Funeral services for Mr. Fred Lynch, 64, were held Sunday at 2:30 p. m. at the Owens and Brumley Funeral Home of Burkburnett with Rev. Fred Ferraez, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene, officiating. Burial was in the Burkburnett Cemetery.

A resident of Burkburnett for nearly 40 years, Lynch died in a Wichita Falls hospital following a heart attack early Friday night in his home. Born at Lone Oak, Texas, June 15, 1893, Lynch married Miss Bertha Alice Mitchell at Featherston, Okla., Dec. 31, 1919. The couple moved to Burkburnett the same year. Into this union was born one daughter, Miss Faye Christine Lynch.

Lynch owned and operated a rod and tubing machine during the oil boom. Later he was a pumper for the Staley, Staley and Langford lease. During the depression he owned and operated his own truck hauling the men for PWA. Following the depression, he worked as a truck driver for the county until he was injured on the job six years ago. He had been disabled since that time.

Survivors include the wife, and one daughter, Faye. Other survivors include two sisters, Mrs. Dollie Gordon, Wilton, Ark.; Mrs. Pearl Tipton, Trinity, Tex.; one brother, Dott Lynch, Hemet, Calif.; four nieces and six nephews.

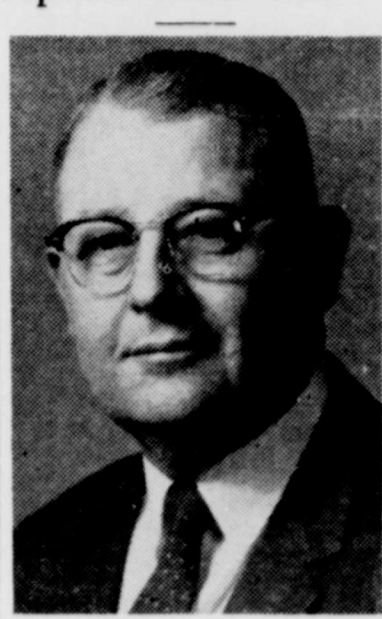
## Bluebonnet Club Flower Show Committee Met

## Spring Seminar Of Jehovah Witnesses Will Be April 18-20

## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

SHREVEPORT, LA., SUN: "A prominent newspaper recently reported on the improvement to unify most of the Protestant churches in the United States. Not an expert in theology, nor in church organization on a high level, we nevertheless think that is desirable for those of similar views to merge their churches into larger and more influential ones. We are happy that this is not a country of one church, and that our system of freedom of religion safeguards us from the dangers inherent in a one church system."

ELK GROVE, CALIF., CITIZEN: "Once again the news has appeared that income taxes have been cut, but once again the dateline has been Canada."

"Which brings to mind the wry comment of Utah's famous tax crusader, J. Bracken Lee: 'Death and taxes are said to be unavoidable, but we are lucky that death does not get worse everytime Congress meets!'"

Senator McClellan of Arkansas says: "I know that talk about eliminating extravagance, waste and nonessential expenditures in government is an old, old theme. It is something about which we have talked a lot but about which we have done very little."

"If we are to meet the challenge of world dangers that threaten our survival, it is imperative that we maintain sound fiscal policies and keep our economy strong."

RED CREEK, N. Y. HERALD: "The free nations have pooled their military powers, have armed for war but have not pooled their brain-power. It is past time they did. And this brain-power can be used for peaceful objectives too, for development of many great things to make life better, for science has not yet reached all its potentialities."

RIVERTON, WYO., RANGER: "Government has grown so large that it is beyond comprehension, incapable of self-regulation and bent on perpetuation of its various components. People fear the thought of the unwieldy monster attaching even one its tentacles onto the public schools, not matter how innocent the initial attachment seems to be."

## EVERYONE AN EXPLORER

National Library Week, which the nation has just celebrated, was made historic by a joint statement of former President Herbert Hoover and former President Harry Truman, marking the first time in their careers that they have seen eye-to-eye!

"The Bible tells us," they agreed, "that the truth shall make men free."

