attack at his home here earlier The student is in a Wichita Falls hospital, where unconfirmed reports are that she sustained a skull fracture and possible internal injuries. Her condition Thursday morning was described as satisfactory

Trooper W. W. Flanagan of the highway patrol unit stationed at Walters, said the incident which ended in a near tragedy, started at 12:15 o'clock. A group of high school students, said to have numbered eight or nine, piled into a car driven by Timmy J. Antwine, 17, also a student at

the school. The car had gone but two blocks when Miss Farley and Donna Sue Thompson suggested they ride on the front fenders of

the car. Sandra was on the right front fender as the car started. Flanagan said the girl was clutching the hood ornament with her left hand and holding an apple in her right hand.

The trooper said the girl was wearing a full skirt, and when the breeze blew it up, Sandra turned loose of the ornament with her left hand to control the garment.

Antwine was able to stop the car immediately, as it was traveling no faster than 20 miles per hour, the trooper said. The girl was unconscious and her companions loaded her into the vehicle, and took her to the school.

When she partially regained consciousness Sandra was taken to a Burkburnett doctor and on to Wichita Falls.

Flanagan said Antwine was so shaken up by the near tragedy that he was unable to drive the car back to the school. The trooper said the injured girl is the daughter of Clifford Farley, who lives two miles west of Cookietown.

He added that young Antwine could be filed on for reckless driving for permitting the two girls to ride in such a manner as to obstruct his view.

### New Proof For The Pudding

A new law of concern to every American is now in effect. Public Law 85-929, amending the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act of 1938 "to prohibit the use in food of additives which have not been adequately tested to establish their safety," was passed by the last Congress and signed by the President on Sept. 6th, to become effective six months thereafter.

The product of nearly a decade of study and investigation by Congress, the Food and Drug Administration and members of the food and chemical industries, this new law shifts the onus of proof from the Government to the food processor. Where, formerly, it was up to the FDA to prove a food additive was harmful and should be banned, it is now the food producer's job to prove the additives he intends using are wholesome.

The need for the new law is a direct result of our expanding knowledge of the usefulness of chemicals in food processing. In 1938, when the previous law was passed, there were relatively few such additives in use and they were classed as either poisonous or non-poisonous, without regard to amounts used or conditions of use. The new law, designed for an age which employs bundreds of such additives falling into about half a hundred functional categories from "acidifying" to "whipping"-to make foods more convenient and more appetizing, is based on adequate testing for human safety (which ordinarly requires a minimum of two years of animal feeding tests) rather than arbitrary decisions Checking of the tests and acceptance of the evidence will, of course, be the responsibility of the FDA.

Not all additives will have to be tested, since salt ,sugar, vinegar and baking powder (not usually thought of as chemicals) are by now beyond suspicion. The law, according to the FDA affects only those substances that are not "generally recognized by qualified experts as safe for their intended use."

It is possible that the new law will add to the many millions already being spent by industry for research and testing in the food field, and checking these tests will add tremendously to the burdens (and the staff) of FDA. But the public will have the best protection ever devised and the food and chemical industries will be free to advance with technology to meet the houswive's demand for better and better products.

It may have happened before, but a law that makes everybody happy is pretty rare.

IN APPLAUDING THE PRESIDENT'S APPEAL TO CONGRESS to relieve the present "intolerable" price support and crop control plan that "has not worked, "doesn't control" and is "excessively expensive," it should be noted that Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson could have told him these things (and doubtless did) six years ago. All of us, and especially the farmers, can be glad Mr. Benson has stuck to his guns.



In addition to this, if Texas Electric Service Company provides the service for all electric customers in Burkburnett we would pay the city about \$2 000 more annually in ad valorem taxes and about \$2,000 more each year in street and alley rental fees. Thus the various savings and increased taxes and fees should substantially improve the city's cash position for general uses. In addition, the city water system would be clear of debt and the city would have the \$257,000 cash available.

We believe that it is generally agreed by a majority of the people of Burkburnett that one of the most serious and pressing problems in Burkburnett is the need for additional sewer lines These new facilities are vital not only for future growth of the City but from the standpoint of health and convenience. In addition, it is important to the home builder and individuals, who must get mortgage money before they can build homes.

We are all aware that Burkburnett at present has an opportunity for substantial growth as a result of plans at Sheppard Air Force Base to bring in about 6.000 additional military and civilian personnel by 1961.

Many Sheppard Field personnel now living in Burkburnett have contributed much to the City's social, religious and business life.
