A City election has been called for Saturday, August 29th, when voters will decide on a \$550,000.00 revenue bond issue. \$150,000.00 is earmarked for waterworks improvements. The other \$400,000.00 will go for sewer system improvements and extensions. The City has \$238,000.00 left from sale of the City Light Plant, which is being held to apply on a sewer system.

A complete text of the order of election appears on another page of this week's Star. Voters are urged to read it and understand fully the two propositions to be voted upon. This is not a tax bond election. It is a revenue bond election. As will be noted, each bond issued will bear this clause: "The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation."

Bonds would be repaid solely from revenues of the City's combined waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System.

## Just Window Dressing

A senate committee has heard testimony on a bill which would create a new federal electric power agency in the Pacific Northwest, with authority to finance dams and other facilities through the sale of revenue bonds.

This proposal has met with strong opposition from people who believe in the perpetuation of our private enterprise system—and who are aware of the menace to representative government that comes from ever-roaching socialism. In an effort to make the bill more palatable, its sponsors have agreed to various modifications. But, these serve merely as window dressing. They can't change the destructive principal upon which the bill is based.

As a spokesman for the taxpaying, publicly-regulated electric utilities puts it, the measure would create "a huge and powerful corporation to displace a tested and effective system of teamwork in power development." In late years, the Pacific Northwest has been making the greatest progress in this development in its history—and the private utilities have carried their full share of the load.

Another spokesman put his finger on the fundamental danger in the proposal when he pointed out that it would establish by law "the proposition that the government has a moral and legal responsibility to enter into the field of manufacturing a basic commodity." He added that the government then, might as well assume equal responsibility to harvest timber, pump oil and mine minerals.

That is the crux of the matter—and that is what gives this bill national significance. If it is proper for the government to enter into one commercial business, it is proper for it to enter into any and all commercial business.

## America Will Do It Again

America's pioneer automobile builders made their products the envy of the world about the turn of the century. Even then there were fine automobiles abroad, many whose engineering and fine hand craftsmanship in both engines and coachwork challenged our own. The difference between US and foreign cars lay in a fourth dimension of lightheartedness and the spirit of excitement, fun and adventure.

In Europe, where the purchase of a car was restricted to the mighty and represented a serious decision, this vehicle was expected to reflect the dignity of a royal coach, the solidity of the owner, and to last about as long. But these sterling virtues had limited appeal for Americans at large who bought automobiles as they still do, to add fun and excitement to their hard working lives. Utilitarian and essential as cars have become, the buying impulse remains the same and the promise of excitement must prevail.

Today, we are about to see the emergence of "small" cars from America's major production lines. But it is safe to say they will not be "European" cars. The traditional difference in automotive concepts will prevail. Detroit will show our friends overseas how compact automobiles can be built at no sacrifice of the spirit, dash, smartness and glamor that three generations of Americans have learned to expect.

The problem, as Detroit sees it, is not one of pounds but of personality. Thus, we can expect ingenious engineering and imaginative design, distinguished by brightwork of time-tested, protective styling. We can expect a new, distinctively American car, built to cope with American mountains, back roads and super highways. American driving habits, climatic conditions and magnificent distances—in a smaller package.

It will be neat — and still fancy.

## Industry And Higher Education

One of the happy developments of the time has been industry's increasing support of higher education in the U. S.

Gifts from corporations to our colleges and universities totaled \$40 million in 1953. They came to \$136 million last year. And the 1959 total is expected to reach \$150 million.

The American Economic Foundation gives two reasons why corporations feel more and more of a responsibility toward higher education. For one thing, business needs the trained manpower thus produced. For another, corporation officers want to preserve and nourish the traditional American ideal of educational opportunity.

Still a third factor must also play a big role in framing the attitude of business. That is the desire to keep education out of the hands of the federal bureaucrats—who would call the tune if the colleges and universities were supported with federal money. Keeping education free of political dictation is the most important need of all.