"We Americans know that if freedom means anything, it means the right to think. And the right to think means the right to read, anything, written anywhere, by any man, any time."

"Print is our passport to truth. It opens the richest empire man knows—the empire of the human heart and mind."

"Men die; devices change; success and fame run their course. But within the walls of even the smallest library in our land lie the treasures, the wisdom and the wonder of man's greatest adventure on this earth."

"National Library week will greatly serve if it makes us pause and remember these things."

To the joint and unanimous wisdom of our two very-much alive former Presidents of the US, we would like to add the comment of another chief executive, Gilbert W. Capman, president of the New York Public Library, the Yale and Towne Manufacturing Company and chairman of the National Book Committee, Inc. co-sponsor with the American Library Association of the first nation-wide observance of National Library Week.

"Our goal," says Mr. Chapman, "is to make every week National Library Week. There is no better way—perhaps no other way for us to preserve freedom and achieve our national objectives of peace and prosperity. What we have sought to do in this observance is to put as many of our citizens as possible in orbit, so they may revolve from here on about those centers of Light which are available to us all."

## A PERSONAL QUESTION

Last year the nation's fire loss was in the neighborhood of \$1 billion—a sum equal to the total personal income of all the people in New Hampshire. This proves the nation's continuing need for the most effective possible fire prevention work.

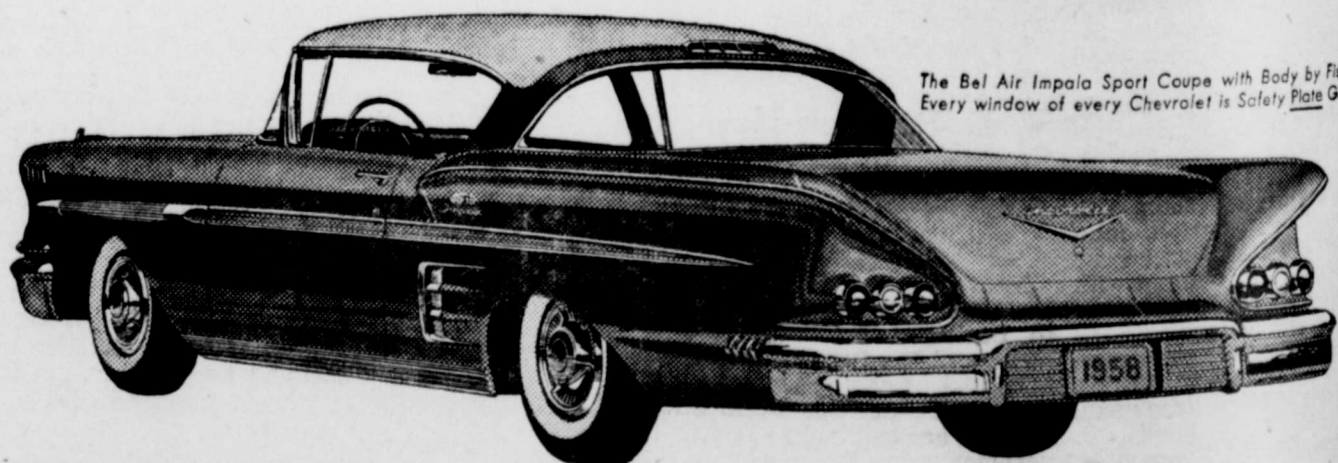

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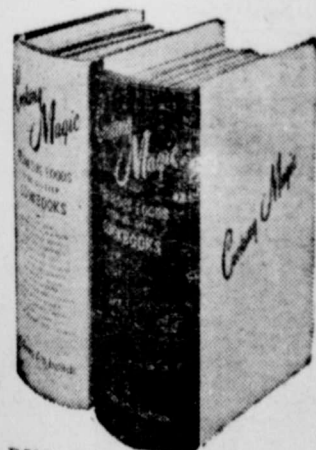

