## Burkburnett Scouts Going to Jamboree In Colo. Springs

### Hi-way Dept. to Spend \$90,000 On Area Roads

The Texas Highway Department will spend \$90,000.00 for improvements on farm to market roads in Wichita County during 1960. L. B. Dean, District Engineer at Wichita Falls, has announced. This is in addition to the regular construction and maintenance program.

The State Highway Commission, at its November meeting, approved this appropriation of \$90,000.00 to improve already existing farm-to-market roads in the county. The usual type of improvements that will be provided by this program will be for base re-construction, seal coat jobs, additional surfacing and for widening of structures.

The ten projects in Wichita County will be under the supervision of the local highway district personnel. Mr. Dean advises that most of this work will be completed during 1960. The purpose of this improvement program in general is to preserve and extend the life of the existing pavements or to rebuild the present road to tolerable standards if such is needed.

Funds allotted for Wichita County will be spent on the following projects:

On Farm Road 367, from Loop 11 West, a distance of 1.4 miles.

On Farm Road 2326, from State 25 to Wilbarger County Line, a distance of 4.1 miles.

Farm Road 1739, from Sunshine Hill to State 240, a distance of 2.6 miles.

Farm Road 1813, from State 240, South, a distance of 0.8 mi.

Farm Road 368, from FM 367, North, a distance of 2.7 miles.

Farm Road 1206, from State 258 to FM 368, a distance of 8.0 miles.

Farm Road 1814, from U. S. 287, South, a distance of 2.2 mi.

Farm Road 368, from 2.0 miles South of FM 367, South, a distance of 0.7 miles.

Farm Road 1177, from US 277 to Clay County Line, a distance of 6.6 miles.

Farm Road 1811, from State 25 to Wilbarger County Line, a distance of 1.8 miles.

## Don't Be Naive

Taxpayers got another jolt with the one cent increase in the Federal gas tax for "the next 21 months."

If anyone is naive enough to think this "emergency" tax will be dropped at the end of 21 months" he is undoubtedly due for a sad awakening. "War emergency" transportation and other taxes have now been in effect for some 15 years.

At the end of 21 months the plea will probably be to add the revenue from the one cent gas tax hike to the general fund instead of dropping it. Already a large portion of the existing 3c gas tax and certain automobile-related tax revenues go into the Treasury, instead of on the road as was intended.

If Congress had worked half as hard trying to stay within the Federal income as it did in trying to find new ways to spend money and increase taxes, it could have made headway in balancing the budget and saving the value of the dollar.

## The "New Leisure"

From the Oregon Voter: "A modern mother and young son were shopping in a supermarket. The child, trying to be helpful, picked up a package & brought it to her. 'Oh no, honey' protested the mother. 'Go put it back. You have to cook that.'"

This is more than an amusing little anecdote. It is illustrative of a quiet and peaceful revolution which has brought about profound changes in the family life of the nation over a comparatively brief span of years.

The shelves of our markets are loaded with products which are all ready to eat or nearly so. The result is that the housewife needs to spend far less time in the kitchen than did her mother. She has a "new leisure" to use as she wishes—and the enthusiastic public response to the processed, frozen and pre-cooked foods shows that she is making the most of it.

It costs money to ready these foods for the grocer's and butchers shelves. Much more labor is involved than with foods in the raw state, along with additional materials. And that is the reason why the "spread" between the price paid for foods in the raw material state and price charged the consumer at retail has widened. That was as inevitable a development as the rising of the sun.

"Built-in convenience," of course, isn't confined to foods. We demand products of a thousand kinds which gives us more pleasure, more efficiency and demand less of our time. So, the manufacturers produce them and the retailers strive to stock them to move in high volume at minimum prices, into the homes of consumers.

## Competition Down The Line

We often hear it said that there's little real competition in the oil industry—that giant companies dominate it and run things to suit themselves.

Some statistical facts gathered by one leading oil company gives a very different picture of the situation.

In 1948, for instance, the country's five top oil companies accounted for 43.5 percent of the industry's total refinery runs. Since then, these companies have grown in assets and production. Yet in 1958 their share of the runs was down to 39.3 percent. In other words, smaller companies are getting a growing slice of the expanding market.

In monopolized enterprises, high prices are the rule. But they aren't in oil. Deducting the state and federal taxes over which the companies have no control, gasoline, costs about the same as it did in the early 20's. That is true of very, very few commodities and services.

In monopolized enterprises progress comes slowly if at all. But, due to advances largely forced by competition, three gallons of today's gas do as much work as four used to do. There are some 170,000 independent companies in the oil industry. This means that competition is tough all down the line—from the fields where crude is sought to the service station ramp.

## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

MILES CITY, MONT., STAR: "Steelworkers themselves know that any price raise will be of transient value, because any raise they get will trigger demands of unions in all other industries. Newspaper polls before the strike showed that union members were generally aware of this discouraging fact. Yet a strike we had, because monopoly unions today are more responsive to the demands of intra-union politics than to the wishes of the members. Thus we are reminded that the new labor act, valuable as it is, lacks provision for secret strike vote by those most concerned—union members."

