### Billions From Pennies

"Life begins at 40" is a saying that will hold little comfort for the nation's taxpayers on Wednesday, Feb. 25th. That marked the 40th birthday of America's first gasoline tax.

The "gas tax" idea was born on Feb. 25th, 1919, when a "one cent a gallon" levy was enacted by the Oregon legislature. That year three other states followed suit. By 1929 every state had a gasoline tax, and by then the average rate had climbed to 3.8 cents a gallon. In 1932, a federal gasoline tax was added.

In its first year this "Penny tax" cost the motorist of four states a little more than \$1 million. Now it is costing highway users a whopping \$4.6 billion a year. Its present national average rate of 8.9 cents a gallon amounts to a 41% "sales tax on gasoline.

In 40 years, motorists have paid \$52.8 billion in state and federal gasoline taxes, more than half of this just since 1951. cost some \$1 billion a year. State gas tax receipts, now running to more than \$3 billion a year, have more than doubled in the last ten years, with 75 rate in greatest difficulty," says President Eisenhower. The bulk of increases enacted since World War II.

The federal tax, its rate doubled by two increases enacted since the war, is today costing motorists \$1.6 billion a year at 3 old political pastime but it may become less popular as the cents a gallon. ## Nobody Can Control The Budget

Neither the Administration nor Congress actually can control spending because nobody can control the budget," says The Wall Street Journal.

If that startles you, here's the paper's explanation for the sad state of affairs: "Some Government projects exist outside the budget as though they were inbued with some magical independent life. Money is spent that hasn't been appropriated. spending measures together in s ion and naturally emerges with a crazy quilt. We don't even know what the budget is, for all the more than a thousand pages of fine print in the big book. For example, the Administration says it plans to spend \$77 billion in fiscal 1960, but actually the whole Government plans to spend, including its non-budgeted outlays, nearly \$93 billion. So where does that leave us when we try to talk about 'the budget'?

Various cures have been suggested. One is for Congress to put a ceiling on spending as each session begins and thus to regard the budget as a whole instead of just passing bills as they come along. Another is to give the President power of the iitem veto, so that he could disapprove parts of money bills without affecting the rest. As matters stand now, the President has to take the whole hog or none when a bill reaches his desk. This forces the executive in many ways to give his signature to spending he considers unwise and unnecessary, because use of the veto would also eliminate appropriations for essential purposes.

Whatever the cure, it's high time we were given it, before

we die of the disease.


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
