## Landmark Torn Down

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### Burk Rotary Club Host Nov 10th Of District Governor

The Rotary club of Burkburnett, Tuesday, Nov. 10th will be host to Robert R. King, Governor of the 579th District of Rotary International, who is making his annual official visit to each of the 37 Rotary clubs in North Central Texas. He will address the local club and confer with President Floyd Marten, secretary, Buddy Byars and committee chairman of Rotary administration and service activities.

Mr. King is superintendent of Schools in Haskell and is a member and past president of the Rotary club of Haskell. He is a graduate of McMurry College and North Texas State College. He was elected as a district governor for the 1959-60 fiscal year at Rotary's 50th annual convention in New York City, U.S.A., last June. He is one of 261 district governors supervising the activities of more than 10,200 Rotary clubs which have a membership of nearly 500,000 business and professional executives in 113 countries throughout the world.

Wherever Rotary clubs are located, President Marten asserted in discussing the governor's visit, their activities are similar to those of the Rotary club of Burkburnett because they are based on the same general objectives, developing better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men, promoting community betterment undertakings, raising the standards of business and professions and fostering the advancement of good will, understanding and peace among all the peoples of the world.

Each year, this world-wide service organization continues to grow in numbers and in strength. President Marten added. During the past fiscal year, 374 new Rotary clubs were organized in 53 countries, bringing the total number of Rotary clubs to an all time high of more than 10,200 and four countries were added to Rotary's roster. — British Guiana, Gambia, Madagascar and Nepal.

The annual Boy Scout Fund Drive Kickoff Breakfast will be held Friday morning, Nov. 6th at Town Hall beginning promptly at 7:00 o'clock. Floyd Marten, general chairman of the drive, expects 150 workers to attend the breakfast.

Advance Gifts committee is composed of Alvin Hill, Cliff Wampler, Jack Mathis and Harry Dodson.

Majors for the drive are Herb Salisbury, B. B. Six, Buddy Byars, H. D. Smith and Bill Browning. They have Captains and Lieutenants under them and are responsible for having them all out for the breakfast.

Plans are to make an all-out effort to wind the drive up the following Monday. By having such a great number of workers, no one person will have more than five or six prospect cards to account for.

People in Burkburnett seem uninformed on just how the money raised for the Boy Scouts here in Burkburnett is spent. The Boy Scouts operate under the theory of one council and one budget. Burkburnett is in the Northwest Texas Council. The budget for the Council is approximately \$75,000.00. Burkburnett has 6.1% of all of the Cubs, Scouts and Explorers in the Council.

It takes money to organize new units (Burk has had 4 in the last year). Leaders are given training with materials supplied by the Council. Every time a boy advances a rank, his badge is paid for out of the Council budget.

The fee for boys attending camp is only \$14.00 per week. It costs far more than this per boy to maintain a camp and to staff it with experts and provide year around maintenance. Many Scouts and Cubs use this camp on week ends, free of charge. Perkins Reservation is in Burkburnett's backyard. Camp is paid for by the Council budget.

The help and guidance of a full time professional man is at our service. This man is a college graduate and has 6 weeks of specialty schooling at Schiff Scout Reservation. He is a big help to unit leaders in Burkburnett.

Last year we raised only \$1,200.00 for Scouting. We should increase this amount 3 or 4 times to pay our way in Scouting in Burkburnett. When a Scout worker visits you this week end, open your hearts and your pocket book to help Scouting make Burkburnett a better place to live.

The Scouting movement has boomed in Burkburnett the past few years. Most of the time, Burk has lead the area in percentage of increase. Here is the lineup as it now stands:

We had approximately 255 boys served by Scouting last year. The goal for the coming year is 320.

### Contract Given to Frank Parkinson Wichita Falls

On Tuesday night, November 3, 1959, the directors of the Burk Swim Club, Inc., voted to award Mr. Frank Parkinson, Jr., of Westmoreland Pool Company of Wichita Falls, Texas, the contract for the construction of a Paddock "Seabreeze" Equipped Swimming pool.

The contract is for a fan shape pool 82 feet long, 35 feet wide at the deep end and 55 feet wide at the shallow end, with a depth from 2 feet to 10 feet. A 3 meter and a 1 meter diving board, and a separate 20 foot in diameter round shallow wading pool are included. The contract does not include bathroom, fence, or lighting equipment. These will be constructed separately by volunteer labor and material.

The total contract is for \$24,000.00 and was let in two parts. First: \$13,500 will be paid for the completion of the pool without the filtration plant; the second, \$10,500 will be paid for the filtration plant and the opening of the swimming pool for use whenever the balance of the money is raised. This is a total of \$24,000.00.

The directors have acted on the approval of a membership meeting to let the contract to commence the pool at such time whenever money was available for completion of one part of the pool.

