove stubborn marks.

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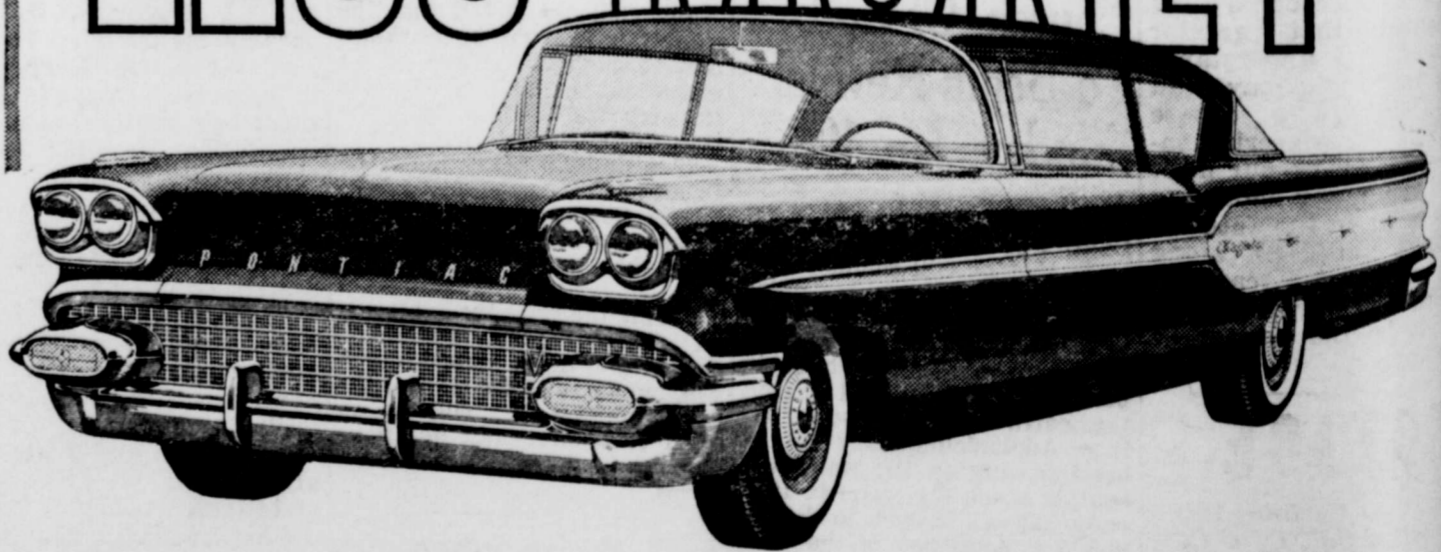

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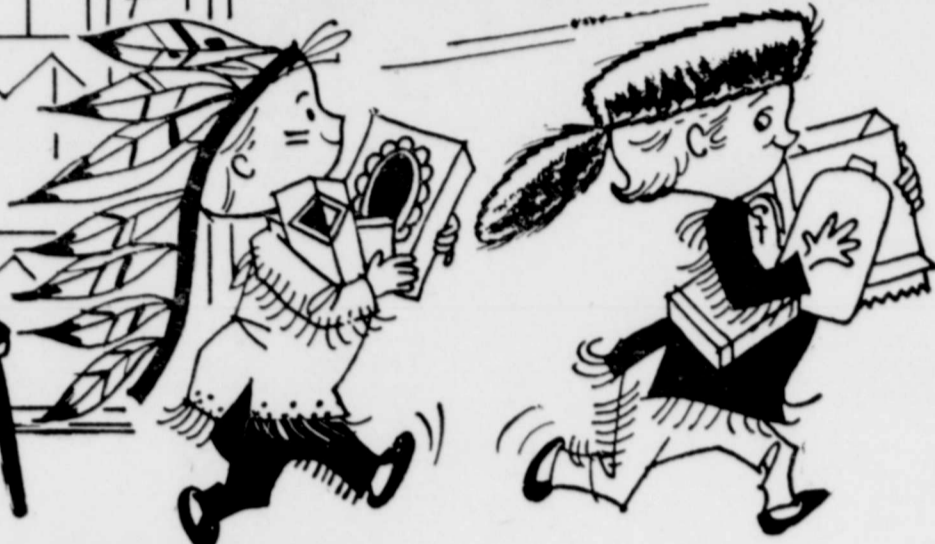

Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District News

Finding places to take care of runoff water from terraces is a major problem for cooperators with the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District, according to Elvy Sargent, Soil Conservation Service technician, of Iowa Park.

Mrs. Bufford Whiteside, co-owner of Bars and Whiteside Farms three miles north of Iowa Park, is solving the water disposal problems on their farm by establishing a vegetated waterway. After cuttinglet all the terraces possible on native pasture, Mrs. Whiteside had to prepare outlets for the remaining terraces needed. Technicians for Soil Conservation Service did the necessary locating, designing and staking. Mrs. Whiteside hired employees of County Precinct 3 to do the constructing. Soil Conservation Service did the checking on construction. The next step in the establishment of cover will be to seed the waterway into small grain and then seed to K. R. bluestem about March 1st, according to spokesmen for SCS. It is then necessary to mow small grain to reduce competition to grass seedlings and provide shade for small grass plants.