ARABI, LA., ST. BERNARD VOICE: "What we need to do in the United States, in Great Britain and in the other democratic countries, is to sell the capitalist idea to the world. Capitalism, with its defects and its advantages, is a saleable product and is the most workable system, and the most beautiful system, for the average working man and the average citizen."

CARRIZO SPRINGS, TEXAS, JAVELIN: "There is no such thing as a free lunch—not even when the Government provides it. Every lunch has to be paid for—by somebody. The same is true of Government aids, benefits and services. "They are not free. All of these things have to be paid for by somebody, and that somebody is we — the people."

ANAHEIM, CALIF., THE BULLETIN: "As was pointed out in "Alice in Wonderland," things are getting curiously and curiously, especially in the federal bureaucracy. For example, consider the bill, now before Congress, to provide an enormously expensive program of school aid. The noble purpose of this legislation is to take from the wealthy states, such as California and give to those that presumably can't afford the new school financing they need. But as so often happens in socialistic legislation, the handout would go to the wrong beneficiary. In a recent analysis of this program, Prof. Yale Brozen of the University of Chicago pointed out that actually the greatest need for school funds is found in the very States from which the most money would be taken."

The stories of shady deals between employers and labor representatives as paraded before the committee is so commonplace that the public apparently wishes to forget it."

constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had, were the following:

Mayor McClarty introduced a resolution and order. The resolution and order was read in full.

Commissioner Freeman made

a motion that the rule requiring resolutions and orders to be passed, read and voted upon at three regular meetings of the Board be suspended for the reasons stated in the emergency clause thereof. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Smith, and carried by the following vote:

AYES: Mayor McClarty, and Commissioners Smith, Page, Brookman and Freeman.

NAYS: none.

Commissioner Smith made a motion that the resolution and order be passed finally. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Brookman and carried by the following vote:

AYES: Mayor McClarty and Commissioners Smith, Page, Brookman and Freeman

NAYS: None

The RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as Follows:

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Burkburnett, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 29th day of August, 1959, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

PROPOSITION NUMBER ONE "Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of Burkburnett, Texas, be authorized to issue ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$150,000), of revenue bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Waterworks System; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (5 1/2%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; said revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses as said expenses are defined by statute?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER TWO "Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of Burkburnett, Texas, be authorized to issue FOUR HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$400,000) of revenue bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Sanitary Sewer System; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (5 1/2%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; said revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses as said expenses are defined by statute?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the CITY HALL

in the City of Burkburnett, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election to-wit:

F. T. Felty, Sr., Presiding Judge Mrs. F. T. Felty, Judge Mrs. Jess Hageman, Clerk

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6 V. A. T. C. S. Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1 "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$150,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR WATERWORKS IMPROVEMENTS AND EXTENSIONS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATERWORKS AND SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$150,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR WATERWORKS IMPROVEMENTS AND EXTENSIONS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATERWORKS AND SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2 "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$400,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS AND EXTENSIONS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATERWORKS AND SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$400,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS AND EXTENSIONS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATERWORKS AND SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

AS TO EACH of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with pen or pencil one of the above expressions thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the two propositions respectively.

SECTION 6: THAT a copy of this resolution and order signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election.

SECTION 7: In the event the said revenue bonds are authorized to be issued by a majority of the qualified electors of said City, voting at said election, and the same are issued and sold the holder or holders of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation; and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election, shall contain this clause:

"The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation."

SECTION 8: THAT NOTICE of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS." Said notice shall be posted at three public places

in said City one of which shall be at the City Hall not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in the BURKBURNETT STAR, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Burkburnett, Texas, published in the City of Burkburnett, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

SECTION 9: That all revenue bonds presented in Propositions 1 and 2 hereinabove mentioned, are to be ratably secured in such manner that no one bond shall have priority of lien over any other bond, it being the intent hereof to provide for the creation of an indebtedness against the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary System for the purposes hereinabove stated, and such bonds as are approved by the qualified electors, voting at the election herein and hereby ordered, are to be issued in one or more installments, but as a single combined authorization.