The Burkburnett City Council has given the Swim Club a lease on the North East corner of the new City Park, located on the South end of the Gulf Road for the building of the swimming pool. Also the City Council has authorized the forming of a committee to landscape and design the park for recreation and beauty. Mrs. Hugh Preston, Jr. is chairman of this committee, and Mrs. Carl Morrison and Mrs. D. C. Dodson will plan the park design.

At the present time there is a total of \$14,834.40 on hand from individual memberships, club memberships, civic club projects and donations to the Burk Swim Club. Additional funds are urgently needed to commence the second phase of the construction program. Anyone having made a pledge to the swimming club is urged to complete his pledge. **Oil Industry Marks 100th Year**

It was on Aug. 27, 1859 that Edwin L. Drake, a retired railroad conductor struck oil at Titusville in western Pennsylvania. When Drake began operations, he had difficulty obtaining workers with sufficient zest for experiment to abandon the primitive method of producing oil by collecting the seepage. After digging a pit and almost drowning the workmen, he conceived the idea of drilling for oil and putting a casing in the hole to prevent surface waters from issuing. Beset by difficulty, townspeople dubbed the project "Drake's Folly," and when the drilling slipped into a rock crevice and stuck orders were to abandon operations. However, the following day, within a few feet of the top of the casing a dark-green liquid appeared. Several gallons of oil were lifted to the surface and "Drake's Folly" was a dream come true. With the widespread exploration for oil, which followed, transportation became one of the main problems. Railroads thrust their spurs into every oil town. Transportation facilities from the Pennsylvania oil fields were overloaded. In 1865, Amos Densmore, a buyer-shipper, built two 1,700 gallon wooden tanks upright on a railroad flatcar. Such tanks soon replaced the leaky wooden barrels that had been used to ship oil to refineries via wagon and flatboat. Later, innovators replaced the two wooden tanks with one horizontal metal cylinder. This is the design used today for approximately 163,000 tank cars that ply America's railroads. The oil industry was started by men who took big financial risks. Today, with all the scientific methods devised for locating oil prospects, there is still only one way to strike oil—drill for it, and 9 times out of 10 the hole will be dry. But the possibility of profit still outweighs the risk. Therefore the US is blessed with bountiful oil supplies. The oil industry is a classic example of the American free enterprise system.

**Your Tax Bill**

How much money in taxes will the average man pay between now and age 65? Frank R. Ford has figured out the answer, in an article which appeared originally in the New York World Telegram and The Sun and has been condensed in Reader's Digest. This average man is 29 years old, makes a little under \$100 a week, and has a wife, two children, a low priced car and a mortgaged home. In the next 36 years, says Mr. Ford, he can expect to pay \$47,221 in taxes. That amounts to \$25.23 a week, or more than 25% of his income. Federal income taxes are the biggest single item. Even so, they come to but 44% of the total. The balance consists of social security taxes, real estate taxes, personal property taxes, taxes on gasoline and tires, sales taxes, state incomes taxes, and so on. To cap the climax, Mr. Ford emphasizes that the figures are conservative—for they don't take into consideration future tax increases. And the way things are going, increases seem as certain as tomorrow morning. What it amounts to is that the average man puts in a quarter of his working time in behalf of the government. Then, what money he has left has been ravaged by inflation.

This type of advertising is in the best interests of the stock brokerage industry, and may do a lot to achieve stability and avoid disaster on the New York stock market."  
**NEWBERRY, S. C. OBSERVER:** "Dr. Robert B. Corbett, president of New Mexico State University, said in a speech recently that a few years ago young men were told not to take engineering because engineers were a dime a dozen. Today, he stated, men trained in engineering are the scarcest and most demanded in our economy. The same situation could conceivably develop in farm-

ing. Our population is increasing so rapidly that in 10 years, according to Dr. Corbett, unless the nation is careful, it may wake up and find itself incapable of providing food for that sharply expanding population. RfET

### Appointment of Farm Census Crew Leader Announced

Appointment of Herert S. Gray of Wichita Falls as a crew leader for the 1959 Census of Agriculture was announced today by Field Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas.

Mr. Gray will direct a force of census takers who will canvass all farms in Wichita, Archer and Clay counties. Before assuming his post, he will go to Graham, Tex., where he will receive five days of training by a member of the Census Bureau's staff. Topics to be covered include procedures for recruiting of census takers, census taker training, canvassing methods, preparation and submission of reports, and the supervision of census takers to insure a complete and accurate count.

The crew leader is one of the key people in the field operations of the Census of Agriculture. It is his responsibility to recruit and train the census takers and supervise their work; plan and allocate work assignments; review the work of the census takers and take remedial action where necessary, and to conduct difficult interviews.

After completing his training, Mr. Gray will return to his district where he will spend several weeks recruiting census takers, and training them in preparation for the start of the field canvass, Nov. 18th.
