## Is This Deflation

For the first time in the history of the Elmer A. Sperry Awards, this coveted engineering honor will go overseas.

Formal presentation of the Sperry Medal for 1958 has been made to Dr. Heinz Nordhoff, president of the Volkswagenwerk, and posthumously to Dr. Ferdinand Porsche, designer of the world famous little car. Ferry Porsche accepted for his father.

The award citation reads: "To Dr. Ferdinand Porsche (in memoriam), Dr. Heinz Nordhoff and their co-workers in Volkswagenwerk for the development of the Volkswagen automobile which, in concept, engineering design and production, has made available to the world an automobile of small size and multiple uses, with unique attributes of universality; of low initial and operating costs; of simplicity of design having ease of maintenance; comfort with adequate performance and suitable for rural and urban use."

Presented in recognition of a distinguished engineering contribution which, through application, proved in actual service, has advanced the art of transportation whether by land, sea or air, the Sperry Awards are administered by four major US engineering societies: The American Society of Mechanical Engineers, The American Institute of Electrical Engineers, the Society of Naval Architects and Marine Engineers, and the Society of Automotive Engineers.

Previous honorees include William F. Gibbs, designer of the SS United States; Donald W. Douglas, creator of the "DC" series of aircraft and Harold L. Hamilton, Richard W. Dillworth, Eugene Kettering and four cooperating engineering groups who developed the General Motors diesel-electric locomotive.

Implicit in the upcoming Awards is the reminder that the automobile, which has flowered into its present essentiality, economic significance and sartorial elegance in the US came to us from Europe. Probably the first patent on a mechanically-powered road vehicle was issued in England to Ramsey and Wildgoose in 1619, the year before the Pilgrims landed. For more than a century European inventors struggled with steam driven vehicles and in 1884, 11 years before the famous Selden patent was issued in the US, Gottlieb Daimler patented the first internal combustion engine. Panhard and Levassor in France produced the first internal combustion automobile in 1891, to be followed a year or two later in the US by Duryea and Haynes.

Perhaps the 1958 Sperry Award will jolt us out of the complacent notion that in Detroit (as in that Kansas City song in "Oklahoma") "they've gone about as far as they kin go." It may even remind our own engineers that Sir Issac Newton's "eolipile" auto of 1680 was a jet job.

## Living Costs 6th Hike In Seven Months

A cloud no bigger than a man's hand hove into view Wednesday when the Labor Department announced that living cost rose 2 of 1 percent in October.

But behind that cloud were some others. It was the sixth time in seven months that living costs had risen. The cost of living is now 1 1/2 percent higher than a year ago.

Small clouds, to be sure. But look again. The cost of living is now 125 1/2 percent of the 1947-49 base period. And if the period a decade earlier had been taken as the base, the cost of living would be more than 200 percent of what it was then. For the value of the dollar is now below 50 cents as compared with 20 years ago.

This fact is comparatively painless, of course, to those whose income has doubled or better in the same period. But what about the millions of pensioners and those others living on fixed incomes? To them, even so small a cloud as .2 of 1% is a menace.

And what about our ability to compete in world markets when our production costs, like our living costs already on a high plateau above those of our competitors, keep building up, slowly but inexorably, with the passing of the months and years?

## Half Century Salute

One of Sigma Delta Chi's goals has been the fight for the people's right to know. The group has campaigned militantly for federal and state laws requiring open meetings of governing bodies and open access to public records. In the last two years the fraternity has cooperated with other press groups to obtain passage of model "open record" laws in nine states and "open meeting" laws in seven states. It continues to fight for such laws in 22 states where they are needed.

With such an objective, the society seems assured of continued growth and many worthwhile achievements.

## A Lesson Not Learned

Foreign competition, heightened by the widening difference between US and foreign wages, has fretted the AFL-CIO into changing its traditional stand on trade. The former free-traders now want tariffs and quotas to be brought to bear when the domestic market (and domestic jobs) are threatened.

Further, they resolved in San Francisco that the US ought to step in and ease the plight of union members whose jobs have gone because foreign workers now make products that the unions themselves have priced out of the market.

In their data, the AFL-CIO bosses have fingered the wage differential as the reason for lost markets, which it clearly is, then they passed another resolution supporting an increase in the federal minimum wage law from an \$1 an hour to \$1.25, which would further widen that differential.

