

The Edison Electric Institute has published an excellent booklet, bringing the story of the development of electric power from the atom up to date.

First of all, the atom promises mankind a great supply of a new kind of fuel which can be used to make electricity. But this coes not mean as some people seem to believe, that power will ultimately become free or virtually so. Last year, of each dollar the electric consumer spent for service, only 15.9 cents went for fuel. By way of comparison 23.2 went for taxes. So, even if atomic fuel cost absolutely nothing, the reduction in the average electric bill would be comparatively minor.


Moreover, one of the major problems is to make atomic power economically competitive. As of now, it is much more expensive than power produced from conventional fuels. Thus, the booklet says that for many years atomic power will be in the development stage and will furnish only a small percentage of the nation's total generating capacity. Fortunately for us, there is no urgent hurry-we have more than enough supplies of the Gangsters have slipped into official union positions. Union treasconventional fuels to meet any conceivable demand for power.

Finally, the booklet makes it clear that the utility industry has a big, practical and productive plan for the atom. As of last May, electric companies were participating in 16 atomic power plants, which are either in operation or in various stages of planning, development and construction. They will have a combined capacity of 1,500,000 kilowatts, and, will require company expenditure of some \$570 million. Private enterprise is vitally concerned with atoms for peace.

The Collar And The Leash

Last November Michael DiSalle sailed into the office of Governor of Ohio propelled by the energies or organized labor leaders and their sympathizers. Now, less than a year later, labor is blasting the man it used to boost.

The governor's offense against labor was that he backed a 20 percent increase in workmen's compensation benefits, while in Texas this season. This has the labor chiefs demanded a 24 percent hike. The President went to the crux of the labor legislation problem when, in a nationally broadcast speech he said: "In the basic sense, the issue is this: Shall the people govern?"



The President cited specific examples of labor violence, and of the use of "blackmail" picketing designed to force workers who did not want to join a union, to join. Of such practices, he said: "I want that sort of thing stopped. So does America."



Late generation pecan nut casebearer (feeding in the shuck Feeding injury of pecan weevil; Inadequate supply of available moisture, lack of available nution of the pecan tree by the black pecan aphid, Heavy scab infection on leaves and shuck, as well as other leaf spot disease. Any condition that reduces the normal activity of the pecan leaf and or shuck can cause the nuts The stress period for the pecan tree in the development of the nut is in the late summer and early fall. Unfavorable condi-

Many growers are concerned about their pecans being full of normal for the nut to contain shedding of pecans.

B. T. Haws, county agent, calls attention to the importance of choosing and planting the small grain varieties that are recommended for your area. This is constantly breeding and testing varieties for resistance to new races of rust and smut.

Soil testing is a tool you can use on your farm to help determine the level of fertility in your soil. The recommendations which you will receive from the soil testing laboratory, based on the analysis of the soil samples you submit, will give the amount of fertilizer needed for the most profitable crop or pasture production.

The most important mistake to correct are those you feel you can get away with, especially on the highway.





1. Although its first responsibility is to the public, the taxpayers and millions of highway users, the Highway Department tries to create a minimum of private injury or inconvience. 2. When private lands are


needed for public roads, the law guarantees adequate compensation to the owner. Independent professional appraisers are hired, and an approved value figure determined.

3. Once the approved value is settled on, the Department negotiator can't horse trade with the landowner. This might reward the greedy and tough minded at the expense of the timid or public spirited person. But a dissatisfied owner can have the matter settled in court.

 When part of a piece of pro-perty is taken and the rest left solated or of little value, the tate will make payment for the loss of value.

5. Owners will be given ample time to move buildings to another site or find new buildings. 6. If an owner with a GI mortgage has to sell, the Veterans

Administration will restore his GI loan privileges for getting a new piece of property 7. An owner who sells property for more than he paid for it will not have to pay income tax on the profit, providing he uses the money to buy similar property within a year. 8. Controlled access highways cannot have entrance and exit for every piece of property along the way. Real estate developers are urged by the Department to contact the local planning engineer before making any commitment based on access to the through lanes of a controlled access road.
