

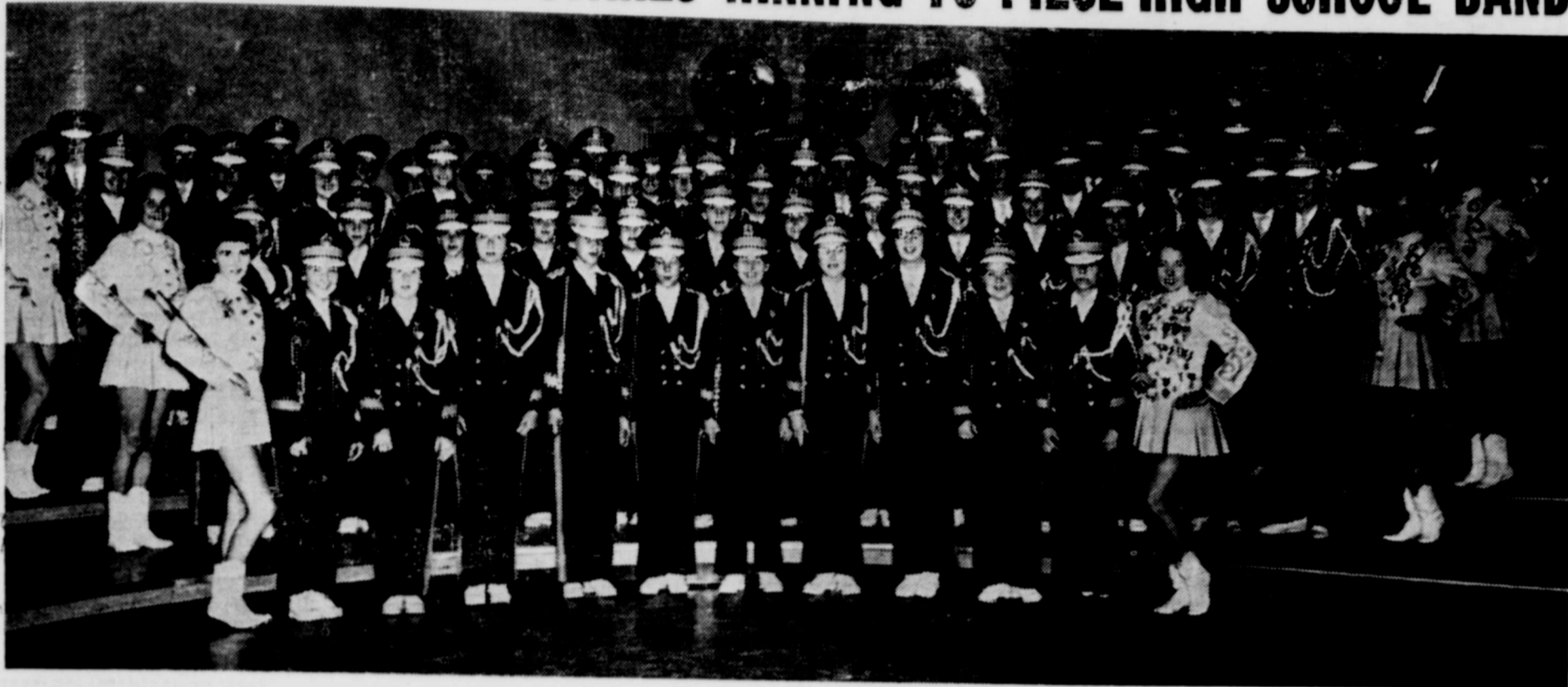

BURKBURNETT'S SWEEPSTAKES WINNING 70 PIECE HIGH SCHOOL BAND



The Seventy piece Burk Burnett High School Band presented a concert in the high school auditorium, Tuesday, May 12th to climax the year's activities. Featured on the program was a cornet trio, Frank Hodge, Karen Burton and Ronnie Anderson, which played Whip-Poor-Will, a H. A. Vandercook number. This group won a Division I rating on this number at the Jacksboro Music Festival and the Interscholastic League Music Contest.

Patsy McNeil, senior student, was the student conductor for the band's presentation of Clare

E. Grundman's American Folk Rhapsody. This is Patsy's second year as a student conductor for the band.

Armed Forces Day Observance At Altus AFB

Saturday's Air Show at Altus AFB promises to be Southwestern Oklahoma's biggest show of the year. The officers and men working on this event have developed a show packed with fast moving entertaining action from start to finish. Drill teams, bands, comedy acts and a military review are major highlights. The latest jet aircraft will be seen both in the air and on the ground.

