Solon Would Alter Supreme Court

From United States Rep. Overton Brooks of Shreveport has come the suggestion that the present Supreme Court be abolished and a new tribunal of 17 members composed of experienced judges, each to serve only for three years, be established. Brooks asserted a belief that the present court is the creation of politicians & unrepresentative of the temper of the people. Large area of the country, he said, are without a justice on the highest court of the land who is representative of their point of view.

It was inevitable in these contentious times, that the proposal be made to curb or alter he Supreme Court.

More important than the integration decision of the Supreme Court has been its ruling on matters relating to international security and interpretation of enactments of Congress. To many sober citizens, the high court has appeared to be arrogating to itself the legislative right to make law whereas its true function is to interpret the law. Rep. Brooks' proposal may get nowhere but it will serve to focus public attention on the functionings of he court and to make the public more observant of the weight and commerce. impact of its decisions.


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URGENT TASK



A new bill is in the legislative works which sets new precedents in the area of federal regulation over wages and hours. And one thing is sure—if it becomes law, we'll have a new wave of price inflation.

Retail trade has always been exempt from the wage-hour law one good reason being that retailing is a local business, in which Party setting. a unit of the largest chain system must compete purely on the local level, and so should be regulated by the states, if at all. The new bill, however, would apply the federal minimum wage to all retailers doing an annual volume in excess of \$750,000. And it would also apply the wag to any retailer doing less than \$750,-000 but who is in competition with anybody affecting interstate

That means that the proposed law would cover almost every main street in the country. No less an authority than AFL-CIO President George Meany said that he could think of no retail establishment "which was not engaged in competition with another retail establishment affecting commerce."

If the American people want more inflation, and if they also want a further destruction of state and local rights this bill should suit them to a "T".

banks in the West is now being waged, through newspaper advertising, through direct mail, every effort is being made to get people to take out that particular bank's credit card. Obviously, if a person holds a credit card from a bank, it is quite likely that his account will also be transferred to that bank.

Thus, there is being sown in the West not only the seeds of more inflationary buying, but also further massive competition
