O. M. Kelly Has Interesting Magazines, Paper

Monday O. M. Kelly came by the Star office with two very interesting magazines and an old paper. The magazines, SUCCESS, were dated Sept., 1901, and Aug., 1903. The paper, The State Herald, Mexia, Texas, Mar. 28, 1907.

The magazines, in almost perfect preservation, are about the size of McCall's, of today, but with fewer pages, were typical of the times then. On the inside cover, some real estate man guaranteed 30% returns to investors who bought lots in Chicago. Mattresses were listed at \$15.00; men's shoes \$3.50; Iver Johnson shot-guns, \$6, \$7 and \$8. Talking parrots were going at \$3.90. Women's suits, \$6.67 to \$20.

From the editorial column: "In the future, a man will be measured by what he does, not by what he has. There is a growing feeling of decided prejudice against the wealthy idle—the useless rich—the 'do-nothing' millionaires'."

The Winton touring car was pictured and priced at \$2,500.00, complete.

The State Herald had a campaign going to gain new subscribers. The Editor offered new subscribers a 50c box of Tonkawa Blue Powders for wire cuts on man and beast. With each renewal he gave a 25c box of Dr. Sloan's Liver Pills. A dry goods firm offered ladies' slippers at 38c to \$1.75. Ladies' hose, 12 1/2c. Children's hose, 7 1/2c. Flannel-ette was only 5c per yard.

Burk Receives 15% Good Fire Credit On Fire Insurance

Word came Thursday from the State Insurance Commission that Burkburnett had been granted a 15% good fire credit rating on insurance. The rate is based on fire losses in the past.

Burk had had a 10% credit rating, which will be replaced by the new rating April 1st.

Alertness on the part of the Volunteer Fire Department has kept losses low during the past two years. With purchase of a new fire truck, which now appears a certainty, it would be possible to earn an additional fire credit in the future.

Russell Mobley had charge of the program Tuesday night. He introduced Sgt. Clarence Bizet, officer of Information Services, Sheppard Air Force Base, who showed a colored sound film titled "Peace and Quiet".

The film dealt with a father who was complaining to the commanding officer of an air base about the noise from jet planes. At the time he was making the complaint over the telephone his teen age daughter had a record player blaring out with her favorite pop tunes, his young son was playing with electric train, blowing the whistle every few seconds, cars out in the street were blasting their horns, and the canary birds were raising old billy ned. None of these noises seemed to bother the father—he was accustomed to them and took them for granted. The film showed the father being shown through a sound laboratory, where constant research goes on to lessen the sound of planes. A visit to a SAC base showed combat pilots in the air less than two minutes after the alarm sounded. Of course there was noise—but the father decided it was a good noise, protecting him and his family 24 hours each day. The film was especially timely, since SAFB has been made a SAC base. Every civic club should see this film.

Red Cross Bloodmobile to Be Here Wed., April 8 at the Legion Hall 12 Noon to 6 P. M. to Collect Blood

A Red Cross bloodmobile from Wichita Falls is set to collect blood in Burkburnett April 8th from 12 noon to 6 p. m. in the American Legion Hall.

The announcement was made jointly by Al Lohofener, general chairman of Red Cross work in Burkburnett and Dr. Jos. A. Davey, chairman of Red Cross medical services here.

Mrs. Marjorie Hofacket, chamber of commerce manager, has charge of scheduling donors. It takes about 30 minutes to give blood.

Donors are requested to call Mrs. Hofacket at JO 9-3393 for an appointment. Those planning to give blood are asked not to eat for four hours prior to visiting the bloodmobile.

Blood donated at the bloodmobile visit will be credited to Burkburnett residents for their emergency and serious illness needs, Lohofener said.

Mrs. Lenora Lesley, chief nurse of the blood center, will be in charge of the bloodmobile. Dr. Thomas Lynch, blood center physician, will provide medical coverage.

Volunteer nurses and others here will assist in the program by giving technical assistance and by serving refreshments.

Residents of Burkburnett use about 150 pints of blood a year. The bloodmobile provides a convenient way to give blood in advance of need or for replacement of blood used.

Lewis R. Jones Dies Friday March 20th

Lewis R. Jones, 62, of Burkburnett, a Magnolia Petroleum Co. foreman, suffered a heart attack Friday night and was pronounced dead upon arrival at a Burkburnett clinic.

Funeral services were conducted at 4 p. m. Sunday at Owens & Brumley chapel in Burkburnett with Rev. Miles B. Hayes of Burk, former pastor of First Baptist church, Burkburnett officiating. Services were also held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at Johnson Funeral Home Pawhuska, Okla., and burial was in a Pawhuska cemetery.

Jones had been a Magnolia Petroleum Co. employee 31 years and had lived in Burkburnett four years. He formerly lived in Eastland County.

