

# Grass Roots Opinion

BENTON, MO., DEMOCRAT: "For your information, the Federal Government is the largest electric power producer in the country, the largest insurer, the largest lender, and the largest borrower, the largest landlord and the largest tenant, the largest holder of grazing land and the largest holder of timberland, the largest owner of grain, the largest warehouse operator, the largest ship owner, and the largest truck fleet operator. In this year of prosperity, we are not requiring our government to live within its income from Federal taxes. We are going further into debt, borrowing from future generations devaluing the dollar more and more in order to obtain more government hand-

KNOXVILLE, IOWA., EXPRESS: "Every man should have the right to work where he should please, when he pleases and not have to pay tribute for the privilege. Most of the workmen of this country are not union workers and they seem to be doing all right without being governed and controlled by self appointed heads.

NORWALK, CONN., HOUR: "Lack of parental interest and discipline starts children on the wrong track. Social workers say the youths of today are basically sound, but like any growing thing must be steered in the right direction."

CHEWELAH, WN., INDEPENDENT: "Unless there is an economic need for continuing highway work on an accelerated basis from the standpoint of making employment, then we should build within present revenues. If the gas tax gets much higher, there will be an increasing trend to small cars to save gas-comparable to European situation, which would just about defeat the purpose of greater tax on gasoline.'

# Crucial Moment For America

This moment may go down in history as the time when America found itself and stood up resolutely for its principles and its great heritage.

And this moment may go down in history as the time when America missed its last chance; as a day of infamy when, partly fulled into complacency by peaceful words, partly due to a combination of fear of war and fear of losing some measure of our high standard of living and our ease, this nation appeared and began the process of gradual surrender.

The reception given Nikita Khrushchev by the people of Washington is encouraging. Large crowds lined the streets, drawn by natural human curiosity. But there was little cheering; mostly there was a cool reserve mixed with an evident dislike and disapproval of everything the man stands for.

But infinitely more, it is to be hoped that our officials will remain as impervious to Communist threats and blandishments; that our industrialists will not be hoodwinked by glittering promises of profit from trade and that our soft-headed appeasers, the fearful and those with a weakness for Marxism in any form will look at this personification of the horrible philosophy of atheistic communism and return to the doctrine of their fathers-the doctrine of Americanism and the dignity of the human soul.

# How High Is Too High

The pay-as-you-go principle of financing our 41,000 mile national highway network now becomes "Pay Thru The Nose."

In 20 states, the latest one cent a gallon Federal tax hike means that drivers are paying \$1.50 for a dollar's worth of gas. Other states, in which the states' tax bite is less severe, bring the national average to 47 cents worth of tax for a dollar's worth of fuel. With the average state tax at six cents a gallon and the new Federal tax at four, gasoline is taxed nearly five times as heavily as such somewhat non-essential items as diamonds and mink coats

This means that, with the October 1st Federal boost, motorists are expected to pay about \$4.08 billion in taxes this year and \$5.4 billion next year. This 1960 take, according to the experts, will provide about \$2.3 billion to the Federal Government and over \$3.1 billion to state and local treasuries.

But will it? There is an ominous hint in the established fact that average car mileage is declining year by year,-from 10,290 in 1953 to 9,620 this year-that law of diminishing returns can apply to gasoline taxes as well as to any other outsize demand on the family purse.

Gasoline taxes have jumped 37% in the past ten years while all retail prices rose 21% and the price of gasoline itself only 6%. Perhaps the taxers have already over-reached themselves. But it seems clear now, that unless they call a halt to the hikes,
