



US Aids Tito-Reds, Argentina Starves (FROM THE HOUSTON CHRONICLE)

A story that struck at the heart chords came out of Argentina last week. It told of whole families from the depression-ridden pampas thronging into cities, not to seek fame and fortune but to try to find enough food to keep them alive. Starvation stalks the populous pampas.

These are our neighbors in the Western Hemisphere, the people whom President Eisenhower, Secretary of States Dulles and many others have said are so valuable to the United States in the cold war against communism and in trade.

If not out of human compassion then for strictly business and political purposes does it not seem that Americans would be solicitous of the welfare of our Latin-American neighbors?

We aren't. We twist dictator Tito's arm to get him to take into the red. American aid for Communist Yugoslavia. We give aid to dictator Gomulka in Communist Poland. We are eager to get dictator Nehru to accept American aid in anti Western India. We even talk of recognizing Red China and trading with her, with American aid being the probable next step.

Meanwhile, Argentineans are dying of starvation. And this situation has not arisen overnight. Argentina has been getting worse and worse economic plight for a long time. Yet while we were pouring out \$56,546,000 economic aid to Tito and little Viet Nam got \$785,000,000 American assistance, Argentina in the past three years was given \$241,000 assistance, lowest of any of the 55 countries we aided.

Meanwhile, too government-leased warehouses in the United States are bulging with government bought agricultural surpluses Some of the surpluses would keep Argentineans from starving. Or aren't we concerned about our neighbors while so solicitous about Communist Tito?

Crucial Point

Innumerable forecasts of what will happen to economy this year have appeared. The vast majority are highly optimistic. And back up the authorities. the vast majority also have another thing in common-they expect that the cost of living will remain virtually constant. This simply means that they believe inflation has been at least open spaces in this country. The

Everyone hopes this will prove to be the case. But the best of economists have been woefully wrong before. And certainly, there are clouds in the crystal ball today.

For instance, no less an authority than the chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, William Martin, is by no means sure that the price level will be stable. In his view, in fact, "the battle against inflation is at a crucial point." He adds: "The process of inflation in this country started over ten years ago during our wartime period and has persisted ever since." He presents three alternatives as possible weapons in this battle-higher taxes, a revision of the tax structure to produce more revenue, or a reduction in spending.

President Eisenhower favors a budget which will be in balance or nearly so, of about \$77 billion. But there are strong forces at work which, if successful, will raise that figure by \$10 billion or more, and thus produce a tremendous deficit. If that happens, it will be a true miracle if the dollar isn't further debased.

The point is that no should be lulled into a happy complacency by the economic forecasts. Attitudes that prevail in government will largely determine what happens.

"Furthermore, he adds, if there are any men on the moon, they'll just talk us into providing them with housing and all of the charities of the welfare state."

BOONTON, N. J., TIMES-BULLETIN: "If your child has classroom failures, parents, don't be too concerned-that would be the advice of Stanley E. Diamond of the University of Michigan. He believes that classroom failures should be accepted as part of growing up. He reminds parents, It's probably impossible to mature in our society without experiencing failure. The good is not in the failure, but in the overcoming of failure."

Why Car Insurance Costs So Much

Do you ever wonder why your car insurance costs so muchand is likely to cost more in the future? If so, an article by Richard Dunlop in the National Safety Council's magazine, Traffic Safety, will give you the answer.

First of all, Mr. Dunlop points out, it isn't because the car insurance companies are reveling in big profits. They have actually been paying out \$116.70 for every \$100 taken in through premiums, and since World War II they have gone \$600 million

That is partly accounted for by inflated prices, and by car designs which make repairs extremely expensive-but only partly. Chiselers of assorted kinds are involved in the profitable business of turning car accidents into jackpots. Their fields Mrs. W. C. But this doesn't end the story. As Mr. Dunlop puts it: "Juries give away insurance money with an almost incredible disregard for the facts of a case." He cites a Texas woman who claimed that merely witnessing an accident caused her to suffer a miscarriage. Two obstetricians said that was poppycock-but the jury awarded her \$90,000. New York State Supreme Court Justice McDonald has said: "Eighty percent of jury awards are excessive and 10% so grossly excessive they may be set aside







Hang brushes in thinner keep them pliable.

If you give the brush successive washings in three separate cans of thinner, turpentine, or other paint brush cleaner, you'll get most of this paint from the well. But if that doesn't do it, spread the bristles carefully apart in sections and use a small screwdriver about the width of the brush well to scrape out any paint that still may be there.

If you have an electric drill, ment which holds a paint brush: Wash the brush in thinner, then simply insert the brush handle in the electric drill attachment and spin the paint residue out of the bristles. Hold the drill inside a carton during spinning to catch the paint.

After cleaning, the brushes can be hung in large cans of clean thinner so that part of the bristles are in the thinner, keeping them moist and pliable. Use your portable electric drill to make small holes in the brush handles and suspend the brashes from wire fastened to the top


