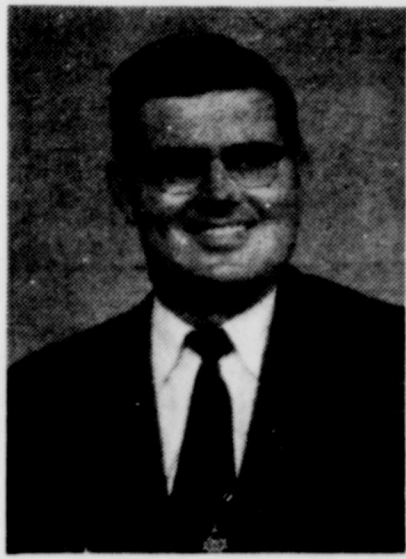

Drivers License Suspended After 4 Offenses 1 Year

The Director of the Texas Dept. of Public Safety cautioned today that a new state law provides for the suspension of the license of any driver convicted of four moving traffic violations within a 12 month period.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., said the new law, passed by the recent session of the Legislature and signed by Gov. Price Daniel Aug. 5th, for the first time defines the term "habitual violator." The definition is as follows:

"The term 'habitual violator' as used herein, shall mean any person with four or more convictions arising out of different transactions in a consecutive period of 12 months, or seven or more convictions arising out of different transactions within a period of 24 months, such convictions being for moving violations of the traffic laws of the State of Texas or its political subdivisions."

Garrison said if a justice of the peace or other designated magistrate finds a driver to be a habitual violator, the Department of Public Safety is authorized to suspend the driver's license for any period up to one year.

The new law also establishes detailed procedures for appeals of persons whose licenses have been suspended and requires the courts to give priority to the setting of such cases. It designates local prosecuting attorneys to represent the state in such appeals cases.

The Greatest Thief

Emil Schram, a director of Cities Service Company and formerly chairman of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and president of the New York Exchange, says this: "The American people have been victimized by the greatest thief in history—and the most efficient one. There is no place where their money is safe from this thief—in savings banks, in insurance, in pension funds, even in Government bonds. Bury it in the ground or hide it under the mattress—and this thief will steal it even faster."

The name of the thief is inflation. It has, in a comparatively brief span of years, cut the worth of the dollar about half. And it will cut it more and more unless the American people, individually and collectively, do something definite about it.

How can inflation be fought? In Mr. Schram's view, we the people, must take an active political interest in the conduct of our national affairs. This means, to be specific, that we must support sound economic policies in government, insist on a balanced budget, stop pressuring Congress for appropriations which are not absolutely necessary, encourage our representatives to resist that kind of pressure from others, demand that states and communities pay their own bills, and refuse invitations to extravagance based on the argument that Washington will pay at least part of the cost. As wage earners, use restraint in making pay and fringe benefit demands. As employers, hold fairly to the principle that increased wages can be justified only by increased productivity. In industry, continue to seek every possible means of offsetting higher costs by greater efficiency of operations, and resort to price increases only when there is no other way to solve the problem.

This is the prescription—and the only one—that can save what is left of the dollar's value.

Khrush Will Enjoy It, Anyway

Nikita Sergeevich Khrushchev, certain to be the most controversial guest any American President has ever received, is and has been many things to many men. Beginning as a peasant farm boy in Kursh province learning the blacksmith and locksmith trades, he fought in the Bolshevik revolution, began climbing the Communist Party ladder, apparently rung by rung, including that of purge master in the Ukraine in '38. A seemingly worshipful satellite of Stalin since the 20's, Nikita's praises turned to denunciation in 1956 after Good Old Joe's stooge and immediate successor as Premier, George Malenkov, had been sent to the provinces and Nikita was firmly in the saddle. Others who faded from the Soviet scene about this time included President Eisenhower's pen-pal, Marshal Zhukov, Khrush's buddy, Marshal Bulganin and Vyachyslav Molotov.

Currently, as chairman of the USSR Council of Ministers and top Communist of the world, Khrushchev is absolute dictator of half the globe, and has made his intentions quite clearly regarding the other half. He is also chief of the largest most intricately organized and most ruthless espionage, sabotage and intelligence network the world has ever known.

He is coming here, he says, as "a man of peace" and is not interested in seeing military bases. With all details on file in the Kremlin, including US patents as they are issued in Washington, why should he bother?

Rather, Mr. K. will no doubt play Foxy Grandpa and visit such childless Americans as the Iowa corn farmer who wants to show off his farm. If we can prove to the visitor that America is an even juicier prize than he has thought, we rather doubt if that will change his eagerness to take us over as promised. And certainly he should be thrilled to see our vast surpluses of price-supported grain, which he might consider mute evidence of our faltering faith in capitalism and the free enterprise system.

Interesting indeed is the belated effort of the State Dept., that has pushed relentlessly for the Khrushchev visit, to warn us against expecting too much from the Ike-Khrush talks. Even vice President Nixon has expressed similar misgivings.

This back-peddaling might suggest that some of our eager beavers in Washington are beginning to wonder, a month in advance, whether this was such a good idea.

Inflation Addiction—An Epidemic

Imagine an epidemic of alcoholism or drug addiction sweeping the United States.

