JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL TEAM GOES THROUGH SEASON UNDEFEATED

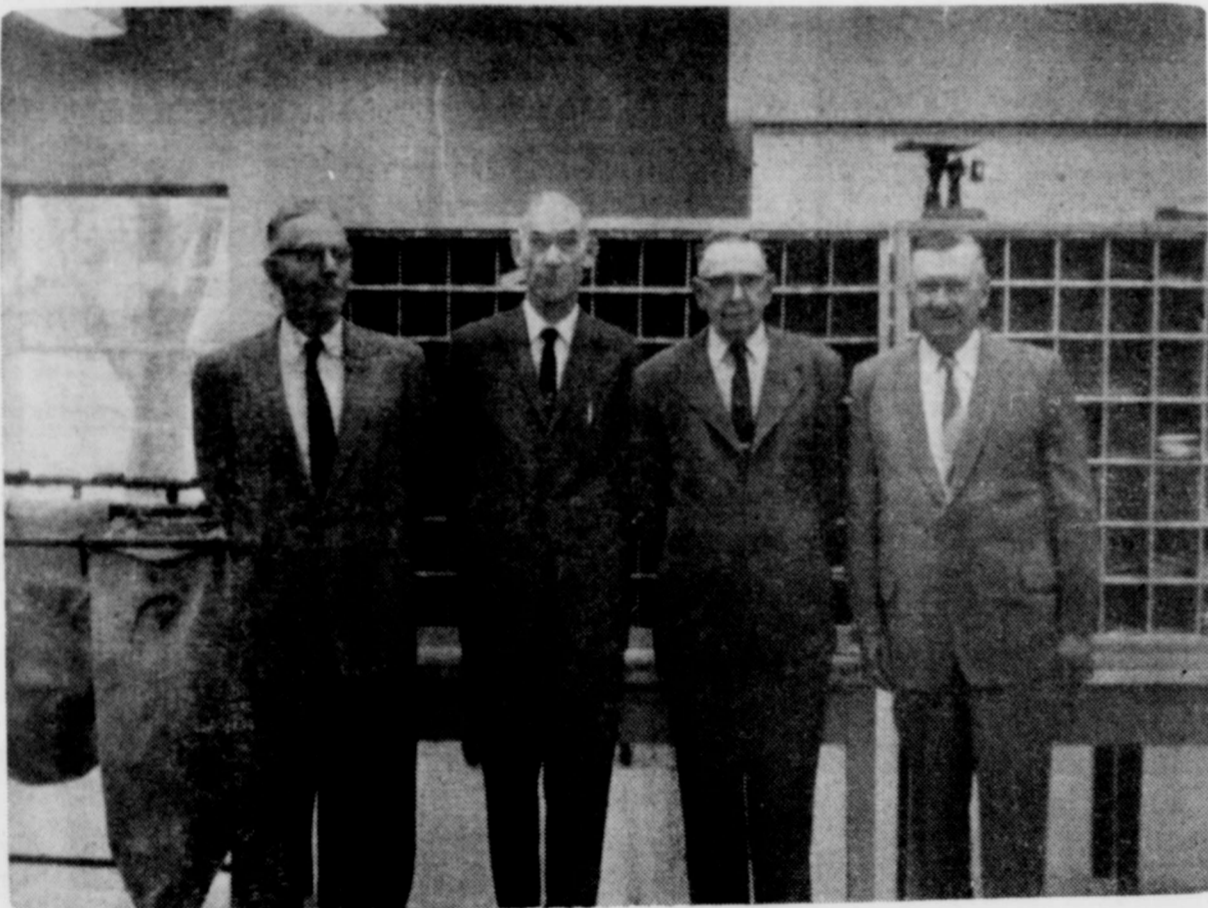

Four Postal Clerks Honored At Dinner for 38 Years Service



Employees of the Burk Burnett Postoffice observed a unique event in the office with a barbecue dinner and party at Underwood's in Wichita Falls on Monday night, November 30th, honoring four employees who have served continuously in the Burk Burnett Postoffice since 1921.

The employees are: J. L. Caffee, J. N. Hall, C. B. Beldon and Clark Ladd. They began their postal careers during the postmastership of Miss Eulalia Smith over 38 years ago, at the height of the Burk oil boom, two as substitute carriers, one as substitute clerk and one as a regular clerk, with three of the group reaching the top rung of the postal ladder as clerks and one becoming assistant postmaster.

