

Most Americans are good drivers—the high traffic toll not-

The Council make a good point: with upwards of 70 million vehicles whizzing past each other only a couple of feet apart, the average driver must make 20 to 50 decisions an hour, many of them literally involving life or death. Last year's all-time low death rate of 5.9 fatalities per 100 million miles of travel proves Invariably our reply is a stock one. The reading matter to which that most drivers made the right decisions.

Most of us want to be good drivers. We pride ourselves on our skill and common sense. We obey the law. We don't want to hurt ourselves, our families or the stranger in the other car. prise. Our suggestion would be that the censors inaugurate an Then why do we have accidents? Carelessness'

Carelessness is a catch-all word that covers a multitude of sins. Good drivers that we are most of the time, every one who has ever been behind the wheel of a car remembers the near misses, and our accident toll is made up of those that didn't miss.

We get tired. We burn up at some minor rudeness by another driver. We drive a little too fast. We take a chance in passing. We think a couple of drinks can't do any harm. Or due to any one of hundred distractions, we let our attention waver from the road for an instant beyond recall.

The National Safety Council estimates that more than 45 million cars will be on the roads over the day Fourth of July holiday. So don't be a good driver most of the time. You can't afford to make even one mistake.

Is He "Clean As A Hound's Tooth"

As of this writing, "Assistant President" Sherman Adams has employed the long suffering Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty as a buffer between himself and the press in the Gold-

In a written statement relayed to newsmen by Mr. Hagerty Gov. Adams admitted that he had used the Goldfine suite in that Boston Hotel, and that he had gotten in touch with the Federal Trade Commission and the Securities and Exchange Commission regarding Mr. Goldfine's problems, but that these contacts wer only "Inquiries.

In a previous statement, Mr. Goldfine said that he and Mrs Goldfine had visited with the Adamses in each others homes "on many occassions during the past many years", and that: "On some occasions, when Mr. and Mrs. Adams have been passing through Boston, I have entertained them at a Boston hotel and the bills have been paid by one of my companies." Mr. Goldfine was emphatic in regarding this as the same as offering the hospitality of his home, even though the House Subcommittee on Legislative Oversight says the Adams' hotel bills amount to about \$2,000. He also denied that his old friend had ever used, or tried to use any influence in his behalf.

In answer to reporters' questions, Mr. Hagerty said: "The President finds nothing improper in accepting the hospitaliy of an old friend." Asked if he saw any similarity between the allegations presented to the subcommittee and the so-called "Truman scandals," Mr. Hagerty said he didn't know anything about the

But, for all his protestantions of ignorance, Mr. Hagerty must know the differences far outweigh any conceivable similarity. For one thing, Federal bureaucrats had not at that time been threatened within an inch of their jobs in the matter of accepting so much as a free lunch from anyone involved with the Government watchdogs. For another, the peccadillos of such hired help as Donald Dawson, T. Lamar Caudle and Harry Vaughn can hardly be compared with questionable conduct from the man who is far more than his title of "Presidential Assistant" implies, who, in the judgement of many close observers, has served as Acting President of the United States.

Freedom To Advertise

Another vicious invasion of our dwindling freedoms was chalked up last month when the Bureau of Internal Revenue took action to try to gag private industry from using advertising to fight government competition." Thus begins a long editorial in The American Press, a monthly magazine which speaks for the weekly newspapers of this country.

The ruling in question was that advertising placed by electric utility companies, and presenting their side of the public vs private power controversy ,could no longer be deducted as business expense for income tax purposes. Needless to say, all the proponents of socialized power greeted this act with shouts of joy.

The American Press also says: "We can't think of a more American way for business to battle for its rights than to take its case to the people by the use of advertising space. Surely this is more to be desired than secret, behind closed doors lobbying, which seems to be the alternative.

"It is our hope that the electric companies will not only fight this ruling in the tax courts but will go a step further and use part of their advertising space to acquaint the people with this attempt of the government to 'gag' them.

Freedom to advertise is an important part of freedom of the press, and should be guarded with equal care. It is, in many cases the one vehicle through which business can 'speak out in open

This goes far beyond the fight over who is to produce this country's electricity. If a tax penalty can be used to prevent any many, any industry or any group from stating his side of a case, one of the most essential of the freedoms supposedly guaranteed by the Constitution is on its deathbed. And government bureaus, tax weapon at the ready, will decide what can or cannot be said in the advertising pages of our newspapers and magazines.

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
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MJF's Enjoy Picnic Hobo Party June 26

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