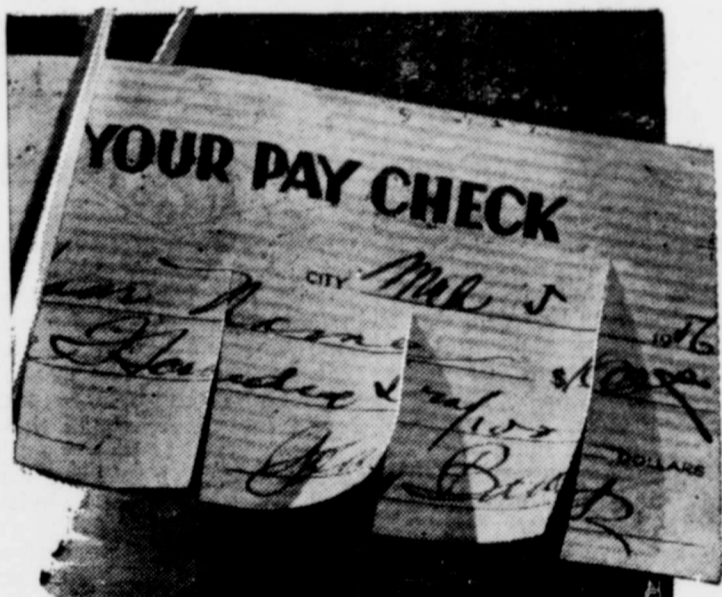

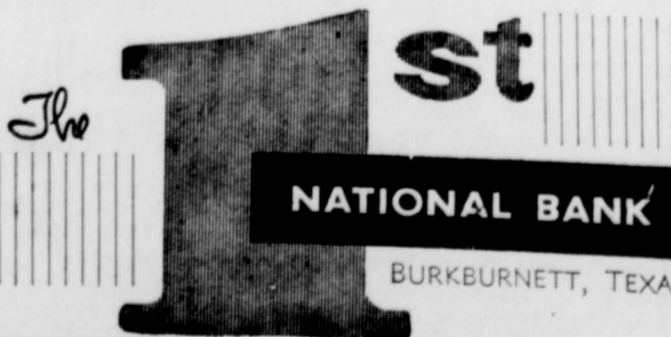

**Burk Man Appointed Commanding Officer Of Civil Air Patrol**

First Lt. Johnny Keown of Burk Burnett was recently appointed commanding officer of the Wichita Falls Civil Air Patrol. He is a 1956 graduate of Burk High School and has been a member of the Civil Air Patrol since 1957. He received his CAP wings in August of 1958. The Lt. is the youngest commanding officer of a CAP unit in the United States. The Wichita Falls Corps. is made up of 50 members, 20 senior members and 30 cadets, 14 to 18 years of age. Young people who make up the cadet population of the Civil Air Patrol are afforded opportunities designed to whet any teenager's appetite for adventure, excitement and education. Incentive programs open to cadet members are integral elements of Civil Air Patrol's continuing effort to provide America's youth with timely aviation education. These programs were reviewed this week by 1st Lt. Johnny Keown, commander of the Wichita Falls squadron as the volunteer organization marked its 18th anniversary. Outstanding among the activities which complement and high light the CAP modern education program are the international air cadet exchange, the national drill competition, the summer encampments and the international drill exhibition. Participation in most of these activities, Lt. Keown pointed out is determined by merit. The wide range of opportunities, however, permits many top-flight members from CAP's corps of 36,000 cadets to take part in one or several of these honor programs. This past summer, for example 145 teenage male cadets were carefully selected from throughout CAP's 52 wings to represent this country in the annual international air cadet exchange. These young men, with their senior CAP and USAF officer escorts, were flown to Washington D. C. and from there fanned out to 19 host nations in Europe, the Near East, North America and South America. While the CAP cadets were enjoying two-week visits in these countries, air minded youth from the participating nations were being entertained and introduced to American customs, culture and principles, by various CAP wings. The costs of this ambitious program are borne by Civil Air Patrol, Incorporated and not by American taxpayers. The exchange idea has the endorsement of the U. S. ## Legionnaires News

Legion is a civilian organization under section 1 of article II of the national constitution. The American Legion is designated as a civilian organization and membership therein does not affect or increase liability for military service, nor is there any rank in our organization and no member should be addressed by his military or naval title in any convention or meeting.

The legion does have political restrictions. The American Legion, under its federal charter, is prevented from engaging in political activities and under section 2 of article II of the national constitution, it is prohibited from engaging in the dissemination of partisan principles or the promotion of the candidacy of any person seeking public office or preferment. Consequently, neither the post, department nor national organization can endorse any candidate for public office.

Furthermore, no candidate for nomination or election to and no incumbent of any remunerative office in the American Legion, or in any dept. or post thereof; provided however, that members of standing or special committees shall not be affected. This provision has been strictly construed and if the holder of an elective office or an appointive remunerative office in the legion seeks nomination to any remunerative elective office his legion office immediately becomes vacant. Attempts have been made at several conventions to liberalize this provision but without avail.

Discipline of Legionnaires. — Under section 2 of article IV of the national by-laws members may be suspended or expelled from the legion upon a proper showing of cause which would include disloyalty, neglect of duty, dishonesty and conduct unbecoming a member of the American Legion. A suggested code of procedure is outlined in the post handbook which should be carefully followed. If a member is expelled he may appeal to the executive committee of his department whose decision is final.

