AUSTIN — In culmination of more than a year of painstaking work, the official State Board of Insurance order promulgating the Texas Safe Driving Insurance Plan, to become effective Jan 1, 1960. ### To Think Is To Share

Thanksgiving, ever since the first one in America, has been a day for giving thought as well as thanks to the blessings of freedom-spiritual freedom and economic freedom, too. And appreciation of good fortune carries with it the normal, human urge to share with the destitute.

This in a nutshell, is the philosophy of "Operation Clothes Closets" to be conducted among more than 16,000 Catholic churches in the US by Catholic Relief Services, NCWC, for the eleventh consecutive year. This mammoth, nation-wide activity which produces millions of pounds of desperately needed wearable used clothing, shoes, blankets and bedding annually for the displaced and homeless, the sick and needy, the undernourished and despairing of 51 countries, is known as the "Bishops' Cloth ing Collection." How this may have come about is related by James C. G. Conniff writing for the NCWC news Service:

"The word 'Chapel' means clothes closet, from the Latin capella. The first chapel in Christendom was a clothes closet. It was the place in France where they kept a certain famous military

"That cape, on a wintry road near Amien, was shared with a shivering beggar by a mounted teenage Rman soldier. The soldier clip-clopped on into History as a Christian convert who lived for charity. He became a bishop of the Catholict Church, and in time, St. Martin of Tours. "And the beggar?

"Well you know the story. What they kept in that first chapel was actually the half-cape which Martin, with Roman prudence, reserved for his warmth. It in no way diminished his reward. ### More Revenue From Lower Taxes

Secretary of Commerce Mueller has come out in favor of tax reform which will remove road blocks to business growth and "establish the right business climate."

The matter arose when a newspaperman asked: "If a tax cut were to come, where do you think to it should come?" The Secretary answered: "I would rather use the words, 'tax reform'. because I think we have a lot of situations in our tax structure that inhibit business growth, and I believe that, as Secretary of Commerce, my responsibility is to make every effort to see that we establish the right business climate, so that investors and entrepreneurs, if you wish to call them such, are encouraged.

He then cited the fact that in 1954 "we had a substantial tax cut and, as a result of that tax cut, business was stimulated to the extent that within a very short period, we were actually. taking in more revenue at the lower rates than we were previously

This emphasis an economic truth that is too lottle understood A heavy percentage tax, whether on business or the individual, does not necessarily result in maximum revenue to government. A more moderate tax, which stimulates investment, expansion and the creation of new productive wealth, will in the long run bring in greater revenue, and at the same time lead to more and better jobs and higher living standards for all.

### News From The County Agent

Texas' share of the 1960 upland cotton acreage allotment of 16 million acres will be 6,791,512 acres. It was announced by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson that alternate, Choice B, farm allotments for the 1960 upland cotton crop will be 40 per cent larger than the regular choice A allotments for the same farms

An acreage allotment of 22,-243 acres will be in effect for the extra long staple cotton grown in Texas in 1960. The national marketing quota will be 66,590 bales with a 64, 776 acre allotment.

The October 1st inventory of cattle and calves on feed indicates there are 4.8 million head on feed in the 21 feeding states. This is 20 percent higher than at this time last year and the largest for any October on re-

The four most important western feeding states including Texas, Arizona, Colorado and California led other regions of the country with a 34 percent increase in number of head on feed over last year.