Soil Conservation Service recommends the following steps in establishing waterways: locate, determine slope, soil and vegetation to be used, design, layout, construct, check against design for completion, and vegetate to design grasses. After grass is established, terraces may be outlet onto waterway.

From the Office of Lyndon Johnson

Senate Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson told his colleagues as Congress opened its session that "a potential for peace never before within man's reach" lies beyond the present peril faced by the United States.

Sen. Johnson told the conference of Democratic Senators that the ground beneath us when we last met has been, largely, swept away. Since Congress adjourned last August, he said, the human race has multiplied its capabilities to infinity.

The exploitation of these capabilities by men of selfish purpose holds the awful threat of a world in subjugation, he warned. "The mastery of such capabilities by men wholly dedicated to freedom presents, instead, the prospects of a world at last liberated from tyranny, liberated in fact from the threat of war."

The Texas Senator called for non-partisan, determined effort by members of Congress to make a beginning on what must ultimately be done to insure the unchallengeable strength of the nation.

"We must work, he declared, as though no other Congress would ever have an opportunity to meet this challenge, for, in fact, none will have an opportunity comparable."

"We must, furthermore, bring to this opportunity a freshness an originality, a diligence far exceeding our previous standards, for many of the concepts and ideas and rules which have been applied to our actions in the past are no longer pertinent and applicable."

RALPH YARBOROUGH'S Washington Report

One of the most important problems facing Congress this session is the question of what role the Federal Government should play in expanding America's educational program.

Dr. Charles A. Quattlebaum, specialist in education, recently said in a report prepared for the Senate Committee on Government Operations:

"Our development of more and better trained scientific engineering and other professional manpower is important to our national survival. The problem can be attacked from many approaches. There is no single solution."

As a partial answer to the tremendous need, I have introduced a bill providing for the extension of the educational provisions of the GI Bill of Rights. Educational provisions of the original bill ended Jan. 31, 1955, after the Korean War. My bill will permit all those who honorably served in the armed forces after that date, and those who do serve during the period up to July 1, 1956, to attend colleges of their choice under the GI Bill, with tuition and minimum subsistence paid.

As things now stand, only half of the high school graduates with high grades go on to college. I believe the adoption of my bill will offer many young men and women, who otherwise could not afford to attend college, the opportunity to secure a higher education. Several other bills will be introduced to establish special science and engineering education programs and I will support most of them. But I'm convinced we also need the extension of the GI Bill educational provisions to help provide continued balance in our national educational program: I believe we need to train more Americans, not only in science, but also in the humanities.

My bill, which is titled the Veterans Education Act of 1958 will be a step in the right direction, helping thousands of Americans to better educations. And the nation will be expressing its gratitude to the young Americans who are manning our radar warning stations in the Arctic, our Strategic Air Command planes, and our other freedom stations around the world.

News From The County Agent

The problem of livestock losses from poisonous plants is becoming more important as the quality of livestock and the value of land increases. Most of the plants poisonous to livestock on Texas ranges are native plants. They are grazed when desirable forage is scarce and when salting and watering facilities are inadequate, says B. T. Haws, county agent.

Overgrazing and periodical droughts are largely responsible for the decrease of the more desirable forage plants and consequent increase of toxic plants. Deferred and rotation grazing, moderate stocking, adequate livestock distribution and water conservation measures are range management practices that you should follow to improve native pastures and reduce weeds. Mechanical and chemical weed control, used in conjunction with range management practices, are also practical in many situations.

For more information on plants poisonous to livestock ask your local county agent for bulletin No. 796, "Texas Range Plants Poisonous to Livestock." This bulletin gives a description of the plant, distribution, sites of infestation, poisonous nature symptoms and the management and control practices.

News From The Congress

As the 85th Congress starts its second session, the question of National security over shadows all other issues. Russia has made truly startling technological and scientific advances and has stepped up the tempo of the cold war. The result has been that we find ourselves on the defensive all around the world. Not in recent history has the United States been so completely out maneuvered and so completely frustrated in our attempt to regain the initiative in world affairs. All this calls for immediate and effective action to regain our position as the leading scientific country of the world and as the determined leader of the free peoples of the world. We must not, however, act in a way that will destroy the very foundation of our country. There is much talk these days about a reorganization of the whole defense establishment, and suggestions have been made by different study groups and prominent individuals that we create some kind of single military leader in this country who would not be subject to all of the red tape and dis-organization that now exists in the Defense Department. There can be little question but what there needs to be a general overhauling in the defense establishment and that we need desperately unity of action, but we must not, in doing this, create any single military authority that is not subject to the control of civilians. It was the preeminence of the military that twice led Germany into disastrous world wars. The military must remain subject to the control of the civilian government if we are to preserve our Democracy. The Constitution makes the President the Commander in Chief of the Arm ed Services. He acts through the Secretary of Defense, and this is the way the system must continue to work. We cannot afford to create any super duper military czar modeled after the old Prussian system. There are also those that indicate that the answer to all of our problems from a scientific and military standpoint is the appropriation of additional funds. The problem is not so easily solved. While there probably is need for additional funds in certain areas, it will take more than money for us to regain supremacy. The real answer is less red tape and more effective, efficient management.
