New Dial Telephones In Operation Sunday Sept. 21 in Iowa Park

Long distance charges on telephone calls between Wichita Falls and Iowa Park will be eliminated at 1:01 Sunday.

That's when the new dial telephone office at Iowa Park goes into operation, Ralph Templin, district manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, said.

This means all telephone users in Wichita Falls can dial numbers in Iowa Park in the same manner as they now dial a local call, he added. Also, they can be called by Iowa Park customers in the same manner.

Iowa Park has more than 1000 telephones. This means Wichita Falls telephone users can dial their calls to more than 40,500 telephones after the new system goes into operation, Templin explained.

Iowa Park telephone numbers will change to the seven numeral system which went into service in Wichita Falls earlier this year.

The Iowa Park prefix will be 592. This will be followed by four numerals.

"We call this new system Extended Area Service," Templin explained. "We feel it will contribute to the growth and community interest for both cities."

This same type of service is scheduled for Henrietta in 1959. Henrietta now has more than 1,200 telephones and is growing.

When this service goes into operation, Wichita Falls telephone customers will be able to call both cities without payment of a long distance charge.

The Wichita County Program building committee met this past week to approve plans for a new year of the county extension work. This is work to be done in the county agricultural and home demonstration program. Mr. Gene Robertson, chairman, presided over the meeting.

The meeting followed a series of sub committee meetings on various phases of agriculture and home economics. Sub committee chairmen reporting were Dairy, Gene Robertson; Sheep, Gale Lowrance; Clothing, Mrs. Gail Mitchell; Home Improvement, Mrs. J. L. Graham; Field Crops, L. D. Barbour; Beef, Joe Price; Foods and Nutrition, Mrs. L. L. McHugh; Organization, Mrs. Marye Eckelkamp and farm and home management and safety, Dutch Eckelkamp.

Thelma Wirges, county HD agent, presented information from the HD survey and Wichita county census on income level of families, age of homemakers and place of residence. The census reveals that 81% of the Wichita county families live in an urban area, 16% live in a rural area but do not farm, and only 3% live on a farm or ranch.

Officers for a new year were elected as follows: Gene Robertson, chairman; L. L. McHugh, vice chairman and Miss Shirley Van Huss secretary.

At this meeting, and in the various sub committee meetings the status of the county situation was analyzed, problems listed, possible solutions stated and objectives for 1959 made.

The home demonstration program will include the following things as a result of plans made by this committee: 1. HD clubs will carry family meal and kitchen demonstrations. 2. extra leader training will be provided on food preservation. These leaders will teach non-club members. 3. Milk in the diet will be stressed with all groups. 4. 4-H clubs will include foods demonstrations in their club demonstrations. 5. News articles will be written and exhibits will

be put up on better methods of homemaking. 6. HD leaders will teach landscape information as a result of training to be given by Miss Sadie Hatfield, Homestead Improvement Specialist. 7. Clothing workshops for adult groups and 4-H club groups will be held in Electra, Burkburnett and Wichita Falls.

Miss Sadie Hatfield, Homestead improvement specialist, for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be in Wichita county Sept. 24-25-26th.

On Thursday, Sept. 25th Miss Hatfield will give training to some 25 Wichita County leaders. These leaders will represent home demonstration clubs, farm and home development families, county program building committee and garden clubs. These leaders will be responsible for teaching others, following this training.

On Friday Miss Hatfield will give training to County HD agents from the district.

Both meetings will include demonstrations and training on the home landscape. The meetings will be held at the home of Mrs. Jud Irby, north of Electra. Mrs. Irby is a member of the county home improvement committee and helped make plans for the meeting.

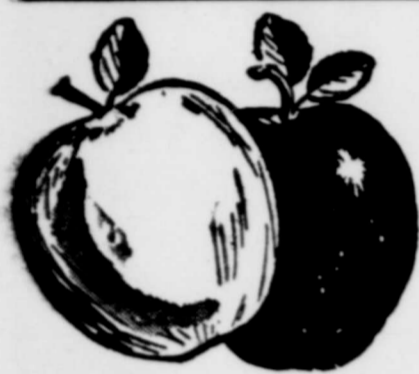

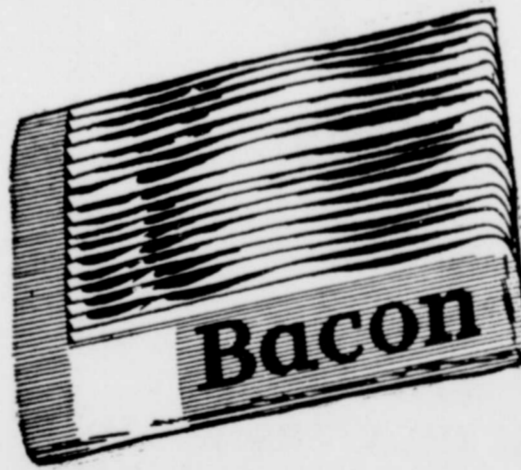

Army to Flex Missile Muscle at Texas-Okla. Fair in Iowa Park

Visitors to the Texas-Okla. Iowa Park, Sept. 22-27th, get a first hand opportunity to learn about the latest missiles from the U. S. Army's arsenal for the first time.

The Army's Chief of Information announced today that negotiations with Fair officials have been completed to have the elaborate exhibit brought in from Washington, D. C. Army information specialists will be on hand to answer questions concerning the various missiles.

The exhibit is the Army's broad research and development program as its theme, the exhibit sets up the Army's success in development of operational missiles for the nation's atomic arsenal. Tracing the history of the missile from 1232 A. D. to the present era of missiles and rockets, the huge information display utilizes colorful paintings, photo murals and a colorful picture showing actual launching of all the Army's missiles. An unusual 3-D black light display of the free world's first satellite, the U. S. Army's "Star" is a main attraction of the exhibit.