SECTION 10: That the public importance of this measure and the fact that it is to the best interest of the City to submit the propositions to the qualified electors of said City, at the earliest possible date, constitute and create an emergency and an urgent public necessity for the immediate preservation of the public business, property, health or safety and providing for the usual daily operation of a municipal department, requiring that the rule requiring resolutions and orders to be passed, read and voted upon at three regular meetings of the Board be suspended and requiring that this resolution be passed and take effect as an emergency measure and such rule is accordingly suspended and this resolution and order is passed as an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in full force immediately from and after its passage and it is so ordered.

### Comment from the Capital - OUR "STUPID" OLD CONGRESS

It was the boast of a bully, and Jimmy Hoffa blurted it right out for all to hear. "We may eventually have to do what labor unions do in Europe and call general strikes," he cried. "If Congress is stupid enough to pass a bill banning secondarily boycotts we'll fix it..." He would paralyze the country, Mr. Hoffa made clear, by having all labor contracts expire on the same day.

The words were out of Hoffa's mouth before he could stop them. He threatened a nationwide strike — and all the denials in the world won't "fix" that fact. And, that "stupid" old Congress of ours might just surprise Mr. Hoffa and all his kind among the union bosses. Before it adjourns this summer, Congress might just put some real teeth into labor racket reform. We hope it does.

We hope Congress will protect workers, employers and the public against the secondary boycott — that shameful innocent party by choking off supply and transportation lines to any businessman who doesn't knuckle under to absolute union rule.

We hope Congress will put an end to blackmail picketing — the ugly practice of calling in outside picket gangs to force working people against their will into a union they don't want.

We hope Congress will give working men and women a real voice in the affairs of their unions. When a union acts, it

should act for its membership, not for its leadership. It's astonishing but true that almost one out of every five work stoppages in 1958 were caused not because the workers wanted higher pay or better working conditions. They were caused by union leaders jockeying for power among themselves, or seeking to extend their rule into new territory.

We hope Congress cleans up these foul abuses, and if the top union brass doesn't like it, that will be just too bad. For the country is fed up with the tyrants and underworld characters who rule the rackets of organized labor. It's time now to put real teeth in the labor racket reform bill. It's time to enact a true labor reform law, so that a qualified man may work at his job in peace — without coercion, without threats, without fear.

There is not much time for Congress to act. With adjournment coming up, some union bosses will use every ugly tactic in the book to prevent real labor reform legislation. They will threaten to withhold votes. They will put up a smokescreen of confusion. They will one day say they want labor reform, the next day cry "anti-law." If the union strategists can keep Congress off balance, they can hope to prevent any and all labor reform legislation! If they can keep Congress impotent this session, they will be one giant step closer to their ultimate aim: domination of the whole American economy by union bosses.

Now is the time for the Congress to show Mr. Hoffa that his threats and slurs cannot control the U. S. Government.

