Funeral Services Were Tuesday For Car Wreck Victim

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday in Slayton, Tex., for Mrs. Charlie Griffin, who was killed Sunday in a car wreck near Lorengo, Colo. Mr. Griffin, driver of the car, and his daughter, Iris were not injured in the accident, but another woman who was riding with them was seriously injured.
Mr. Griffin is a brother of Mrs. Artie Whitesides of Burkburnett.

Postal Receipts At Burk Show Rise

Postal receipts at the Burkburnett Postoffice were \$32, 610.55 for the period Jan. 1 through Oct. 16th.
This represents an all time high for this period and is an increase of \$6,823.02 over the same period in 1958. The increase represents an approximate gain of 26 1/2 percent for the Burkburnett office, which is partially accounted for by the increase in population of the city, which according to the Chamber of Commerce estimates now stand above 9,500.

Fire Truck Used Initially At Burk

The Burkburnett firemen made their first run a few days ago with the new fire truck, a 2 1/2 ton Dodge truck chassis powered by a 210 horsepower engine on a reinforced frame.
It is equipped with a 500 gallon two stage capacity with centrifugal pump, 1,500 foot 2 1/2 inch hose bed, 300 gallon booster tank and two reels of 150 foot each of booster hose.
All service lines are equipped with fog nozzles. The truck carries two five gallon Indian pump cans; 20 pounds of dry chemical, bars, ladders, axes, pike poles and an inhalator, public address system, penator signal system, two gas masks and two resuscitators.
The last custom built fire truck for the city was purchased in 1937. Another was built about 1939.
Cheseter Howard has replaced Dick Chambers as driver. Chambers had driven for 17 years and now serves as assistant driver. Weldon Nix is the chief of the 26-member Volunteer Fire Department.

WHOSE MONEY IS IT?

On the West Coast, Harry Bridges' Longshoremen and Warehousemen have procured a control under which employers will pay \$1.5 million into a union fund. This is supposed to reward the union for allowing machinery to increase productivity.

Why employers should have to bribe a union to allow them to increase efficiency, we can't answer. In the past such increases have financed high pay scales and shorter work weeks, plus fringe benefits.

But the trend is established. Ever larger parts of the gains in new contracts are withheld from paychecks and placed in union funds. There, union officials say how they shall be invested or spent. The members, who earn the money, have little to say about what becomes of it.

If we were union members we would be quite concerned about all the money others take from our paychecks "for our own good". Federal, state and local governments as well as the unions take their bite for plans to insure our future security—and leave union members worrying about how to pay today's bills.

If we were union members, we'd start our campaign for more "take home pay" by working on those in government and in union headquarters who prevent us from taking home so much of what we already earn.

Equating Communism With Christianity

Nikita Khrushchev added blasphemy to his crimes Monday. He equated communism with Christianity. He said that "communism is in accord with Christ's teachings." He added, "If you will look into our aspirations you will see that we have taken many of Christ's precepts—such as "Love thy neighbor."

Communism is the antithesis of Christianity. Communism denies the existence of God and the divinity of Christ. The Communist leaders have done all they can to suppress Christianity. The artificially engineered famine in the Ukraine which took millions of lives was not in accord with Christ's teachings."

Neither is the Communist practice of herding millions of political prisoners into slave labor camps.

Nor the numerous Soviet aggressions against Poland, Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, Finland and the other less direct aggressions of which the Kremlin has been guilty. Nor was the inhuman suppression of Hungary's uprising against Red Rule. Nor were the repeated, almost universal, violations of treaties of which the Kremlin has been guilty.

Khrushchev has talked a great deal since he came to this country. Mostly he has said the expected things, made the usual boasts and threats, evaded questions or given twisted and tortured replies, all along the usual line. But no one expected him to equate communism with Christianity.

American indignantly reject such blasphemy.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

FREDONIA, N. Y., CENSOR: "Like any other momentous force in our society, organized labor must be subjected to controls in the broad public interest. Like any other momentous force it must be allowed sufficient freedom within the framework of control so that it can perform its destined function. We believe that this principle of controlled freedom has the approval of the great majority of the American people."

CHARLESTON, MO., ENTERPRISE-COURIER: "Ever since inflation began to cheapen the dollar, business has been automatically prevented from laying aside enough money, before taxes, to make up for the wearing out of the tools it must use to keep it alive. Unless some provision is made—and soon—to enable industry to replace its tools at present day inflated prices, the entire economy (and the tax collector) will suffer."

The Great Falls, Montana, Tribune, says that about one in six employed Americans—more than ever before—have government jobs and the trend is still upward. Something like 11 million people are paid with tax dollars from one unit of government or another. Since the turn of the century, the paper adds, non-government employment has increased 100%—and government employment 66 percent.