Something similar is taking place. Inflation, an economic disease, is ruining the financial health of Americans and their nation.

Economists have diagnosed its causes and prescribed remedies. Communications media have funnelled their warnings and recommendations to the public. But not enough people have realized the epidemic's seriousness to force concerted action to stamp it out.

The nature of the disease is partly responsible. Like alcoholism and drug addiction, inflation causes a deceptive feeling of well being. When one jolt wears off, its victims want another jolt not a cure. Everything will be fine, they think, if they can just get another wage raise or more help from the government.

No one or two people can halt this epidemic. To be cured, inflation's victims (and let's face it—that's us) must realize what is happening and want to be cured. That will take fact-finding, will power and backbone enough to break the self-deceiving habit of demanding something for nothing—whether it be more pay without production or more government spending without more taxes.

News From The County Agent

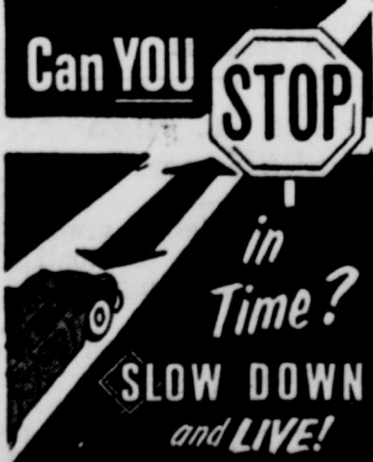
If you are trying to make money out of hogs, keep them cool. When the temperature is 80-100 degrees a hog eats twice as much to put on the same gain as he does when the temperature is 60-70 degrees.

Sept. 30th is the last day to claim a refund of the federal tax you paid from July 1, 1958 to June 30, 1959 on gasoline used for farm work, reminds B. T. Haws, county agent.

Beef producers over the state are finding that performance tested bulls pay off in better prices and more demand for their calves. And here is why: B. T. Haws, county agent said: "Calves at Pan Tech farms in Texas sired by top gain bulls, averaged 38 pounds more at weaning, gained 26% faster in the feedlot and required 19% less feed than run of the mill calves."

Don't let a scrub bull wreck your dairy herd. All bulls are considered scrubs until they are proved, regardless of pedigree and everytime you use a scrub you take a chance on losing your potential production.

If you are one of those people who are willing to spend money to make money you may be interested in covering your trench silos with polyethylene covers. They are relatively inexpensive and can save you money in feed and labor.

Let's Go Fishin'

BY BUCK ROGERS

I had a chat with a large-mouth bass the other day and learned some interesting facts about fish vision. I was informed that fish have excellent eyesight, a fact proven by trout as they feed on insects almost too small to be seen by humans. Fish also have a color sense, and can tell even slight differences in some colors. They're also light sensitive. Fish have no eyelids, and their eyes are tuned to function in the subdued light of a watery world. For this reason, they seek shaded waters or extreme depths on a bright day—a fact to remember.



Fish view the outside world through an overhead window which can be highly distorted if the water surface is ruffled. Because of this optical barrier, they can see a bird flying overhead easier than they can a low silhouette boat several yards away.

Thusly, fish have a blind spot which every angler should know about—a field between the horizontal and a 37 degree angle. Keep low in a boat, wade deep in the water, and you can approach fish without them seeing you.

Try Trolling
The more proficient an angler becomes in handling his tackle, the more he neglects trolling. And, this can be a mistake. Casting is more fun, but frequently the best way to put fish on a stringer is to throttle down your outboard and let your lure bounce along the bottom behind you.

A good trolling motor isn't necessarily a pint sized kicker,

either. I use a Mercury 22 horsepower outboard for this job, and it functions perfectly. Other successful anglers that I know, use similar outboards in the 30 to 35 horsepower class.

Especially if you have a large outboard which isn't considered a fishin' motor, try trolling.

How Deep?

One of the knotty problems in fishing is trying to determine how deep to fish. This question has been complicated by a number of theories which may or may not have any bearing on the subject. In my opinion, if a guy has to spend all of his time worrying about water temperature, barometric pressure, and oxygen content, he might as well stay home.

So I suggest that you stop considering the "how deep?" question in terms of feet, and confine your efforts to top and bottom.

Here's why. Most of the food and cover are found in these two regions. Frogs, small land-born animals, and insects are found on the water surface. And, the cover along the shoreline is the favorite habitat of minnows and small fish. Other food—crawfish, helgramites, and bait fish are to be found on the bottom of a lake or stream.

Cover is a factor, too. Game fish seek protection from their enemies, or lie in wait for food in the shadows of logs, brush, rocks, and weeds. And this cover is usually to be found on the top or bottom.

Fish on the prowl look for food in either of these two places. And when they're simply resting, they seek out the shade of a rock shelf, an undercut bank, or the bottom.

So skip the water in between. If surface or shallow running lures don't pay off, shift to completely opposite equipment and techniques. Go to the bottom, and don't be satisfied until you feel your lure bouncing over a rock or plowing through a mud bank.

You may not always catch fish, but, if you'll confine your angling efforts to top or bottom, you'll be right 90 per cent of the time.