Born in Bolivar, Mo., Jones was a World War I Army veteran. He married the former Miss Lola Mitchell in 1930 in Lebanon, Mo.

Survivors are his wife, a son, Evan Jones, Burkburnett; six brothers, John and Evan Jones, Wynona, Okla.; Campbell Jones, Jal, N. M.; M. M. Jones, Casa Grande, Ariz.; Wesley Jones, Okla. City; and Bonnie Jones, Los Angeles, and three sisters, Mrs. Lola Dunham and Mrs. Ada Morris, both of Wynona, and Mrs. Edgar Wilson of Okla. City.

Mr. S. S. Reger received word of the death of his brother, Earl Reger, of Parkersburg, W. Va., Sunday morning. Mr. Reger was a retired postmaster and had visited in Burk several times.

Grass Roots Opinion

Burglars At The Back

Even if that Russian fellow, Khrushchev, is sticking his tongue out at us from across the street, maybe we ought to look see what's going on at the back door. Pennsylvania's Rep. Daniel Flood, for many years a "one man watchdog committee" over the Panama Canal Treaty, blames the Reds for the Panamanian effort to extend the internationally recognized three-mile limit to twelve, thus "Berlinizing the Panama Canal."

"Those in charge of the Communist movement in Latin America," Rep. Flood, told the House, & especially in the Caribbean area, have undoubtedly focussed their conspiratorial activities on the Panama Canal with the purpose of complete liquidation of US control over the Canal itself.

Even in this age of atoms and intercontinental missiles and man on the moon speculation, our ships and those of the free world must play the seven seas if this nation is to survive. As Mr. Flood has said: "Panama could well be the Achilles' Heel of our defense system."

Congress and our State Department should act decisively—before we have a Suez mess of our very own on the back stoop.

The Three Cent Answer

In Washington right now many of our Congressmen are happily voting plans for the federal government to spend more money than it can possibly take in in taxes. Does this make sense? You can bet the bottom dollar of your taxable income it doesn't.

President Eisenhower still contends it is possible to balance next year's budget at \$77 billion. The National Association of Manufacturers—an organization that certainly should know about money matters—says we can get by handily on \$3 billion less than that.

Yet the odds are two to one against a balanced budget. Why? This sentence from a news story is significant: "Despite the Administration confidence that public opinion backs a balanced budget, a spot check by United Press International showed that most House members are receiving only light to moderate mail in favor of Government economy."

That brings the problem down to a level where you and I and a three cent postal card can do something about it.

Sheep No Longer Sheepish

That smug look you may notice on sheep these days isn't just because it's lambing season. The sheep is suddenly in the wonder fiber business. The scientists have made it possible to put permanent creases in wool trousers, and permanent pleats in wool skirts.

By next fall a customer will be able to buy wool clothes treated with this new process in stores all over the country. Many stores already are selling wool trousers with creases that last as long as the pants.

This is reassuring, in an age of man made this and that, to find Nature-made things holding their own with only a little help from the test tube. Actually, what the scientists have done for wool is what the ladies have been doing for their hair with the home permanent wave. A solution, developed in Australia and something akin to the brew in the home permanent bottle, is what puts the creases in for keeps.

You can't sit these creases out. You can't sweat them out. If you soak them in rain they come back tighter than ever. And what really must be making the sheep perky is the knowledge that his new home permanent won't work on any fabric except wool.

Put The Money Where It Belongs

A 40% tax on even an extreme luxury would seem excessive to most people. But such a tax is in effect on an absolute necessity—gasoline. Federal, state and local taxes on motor fuel now equal a national average of 9c a gallon. And that amounts to 40% of the service station price or regular grade gasoline, exclusive of tax.

To make a bad matter worse, it is proposed that the gasoline user be socked still harder, by raising the federal tax from its present 3c rate to 4½ cents.

The excuse for this is that the money is needed to pay for the multi-billion dollar highway program, and that the burden should be imposed on highway users. But that is a highly misleading alibi. For, if all the money collected from these users were applied to the road program there would be no financing problem.

Simple statistics tells the story. In the last fiscal year the federal government took in \$3.6 billion from what is known as "highway-related" collections. These collections include the gasoline tax, along with other motor vehicle taxes. But only \$2.1 billion of that money was earmarked for highway purposes. A whopping 42% of the total, \$1.5 billion went into the general fund, to be used for federal activities that have no relation to highways.

There is, therefore, no justification whatever for increased gas taxes. What is needed is to put current revenues from highway users where they belong—on the road.

