Sioux Indians Seek Aid From Russia

The proposal by a Sioux Indian leader that the Russians lend his group \$5,000,000 obviously was conceived as a stunt, but it could work. If the Russians want to achieve a mast propanganda stroke, they can use this request to do it.

The United States government has been oh, so very solicitous of the natives in Ubangi, Pago Pago, Communist Yugoslavia and Communist Poland. It has urged billions in aid on them, saying, if effect, "Go ahead and take it. Don't be modest. There's plenty more where it came from."

All the while, there have been millions of Americans, including the Indians, in dire need. For years Indians in many parts of the country have been begging for help. But aid to the Indians never has come a popular vote-getting issue, so their pleas have

fallen on deaf ears. There has been a great hullabaloo about integration in this country in recent years. But has anyone done anything about intergrating the Indians into the American society with full rights and privileges? Has any liberal leader bemoaned the fate of the Indians living on reservations in desperate circumstances?

There's at least one very good reason why the bureaucrats in Washington, who are responsible for a major portion of the do-good programs of the federal government, haven't raised the issue of intergrating the Indians. The bureaucrats handling Indian affairs would be without jobs if there were no Indian affairs

It's a shame that the American people would have to suffer embarrassment over an incident like the Sioux leader appealing for Russian aid, but it's their own fault. They've elected to Congress men and women who think the same way the bureaucrats do. When enough of the American people get sick of what is

happening in Washington, then perhaps they will force a change. The change isn't going to start in Washington. It must start at the grass roots with the people.

Stop The Merry-Go-Round

Most adults clothe the merry-go-round with nostalgic memories of carefree childhood. Perhaps they're fooling themselves. We may all still be riding one.

Current proposals from Washington call for a new boost in the federal gasoline tax, to 41/2 cents a gallon, to make up an expected "deficit" next year in trust funds for the highway program. This tax was raised to its present 3 cents a gallon rate in 1956 to finance most of the same program, or so we were told. Before that, there was a hike in 1951 to help underwrite the Korean War and one in 1940 for World War II. Originally, the levy was enacted as a "temporary" budget balancing device in

Round and round we spin, at such a fearful and wonderful rate, blurry-eyed we might lose sight of landmarks. One of these is the rocky crag of common sense.

If the federal government is going to tax the motorist to raise money which the state in turn-to qualify for federal road funds-has to match by taxing the same motorist, where do we truly stand. Perhaps on the threshold of extinction of the motorist, a fatal blow to an automobile civilization.

Fortunately, in this case, the argument for a federal gasoline tax increase falls flat on its long bureacratic nose. It just happens that the federal gasoline tax and other special automotive taxes are bringing in about \$1.5 billion more a year than Washington is spending on the road program. So much for the "deficit" in highway trust fund.

Moreover, the present federal gasoline tax, added to steadily climbing state motor fuel taxes, already amounts to a staggering 41% sales tax on a commodity most of us use every day.

Unless we call a halt to the process, however, the merry-goround may become the only form of transportation for many. Running a car will be too costly, and those who can keep one operating may cut a lonely figure on the deserted Autobahns.