Retirement is planned by three of the group, and possibly the fourth, some time in the future. Featured speaker for the rare event was Judge Graham B. Purcell of the 89th District Court, who paid high tribute to the four men for their long and loyal service to the postoffice department, and wishing them well in their retirement to come.

Present for the happy occasion were all of the postoffice personnel of the Burk Burnett office and their wives, and one special guest, Mrs. J. O. Beldon of McKinney, Texas. Mrs. Beldon, who is 91 years young, is the only living parent of the four honor guests.

J. L. CAFFEE has been assistant postmaster since 1944. NEAL HALL was on detached service to Army Postal Installations at Leesburg, La., and Marfa, Texas, during World War II. All four boys were exempt from distribution scheme examinations by reason of having made grades of 98 or better in several consecutive exams.

All four were qualified to handle any work in the office assigned to them. Beldon has been main distribution clerk; Ladd main dispatch clerk; Caffee main finance clerk, and Hall main C. O. D., Insured and general mail clerk since 1936.

When any team goes through a football season, undefeated, it is news, whether it is college football, high school or junior high. This year, for the first time in several years, the Junior High Bullpups breezed through their regular season without a defeat. Heading up the linemen were guards Bill Byars, Barry Davey, Sammy Wise, Robert Dillard and Eddie Cerday. Eddie also played a great deal at center. The tackles were Sonny Bentley, Jerry Melton and Eldon Wulbrecht. Playing center were Johnny Koller and Eddie Cerday. At the all important end slots were Jerry Bridges, Mitchell Henry, Dana Matherly and Gary Owen. These boys played most of the downs for the Bullpups, but were backed by Jerry Mason, Tommy Hoover, Jeff Barfield, Tony May, Mike Musick, Ricky Landrum, Will Lacy, Richard Alexander, Dawson Vaughn, Butch Boswell and Jerry Lindley.

The first game found the Bullpups winning over Henrietta at Henrietta by 14-0. Bulldog stadium was the site for the next encounter which was with the Iowa Park Hawks. They won this one 14-6. The Duncan team was the next opponent. The Burk team won 14-6. Duncan has one of the best teams in the southwestern part of Okla. The Electra Tigers were the next victims of the all victorious "Pups." as the Burk Burnett boys won 24-6. Next on the agenda were the Cubs of Olney and they too lost 38-6. The Nocona Indians got scalped 30-0 in Nocona as the Bullpups rolled merrily on. As mention earlier, the Bowie Jackrabbits gave the home town boys their biggest scare, and their best game of the season when they battled to a 28-24 decision in Bulldog. Braving the sub-freezing temperature, the boys went to the home field of the Jacksboro Tigers and came away with a 40-14 victory. The final game of the season, with Decatur was won 1-0 on a forfeit.

The Bullpups scored an outstanding 207 points this year while allowing only 56. Undefeated and untied. These boys will bear watching. Congratulations to Coach Koller and his fine team. We will look forward to seeing you play next year.

Now Do You Understand

It's time again to do your homework on Public Law 199 so you can get those Christmas packages in the mail.

Since no ordinary mortal, who is neither a traffic manager nor a postal official, can remember the ins and outs of mailing a Yule package to Aunt Mary, our duty to our readers and our sympathy for the long suffering souls in the post office demand that we try to point out the pitfall of that "Public-Be-Damned" parcel post law.

If Aunt Mary lives on a rural or star route, or in a town with a second, third or fourth class post office, or if you intend mailing the package from a rural or star route or in a second, third or fourth class post office, you are in luck. You can then send her a package weighing up to 70 pounds, so long as its girth plus length is no more than 100 inches. But, if your bundle weighs more than 40 pounds, or the combined length and girth is more than 72 inches, and you and Aunt Mary are both served by first class post offices, you had better drive to a smaller town to mail it. Or, if Aunt Mary lives more than two postal zones away (more than 150 miles) your package must not weigh more than 20 pounds if it is to be mailed. If it weighs more, you'll have to deliver it yourself, hire a truckman, see if you can persuade the Railway Express people to take an interest in the problem, divide your Yule offering into two parcels each weighing 20 pounds or less, or forget the whole thing.