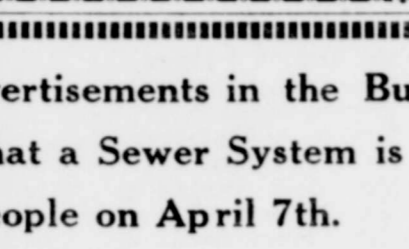

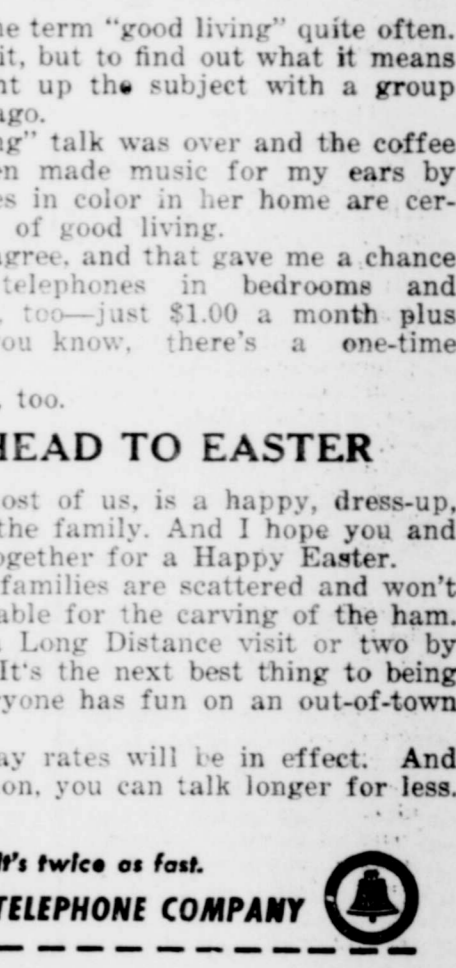

Publication of Ordinance No. 228
The Proposed Agreement Between
City of Burkburnett and Texas Electric
Company Regarding the Sale of
City Light Plant and Electric System

WICHITA
TEXAS

Ordinance made this 11th day of March, 1959, between the City of Burkburnett, Texas, hereinafter called "City", and Texas Electric Service Company, hereinafter called "Company", (hereinafter referred to as "Parties").

WITNESSETH: That the mutual and agreed terms hereof are as follows: It is agreed as follows:

ARTICLE I
The price and upon conditions herein to be sold and conveyed free of all liens and encumbrances, by general warranty, to the City of Burkburnett, Texas, by the Texas Electric Service Company, hereinafter called "Company", shall be the fair value of the property as determined by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Burkburnett, Texas, on the date of the execution of this agreement.

C. Company shall be obligated to pay to City an amount equivalent to City ad Valorem taxes on a pro rata basis for the remainder of the current year after the effective date of this agreement.

D. City shall make such arrangements as it may deem necessary with its present customers with respect to collection for service rendered to the effective date, provided, however, that City shall read its customers' meters on or as soon after the effective date as may be reasonably practicable. There shall be no adjustments for unbilled service.

ARTICLE VI
Company agrees that as soon as practicable after the transfer of the property herein agreed to be conveyed to it in accordance with the terms hereof, it will at its expense:

A. Install Company's standard modern street lighting system in the downtown and residential areas of the City in such locations as City may order and approve.

B. Proceed in an orderly manner to improve and modernize the electric distribution system and to eliminate as rapidly as practicable unnecessary poles, wires and guys.

C. In order that Burkburnett will have available a power supply adequate to attract industry and provide for business and residential growth, Company will proceed to construct a new 69,000 volt transmission line to augment its present transmission facilities serving Burkburnett, construction of which may start either before or promptly after the effective date of the agreement.

D. Offer employment to persons presently regularly employed in the operation of the City's electrical system and further to offer such persons who accept employment with Company the same status as regards to life insurance, group medical, surgical and hospital benefits and a similar status as regards retirement benefits as they would be entitled to had their entire continuous service with the City's electric system been with the Company. Employment opportunities will be offered in Burkburnett or elsewhere on the Company's system.

ARTICLE VII
In further consideration of the premises, City agrees that in the event this agreement becomes effective it will not engage directly or indirectly in the operation of an electric light and power generation, distribution or transmission system for a period of not less than ten (10) years from and after the effective date of this agreement.

ARTICLE VIII
Company covenants and agrees that during the period of operation under the franchise as set out in Article IX, Paragraph A, it will not file rate schedules or charge for electric service in the City of Burkburnett at higher rates than those currently being charged at that time in other cities and towns served by the Company under similar and like circumstances and similarly classified by the Company. In this connection City agrees to repeal Ordinance Number 184 (Minimum Rate Ordinance) from and after the effective date of this agreement.

ARTICLE IX
The following and each of them are conditions precedent to this agreement's becoming effective.

A. The approval by the qualified voters, at an election called for this purpose, of this agreement and of a fifty-

(50-) year franchise to Company upon the terms set forth in the copy of same attached hereto and marked Exhibit A, said approval to be evidenced by a majority of those voting at said election, called not less than fifteen (15) days or more than thirty (30) days from the date of this agreement, in accordance with the provisions of City's charter and of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, the expense of which election shall be paid by Company.