Editor Ralph McGill of the Atlanta Constitution writes: "It is very difficult for a senator to move from the Senate to the White House. In all history, only one, Warren Harding, has made it. Vice presidents have a difficult time too. Only one has made the direct transfer—Van Buren. "Governors have the best chance. Especially one who is out of the controversial national issues."

Industry Seeks The Handicapped

Physically handicapped workers have proved their worth as competent employees in industry and recognition of this comes from no less a group than the National Association of Manufacturers.

On the eve of the Oct. 4-10 observance of "National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week," NAM president Stanley Hope sent a letter to the associations 20,000 members applauding the accomplishments of disabled workers. "They have done more than their share not only in helping themselves and their dependents, but in helping sustain the nation's economic strength," Mr. Hope observed.

He pointed out that handicapped job placements increased 25% in the first half of 1959 over the same period of 1958. Today industry seeks the handicapped," the NAM president said.

This stands as a tribute to the courageous determination of disabled workers to overcome their handicaps and be self-supporting. It is also a tribute to the employers, who have given them the opportunity to prove they can do it.

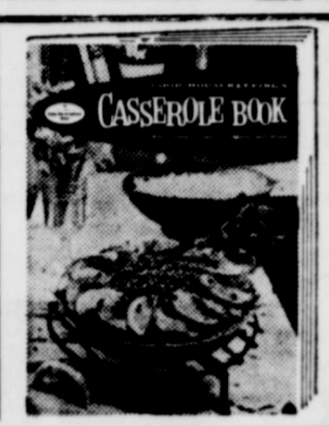

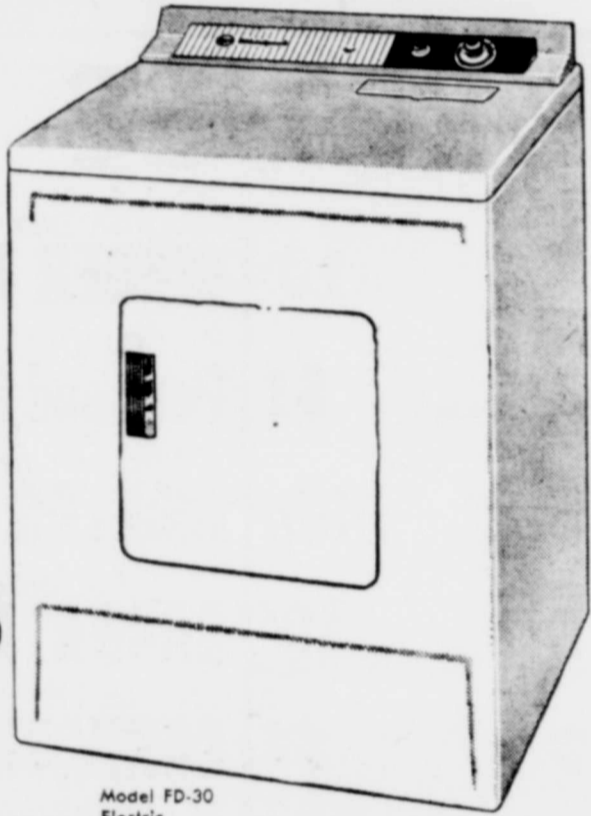

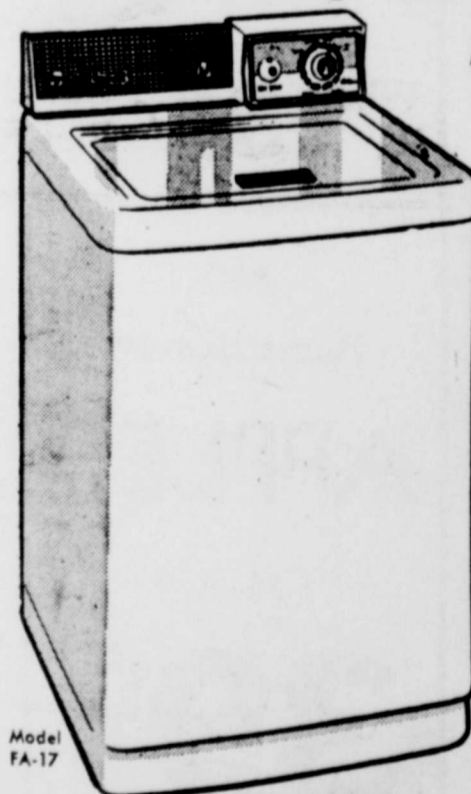
