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Berlin Blockade Can Be Broken Again

Russia has shown again that the Communists can't be trusted to enter into any conference with good faith. While representa- refunding all membership fees and deposits, rate reductions tives of the major powers were meeting in Geneva to try to lay a groundwork of some kind to avoid mass destruction by atomic warfare, Russian Premier Nikita Khrushchev brought up a new and discordant issue in Moscow which he hopes will throw the free nations off balance.

Khrushchev, at a Soviet-Polish friendship meeting, demanded an end to four power occupation of Berlin. He hinted that Russia might break its treaty promise to permit free access between West Berlin and West Germany.

The United States State Department reacted with commend-

able promptness. It bluntly rejected Khrushchev's demand. If Khrushchev wants to try to isolate West Berlin, as the Reds did several years ago, the Allied airlift which broke the back of the Communist blockade can be revived.

Naturally the Communists would like for the Allies to move out of West Berlin. East Germany, which is under Communist dictatorship, would absorb it immediately.

The United States State Department said that three powersthe United States, France and Great Britain-are prepared to fight if necessary to defend West Berlin's freedom. Any weakening of this stand would be playing into the hands of the Communists. If the Western Powers make any concession in West Berlin, they bolster Communist confidence to make agrressive pushes in other directions.

Holding West Berlin is a key to containing communism thruout the world.

People Increase Faster Than Forecasts

As recently as 20 or 25 years ago many students of population trends were forecasting that late in this century the number of Americans would reach a top figure of about 175,000,000 and then perhaps go into a gradual decline. Some went so far as to say that there never would be more than 160,000,000 Americans. a total to be attained by about the year 1975.

How wrong they were has already been demonstrated. In this year 1958 there are already 175,000,000 Americans and the population is rising rapidly. Growth in recent years has surpassed Census Bureau forecasts. And now the bureau has come out with

new prognostications raising its sights materially. Only two years ago the bureau forecast a 1975 population of between 206,900,000 and 228,500,000. Sunday it came out with new estimates that our population will rise by 1975 to somewhere between 215,800,000 and 243,900,000. The spread of 28,000,000 is due to possible shifts in fertility and mortality rates, and im-

migration figures. In any event, our population now is expected not only to continue to rise rapidly but also to exceed greatly the outlook

of as recently as two years ago. It is explained that the projections are based upon expectation of high economic activity and employment, no major war and no disastrous epidemics.

One notable fact in the forecasts is that the number of Americans in the main working group will remain fairly constant while the population as a whole is going up rapidly. In other words, while there will be many more mouths to feed, there will be comparatively few additional producers to feed them. Growing productivity both on the farm and in the factory should take care of that situation handily, however.

Continued heavy population increase will bring many problems, especially in urban areas. There is no question, however, of this country's ability to maintain a much larger population and to do it on a high standard of living.

Vote Of Confidence

Proponents of socialized power always claim that the people are solidly behind them. But it's one thing to make a claim and another to prove it.

For instance, the people have no chance to pass on such matters as big Federal power projects. Congress approves or disapproves them. But at frequent intervals, elections are held in which the issue is public power versus private power. Over the years, private power has been given the vote in the great majority of cases.

No Cause Fr Cheers

Reports now indicate that this year's federal deficit will probably be well below the \$12 billion figure that was forecast until recently. The reason, however, isn't that government spending is declining. It is, instead, that the upturn in business activity and personal incomes are raising tax revenues.

A reduced deficit will be good news. But it shouldn't lead to any cheering. At best, the government will go into the hole by billions. That means more national debt. That means more danger of inflation. That means ever-poorer chances for tax reduction.

If the next Congress continues the spending sprees of its predecessors, we'll keep right on moving toward a further debased currency and ultimate national bandruptcy. It's happened all over the world. It can happen here.
