

Instead Of Air Lift To Berlin (From The HOUSTON CHRONICLE)

The Western Allies are reported to have agreed on an airlift to supply their garrisons in Berlin if the East German puppet regime attempts to control traffic along the ground routes.

This no doubt will be hailed in some quarters as an astute move, possibly even as a bold one.

It is nothing of the kind.

Instead of announcing that they would resort to a costly airlift-precisely what Khrushchev wants them to do-the United Author Boris Pasternak through its condemnation by the Soviet States Britain and France should declare that their trucks are going through even if tanks, supported by planes, have to blast he found it expedient to reject. But, here, again, will he be able the path clear of obstructions.

The probability is that the East Germans would not attempt to exercise authority over ground traffic in that event. The Russians might even give up their plan to turn over control of the autobohn, railroad and canal traffic to the East Germans.

We don't have to continue compounding the errors which began with the calamitous decision in 1944 to allow Russia to occupy East Germany.

As result of that decision, it will be recalled, American forces who had reached the Elbe River south of Berlin stopped there and waited for the Russians to come up. Then we withdrew our forces 125 miles and more.

We could have occupied most of what is now East Germany, including Berlin, for the Nazis would have surrendered the city to us rather than fight the Russians to the bloody end.

A Special Kind Of Business

The producers of minerals operate under special provisions of the Federal income tax laws. Varying percentages of their income from production are tax deductible.

It is often asked why these particular businessmen should be given a special deduction. The answer is simple. An expert on the subject, after pointing out that mineral production is a special kind of business, says: "The depletion provisions in the tax laws recognition to the fact that the income of a producer of any mineral comes from the sales of a diminishing asset. The asset is his oil, gas, coal or ore in the ground, or whatever other mineral deposit it may be. This asset is used up-depleted-in the normal course of the producer's business, every time he sells a barrel of oil or a ton of coal or iron ore.'

The depletion rate for oil and gas has long been set by Congress at 27 1-2 percent-higher than for any of the other minerals, because there is more risk involved in the search for oil and gas than in that for any other minerals. For instance, last year 8,014 test wells were drilled in hopes of finding oil or gas-and 7,142, or 89 percent, turned out dry and worthless. They produced nothing but red ink in the books. And of the 872 producers, fewer than half turned up amounts of oil sufficient for profitable operations. The depletion allowance is in no sense a tax loophole. It's a necessity if men are to take the long risks necessary to meet our demand for oil.

Something Else Again

Union heads are bitterly opposed to the right-to-work laws, which put union membership on a voluntary instead of a compulsory basis. They go all out in fighting these laws at the polls, which is their right.

But it is something else again when they attempt to prevent people from voting on the laws.

If this forecast is correct, organized labor will try to muzzle the electorate. Just suppose organized industry tried the same thing in regard to measures it opposes. The outcry would shake the country, and it should. Everyone who believes in representative government-no matter what his views on right-to-work-