B. The approval by the City of the Company's schedule of rates then in effect in other cities served by the Company under similar and like circumstances, and the execution by City of ten (10)-year service contracts with Company for electric service applicable to street lighting, water pumping and other municipal uses in form substantially similar to those in effect in other cities served by the Company under similar and like circumstances.

C. The full and final payment, redemption and retirement by City, or the making of adequate provision therefor, of all of City's City of Burkburnett, Texas, Waterworks, Light and Power System Improvement and Extension Revenue Bonds dated April 1, 1952, in the original principal amount of three hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$350,000) with three hundred and eleven thousand dollars (\$111,000.00) of principal outstanding and payable after April 1, 1959, and all of City's City of Burkburnett, Texas, Waterworks, Light and Power System Improvement and Extension Revenue Bonds dated January 1, 1957, in the original principal amount of three hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars (\$375,000.00) with three hundred and thirty-five thousand dollars (\$335,000.00) of principal outstanding and payable after April 1, 1959, both series combined hereinafter referred to as City's Revenue Bonds.

D. The obtaining by City of proper and valid releases from all liens of any kind, including remaining lease payments under lease purchase agreements, other than the liens created by City's Revenue Bonds, on or relating to City's System or any part thereof or the revenues therefrom.

E. The approval by Company's attorneys of City's title to the property to be transferred and conveyed.

This agreement shall not become effective until all of the conditions precedent contained in this Article have been satisfied as hereinafter outlined.

In connection with condition C of this Article, since neither of City's Revenue Bond issues contains any provision permitting their call by the City until April 1, 1967, and April 1, 1972, respectively, it is expected that an amount greater than the principal sum of said bonds may have to be paid in order to repurchase the bonds or make adequate provision therefor and that certain expenses or commissions may be paid to accomplish such repurchase. The total sum of repurchase price of the principal amount of City's Revenue Bond issues plus expenses or commissions for repurchasing same in excess of the principal amount of City's Revenue Bonds outstanding on the effective date of this agreement is hereinafter referred to as "Premium on City's Revenue Bonds." City shall not be required to pay a Premium on City's Revenue Bonds in excess of ten percent (10%) of the principal amount of City's Revenue Bonds outstanding on the effective date of this agreement.

City has accepted the offer of the First Southwest Company of Dallas, Texas, copy of which is attached hereto and marked Exhibit C, to proceed with all due diligence to negotiate the repurchase of all of City's Revenue Bonds and City and Company both agree that the effective date of this agreement shall be fifteen (15) days after notification by the First Southwest Company that they hold commitments for the repurchase of all of City's Revenue Bonds or have made adequate provision therefor within the limitation as to repurchase price set forth in this Article, provided that prior to the receipt of such notification Company has notified City of its satisfaction with conditions A, B, D, and E.

In the event that Company has not notified City in writing that it is satisfied with conditions A, B, D and E prior to such notification of the First Southwest Company, the effective date of this agreement shall be fifteen (15) days after such notification to the City by the Company; provided further that in the event all such conditions are not satisfied within thirty (30) days after such notification from the First Southwest Company, this agreement will be canceled and of no further force and effect.

A. City of Burkburnett, Texas, Waterworks, Light and Power System Improvement

Revenue Bonds, dated April 1, 1952, in the principal amount of \$311,000 to be outstanding after April 1, 1959; and

B. City of Burkburnett, Texas, Waterworks, Light and Power System Improvement and Extension Revenue Bonds, dated January 1, 1957, in the principal amount of \$335,000, to be outstanding after April 1, 1959.

In view of the above and foregoing, and in the event the election referred to in "I" above results favorably for entering into said agreement, it is hereby agreed, as follows:

(1) That we will represent the City of Burkburnett, as Fiscal Agent, in securing firm purchase commitments from the owners and holders of all outstanding Waterworks, Light and Power System Improvement and Extension Revenue Bonds, Series 1952 and Series 1957; and at the proper time to deliver said bonds to you, or your agent, at a price of par and accrued interest to date of delivery to you, plus any premium necessarily paid over and above the par amount of bonds secured and delivered to you; PROVIDED, however, that in the event said premium is in excess of eight percent (8%) of the par amount of bonds secured, the City may, at its option, elect to pay such excess amount upon delivery, or to cancel this agreement.

(2) We agree to deliver to you, upon thirty (30) days written notice, that certain Lease Contract between City and Fairbanks-Morse Company, dated April 1, 1955, and you agree, upon delivery thereof, to pay us an amount equivalent to the unamortized balance of the lease account on date of delivery to you, including proration of any accrued amounts due on delivery date.