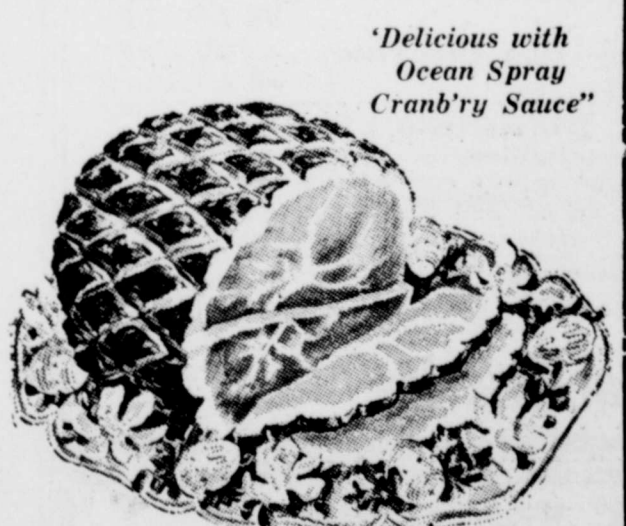

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**WHAT HAPPENS IF?**

What happens if you die? It is the law's business to look into the future and say what would happen if you die. In your contracts, leases, insurance policies, escrows and wills, you had better say what would happen if you die. Your best laid plans go awry. The law calls "contingencies."

What happens if you get the "earnest money" put down, if you cannot go through with buying that house? What happens if you want to pay up that house and save interest? What happens if a partnership goes wrong or a partner gets sick or dies? What happens if the person you name in your will should die before you do, or if you all die in a common catastrophe like a car smashup?

The law is wise but it cannot think for you. It sets up questions, but not answers to your liking. If you do make a will, the law says what shall get your property. If you leave certain things out of your will, the law assumes that you meant to put some certain things in. But how much better would it be in the first place to say what you want them to do by asking "what if?"

What happens if you die? Your first thought should be to take care of your wife and children, those

nearest to you. But it won't hurt anything to put "contingent beneficiaries" in your will in case something happens to thwart your first intentions.

Review your will every year or so to see if it meets the new things that have come up, or arrange with your lawyer to write in "contingent beneficiaries" those who will receive your property if your first beneficiaries should die before you do.

You may long ago have had your son provided for in your will, but what about those lovely grandchildren he and his wife have presented to you since you wrote the will? What would happen to them if things go wrong and your son should die before you?

Or take your widowed sister and her children now. Suppose you and your immediate family should be wiped out, would you want your property to go equally to her and your well-heeled bachelor brother? Or would you prefer to leave your brother some token of your affection, and then really take care of your sister?

You may be impatient with the law's long memory. Such things never happen, you think, but the court records are full of plans which failed. And so the law has ways in which you can provide for "what happens—if." One way is the device of contingent beneficiaries in your will and insurance policies.

Most of our Texas cities need to build hospitals, libraries, schools, streets, recreational facilities, city halls, but have been holding back for the lack of money.

The bill I am co-sponsoring with Senator Fullbright (D-Ark) would set up a \$2 billion revolving fund to allow states and other political subdivisions to borrow the money they need at around 2 percent interest for 30 years. This is an anti-high interest rate measure.

There are two major advantages in this program.

First, it would get men back to work quicker in the areas of greatest need, because cities could get their local public works jobs rolling much faster than bigger federal public works projects can be put in motion.

Second, there will be very little, if any, waste under this program. Some cities might take Federal public works funds for unneeded projects. Few Cities will construct facilities they do not need with funds they have to pay back.

### News From The County Agent

Bennie Rogers, 4-H clubber from Valley View, received a \$25 War Bond this week from the Midwest Cooperative Oil Mills at Hamlin, for outstanding work in the 4-H Cooperative program.

Three Wichita County communities entered the 1958 Bridwell Community program this week. The three communities entering are Friberg-Cooper, Valley Farms and City View. The chairman of the Valley Farms community is C. E. Russell; Friberg-Cooper's chairman is Clinton Swinford, and City View's chairman is J. B. Cissell.

The Wichita Valley DHIA Association ranked first in the state in average pounds of milk, which was 880 lbs and first in the state in average pounds of fat, which was 33 lbs.