Residents near and far will be seen entering the base shortly after 11:30 when the gates are officially opened to the public. The show begins at 1:30 p. m.

This year's show features the newest of the SAC fleet, the Supersonic B-58 bomber. This aircraft will be flying nearly 700 MPH during a pass over the base.

Numerous displays of military equipment will be available for public inspection.

Open House to Be Featured Armed Forces Day at SAFB

The tenth annual observance of Armed Forces Day will be held at Sheppard Air Force Base, featuring the theme "POWER FOR PEACE".

Open house, with the public invited will be from 1:00 to 4:30 P. M. Saturday.

Aircraft on static display will be F-84, F-89, C-130, B-66, B-57, C-97, C-124, C-123, C-119, H-19, H-21, and T-28. Numerous engines including jets and reciprocating engines will be on exhibit.

Demonstrations: Loading and unloading missiles using model missiles. Photo radar equipment with a T-29 aircraft operation of IBM equipment. Maintenance and repair of communications equipment including that on poles.

Different types aircraft will fly over the field at 9:48, 10:15, 10:30, 11:24, 11:44, 12:15, 1:15 and 2:27.

Also included in the displays will be equipment from the U. S. Army Base at Fort Sill. A 105 mm howitzer will be set up for actual firing with blank ammunition using the fire direction center.

The corporal missile will be set up in such a way that the spectators may see it moved from the carrying to the launch position and back down again. The launcher and service equipment will be displayed too.

A movie, "Road to The Stars" will be shown.

Parade Two thousand troops from Sheppard will participate as well as the Sheppard AFB Band and Drill Team. It will begin at 9:30 A. M.

Contingent from Fort Sill to be in the parade will be 105 mm howitzers, 60" search light, Corporal missile launcher and service equipment, and mortars.

Luncheon Friday Friday, May 15, at dining hall, a luncheon will be held. Tour of the base facilities including SAC area, missile building, new runway, new municipal airport and flight line will be held immediately following.

Burkburnett Bank Near Completion \$35,000.00 Spent On Facilities

A \$35,000 remodeling project at First National Bank in Burk Burnett is nearing completion with open house expected to be held late in May.

Top story of the building at 3rd and Ave C. has been removed and the entire structure redone in Roman brick and cast stone. Oak and birch paneling inside and a tinted glass front complete the construction.

Almost everything about the building is new except the walls. Bookkeeping department of the bank now occupies the part of the building formerly occupied by the post office.

A. R. Hill, president, says open house will be held as soon as furniture arrives and interior is completed.

Front of the bank now is gray tinted glass with an aluminum canopy. A planting box accents the exterior. The outside wall along Ave C. is 22 ft high with 10 feet Roman brick and 12 ft. cast stone.

Ceiling inside has been lowered from 18 to 10 feet and is of acoustical material, recessed fluorescent lighting is being installed following.

James R. Killebrew, architect and engineer of Wichita Falls, designed the building.

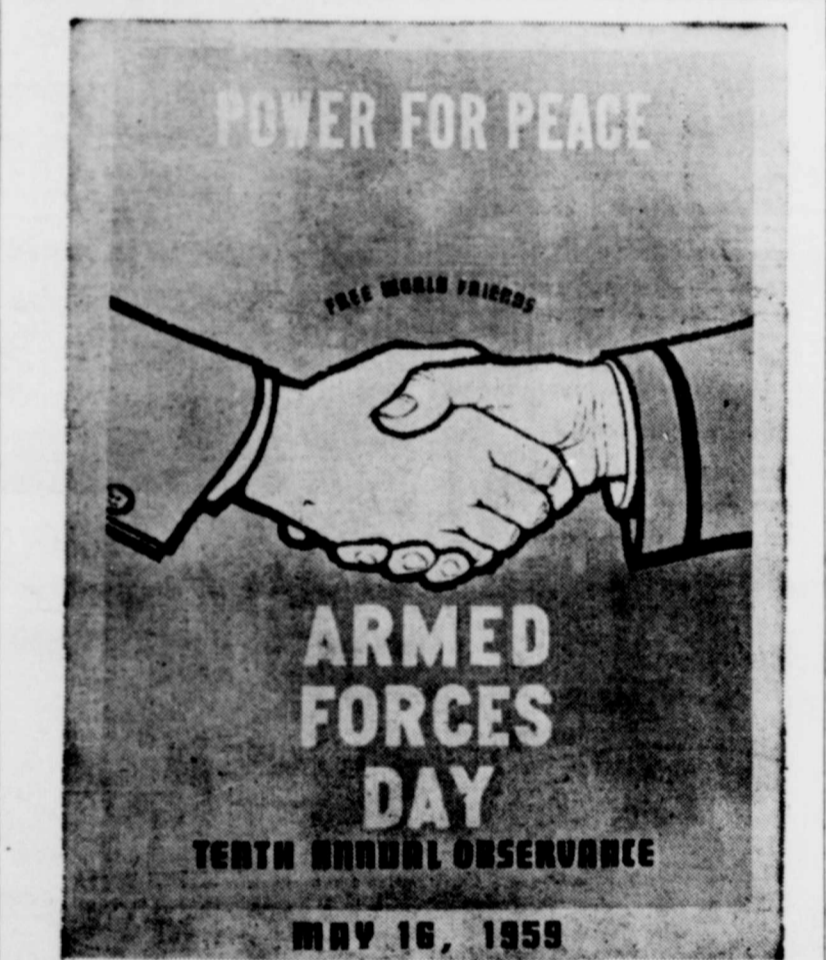
Other officers of the bank are James E. Frye, vice president and cashier; & Jerry L. Thomas assistant cashier.

