This was the first shipment of a supply of drugs made available by John E. McKeen, president of Chas. Pfizer and Co., Inc. on which the Committee may draw as needed-up to \$350,000 worth.

In thanking Mr. McKeen for the assistance his company has rendered, Chairman Thomas reported that within a few days of the Committee's appeal, more than \$700,000 in supplies and funds had been pledged. At this writing, just a week from the original plea, pledges of cash total \$125,000 and supplies \$750,000.

Pfizer's speedy response will remind many Americans of the company's swift action in the tragic days of the near successful Hungarian Revolution in October-November of 1956 when it supplied large quantities of wonderdrugs to the International Rescue Committee. These, too, were flown overseas by Pan-American as a part of its contribution and smuggled from Vienna into Budapest before the border was clamped down by rutheless

From no other country in the world could such massive assistance from private business (including other pharmaceutical manufacturers besides Pfizer) and private citizens spring in so short a time. Most impressive of all, perhaps, is the fact that aid to the Tibetan refugees is just one more demonstration of the Ordinary American's unfailing readiness to help the under dog. The Reds, both Chinese and Russians, whose bloody tyranny has provided us so many opportunities, should ponder this. It may be our secret weapon, the present day manifestation of the spirit

## Eye Opener

Does anyone still believe the fiction that most of the cost of government is borne by the well-to-do, and that government spending isn't of much consequence to the rest of us?

If so, something said by an official of a leading manufacturing company should be an eye-opener: "Few people realize it, but 84 percent of all the revenue obtained by the personal income tax comes from the basic 20 percent rate and only 16 per cent of the revenue arises from progression. If the income presently taxed in excess of 50 percent were taxed only at that rate, the direct loss in revenue to the government would be just \$734 million, is approximately 1% of federal revenue collections.

## News From The County Agent

How can an individual farmer determine the right amount of fertilizer to use to obtain the most profit? This will depend on the soil type, climatic condition expected, past management and the amount of capital the farmer has to invest, says B. T. Haws. county agent.

Besides the yield increases, other factors which determine the rate of fertilizer to use are the cost of the fertilizer, price North Texas State. The most profitable rate of fertilizer to use will depend on the price expected for the crop. where he will resume his studies at North State College.

The non productive months in prices appear to be good, more fertilizer can be used profitably at North State College.

Firm fully ripe red berries are best for freezing. They may be packed in syrup, in dry sugar to be low, fertilizer use would be some first less appear to be good, more fertilizer can be used profitably at North State College. not be as profitable and less should be used.

The cost of producing the crop too influences the most profitable rate of fertilizer to use. Haws said. Certain fixed costs seedbeed prepared, seed pur-chased and planted, the crop cultivated, insects and disease controlled and the crop harvested. These costs are fairly con. out

stant and can be estimated. Fertilizer rates are not the most profitable just because maximum yields are reached, From the standpoint of fertilizer use, it is desirable to stop fertilizing before maximum yields are obtained. For example if 90 lbs of Nitrogen will increase the yield of corn to 109 bushels per acre compared with 87 bushels where no nitrogen was used, but 120 lbs of nitrogen will yield 112 bushels per acre, the 3 bushel yield increase would not offset the cost of the additional 30 lbs of Nitrogen.

If capital is limited, it would be advisable to fertilize at a rate short of maximum net profits. If capital is available, it is more profitable to fertilize at a rate which will give maximum net profit. Even though capital is limited, returns from fertilizer use would justify borrowing the funds needed.

#### Texas Spiders Described in Game Magazine

There are only two dangerous spiders in Texas—the black widow and the tarantula—according to an article in the April issue of "Texas Game and Fish magazine". The article, written by Janey Bell and illustrated by Don Hague ,covers the field of native spiders, under the title of "Nature's Extravaganza."

The best hunters, trappers & fishermen in the world probably are spiders, the article points out. Although governed solely by instinct spiders obtain their prey in a fascinating variety of ways, weaving webs, stalking and leaping, dipping in the water or camouflaging themselves for an ambush. And food, not fun ,is their objective.

Most of the better known spiders are listed in the article, which tells something of their appearance and habits. The wound and the treatment of spider bites also are described. It also tells how spider webs have been utilized by man for

numerous purposes. For instance, overlaid spider web has been used as a bandage to stem the flow of blood from wounds. Artists have used the web fabric as a canvas for their paint-

The breed spread rapidly thru out the country eventually replacing the longhorn cattle on the western ranges. The Polled, or naturally hornless, strain was developed after the Civil War Shorthorns have received international recognition for improvements in today's beef ani-

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