(3) In consideration for service rendered and expenses incurred in securing, assembling, and delivering City's outstanding Waterworks, Light and Power System Revenue Bonds, you do hereby agree to pay us an amount equivalent to 2% of the par amount of the bonds assembled and delivered to you, or your agent, said amount to be due and payable simultaneously with the delivery of the bonds.

It is further agreed and understood that we will use our best efforts and facilities and incur any and all expenses deemed necessary, to the end that City's revenue bonds may be secured, assembled and delivered to you, or your agent, in accordance with the foregoing. However, nothing contained herein shall be construed as a guarantee that the bonds will be secured, assembled, and delivered to you in accordance herewith. In the event we are unable to deliver City's aforementioned revenue bonds to you on or before October 1, 1959, this agreement may, at your option, be terminated and be of no further force and effect. Further, should we be unable to perform in accordance herewith, you will owe us nothing for services rendered and expenses incurred.

State Women's Group Launches "Ballot" Campaign

State legislators throughout the nation will be alerted to feminine concern over state driver licensing laws as the result of a unique "Ballot for Better Driver Licensing" campaign to be conducted by the General Federation of Women's Clubs, according to Mrs. B. V. Todd, national safety chairman.

The General Federation, which numbers more than seven million members in this country, recently adopted a "Passport to Safety" program to alert its members to the necessity for driver license legislative reform to improve traffic conditions. The "Ballot for Better Driver Licensing" campaign will dramatize this program and express to state legislators the concern felt by women over the traffic accident problem.

Printed ballots urging legislative action to improve state driver licensing programs will be sent to each of the GFWC's 20,000 affiliates throughout the country for signature by the members who will forward the signed ballot to their respective

state legislators. "We feel the time has come to step forward and speak out vigorously for driver licensing laws that will operate to reserve the driving privilege for those motorists willing to accept and live up to the responsibilities inherent in the operation of a motor vehicle," Mrs. Todd said. "Our lives and health and the lives of our families have too long been jeopardized by a selfish minority of drivers who are incapable or unwilling to drive safely. In my opinion, this campaign for improved driver licensing procedures is the most significant and satisfying program ever undertaken by the General Federation of Women's Clubs."

News From The County Agent

An annual meeting of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council will be held in Houston on the afternoon of March 24th and the morning of March 25th at the Rice Hotel. Persons interested in knowing more about the farm safety problem in rural Texas have a special invitation to attend. Starting time 2 p. m. and 9:30 a. m.

Beef cattle producers can pick up the latest information on a lot of subjects important to them by attending the Beef Cattle Short Course in Ft. Worth, March 30-April 1st. All sessions are scheduled for the Pioneer Palace on the Stock Show grounds. It will be conducted by the animal Husbandry Dept. of the Texas A-M College System, and sponsored by the Ft. Worth Farm and Ranch club and the Ft. Worth Chamber of Commerce.

Vertical integration, a practice common in many non-agricultural industries, is seeping into agriculture and many think it may become a dominant force in the future development of Texas Agriculture.

Vertical integration means the linking together of two or more stages of production, processing or marketing activities under one management. The key feature is that decision making, risk bearing and supervision are centralized.

The present trend is toward "partial" vertical integration, which involves the linking together of certain specialized stages of production. Processing or marketing.

Vertical integration may involve farmer business arrangements that extends from the transfer of only one or two risks to complete ownership & operation of the farm by business, or vice versa.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station have joined to publish a leaflet on "Vertical integration in Texas Agriculture."

This publication covers many phases of this increasingly important subject. Some of the topics discussed are how widespread is it? Why is it growing? How does it work? Advantages and disadvantages and what is ahead?

The leaflet is available free of charge from local county agents or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

Fishermen normally think in terms of bass eating minnows. A recent discussion with Billy Brown aquatic biologist of the Texas Game and Fish Commission, brought to light a different angle—minnows eating bass.

Mr. Brown says that adult shiner minnows can be very destructive to schools of freshly hatched bass in ponds and lakes.

In view of this possibility, it seems advisable to continue recommending the stocking of ponds only with bass, catfish and sunfish as distributed by federal and state fish hatcheries.

The stocking of minnows as a food fish for bass may work in reverse.

Need money to do some conservation work? Many of you are planning this year's work now. If you are leaving out some needed soil and water conservation practices for lack of finances then here is a source that may interest you. The Farmers Home Administration has available money to loan you to carry out soil and water conservation work on your farm. Amounts up to \$25,000 may be borrowed to be paid back not to exceed 20 years.