Still, that's not quite right either. If your gift packages include baby fowl, live plants, trees, shrubs or agricultural commodities, or consists of books, it can weigh up to 70 pounds, measure up to 100 inches in length and girth no matter where either of you lives.

There Now that this is all clear, you can go back to your wrapping. But when you write your Christmas card to the Congressman you might also tell him you'd like to have him cut out this Public Law 199 foolishness when he goes back to Washington next year.

Your Stake In Foreign Trade

Over a period of time, the publication Maritime Affairs has been printing factual reports on just how important foreign trade is to various areas of this country, including areas remote from the seacoasts. And, to say the least, these reports have been extremely revealing.

A late one dealt with Minnesota and the Dakotas, the three states that are as far from the oceans as you can get. And it shows that few farms and factories in the region could operate efficiently without ship-borne imports. For example, the region's factories need tin, nickel, manganese, iron ore and other resources that are either entirely lacking or in short supply in this country. Thus, ship-carried imports are essential to 6,000 manufacturing plants in the three states which employ 242,000 workers.

Imports, of course, are but a part of the foreign trade story. There are, to take another example, 400,000 farmers and farm workers in Minnesota and the Dakotas. They had in a recent year, a \$224 million share of U. S. exports of wheat, corn, barley, oats or derived products. That works out to an average of \$850 for each of the 260,000 commercial farms in the area. And all of those agricultural exports moved by ship.

A similar situation exists in all the other states. We have a huge stake in foreign trade, and in the U. S. flag merchant marine which is one of its cornerstones.

Appreciation Is Appreciated

The following welcome comment is reprinted from the Irish Independent, Dublin, Ireland.

"The British gesture of repaying a loan of 90 million pounds to the United States five years before its due, underlines the immense financial burden which the United States has been carrying since the war. The assistance disbursed to friends and former foes alike under the Marshall Aid Plan and the various Foreign Air Programs was (and still is) generosity on a scale such as had never before been known between peoples.

"With the war fourteen years over, the time has come for other economically sound industrial countries to undertake some of the international charity at present dispensed by the United States. The British Government could take some legislative action to divert investment from countries like Australia and New Zealand (which are surely viable) to the poorer parts of the Commonwealth; this need not even involve the making of grants or loans. Federal Germany, so proud of her recovery, should now have plenty to spare; it would cost her little enough to alleviate the lot of the 13,000 refugees still in camps in Europe as the results, direct or indirect, of German aggression a generation ago. Other countries, too where people live in smug comfort could surely do more toward aiding less fortunate nations. Too long the American taxpayer has been the modern Atlas, carrying the world on his own shoulders."

Don't Play With Fire

Those who remember when the only way to light a Christmas tree was with candles also recall the Merry Yule as a time of worry for the elders and a time when, for some, fires took the fun out of the festivities.

But there's still magic in candle-lighting, for the gentler sex. The way to make a supper table glamorous, it seems, is to light it with candles. And if you can't see what you are eating, or the way to your mouth, that's all the more romantic, or something. This, it seems, is especially true at Christmas when there are likely to be candles all over the place and particularly in the windows.

This would therefore seem to be a good time for a note of warning. And at the risk of being castigated as a killjoy, a pain in the neck, even a party-pooper, we would say candles are alright on the dinner table as long as everybody is sitting around looking at them, but blow them out when you get up to leave. And don't put candles in the windows or use them for decorations elsewhere, unless you have Fiberglass curtains and drapes. The greatest danger lies in decorations of paper or plastic that may be too near the flame, and most of all from flimsy, inflammable fabrics such as are often used for curtains or costumes or in women's blouses and negligees. Curtains may billow or the flame may follow an unexpected draft. As for what people may, do read any newspaper.

You can feel safe with Fiberglass drapes. No candle, or even a blow torch will ignite glass. But still, think of the other hazards and go easy on the candles. Light 'em while you look at 'em, and then blow 'em out. And a Merry Christmas.

Can't All Be Captains

In the running of a ship the sailor is just as important to her operation as is the captain; each has his job to do. The sailor makes the ship function and the captain sets her course. The same could be said for labor and management in industry. Labor makes the industry function and management sets its course.

The great question today is whether labor is stepping beyond its bounds and attempting to take over management. If this is the case industry will deteriorate into an entity without leadership. How long would a ship sail without a captain?