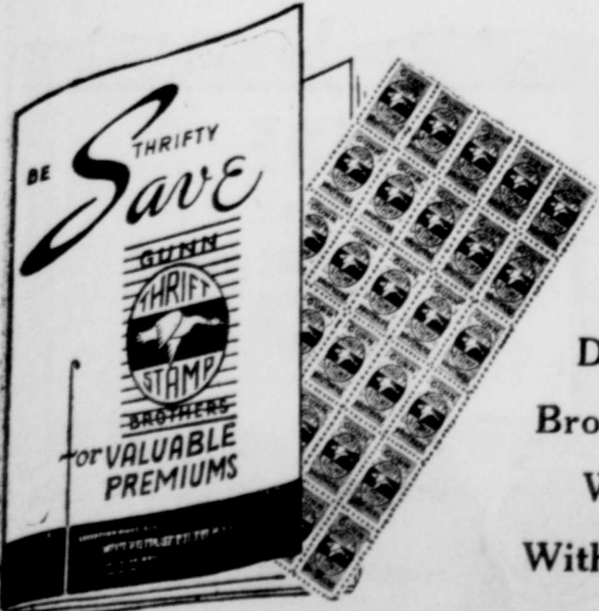

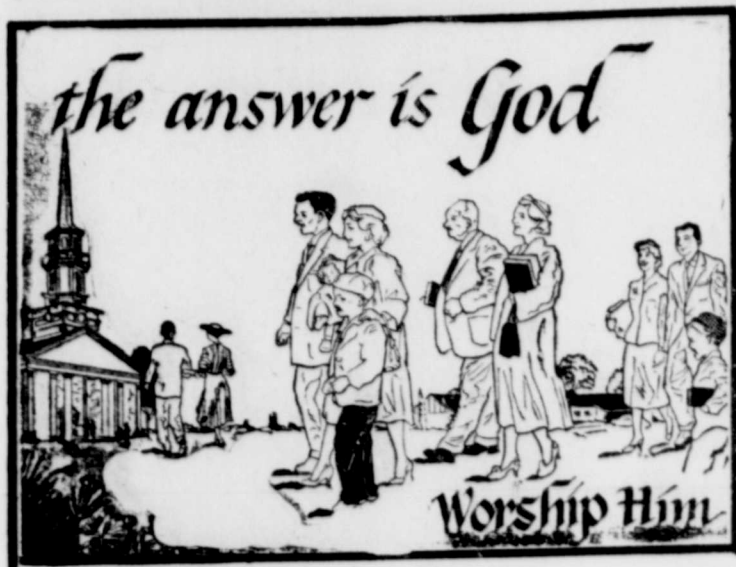

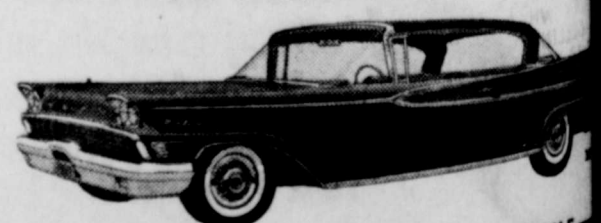

to regard the new budget as the best that could be hoped for in such a hard year. For their parts, lawmakers were eager to get home and mingle with the folks. Ahead lie probably showdowns on new spending for welfare and public schools, and, always, the inching up every two years in general spending.

**Budget Breakdown**—Texas new record high budget of \$2,418,000,000 was reported out after 95 days of haggling in conference committee. But once out, it zipped thru both houses, with only 8 dissenting votes in the Senate and a 108 to 30 vote in the House. Spending from the general revenue fund, the state's multipurpose housekeeping kitty, totals \$332,800,000. This is up \$42,000,000 from the present biennium. To show how hard up the state was, more than 56 percent of total general revenue spending, or \$185,000,000, will have to come from the new tax bill passed this session. Here's how the pie was finally sliced on major items: PUBLIC SCHOOLS received an appropriation of \$774,904,500, an increase of about \$85,000,000 mostly because school spending

has an escalator clause which ties it to enrollment. HIGHER EDUCATION got the biggest increase from the general revenue fund of any program. It was boosted by more than \$12,000,000 to a total of \$130,933,424 for the state's 18 tax supported colleges and universities. Increase was only about half what was asked by the commission on Higher Education. University of Texas officials saw one of their fondest dreams come true in that the available fund (income from the University's permanent fund) was left free for buildings and excellence programs. Hospitals, Special Schools, Youth Council—Allotted a total of \$90,456,554, an increase of \$6,348,252. This is to be used to improve medical care in state hospitals and to build a new mental hospital at Denton, a new dormitory for delinquent boys at the Gatesville School and a new building at the Gainesville School for Girls. It will also cover some salary increases and cost of some repair and remodeling in the vast hospital and school systems. It does not allocate system ardently desired by the Youth Council and recommended by Gov. Daniel. State Employees — Lower bracketed employees, from \$2,400 to \$6,000 annually, will get a \$180 a year raise. It's not a lot—\$15 a month more in the employes pay envelopes—but it will cost the state about \$14,000,000 for the two years. Judiciary — will receive \$9,336,769 from general revenue, a \$312,779 increase. Most of this goes for new district courts plus briefing attorneys and secretaries for the Supreme court. Prison System — operating budget increased \$2,800,000 plus \$7,720,000 to provide additional buildings for a prison population soaring toward 11,000. Livestock Disease — A new program to control brucellosis was tabbed for \$239,960, considerably under the \$2,170,000 requested. State Advertising—State Highway Dept. was authorized to use \$100,000 to lure tourists and the Texas Industrial Commission \$20,000 to seek new industries. Constitution — Texas Legislative council was given \$50,000 for a study of the State Consti-