Silage continues to be the cheapest substitute for pasture. One ton of silage costing \$4.00 to \$5.00 is equal in feeding value to about 500 pounds of 16% grain mixture costing \$15. to \$18.00.

Final plans have been made for the Annual Tri-County Dairy Show to be held at the 4-H barn on Tuesday, April 29th. Prize money and ribbons will be awarded. Plan now to enter some animals in the show.

There is still time to take soil samples and send them to the soil testing laboratory at Texas A&M College or Midwestern University Soil Laboratory, before

most 1958 crops will be planted. If the samples are submitted in the very near future, they can be processed and recommendations returned in time for use this spring, says B. T. Haws, county agent.

Plan before you plant is a basic rule for successful vegetable gardening. Many vegetables grown in home gardens are wasted because too large a quantity of one vegetable matures at the same time. To avoid this trouble plant a succession of plantings in order to keep wastage to a minimum and more garden fresh vegetables available over a much longer period of time.

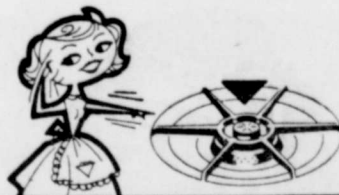

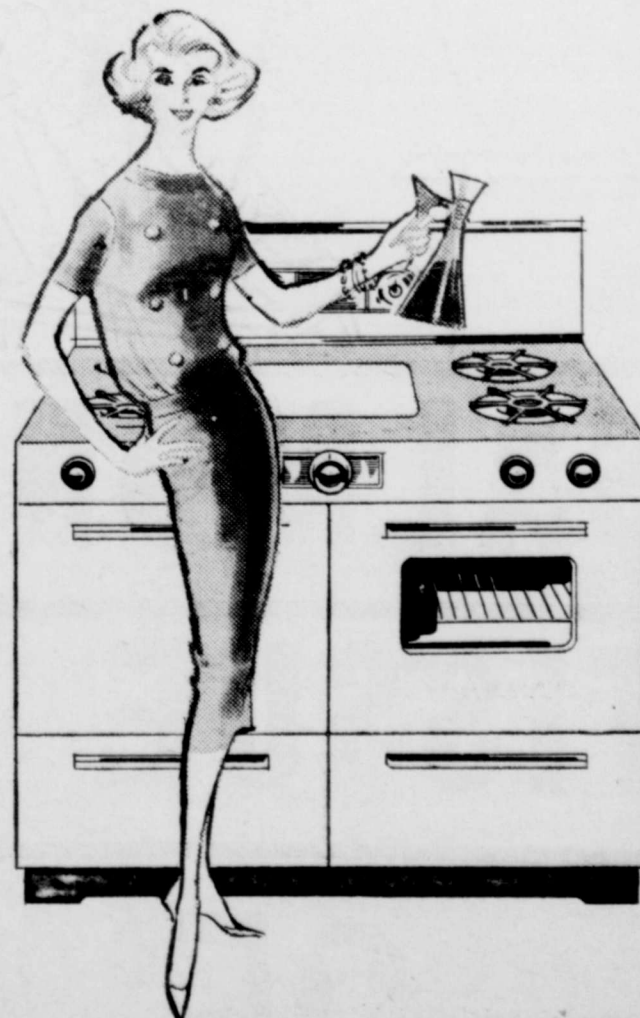

In so doing we will become more fully acquainted with the gravity of the situation at hand and the sincerity of all members to act not on their behalf or personal feelings, but for your interests as residents of this School District and to the betterment of our school all attending students.

Yes, it is enlightening to examine minutes of previous school board meetings. But, since it will be convenient for every one to check the minutes before voting time Saturday, April 5th, we did a check on our own.

On March 27th we accused four members of the board of voting "solid in most instances to dominate the actions of the board". Let's see if there is truth of prevalent accusations".