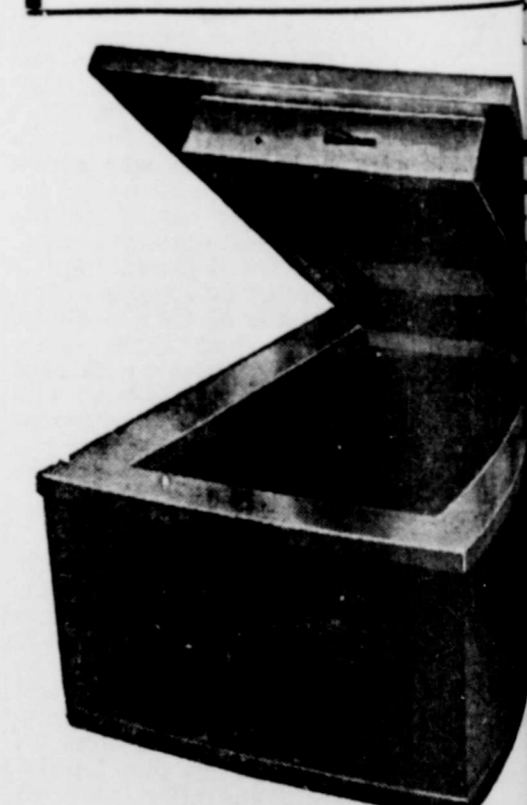

How Bills Become Laws In The Texas State Legislature

By GEO. MOFFETT
The Texas Legislature meets in a regular session for about four months once each two years. About 1500 bills are usually introduced at each regular session. The House of Representatives and the Senate are separate branches of the Legislature. Any member may introduce as many bills as he desires upon any subject, except that tax bills must be introduced in the House of Representatives. Only about 1-3 of the bills introduced ever reach the Governor's desk. He vetoes some which do.

In order to become a law, it is necessary that a bill receive a majority of the votes in each branch of the Legislature. The Constitution requires that a bill immediately after being introduced, be referred to the proper committee. This committee may or may not recommend the passage of the bill. If the committee takes no action on a bill it is stopped and never proceeds further. Perhaps two-thirds of the bills receive a favorable committee report and are placed on the calendar of either the Senate or the House of Representatives, depending upon the branch in which the bill was introduced. Our calendars sometimes have as many as four or five hundred bills pending at the same time.

A bill can be, and often is, amended in branches of the Legislature. If a bill is amended, it is then sent by the other branch of the Legislature. The same bill may be introduced in the Senate then returned to the House. The amendments may not go to the Senate. I receive a mail daily about bills that are introduced in the Senate but do not pass. The Senate bills over in the representatives. Some may be amended after its introduction still in the representatives, it is a member of the Legislature. Many bills reach the Senate.

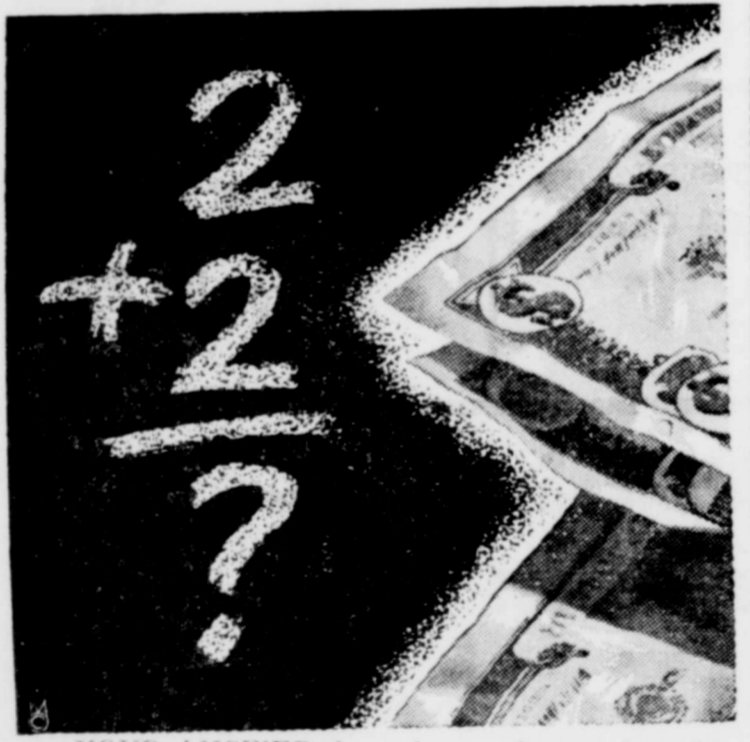

Sale of the light plant will bring these benefits to you the people of Burkburnett: (1) opportunity for a city-wide sewer system, (2) about \$20,000 annual savings on electric service bills, (3) a water system free of (4) elimination of duplicate poles, lines and guy wires, (5) better street lighting, (6) plenty of dependable low-cost electric service, (7) more annual revenue available to City for other services, and, (8) Community harmony.

Many citizens have shown a growing interest and approval of the Company's proposal to purchase the City's light plant and electric system. The Company has contracted to pay \$972,000 for the light plant and electric system and to approval of the agreement and the franchise by voters on April 7th.

Many have recognized the opportunity Burkburnett offers, and have offered their services in support of the Company's proposal.