First National Bank of Burk Burnett was organized in 1907 by J. A. Staley and J. G. Hardin. Hill has been president since 1957 and has been employed by the bank since 1921.

Other presidents have included Staley, Hardin, I. E. Harwell, O. L. Clark and J. V. Brookshier.

The bank merged with the Farmers State Bank in 1941. Their combined deposits totaled about \$800,000 at that time. The bank's last statement of condition on March 12th showed deposits of \$3,950,472.

Sheppard A-F Base Personnel To Be Honored at Annual Rodeo To Be Held Here June 16 - 18

The City of Burk Burnett will honor personnel of Sheppard Air Force Base at its 14 annual Boomtown Rodeo at Morgan Field in Burk Burnett June 16-17-18th.

In addition to Burk Burnett's own rodeo representatives, picked by the civic clubs in that city, Sheppard AFB will elect a Rodeo queen and her court for the festivities that are scheduled to get underway with a large parade in Burk Burnett on the opening day of the rodeo.

Site of the huge oil strike of years ago that led to the filming of "Boomtown," Burk Burnett is honoring Sheppard AFB and its personnel because of the base's economic help to the city in recent years that is again causing a "boom."

Mr. Buster Morgan, co-chairman of the rodeo committee, has invited Major General J. H. Wallace, Sheppard commander, and his staff to ride in the parade as well as be guests of honor at the rodeo performances.

Sheppard's rodeo queen and her court, to be elected by the base personnel, will be members of the Air Force, either WAF or Nurses. The name of the queen will be announced June 4th and she will appear before the civic clubs in Burk Burnett as well as be introduced on local TV stations prior to the rodeo.

The rodeo, attended by some 18,000 persons annually, features the tops in traditional western entertainment, with bronc busting, bull dogging, roping and trick riding included on the program.

Dangerous Drive

The current drive in Congress to cut the oil depletion allowance by almost half—from 27½% to 15% is an exceedingly dangerous one.

The allowance is a credit against Federal income taxes. It is given to producers only—not to refiners, distributors, or other segments of the oil industry. It has been in effect since 1926, and its sole purpose is to give the producer the ability to generate enough capital to replenish his supply of crude—which is actually the business itself—when wells become exhausted and worthless.

It also provides an incentive which will bring men to take the long risks that are inevitable in oil exploration and wildcatting. Only about one wildcat well in nine ever produces any oil at all—the rest are a total loss. A far smaller proportion are successful on a big scale. The cost of exploring and drilling goes higher and higher, because of inflated prices and wages, and the fact that wells must be sunk to ever greater depths. Without this incentive, the search for new oil would dwindle—at a huge cost to this country's economic welfare and military strength.

Moreover, the depletion allowance is no bonanza. The Chief Engineer of the U. S. Bureau of Mines has found that the U. S. oil producing industry has put about \$3 into the search for oil for every \$1 deducted under the allowance.

In sum, depletion is one of the really big factors in making possible an adequate supply of crude oil reserves and a multitude of petroleum products at reasonable prices. To reduce it, would be to invite the most serious kind of national trouble.

Taming A Vicious Circle

Twenty years ago it cost only as much to run the entire federal government as our annual cost for interest alone on the national debt today.