#### THE SOLID FOUR IS BORN

The following was taken from the school board minutes of June 17, 1957: "The question of filling unexpired term of Mr. Archie Faulk was discussed. Mr. Roy Mitchell nominated Mr. J. C. Hinkle. Mr. Herman Miller nominated Mr. Rudolph Robinson. Motion was made by Mr. Preston and seconded by Mr. Mitchell that nominations close to the two above mentioned men be voted on. Motion carried. Mr. J. C. Hinkle received four votes. Mr. Rudolph Robinson received one vote."

From July 8, 1957 to March 20, 1958, the board met sixteen meetings. One hundred ninety-five propositions were voted on. The solid four voted solid times out of 195. That is fairly solid. On two occasions did any of the solid four stray from the fold. On July 22, 1957, Supt. Ralph Davis asked for a raise for school employees, other than teachers. This includes caretakers, cafeteria workers, etc. In this category, salaries start at \$1,080.00 for six months. Many are under the \$2,000.00 mark. Mitchell and Hinkle voted to keep the salaries at same figure as the previous year. Miller, Preston and Nixon voted against holding the salaries at the previous low level. Crane was absent.

On March 5, 1958 the board voted on the proposition of paying the newly elected Supt. \$9,000.00 a year. That was too rich for Hinkle's blood. He voted the solid four and voted against the measure, which did not carry. The above is the only two instances where the solid four split up. They carried a total of 194 propositions out of 195. Two of the solid four made and seconded 58 of the 195 propositions voted on.

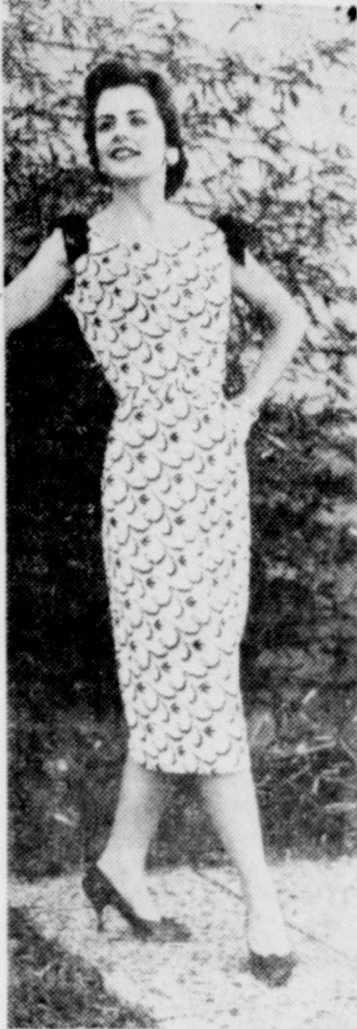

## News From The Congress

By Congressman Frank Ikard

The recent rise in the cost of living has again directed attention as to what portion of retail food prices reflect the price that the farmer gets for his products. The last Report that has been issued on the spread between farm and retail prices points out that in 1948 when wheat was selling for \$2.81 a bushel, the average farm prices of wheat had 13.8 cents. Several years later when the average farm price of wheat had dropped to \$2.14 the price of bread had increased to 17.5. The Report also shows that a Twenty-Two cent box of corn flakes contains only Three cents worth of corn and that the average city family in the late Forties spent \$261. annually for meat products of which amount the farmer received \$176. By the mid fifties, this same family was spending \$263. for the same amount of meat, but the farmer was getting only \$164. Also, it is pointed out that a Four Dollar cotton shirt contains about Thirty Cents worth of cotton. All of this adds up to the fact that farm prices do not affect the end retail price of a commodity as much as we are sometimes led to believe that it does

and that every time we buy a loaf of bread or a steak or shirt, much of the cost that we pay for it represents processing and labor costs, and in the case of many commodities, the actual price to the farmer for the raw product does not actually influence the retail price much one way or the other. For instance, a peanut candy bar contains only about one-half Cents worth of peanuts, and if the peanuts were provided free, chances are the price of the candy would not change one bit.

This week Governor Price Daniel of Texas and Governor Gary of Oklahoma testified before the Committee on Ways and Means on the devastating effect that oil imports are having on the economies of both Texas and Oklahoma. Both of these Governors made excellent statements. It will probably be late in April before the Committee finishes its consideration of the reciprocal trade program and the matter comes before the Congress.

