# Wrong Direction

The tools of industry-Machinery, buildings, and all kinds of other necessary equipment-wear ont in time and must be replaced. In recognition of this, the income tax laws provide for depreciation reserves. This simply means, for instance, that if the life of a \$10,000 machine is 10 years, the owner is allowed to lay aside, tax free, \$1,000 a year. Then, theoretically, at the end of the 10 years he has enough moneey to buy a replacement.

This concept used to work well. But it doesn't now. Under the tax laws, depreciation must be taken on the original purchase price of the property involved-not its replacement price. And that, after years of inflation, is as different as night and day.

Equipment which cost \$10,000 ten years ago cost \$20,000 or more now. But depreciation allows for the accumulation of only the original sum. The balance must be made up out of profits. And inasmuch as federal income taxes alone take more than half of the profits earned by a business of any size, the magnitude of the problem becomes obvious.

What it all adds up to is that pre-inflation tax laws in an inflationary age prevent tool replacement. This means that they prevent much industrial expansion and betterment. This means, in turn, that they prevent new employment, new opportunity, and the production of new, better and less costly products that otherwise would come to market.

It has been observed that "in our modern world, as goes a nation's tools, so goes the nation." The tax laws are seeing to it that we go in the wrong direction.

### What Farmers Want

Farm Journal, the leading magazine in its field, has polled its readers to find out just what kind of a government farm plan

The results will come as a big surprise to those who think farmers as a whole want more and more government aids, controls and supports.

Here's how the vote adds up: 55% want total abandonment of supports and controls, and a return to the free market; 15% favor supports on an emergency basis only; 8% want adjustment | Mesdames: supports which would permit a gradual return to normal markets over a period of time. In sum, therefore, 78% favor plans call- James Randall ing either for no support or for less support.

By contrast, only 14% say they want high price supports, of 90% to 100% of parity, and only 8% favor the production

The percentages were pretty much the same in all sections of the country. Among the different commodities, farmers specializing in poultry, beef or fruit and vegetables are the most inclined to get rid of supports. Wheat and grain producers are least disposed to do this-but, even so, close to half of them consider it the thing to do.

Farm Journal has done the country a real service- and the hope is that the lesson learned will find its reflection in future policy. Farmers, like the rest of us, know past programs have been monumental failures, and that billions have gone down the drain with no return. And farmers want to stand of their own feet.

### **GRASS ROOTS OPINION**

MARION IOWA, SENTINEL: "One of the trends in newspaper work that is regarded with growing fear is the tendency of government officials to deny the public information. This goes from the township to the national level. Newspapers, radio and TV stations are fighting this with everything at their command. The most flagrant cases are in Washington where bureaucrats decide what the American people are entitled to know. Newspapers have no quarrel with suppression of news concerning national safety. But this is carried far into other fields. There is only one basis on which to go. The public is entitled to every fact about governmental operation, outside of national safety."

OSWEGO, KANS., INDEPENDENT: "History tells us that every nation and people who look for security instead of opportunity decays and rots. All advancement comes through discovery of new ideals. In a half century we have discovered and developed thousands of ideas in flying and other ideas of transportation to nuclear energy and over-coming of space by atomic power. 

# Big Business and Small Profits

In the minds of many people, the terms "big business" and big profits" are virtually synonymous. If this were always the case, it certainly would make the businesses concerned happy & contented, if no one else. But in our competitive society it isn't.

Meat packing is a good example. It's a big business, which supplies the 170 million people of this country with the cuts and kinds of meat they want whenever they want them, and provides farmers and ranchers with a day-in-day-out cash market for their livestock. It handles huge quantities of meat animals, and huge quantities of money pass through its hands. And that phrase, 'pass through its hands", is truly factual in this case. Very litlte of the money sticks.

The best earning year the industry has had in recent decades was 1947-and its profits amounted to one and one-half cents on each dollar of sales. Since then, it hasn't even come close to that. In 1957 and 1958, for instance, its dollar net earnings were not much more than half of the 1947 figure.

Leaders of the industry are concerned about their poor earnings showing. Efforts are being made to do better through improvements in livestock procurement, selling techniques and so on. Maybe these efforts will succeed and maybe they won't. But one thing is sure—big business or no big business, the buyers of meat will pay a mighty small profit to the packers who make it available.

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

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



# Chiggers Can Be

The chiggers in your lawn and the ticks that your pets bring into the yard need to be tolerated no longer, says county agent, B. T. Haws. Most homeowners have at least one of these problems at sometime during the year. Both pests create a problem in recreational areas, especially where wild animals are present to serve as hosts for the ticks, he said.

One application of a practical and safe insecticidal control is now available for use in controlling them. For ticks use 10 percent DDT, 10 percent chlor-dane or 2 percent dieldrin dust at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds, or 20% toxaphene dust at the rate of 10 to 15 pounds per acre where vegetation is sparse. Increase the dosage in heavy vegetation. If sprays are used, follow manufacturers direction for mixing. Apply at the rate of 15 to 25 gallons per acre to lawns and 50 gallons per acre to heavy vegetation.

For chiggers apply dusts or sprays of chlordane, toxaphene or lindane to grass and ground litter where chiggers are present. An emulsion spray usually gives the best results. Follow the manufacturer's direction for mixing sprays. For small areas, use a compressed air or snap-sack spray and apply 21-2 to 3 quarts per 1,000 square feet. If dusts are used, apply 5% chlor-dane at 40 to 50 pounds per acre or 20% toxaphene at 10 to 15 pounds per acre.