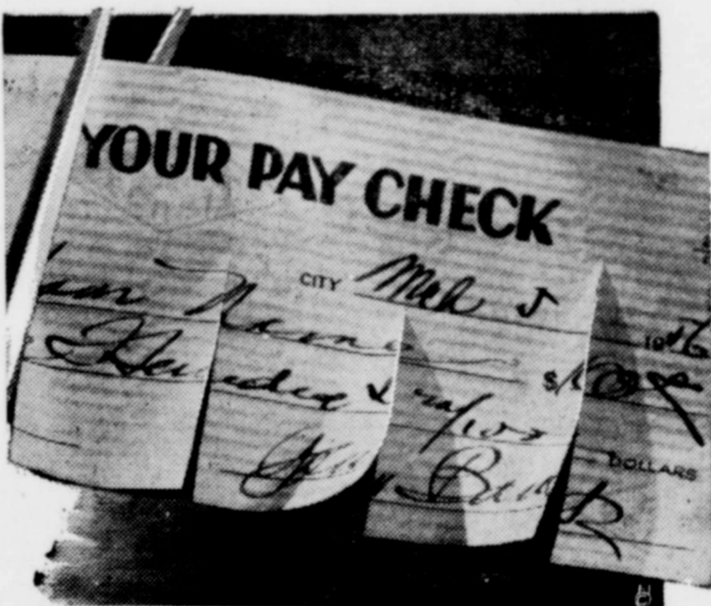

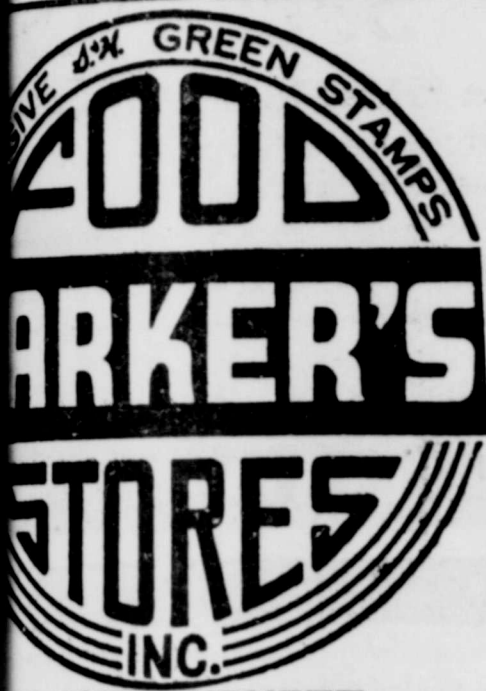

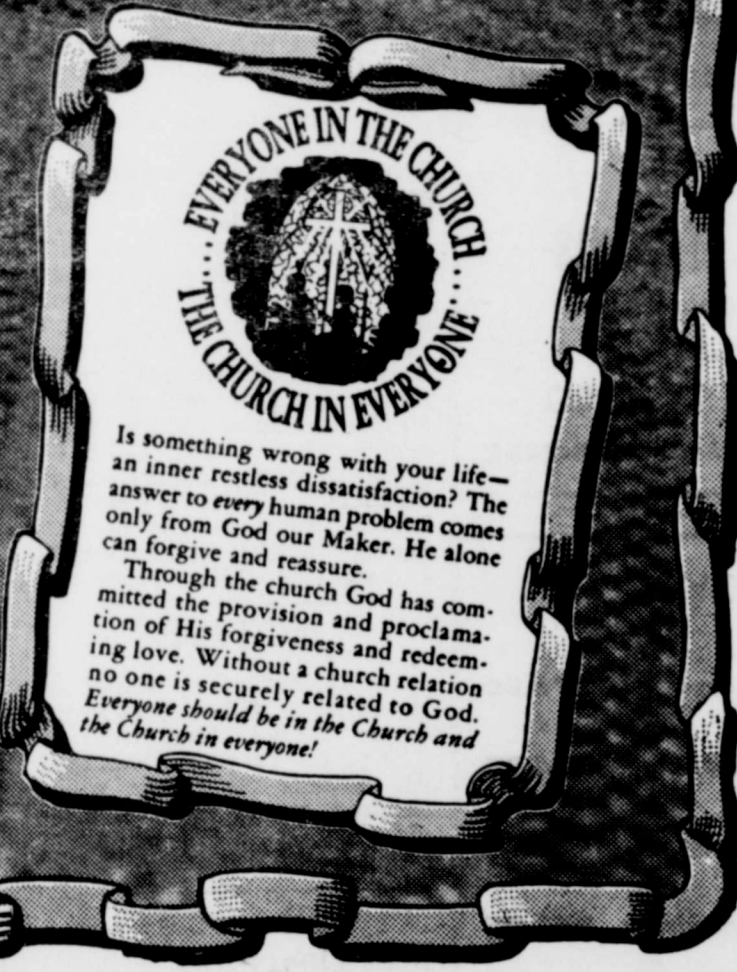

Sheppard Senator Recognizes Duvall As Santa Claus

Russell Duvall, a civilian employee at Sheppard Air Force Base, is preparing for his busy season as "Mr. Christmas," the Santa Claus for an area surrounding his home town of Burkburnett.

The role of playing Santa Claus for a wide section of the Red River Valley came by chance to the bereft father grieving the death of an only child, a ten year old boy. Duvall and his wife had considered establishing an orphan home as a memorial to their son, and as a means of bringing back into their lives the love and laughter of little children. They found that the financial and legal obstacles were for them insurmountable.

A friend asked Duvall to help with the opening of a toy section in his Main Street store. Duvall had the build; he was short and fat and besides, he liked children.

With his wife's help in adding a few touches to the \$3.50 Santa Claus suit, Duvall appeared on schedule for the opening of the toy sale.

Duvall admits now that he appeared with a few mental doubts

about being able to do the job, and he felt alarm when he saw his first prospects, two small children.

"When I looked down into the eyes of those little children, I saw they were afraid of me," Duvall says. Then I knew what to do, make them happy."

Soon, Duvall had the youngsters in his arm & they were smiling happily when a critical moment arrived. His sister-in-law walked into the store and busted her self not many feet from where Duvall stood in his Santa Claus suit with only the flimsiest of masks to shield him. To his amazement, then to his delight, the sister-in-law failed to recognize him.

At the close of the day, Duvall was physically exhausted; he had lifted into his arms more children than he cared to count. He had put so much effort into bringing smiles to their little faces, into winning their confidence for the whispered, "I want a cry-baby doll" or "I want a fire engine."

But Duvall hardly felt the weariness in his arms, his tired feet. He felt that a way had been opened for him to help the little children of Burkburnett. He little knew then what an absorbing interest that would become, both for him and for his wife. He never dreamed what a richly rewarding activity it would be for them spiritually.