When any such proposal arouses the general interest of the community, opponents circulate rumors and misleading statements. We want to call your attention to some of these rumors and give you the facts:

FACTS SAY:
A comparison between two electric systems will keep our rates lower and give us a better service.

FACTS ARE:
The electric systems are being compared and result in most cases to pay more for electric service under any proposal. Actually, if the Electric Service Company's rates for similar cities were applied to Burkburnett, the people would enjoy a \$20,000 a year saving on electric service bills. A city ordinance forces higher average rates than Burkburnett.

FACTS SAY:
If the light plant is sold, the City will be able to raise rates any way it wants to.

FACTS ARE:
The rates which the Company has put into effect in Burkburnett are subject to approval by the Commission. These are the standard rates, which apply to all cities similar to Burkburnett. Any change in these standard rates must be subject to approval by the Commission. In spite of increased and higher prices for nearly everything used in the home, the average price per kilowatt-hour of electricity used by customers of the Electric Service Company is less than before World War II.

FACTS SAY:
The City can't afford to lose the money from the City light plant.

FACTS ARE:
All things are considered the annual net income will actually INCREASED with sale of the light plant. The sale of the light plant will permit the city to pay off its obligations against the electric water systems. When repaid the principal and interest on this debt, now scheduled at least the next 30 years, the water system alone will save more money for the City's year than is now provided by the electric and water system. The Texas Electric Service Company will pay about \$4,000 annually in ad valorem taxes on street and alley rental fees. The reported earnings of the light plant were only pos-

sible with electric rates under which the citizens of Burkburnett were required to pay \$20,000 more for their electric service than they would have paid under the Company's proposed rates.

OPPONENTS SAY:
"If the Municipal Light Plant is sold, your taxes will be raised".

THE FACTS ARE:
If the light plant is sold the city will have MORE money to spend annually for other services and conveniences without an increase in taxes or in water rates. On the other hand, if the light plant is not sold, any major improvements in the electric or water systems will be difficult if not impossible to make without an increase in taxes, electric rates and water rates. This is because of the present heavy debt on the water and electric systems.

OPPONENTS SAY:
"The city-wide sewer system cannot be built for \$554,400 as estimated by Freese and Nichols, consulting engineers".

THE FACTS ARE:
The engineering study was made ON THE GROUND and all factors in the cost were carefully considered by the engineers who are recognized as authorities in sewer system planning. These estimates have been checked and confirmed by an independent engineering consultant, and by contractors who specialize in building sewer lines and sewage disposal plants. After all obligations on the electric and water systems are paid off, the City will have about one-half the cost of these new sewer facilities. The remaining part of the cost can be paid for entirely from sewer system revenues without requiring any increase in water or tax rates.

OPPONENTS SAY:
"Our City will grow anyway without a sewer system."

THE FACTS ARE:
Home builders and individuals will find it increasingly difficult to get mortgage money to build in areas not served by sewer facilities. This has been confirmed by a recent survey. So unless Burkburnett takes positive action now to provide these facilities, the City's growth can be seriously handicapped.