We have had two wars since then, and Uncle Sam borrowed most of the money to pay for both of them. That can't be helped. But there is no excuse for continuing to go into debt in times of peace and prosperity, and that's what we are doing today. We are not running up these bills in the name of defense, either. Since 1954, defense expenditure has remained steady, while spending for civilian programs has risen \$15 billion.

When the government pays out more than it collects in taxes, it sets up credits in banks—which is just like printing extra greenbacks. This makes inflation.

When inflation occurs, the government has to pay higher prices and higher salaries—which runs it deeper into debt, which makes for more inflation, and so on indefinitely. We will suffer from the decreasing buying power of our savings, pension funds and insurance.

The only way to beat inflation is to remove its causes. One of the chief causes is deficit spending. Thousands of Americans have been flooding Congress with demands that deficit spending be halted.

The dollar can keep its value if Congress is made to realize that our citizens will no longer stand for inflation—a hidden and vicious tax which makes our plans for personal security worthless.

Why There Are Jobless

There has been a great deal of discussion of the unemployment problem. A commonly suggested cure is more massive doses of government aid of one kind or another, combined with inflation breeding government building programs.

But these proposals offer no real cure at all. They are merely alleviations. They deal with symptoms of the disease—and not the disease itself.

Writing in Newsweek, the distinguished economist Henry Hablitt explains "why there are jobless." He says: "Unemployment is caused by wage rates that have become excessive in relation to productivity or demand. The price of labor services is like the price of anything else. If it is too high in relation to demand, part of the supply will go unsold. The cure for a commodity is to reduce the price to the point where the entire supply can be sold. The cure in the case of labor is to reduce wage rates in the lines where they are unworkable, to the levels where full employment can be resumed.

This prescription will be highly unpalatable to a great many people. But it's the only prescription which can solve the basic employment problem without creating still worse and still more destructive problems. Labor can price itself out of the market—and it has been doing just that in many cases.

AUSTIN HIGHLIGHTS

By Sen. George Moffett

Texas is faced with one of the most serious financial problems in its history. Many other states have the same problem. In the past ten years the population of our state has increased by nearly two million people. Enrollment in our public schools and colleges is increasing by 100,000 each year. Since the State pays 80 percent of the cost of operation of the public schools and state supported colleges, it follows that about 40 million dollars of additional revenue must be raised each year just to take care of the normal growth of the school system.

This same record-breaking population increase also over-crowds our state hospitals and penitentiary systems, both of which have more inmates than they have ever had. These conditions, plus the rising cost of all supplies purchased by the State, create a need for an annual increase in state revenue of at least 60 million dollars.

Unfortunately on account of foreign oil imports, our state tax revenue on oil has been reduced 42 million dollars. In order to take care of the State's contribution to the schools and col-

leges, hospitals, penitentiary, etc and also offset the loss in oil revenue, it is necessary to increase statewide taxes in the amount of about 100 million dollars per year to keep our State Government running as it is now.

In addition to this 100 million dollars, the Hale-Aikin program for expansion of school facilities and increased teachers salaries calls for another 100 million dollars in new state revenue annually. In the judgment of most members of the Legislature, the people of Texas can not stand anywhere near a 200 million dollar increase in taxes at this time.

The tax bill considered in the Regular Session actually would have provided only about 30 million dollars in revenue. It failed on passage. The Special Session is faced with the problem of how much additional tax money should be raised and where it should come from.

Most members of the Legislature, including myself, would appreciate statements from the

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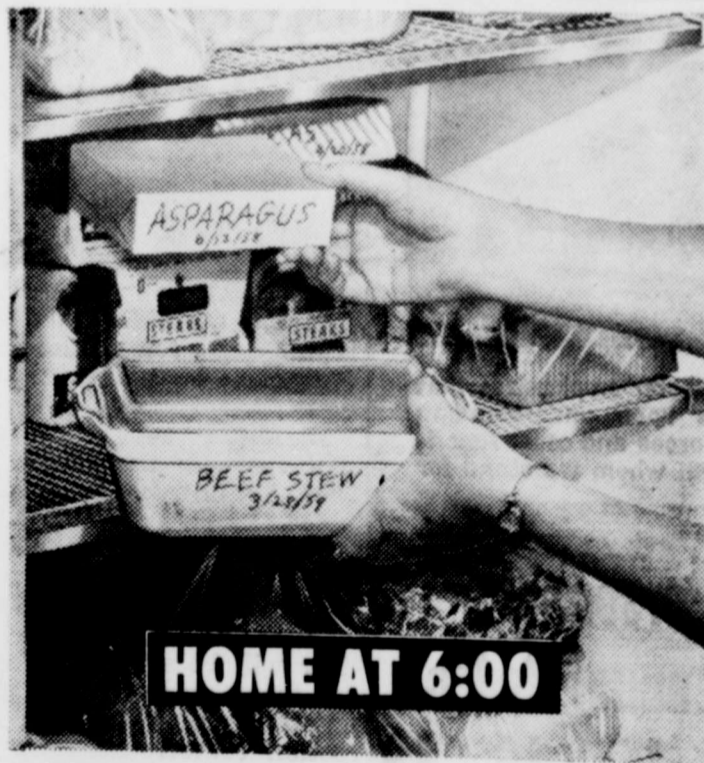

