

NORWALK, CONN., HOUR: "The largest union in the free world, the Metal Workers Union of West Germany, has been ordered to pay employers for money lost when they went on strike.

The Court Is Out Of Step

"The framers of our constitution never intended," says the American Farm Bureau Federation in a resolution adopted without opposition at its recent Boston convention "that there should be vested in the Supreme Court of the United States power to legislate, power to distort the plain language of the Constitution, or power to interfere with matters of purely State or local concern where constitutional privileges and immunities of citizens are in no way bridged."

The convention was, it said, "seriously concerned with the present tendency of the Supreme Court to legislate with the acquiescence of the executive branch" and with the further tendency of Congress to relinquish legislative powers.

The resolution urged that Congress prescribe proper limitations of the court's jurisdiction, and that it enact "corrective or conforming legislation in those fields where the Supreme Court has invaded the legislative area."

While the Farm Bureau resolution does not refer specifically to any decision or ruling of the court, the delegates are obviously in agreement with former Indiana Congressman Samuel B. Pettengill, who takes issue with the oft repeated statement that the court's ukase (in the school segregation issue) is "the law of the land."

"But more important than integration or segregation," writes Mr. Pettengill in HUMAN EVENTS, "is the preservation of the constitution against the brainwashing of the American people now going on to support the curious notion that a decision of the US Supreme Court, any decision, is law.

"There is not a word in the Constitution which says that a Supreme Court judgement is 'the law of the land'; there is not a word which says that public officials or private citizens are legally bound by a decision of the Supreme Court (except the parties to the particular case itself).

"There is not a word in the Constitution which gives the Supreme Court the power or right to enact a law, or to amend the Constitution by giving it a meaning which the proposing Congress or ratifying state legislatures, or the people, did not intend it to have.

Mr. Pettengill goes on to observe that only the people have the power or right to amend the Constitution and only the Congress to enact Federal law. "This is what is meant," he says, "by a government of law. And Congress has never said that segregated schools are against the law."

Certainly, as the Farm Bureau resolution suggests, it is time for Congress to assert its prerogatives and its responsibility to the people. We have faced intolerable situations before, and (sometimes) found orderly and dignified solutions. Our need for statesmanship was never greater.

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

-TAX FACTS #1-Selecting The Proper Tax Form

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.)

F you are one of the millions of American taxpayers who spends the lion's share of his income feeding, clothing, housing and entertaining his family, chances are there is very little you can do to reduce your 1958 federal income tax bill

— but you owe it to yourself to try.

First of all, decide which of the two individual tax forms you are tions or take the standard deductions or take the standard deducgoing to use to report your in-come. If you choose the wrong one, you may automatically cut yourself off from a possible tax

The easiest way to file is to use the simple 1040-A Form. It's a card the size of a check, on which you answer a few simple ques-tions and have the choice of either computing your own tax or letting the Government do it

You are permitted to use the card form if your gross income consisted only of wages, dividends or interest totaling less than \$10,000, and if you did not have more than \$200 of gross income apart from that listed on your W-2 withholding slips.

Facts to Consider

Before deciding to use the card
Form 1040-A, you should consider couples filing joint returns. You may qualify for a "head of household" status if you prothese facts: vide more than half the support

acrylic fibers is news in floor covering picture, according to Thelma Wirges, County HD agent. It also is known as Dynel, synthethic fiber, man-crafted fiber and science fiber.

Made of natural gas and air, acrylic fibers are the newest ones developed by scientists in their search for man-made fiber for carpets that copies the qualities of wool. Wool is still the standard by which all other car-

pet fibers are compared.

Acrylic fibers sell in the medium price range. They have a lot of bulk and natural springiness and are moth proof, static retardant, mildew-proof and soil

Rayon, too, is very much in the picture this year because of cost advantage. It does mat down but some companies are turning this feature into advantage by combining with wool to have a two level tuffed carpet. The wool is used in the higher tufts and gives the carpet resiliency & longer wear; the rayon yarns are in the back ground or lower level where they add color and sparkle. The combination of these two fibers produces a car-pet which can be sold for about

\$10.00 a yard. Wool weavers are producing brilliant colors in wool carpeting as well as the muted or grayed tones, which have been in use for years. The reason no doubt, is competition of the clearer, brighter colors in man-made fibers and cotton. Colors like bronze, blueberry, cherry and avocado are being produced. The old standard colors of beige, gray and green are still around,

Gov. Daniel's recommended budget calls for spending \$2,-311,434,306 during 1960-61. An extra \$185,000,000 in new tax revenue would have to be rais-

Overall, the governor's budover present spending. Almost all the increase, he pointed out, would go to meet a growing population's need for basic state services, -education, highways, welfare and hospitals and correctional institutions. Gov. Daniels said he had found no public sentiment for reducing these services.

Not included in this budget are several items for which there is certain to be demand, such as teacher pay raises and medical aid for persons on the welfare

EDUCATION, on all levels will be a broth that many will try to

For public schools, the Hale-Aikin Committee of 24 is presenting a lengthy report on ideas for improving programs. Included are more pay for teachers, longer school terms, special instruction for the gifted, driver education, etc. Total cost of the additions would be \$80,000,000 a year for the state, about \$32,000,000 a year for

Both the Commission on Higher Education and Gov. Daniel have recommended increased appropriations for state supported colleges and universities. Both also recommended Arlington State College be made a senior college.

Recommended measures would (1) allow chemical tests for drunkeness, (2) increase the State Highway Patrol, (3) strengthen traffic courts, (4) provide state aid for driver education in public schools and (5) overhaul the drivers license

WATER law will again be in the news when the State Water Board presents its report to the Legislature with the recommendation that \$5,000,000 be spent on water planning in the next five years.

Texans lost hundreds of millions in this decade through drought and uncontrolled floods the Board noted. It suggests planning directed toward capturing for use some 20,000,000 to 25,000,000 acre feet of the 42,000,000 acre feet estimated to run annually into the Gulf from Texas.

SMALL LOANS COMPANIES likely will be the center of some heated legislative debate as they have been in the past.

Texas Legislative Council has suggested a law giving the State Banking Commission authority to police the small loan industry and a constitutional amendment to allow the Legislature to fix interest rates.



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