So successful was Duvall's toy counter Santa Claus that he received invitations to appear at his church's Christmas program.

From that small beginning, it has spread to include the school programs, the programs at all the churches in addition to his own. Boy Scout parties, Christmas parades, appearance at near-

by towns who find this imported Kris Kringle fills the bill better than their own local volunteers.

In scope, the Christmas activities of Mr. Christmas and his wife, for she plays an important part in all the work, have gradually increased. He now advertises early each fall for broken and discarded toys which he and Mrs. Duvall mend throughout the fall season so they can put them into Christmas bags for needy children.

His fellow townsmen have come to help in small ways with contributions and with tinned groceries for the many Christmas gift bags he distributes. Bakeries in nearby Wichita Falls, have generously furnished bread for each bag. The groceries, the mended toys, the little candy and fruit treats, these he distributes as freely as the fabled Santa.

Duvall takes his annual leave allotted him as a civil service painter preceding Christmas so that he can devote all his time to this benevolent hobby.

It has become necessary for him to rent each year an empty store building on Burkburnett's Main Street which he converts into a Christmas headquarters gaily decorated and centered with a huge tree. Duvall's stock of decorations has received additions each year until now they are valued at approximately \$200.

At the headquarters on Christmas Eve, Mr. Christmas has a party for which there are no printed invitations. The welcome sign is for every boy and girl and it shines more brightly for the needy ones.

On one point, the painter is especially insistent. He limits his benefaction to no privileged groups. "A child is a child, regardless of race or color or creed," he says warmly and with conviction.

Duvall for the last several years has included another age group in his Christmas Eve visits. He says that the forgotten people of Christmas are the aged, the so-called senior citizens.