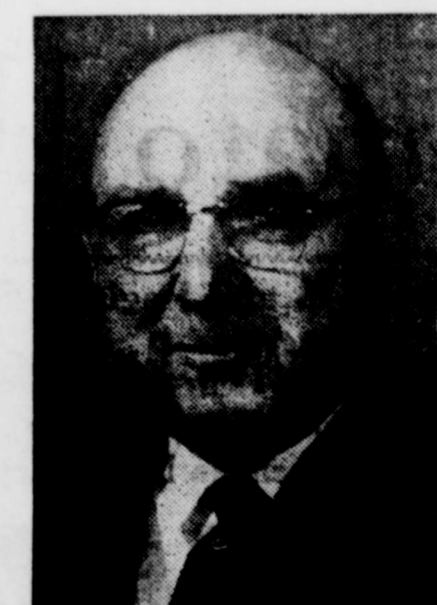

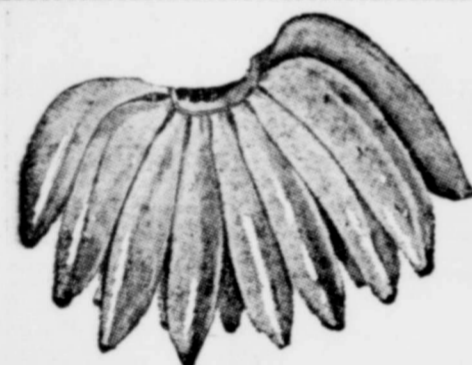

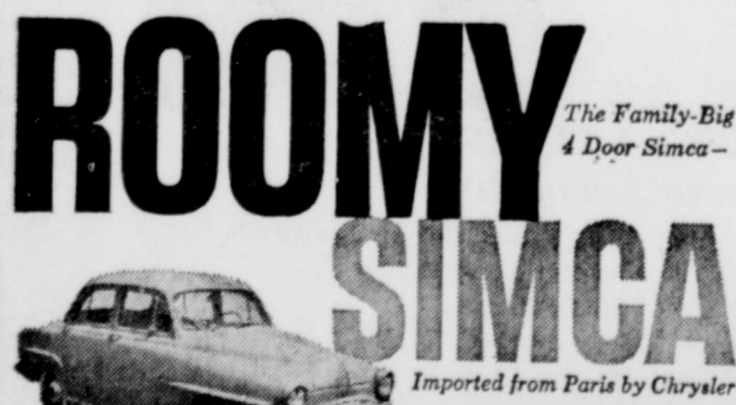

News From The Congress

The crisis over West Berlin continues to overshadow all other events here in Washington. The President's statement of the United States' position to the Nation earlier this week over TV and radio was generally applauded by everyone. Our position of refusing to give in to the Russians seem to be paying off in a slight degree in that it now appears certain that there will be a Foreign Ministers' meeting with Khrushchev's blessings and assuming that this meeting may agree on an agenda for a summit meeting, then the heads of the great Nations will meet in an effort to work out the differences that exist in Berlin and Western Europe. It now appears that the Russians have backed away from the May 27th deadline, and there is more hope that the issues may be resolved peaceably.

The recently announced program to control imports of oil

is a meaningful program and one that should bring greater stability to the domestic industry, and as a result of long study and the Congress and the Executive Branch of the Government, it is based on authority granted in the Trade Agreements Acts which was passed by Congress last year.

To this point little major legislation has been enacted by the Congress. This, of course, is the usual procedure for up until about this time each year most of the work goes largely unnoticed in the various committees and sub-committees where hearings are being held, and legislative programs are being developed. Just now are the committees beginning to report bills, and after Easter, the legislative tempo should step up considerably. The committee work of Congress receives entirely too little attention from the press and the public. Much is said about what goes on in the Floor of the House and Senate, but little attention is paid to the more vital work of all, which is the committee hearings and legislative sessions.

News From The County Agent

Green bugs are doing some damage to small grain fields in the county. There is very little spraying being done by farmers in the county due to dry weather.

How to make infestation counts for green bugs. A minimum of 5 counts, consisting of one linear foot each, should be made at random while walking diagonally across the field. It may be necessary to make more counts where larger aceages are involved. The plants should be examined carefully and all the greenbugs counted.

When To Spray — Control measures should be applied when the average number of green bugs in fall seeded small grain reaches 100 per linear foot at any time before the boot stage. High populations are more injurious early in the season. In very young wheat and spring seeded grains, populations of 25 to 50 green bugs per foot may warrant treatment. If parasites and predators are very numerous and the green bug population is declining control measures may be deferred.

What To Use— Parathion will control the green bug effectively. Use 1 to 2 pints per acre of an emulsifiable control containing 2 pounds of active ingredient per gallon. The required amount of emulsion should be applied in 2 gallons or more of water per acre by airplane or ground sprayers. The lower rate per acre is satisfactory in most parts of the state, but 2 pints per acre is usually needed in the Panhandle.

Apply insecticides when the temperature is 50 degrees F. or above. Better control can be expected at higher temperatures.

Bulletin Relating to State's Financial Condition, Etc.

I would like to have your suggestions about solving the States serious financial problems. The record breaking increase in state wide population adds nearly 100,000 children in the school rolls each year. This heavy population increase has also overcrowded our State Hospitals which now have 26,000 patients. The operational cost of the schools and the hospitals rises each year as the population climbs.

Unfortunately, the State's income is dropping. The oil tax has decreased about 45 million dollars during the current biennium. There is little prospect that it will increase in the future. Consequently, our state must find new sources of revenue to replace the oil tax loss and to provide for the necessary increase in the school and hospital expenses mentioned above.

Recently about 2000 teachers visited Austin and urged that beginning pay for teachers be raised from \$3,200 to \$4,000 per year and that \$100 be added for each year of experience. Under the law, local school districts will pay one-fifth of this additional cost. If the State grants an increase for teachers, it is right and proper that other State Employees also be given an increase. About 8000 hospital employees now receive only \$150 per month. Last November the people voted for an 8 million dollar addition each year for medical payments to those on Old Age Assistance, which sum must be raised by new taxes. All of these items combined call for the biggest tax bill ever faced by a Texas Legislature.

What do you think about this tax problem if you favor the increases, what taxes do you suggest to pay the bill? It should be noted that if the request is reduced by one half, it will still require the biggest new tax law ever voted in Texas.

More light is needed on this subject from the folks back home. This bulletin is being sent to a cross section of the people in the district which I represent. I would appreciate an expression from you and your neighbors about these matters. If convenient to you, use the back of this letter for your reply.
