Funeral services for Mr. Fred Lynch, 64, were held Sunday at 2:30 p. m. at the Owens and Brumley Funeral Home of Burkburnett with Rev. Fred Ferraez. pastor of the Church of the Nazarene, officiating. Burial was in the Burkburnett Cemetery.

A resident of Burkburnett for nearly 40 years, Lynch died in a Wichita Falls hospital following a heart attack early Friday night in his home. Born at Lone Oak, Texas, June 15, 1803, Lynch married Miss Bertha Alice Mitchell at Featherson, Okla., Dec. 31, 1919. The couple moved to Burkburnett the same year. Into this union was born one daughter, Miss Faye Christine Lynch.

Lynch owned and operated a rod and tubing machine during the oil boom. Later he was a pumper for the Staley, Staley and Langford lease. National Library Week, which the nation has just celebrated, was made historic by a joint statement of former President Herbert Hoover and former President Harry Truman, marking the first time in their careers that they have seen eye-to-eye!

"The Bible tells us," they agreed, "that the truth shall make men free.

"We Americans know that if freedom means anything, it means the right to think. And the right to think means the right to read, anything, written anywhere, by any man, any time. Print is our passport to truth. It opens the richest empire

man knows-the empire of the human heart and mind. "Men die: devices change; success and fame run their course. But within the walls of even the smallest library in our land lie

the treasurers, the wisdom and the wonder of man's greatest adventure on this earth. "National Library week will greatly serve if it makes us pause in said cause by all other parties

To the joint and unanimous wisdom of our two very-much alive former Presidents of the US, we would like to add the comment of another chief executive, Gilbert W. Capman, president of the New York Public Library, the Yale and Towne Manufacturing Company and chairman of the National Book Committee, Inc. co-sponsor with the American Library Association of the first nation-wide observance of National Library Week.

"Our goal," says Mr. Chapman, "is to make every week National Library Week. There is no better way-perhaps no other way for us to preserve freedom and achieve our national objectives of peace and prosperity. What we have sought to do in this observance is to put as many of our citizens as possible in orbit, so they may revolve from here on about those centers of Light which are available to us all."





Washington Report

In order to help get men back to work fast, I am co-sponsoring a bill to help cities and counties own local public works projects.

Most of our Texas cities need to build hospitals, libraries, schools, streets, recreational facilities, city halls, but have been holding back for the lack of

The bill I am co-sponsoring with Senator Fullbright (D-Ark) would set up a \$2 billion revolving fund to allow states and other political subdivisions to borrow the money they need at around 2 percent interest for 30 years. This is an anti-high interest rate measure.

There are two major advantages in this program.

First, it would get men back to work quicker in the areas of greatest need, because cities could get their local public works jobs rolling much faster than bigger federal public works projects can be put in motion.

Second, there will be very little, if any, waste under this program. Some cities might take Federal public works funds for unneeded projects. Few Cities will construct facilities they do not need with funds they have to pay back.



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Social Security Information

Of special interest to disabled workers is the provision of the Social Security Act which provides for disability payments at age 50. In order to qualify for these benefits, the disabled person must be unable to perform any substantial gainful activity and must have worked under social security for at least 5 out abled. At least a year and a half during the three years just be-

Disabled workers who have been unable to work for a prolonged period may lose their rights to disability payments at age 50 if they do not file an ap-

plication before June 30, 1958. Failure to file for these disability provisions may also effect their rights to benefits upon retirement and to benefits for their survivors in the event of the worker's death.

Any disabled person who meets the requirements set forth above is urged to contact his nearest social security office. If the individual is unable to make this contact in person, a friend or relative may notify the Social Security Administration in his

Persons desiring information or assistance in social security matters are invited to meet with the representative who will be in Burkburnett at the City Hall on Tuesday, April 1st.

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
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
