WICHITA, KANSAS, THE DEMOCRAT: "One explanation advanced for the mushrooming growth of governmental expenditures is that such are required because of the tremendous rate of growth of population. 
A good many variants of such programs have been tried. All, it can be fairly said, have been flat failures. The surpluses and the cost of subsidizing those surpluses have reached stupifying proportions.

Yet there is a sensible, non-political way in which the American farmer can greatly help to reduce the surpluses, and a number of agricultural experts have advocated it. It lies in expanded livestock production. Homer Davison, president of the American Meat Institute, puts the case in these clear words: "An expanding animal agriculture is the best way to attack so called commodity over-production. If 10 percent of the farm land currently producing food and fibre crops were diverted to raising meat animals went home about 8:00 p.m. local laws, Federal assistance, bringing to bear all the fine para- or producing feed for livestock, we would reduce our surplus enough to bring production into balance with consumption.

Then Mr. Davison made an additional important point: "The perishable nature of meat makes it a commodity which defies controlled production. The free market price is probably the only practical instrument that can be used successfully to balance production with consumption and be fair to both producer and consumer

Depletion And Depreciation

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Another attack is underway against the percentage depletion allowance which has long been given oil producers-but not refiners, transporters or other elements within the industry. The allowance is 271/2% and amounts to a credit against federal in- School of Instruction come tax.

This allowance, it should be noted, was established by Congress only after many other devices had been tried and proven unworkable. It is defined by the Internal Revenue Service in these words: "Depletion is to the owner of an economic interest in mineral deposits, what depreciation is to the owner of a depreciable asset." In short, it helps to compensate for the fact that oil wells wear out and must be replaced-at heavy cost and great financial risk.

What has been the practical effect of depletion? A top official of a leading oil company says: "Percentage depletion provides a steady incentive that maintains our crude oil reserves and productive capacity at high levels and at a reasonable price for crude. Production has been increased to meet growing demand, while prices for crude oil and refined products have remained generally lower than they would have been without percentage depletion."

Depletion, in sum, has been a major element in making it possible to provide us with almost unbelievably large supplies of oil products, even while maintaining huge reserves for the future. If we want to change this situation, and risk a major oil shortage, getting rid of depletion would be a sure way to go about it

## Heavy, Heavy Over Our Head


After more than two years of congressional investigation and exposure, the peril of corrupt and excessive labor union power still hangs over the head of America.


When is Congress going to do something about it? and what? Several labor bills are before Congress now. Most of them, if not all, are too weak to do what needs to be done. No labor law will be adequate which allows unions to force free Americans into compulsory union membership; to deny members a free voice in running their union; to spend union dues without members consent for political activities aimed at forcing the views of union leaders on the whole United States. No law will be adequate as long as it permits unions to use the secondary boycott against employers, or to hold power to cripple the nation by closing down entire industries.

Misuse of union power endangers three groups- union members, business and the public. Congress should refuse to accept any labor legislation which offers less than full and equal protection for all three groups.

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



We shall always endeavor to handle our affairs in a manner which will justify your vote of confidence.

We pledge our full co-operation to city officials in working out all matters in connection with sale of the plant. In the meantime, our organization of experienced and trained men will draw plans to eliminate unnecessary poles, lines and guy wires, and to meld the two systems into one efficient and dependable system. We shall start immediately to make plans for the modern street lights in the residential areas and to build the new 69,000 kilowatt high voltage transmission line into Burkburnett from the big North Wichita Falls sub-station, including the new sub-station on the Burkburnett end on the line. Other important matters will be given immediate study so that the program may be carried out in the minimum of time.

Final closing of the transaction cannot be made immediately. It will take place as soon as the city's fiscal agents, the First Southwest Corporation of Dallas, can repurchase, and the city can cancel, the outstanding revenue bonds on the city's electric system and water system. The bonds are a mortgage on both systems. Only the electric system is to be deeded to the company; the city retains full ownership of the water system.


