### To Fulfill A Promise

The executive director of Congress' Joint Committee on Atomic Energy recently asked interested parties to comment on the "Proposed Expanded Civilian Nuclear Power Program."

Elmer L. Lindseth, the Committee's chairman, replied in detail. At the end of his long letter he offered this summary: "It seems to us to be particularly important that at each stage of the development of the new field, prime consideration be given to the maintenance of our normal business system. Whatever we have in the way of productive capacity in this country can be credited to that system, and as we enter this new field of energy,

every effort should be made to protect and strengthen it-" Going on, Mr. Lindseth urged that the nuclear programshould be designed to create an environment in which the inventive and productive capacity of industry can most effectively be utilized to achieve the national and international objectives at the earliest practicable date. Detailed government controls and government ownership of nuclear power plants will not serve to create environment and will be detrimental to the achievement of the program objectives. Maximum participation by industry on the other hand will achieve optimum progress at least cost to

Utilities and other private enterprises in this country are now engaged in an atoms for peace program which, in the view of experts here and abroad, holds the greatest promise of progress of any in the world. The plain set of principles laid down by Mr. Lindseth will see to it that the promise is fulfilled.

# A MESSAGE to THE PEOPLE of BURKBURNE

The Texas Electric Service Company, in response to the request of many citizens of Burkburnett, has signed an agreement with the City to purchase the municipal light plant and electric system subject to approval of the voters at the election called for April 7, 1959.

After careful study and investigation the Company has agreed to pay the City \$972,000 for the plant and system.

In addition it has agreed to deed back to the City the light plant building and grounds which the citizens may use as a community project or the housing of a new industry. We will make every effort to expedite delivery.

We are running this statement in the Burkburnett Star in order that you may know the facts of the agreement.

### HERE ARE THE FACTS

We feel that \$972,000 is a fair price for the plant and system. It was arrived at after careful study of the system and our estimate of the growth that may be expected provided the net proceeds from the sale are used for needed betterments to the City.

It has been estimated by the City's fiscal agent that the sale will result in the City realizing about \$257,000 after all of the obligations on the electric and water systems are paid off. This includes the money which will be released to the City from the debt reserve and special funds held by the City National Bank in Wichita Falls, trustee under the Bond

The light plant and the water system were largely financed by the sale of two outstanding issues of revenue bonds, and all of these bonds must be paid off and retired before the sale of the light plant can be made. This is a requirement of the purchaser of the bonds, so when these bonds are retired this means that the water system will be free from all debt, because there are no tax obligation bonds on the system.

In addition to the \$972,000 purchase price, the Company agrees to build a street lighting system of the type we have installed and operated in other cities and towns served by the Company. The new lights will be installed at locations selected by the City to afford greatest safety and protection to the people. The Company also will consolidate the two electric systems, eliminating unnecessary duplicate poles, guy wires and lines.

And in order to provide abundant power for civic, commercial and industrial development the Company will immediately construct a new 69,000 volt transmission line from its big sub-station in North Wichita Falls to Burkburnett and also provide a new substation for the Burkburnett area.

All present regular employees in the operation of the City's electric plant and system will be offered employment by the Company. They will be eligible to participate in our group life insurance plan, family group medical, surgical and hospital plan, and for retirement income benefits. They will be credited in length of service with the number of continuous years they have worked for the City electric system at time of transfer to our payroll.

Because the Company must plan and build ahead of the needs of its customers for electric service and because of the large investment the Company has contracted to make at this time, the voters will also be asked to approve a fifty year franchise. It would not be an exclusive franchise and it could be

terminated if the City should elect to purchase the property of the Company as provided in the franchise. All of the safeguards provided in the City Charter are preserved to the City in the franchise.

### A CITY-WIDE SEWER SYSTEM

The cost of a city-wide sewer system and improved disposal plant facilities for Burkburnett will be \$554,000, according to Freese and Nichols, consulting engineers.

It has been pointed out that the City will have \$257,000 remaining in the City treasury as a result of the sale of the municipal light plant. This \$257,000 will pay almost 50% of the cost of the sewer facilities, and long-term financing can be obtained for the remainder. The remaining part of the cost can be paid for entirely by monthly sewer receipts, without requiring an increase in water charges or tax rates.

This means that Burkburnett can have good sewer facilities for the entire City. Besides being vital to health and convenience, this will encourage progress and growth for

### **OPPORTUNITIES** FOR GROWTH

Burkburnett now is facing one of its greatest opportunities for growth as a result of plans at Sheppard Air Force Base to increase its military and civilian personnel by 6,000 during the next two years. In order for Burkburnett to attract its share of these new residents the community must be prepared. This includes the availability of good, attractive housing and proper facilities for taking care of increased population.

Home builders and individuals may find it difficult to get mortgage money to build in areas not served by sewer facilities. So unless Burkburnett takes positive action to provide these facilities, the City's growth can be seriously handicapped.

Many of the folks now employed at Sheppard Field live in Burkburnett. They have contributed much to the community's religious, social and business life. Others will come here if the right atmosphere and setting is provided, and they, too, will contribute to the progress of Burkburnett.

### ABOUT \$20,000 SAVINGS ON ELECTRIC SERVICE BILLS

If the City sells its light plant, Texas Electric Service Company's standard rates for cities in similar and like circumstances will go into effect with approval of the City Commission. Some bills will be higher, but a big majority of the bills in Burkburnett will be lower under the Company's rates than they are now under City Ordinance rates, with the result that the people of Burkburnett will get their electric service for about \$20,000 a year less. This figure is on the basis of 1958 elec-

tric service billing here. Rates and ser the electric company in the future wil a Hollo tinue to be subject to approval by the Commission.