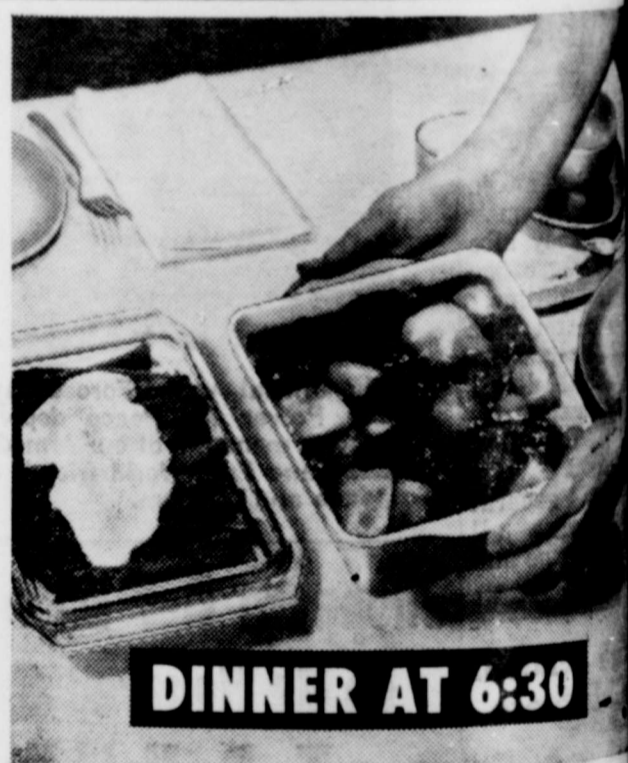

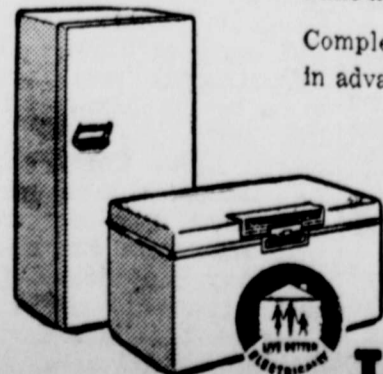

News From The Congress

One of the toughest policing jobs is the stopping of the movement of lewd and obscene materials through the mails. At one time or another most everyone has received advertisement of this offensive material. Last year Congress passed a law which was designed to tighten up the restrictions and make it possible to better prosecute those who ply this vicious trade. However, even with this new law, the Post Office Dept. is still having difficulty in cleaning up this mess, and a move is now on foot here to pass even stricter laws controlling the movement of this material thru the mail.

With almost 60% of our budgeted funds being spent in the defense program, it is of the utmost importance that those who furnish military items to the Government on a negotiated contract basis do not make excessive profit. While a profit motive is most desirable and is essential to keep our Nation strong, there is a difference between fair profit derived in the free enterprise system on the open market as against a non-competitive negotiated contract entered into with one of the procurement agencies of the Defense Dept. At the present time the Committee on Ways and Means is considering the extension of the Renegotiation Act which has been the safeguard against excessive profiteering on this type of defense business. The re-enactment and extension of this Law is essential.

Even though few of us realize that control of traffic in the air is now probably one of the most skilled arts in the world, the increasing number of air-

craft throw an almost unbelievable burden on the air traffic control centers. For instance, in 1938, there were almost 29,000 airplanes in the United States. In 1958, this number had grown to 109,000 aircraft. Despite this spectacular growth, air travel is much safer today than it has ever been. Aircraft use for agricultural purposes such as crop dusting, mesquite eradication, etc., represent over 800,000 hours of flying each year.