WALDEN, N. Y. HERALD: "The National Safety Council reveals that 1,265,000 persons have died in this century in motor vehicle accidents in this country. By comparison 604,773 American have been killed in battle or died of wounds in all this nation's principal wars, from the Revolutionary War through the Korean conflict. War is a grim thing—but we live with something even grimmer, day after day on our highways and byways."

KITTANNING, PA., LEADER-TIMES: "Unwarranted pessimism has developed among some observers in evaluating Soviet rocket advances—the error lies in confusing progress in space research with expansion of defense capabilities. Dr. Herbert F. York, U. S. chief of military research and engineering, does not make this mistake. He describes the Soviet lead in space research as more of a question of acute embarrassment than national survival."

LIBERAL, KANS., DAILY TIMES: "Seems no matter how convinced you are that it's a bad risk to pick up any hiker, you still feel just a little like a heel when you sail on past. This writer would suggest, that you just go on feeling like a heel and pass up all the hitch hikers because a survey shows that the percentage of thugs is NOT one in a thousand or anything like it. For instance the police department at Globe, Ariz. made a survey of 300 hitchhikers. It showed 84 had criminal records or were wanted by authorities. Criminal records included 24 for burglary, 14 for auto theft, 11 for personal violence."

CHEWELAH, WN., INDEPENDENT: "Labor, as an organization, should never be denied the right to quite work if it so desires. What is needed is a new approach to settlement. Labor leaders are too sensitive to their position, feeling that in every contract negotiation they must be in position to say, 'See what I got for you this time.' There must inevitably come a time when the Saturation point has been reached and industry to stay in business, must say, this is where we must stop. Otherwise we are being catapulted into an inflation era that will ruin our entire economy."

CARLSBAD, N. M. CURRENT-ARGUS: "Sen. Hiram L. Fong of Hawaii is launching his career in Congress with a 14 country, 45 day tour of the Far East. There is nothing unusual about Congressmen traveling around the globe. However, this is one instance where a Junketing Congressman may be of more benefit than the usual. Sen. Fong is an Asian, having been born in China. His appearance is testimony of the democratic system in America. And Sen. and Mrs. Fong are traveling at their own expense. He may do more for Democracy than was anticipated."

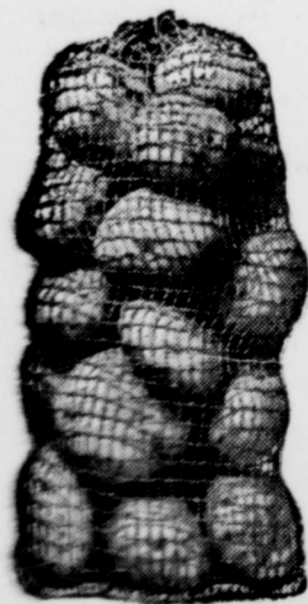

News From The County Agent

Clean all gutters and downspouts. Check to see if they are firmly fastened and look for rusty spots. A wire screen over the downspout will help prevent leaves and trash from entering and choking off the drain. When gutters overflow, you risk expensive damage to the cornice or walls of the house.

Be sure water from the downspout drains away from the foundation, warns Haws. Check all drainage around the foundation and fill in any low spots to assure proper and adequate drainage away from it. This will help prevent heaving and other potential damage problems.

Caulking at windows, masonry joints and other possible points of moisture entry should be checked and replaced if loose or chipped. Proper and timely maintenance will prevent costly repairs at a later date, so save money later by making a check now.

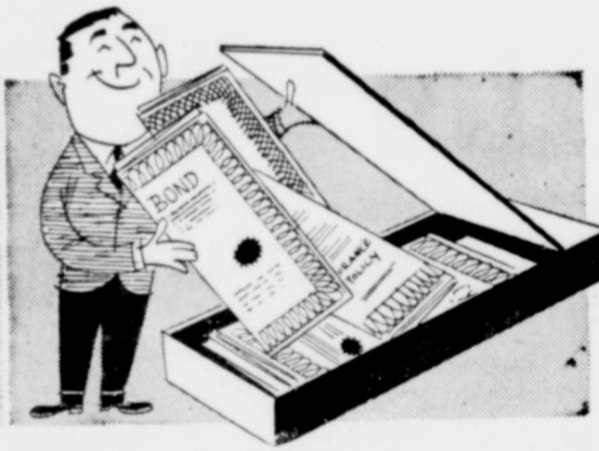

For convenience, locate the trashburner near the kitchen, but far enough away for safety. It does not have to be large, if trash is burned every day or 2

For materials that won't burn, such as bottle, tin cans, etc, place a large fly tight, water-tight garbage can near the trashburner.

Sparks fly easily, so cover top and front of the trashburner with one-fourth inch wire mesh. It should be surrounded by shrubs that will not burn easily. Locate at least 12 feet away from buildings. Make sure the clothes line is well out of range too.

Plans for building your own mortarless trash burner are available from your county HD office.

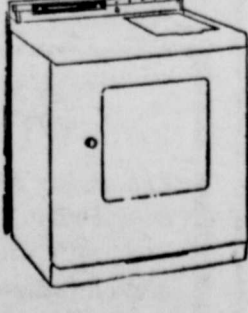
