



At that time, Texas was the third state in the nation, from the bottom in TB hospitals appropriations. In the hospitals there was a shortage of doctors, nurses, trained technicians and untrained personnel. Chaplains, end. dietitians, vocational therapists, and other vital personnel were needed. At an exorbitant rate, patients were leaving the hospitals against medical advice. They were returning to their homes where their disease worsened and where they spread new cycles of infection.

State TB hospital appropriations now average approximately \$6.00 per patient per hospital day. (In some states, the appropriation more than doubles that of Texas). But a greater per cent of patients are now remaining in hospitals until they receive medical dischrage.

Finding and preventing tuberculosis serves a dual purpose. Preventing the disease also prevents home and family disrupsent a gift.

A large percentage of home fires start by burning trash. Thelma Wirges, county HD agent, says that a good trash burner helps insure the safety and beauty of your home.

For convenience, locate the trashburner near the kitchen, but far enough away for safety. It does not have to be large, if trash is burned every day or two.

For materials that won't burn bottles, tin cans, etc., place a large fly-tight garbage can near the trashburner.

Sparks fly easily, so cover top and front of the trashburner with one-fourth inch wire mesh. It should be surrounded by shrubs that will not burn easily. Locate at least 12 feet away from buildings. Make sure the clothesline is well out of range

Plans for building your own Mortarless Trash Burner are available from your local county demonstration office.


QUESTION FOR THE LADIES

How many times did you answer your telephone to-day? Several times, I'll bet. Chances are, you'll get one or two more calls before the evening's over.