000, but nearly \$800,000 less than requested. It will allow for some salary increases for board members and engineers and mapping to locate future dam-sites. Rio Grande Navy— Sen. Abraham (Chick) Kazen Jr. of Laredo, Tex., Texas' 4th "governor for a day" this year, used his time in the spotlight to call attention to needs of his South Texas border country district. As senate president pro tempore, Kazen served as chief executive in the absence of the governor and lieutenant governor. He proclaimed Good Neighbor Day, created the Navy of the Rio Grande and urged congressional approval for construction of Diablo Dam west of Del Rio. Sen. Frank Owen III of El Paso succeeds Kazen as president pro tempore for the interim between sessions. Repeive For Church— St. Martin's Lutheran Church, a beautiful, classically designed building one block north of the Capitol was to be destroyed to make way for the state building program. Texas Employment Commission's new building has already gone up within a few feet of it. But the Senate, in a resolution sponsored by Sen. Charles Herring of Austin, has asked TEC to study the possibility of putting the church to some use, such as a non denominational chapel, before deciding to level it. SHORT SNORTS— j Penalties up to \$200 and court costs can be assessed against operators of dual wheeled vehicles without protective "mud flaps" after Aug 9th. Previously the law had required use of the mud flaps only when the pavement was wet. Now they must be used at all times. Beginning Oct. 14th, parents' consent and a three day wait will be requir-

ed between the application for a marriage license and the wedding if the groom is under 21 or the bride under 18. Changes in the law to slow down quickie weddings were voted by the Legislature in its recent called session. Salk vaccine still hasn't put an end to all polio in Texas. Total cases in the state this year had climbed to 231 as of July 25th, the State Health Dept reported.

Water Planning — Board of Water Engineers was allotted \$2,037,000 an increase of \$200,000.

Make the most of cantaloupes while they are in plentiful supply and of top quality. Besides being nutritious and tasty, cantaloupes are low in calories, according to Thelma Wirges, county HD agent. Half of a melon, 5 inches in diameter, contains only 37 calories, yet it yields more than the full amount of vitamin A as recommended for daily consumption by the National Research Council on Nutrition.

As a starter for breakfast, serve cantaloupe halves with wedges of lemon or lime, with maybe a dash of salt. To chill, place melons in a plastic bag or slice and store in a covered container. This prevents cantaloupe odors from spreading to other foods.

Half of a cantaloupe also furnishes more than half of the daily allowance for vitamin C or ascorbic acid. That's important because this vitamin must be supplied in foods each day because the body cannot store the extra supply for future use. Vitamin C is essential for helping hold the billions of body cells together like cement between bricks. This characteristic explains why vitamin C deficiency may show up at any place in your body, in skin surfaces, teeth, bones, muscles and blood. It is helpful in the healing of wounds.

Use cantaloupe to brighten fruit plates, vegetable or gelatin salads, or with sherbet or ice cream for a quick tasty dessert.

For best flavor, choose your cantaloupe carefully. Look for a mature one that has been separated from the vine end with slight pressure. It will have a slightly sunken, smooth, well calloused scar at the stem end the "fingerprint" of a vine-ripened melon. The netting will be raised, coarse, dry and grayish in color with a lighter background.