Once a man, twice a child, Duvall quotes to illustrate the delight with which the elderly people greet his visits. They tell him it is so good to be remembered. Increasingly, the oldsters consume his interest and his time.

Duvall's final program on Christmas Eve is the one held in the school in the Negro neighborhood of Burkburnett. He finds that experience each year one of his most satisfying, for he says that this is the best behaved audience he entertains. Besides, the happiness shining on the little faces rewards him completely.

Following the final program, Mr. and Mrs. Christmas set forth in their car to make deliveries to the needy ones who were too proud to come for the gift bags, to the shut-ins and the seasonally ill ones who could not brave the Christmas weather.

How does he know where to go? People know what I do and

they come or phone to tell me about folks that are having trouble and need help. Duvall explains.

He recounts his experiences of the past season. Christmas Eve, true to its usual form, was a cold and rainy day, a dreary one that taxed all the cheer this amateur Santa Claus could muster. Despite the weather, Mr. Duvall and his wife started out in their car piled high with the remaining bags to be distributed over a wide area.

At 2:30 Christmas morning the Duvalls returned home, empty handed, weary beyond describing, but deeply happy in the satisfaction they receive from their self-appointed task of serving Burkburnett as Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus.

Their own son now would be out of high school and in college had he lived, but for the Duvalls he is forever young.

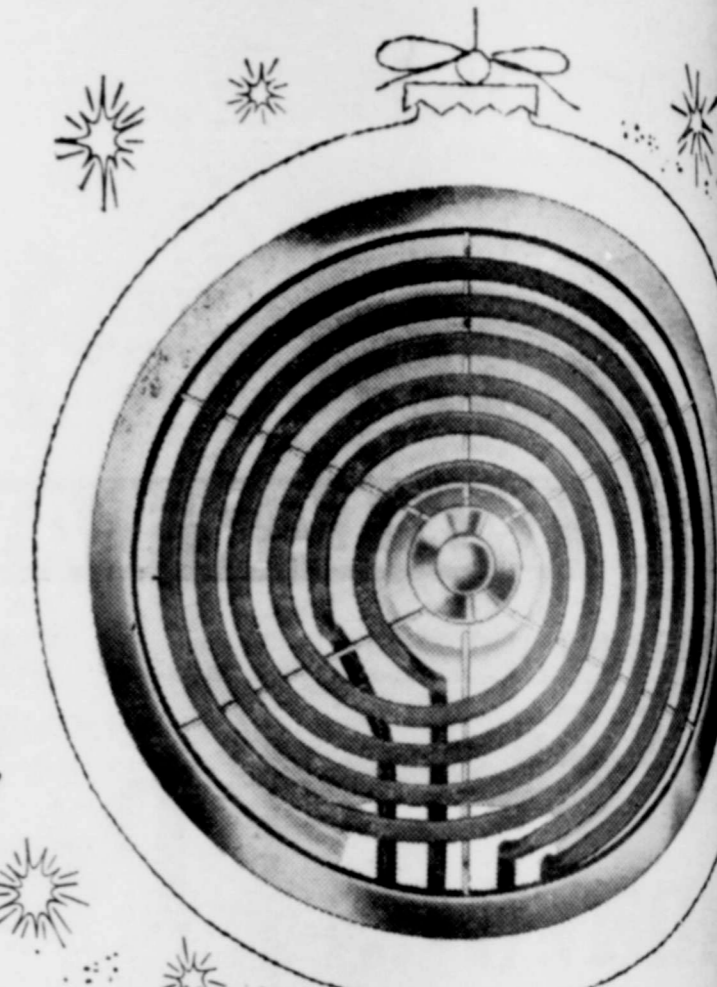

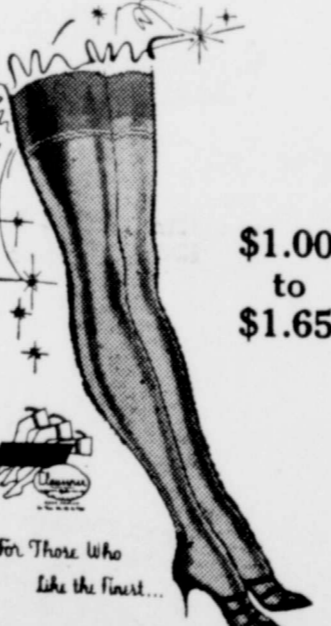