## Social Security Information

Of special interest to disabled workers is the provision of the Social Security Act which provides for disability payments at age 50. In order to qualify for these benefits, the disabled person must be unable to perform any substantial gainful activity and must have worked under social security for at least 5 out of the 10 years immediately preceding the date he became disabled. At least a year and a half of this work must have been during the three years just before the disability began. In addition, the disabled individual must have filed an application for these benefits.

Disabled workers who have been unable to work for a prolonged period may lose their rights to disability payments at age 50 if they do not file an ap-

plication before June 30, 1958. Failure to file for these disability provisions may also effect their rights to benefits upon retirement and to benefits for their survivors in the event of the worker's death.

Any disabled person who meets the requirements set forth above is urged to contact his nearest social security office. If the individual is unable to make this contact in person, a friend or relative may notify the Social Security Administration in his behalf.

Persons desiring information or assistance in social security matters are invited to meet with the representative who will be in Burkburnett at the City Hall on Tuesday, April 1st.

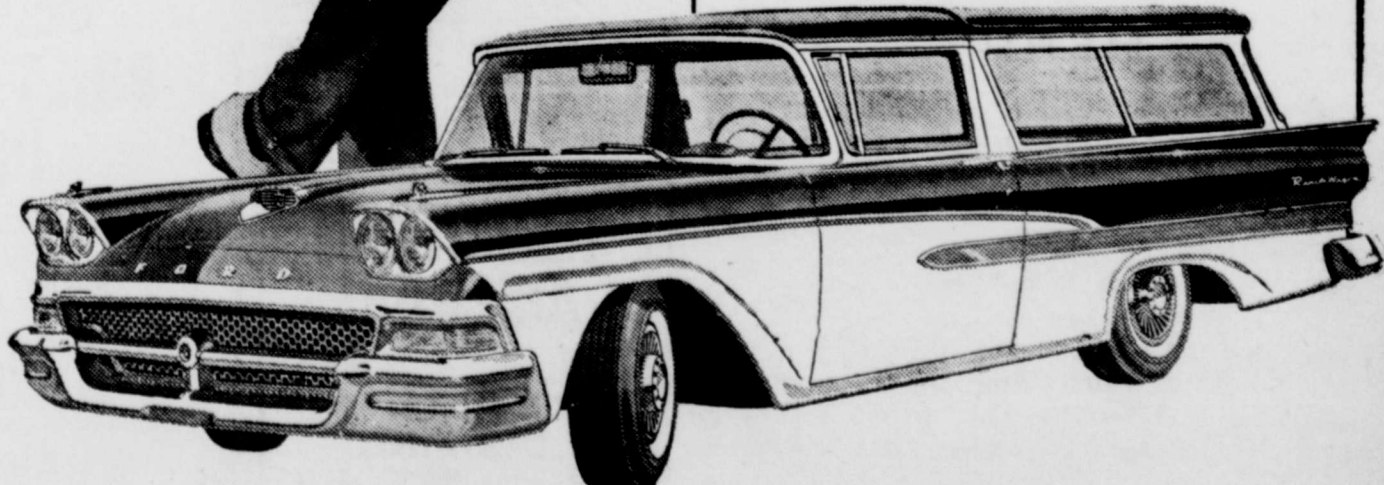

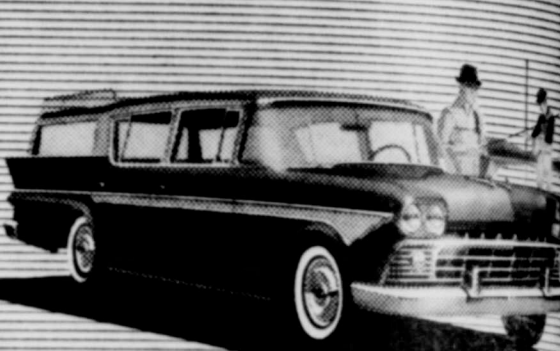
