### News From The County Agent

Recent rains have provided moisture needed for soil preparation and the planting of fall gardens, says B. T. Haws, county agent. If planted now, snap beans, lima beans, squash and the leafy green vegetables should produce good crops before freet fore frost.

Soil should be prepared now for later plantings of turnips, collards, kale, swiss chard and broccoli, says the county agent. He recommends disking two or three times to form a smooth, firm seedbed. If only a small area is to be planted ,he says a hand rake can be used to smooth the seedbed. Because most vege-table seed are small, it is necessary to break up clods and plant them in a firm smooth bed in

order to obtain a good stand.

Vegetables planted now will insure a good supply through the late fall and winter months and provide the family with the green and leafy vegetables they need for a good diet, says Haws.

The county agent advises those who may desire more information on fall and winter gardening problems to visit the local county extension agents for advice and free publications.

Speeding is the visitor's number one offense—and there are only six states in which you can plead "ignorance of the law." All states now have posted maximum highway driving speeds except six where speed must be kept "reasonable and prudent."

Here are a few other pointers to remember when traveling from state to state. Coasting in neutral is prohibited in almost all states. It is unlawful to park on the highway in all states except Georgia, Rhode Island and Washington D. C.

You must dim your headlights upon meeting a car at night in all states. In Louisiana and Montana, the law requires that you dim lights when following a car as well. Spotlights are prohibited in Louisiana and

### The National Outlook OMISSIONS OF THE 85th CONGRESS

Praise has been high for the second session of the 85th congress. It has been called one of the most productive in history. In many respects there are grounds for praise. There also are grounds for serious disappointment.

In three crucial fields there was no significant action. These

1. For all practical purposes nothing was done in the area of labor. A bill was passed requiring routine reporting on pension funds, but it was not of a character which will assure there will be no further fraud in the handling of such funds. On overall labor legislation the only proposal considered by either House was the Kennedy-Ives bill. This passed the Senate with only one dissenting vote, and much has been made of that. Actually, this top heavy vote in no sense reflected the basic feeling of the Senate. This is shown by the fact that one amendment after another was offered in the Senate to strengthen the bill. These amendments received support, but in no case a majority.

The Kennedy-Ives bill, upon passage by the Senate, was referred to the House. It was held on the desk of the Speaker for forty-one days. By then we were in the last days of this session of the Congress, and the House Labor Committee failed to report out the bill. An attempt was then made to bring the measure up without a committee report, which would require a two-thirds vote of the House members for passage. Not even a majority voted to bring up the bill, so the measure died.

Even if the Kennedy-Ives bill had passed it would have done no good from the viewpoint of solving the labor problem. As a matter of fact, as a result of various provisions weakening the Taft-Hartley Act, it would have done genuine harm. It also is questionable whether the President would have signed the bill d it reached his desk. This is indicated by his call for a real labor reform measure just at the end of the Congress, and his supplementary Labor Day message in which he briefly outlined

2. Various tax bills were passed, but nothing in the way of eform on the income tax rate structure was considered. The bills passed were an extension of the old corporate tax rate, to the state of their own pocketbooks. They don't realize that elimination of certain transportation taxes, various changes in every cent must be paid one way or another by the taxpayers excise taxes, and a measure designed to help small business. of today and of generations to come. And that term "taxpayers" The total revenue effect of these actions was relatively small except for the extension of the corporate rate.

The failure to take up the problem of rate reform is all the more remarkable because the House Ways and Means Committee held hearings from January 7th to February 7th, and the majority of the witnesses made it clear they were in favor of think twice if we really understood that we must pay a part of something along the lines of the Sadlak-Herlong tax reform proposal. That proposal was a five year program designed to reduce think once or don't think at all. the base individual rate by 25 percent, and all progressive rates by a designated amount each year until the top rate was 42 per cent. Corporate taxes also would have been reduced within the same period to 42 percent from the present 52 percent.

The Administration never was in favor of the Sadlak-Herlong proposal, and with Congress in a spending mood and revenues declining as a result of the recession, neither this nor any other tax reform measure even reached the floor of the Congress.

3. Nothing was done to clarify the issue of State versus **Federal** jurisdiction. This issue has arisen because the Supreme Court has handed down various decisions which have clearly indicated that when there is a Federal law on a subject, any state laws relating thereto are not enforceable. That this is a new doctrine goes without saying. A bill (Smith bill, HR-3), introduced in and passed the House would have corrected this situation, but is was opposed by the Administration and in the Senate was recommitted by a vote of 41-40. The question of Federal preemption, therefore, is just where it was before the 85th Congress convened. There are other areas where legislation is needed and was not passed, and others where it was desirable that nothing be done. The three mentioned above, however, are the most important omissions because each will continue as a major problem until each one is solved.

### A Bargain

It has been said that gasoline is a bargain. A few facts bear

Today we pay an average of 30 1-2 cents a gallon for regular grade gas. This is an increase of only 17 percent over 1948 - a much smaller increase than has been chalked up for commodities Gilbert recently. The meeting

Moreover, included in that 30 1-2 cent price are taxes amounting to 9 cents-41 per cent more than the taxes of 10 years ago. If we exclude the tax, the average price of gasoline today is 21 1-2 cents-only 10 per cent more than a decade ago.

Still another comparison tells the story in a different way. Between 1948 and now, the cost of finding oil increased 125 percent. The cost of oil field equipment increased 90 percent. Hourly wages paid production workers increased 61 percent. Yet the price of gas, excluding the taxes over which the industry has no control, increased a mere 10 percent.

Finally, these figures can't show the many improvements in gasoline quality since 1948 - improvements that make each gallon do more and better work.

### Your Money

The Portland Oregonian prints a letter from a reader which offers an interesting suggestion. He proposes that we stop the "Silly' Practice" of referring to the financing projects with government money" or "federal funds" as though it was manna

Instead, he thinks, we should start calling such financing the principles which must be followed to solve the labor problem. by its right name - that is "your money" or "taxpayers' funds." There is a world of merit in this idea. A great many people
