The Point Of Diminishing Returns

Taxes-and most particularly excise taxes-can easily reach a point of diminishing return. In other words, they become so high that sale of the products to which they apply sag, and in the long run government gets less revenue than it would from a lesser tax. This principal applies to the gasoline tax with full force.

The president of the Ohio Oil Company points out that the average motorist now pays state and federal gas taxes totaling 9c a gallon, which works out to more than 40% of the retail price of gas excluding tax. Now it is proposed that the federal tax be boosted by a whopping 50%-from 3c to 412c a gallon. He says of this: This can only have a retarding effect upon gasoline sales. And at some point, motorists will be given sufficient incentive to curtail their purchases of gasoline to the extent that the taxes will produce less revenue rather than more for the taxing agencies

You can take a horse to water but you can't make him drink. You can boost the gas tax to any level-but you can't prevent motorists from paring their driving to the limit and thus defeating the very purpose of these taxes. A 40% tax on an absolute necessity is certainly big enough and then some.

free—is it child proofed? Here are some suggestions for ************* helping your children avoid accidents in and around your home Always keep matches in metal containers, out of reach from

small hands. Be absolutely certain none of your gas fixtures leak. Use metal pipe connections, not flexible tubing which may fray and leak

Check all your electrical connections, wires and appliances for frays, shorts an bare wires. Either buy new or repair any which look dangerous. Tape over unused electric outlets or plugs in the special appliances available for that purpose.

Keep stairs free of all objects to prevent tripping and falling. Train your child from the start to put his toys away. It isn't only safer, but much easier on a busy mother.

While children are young, use table mats rather than table cloths that hangover the table edge. A pot of hot coffee or bowl of soup can easily be pull-ed down on himself by a toddler

Turn handles of pans on the stove away from the front of the stove, so that your child can't pull them over. Buy a stove whose controls are out of reach of toddlers.