You, Mr. Legionnaire, you are an ambassador of good will to the community, state and nation. Public relations is a matter for each member to consider. The American Legion is not a secret organization. It is a patriotic organization and the number one enemy of the Communistic aggression. The words of Mr. Don Peters of Houston, Tex., at a convention recently held at Graham, were "There is nothing that the Communist bosses of Russia can show us; but there is much they can learn from us."

All legionnaires are requested to meet at the Legion Hall Tuesday night, Dec. 22nd, at 7:00 p. m. to help deliver the Christmas baskets to needy families in Burkburnett.

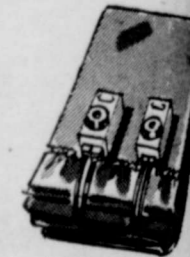

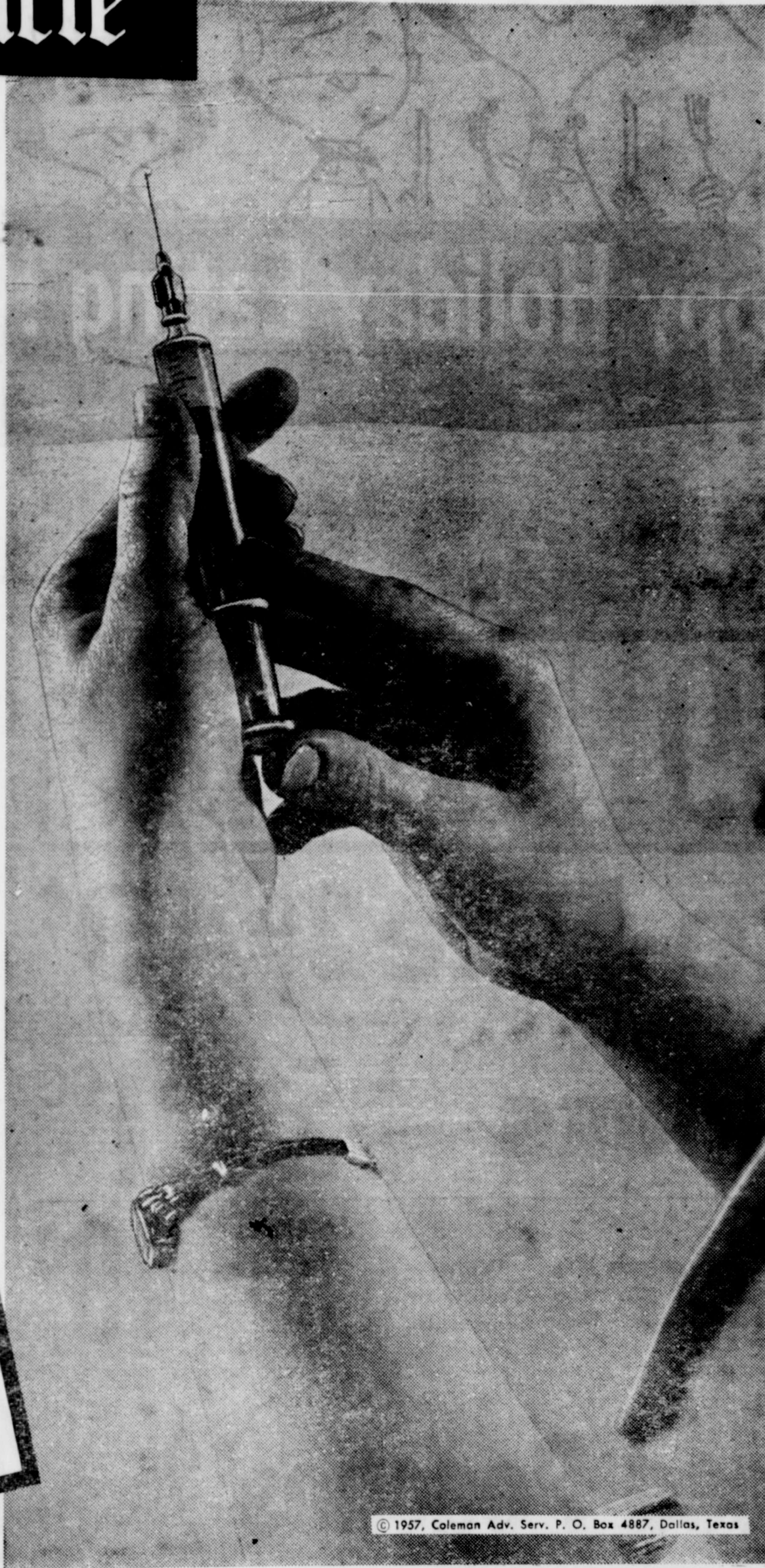
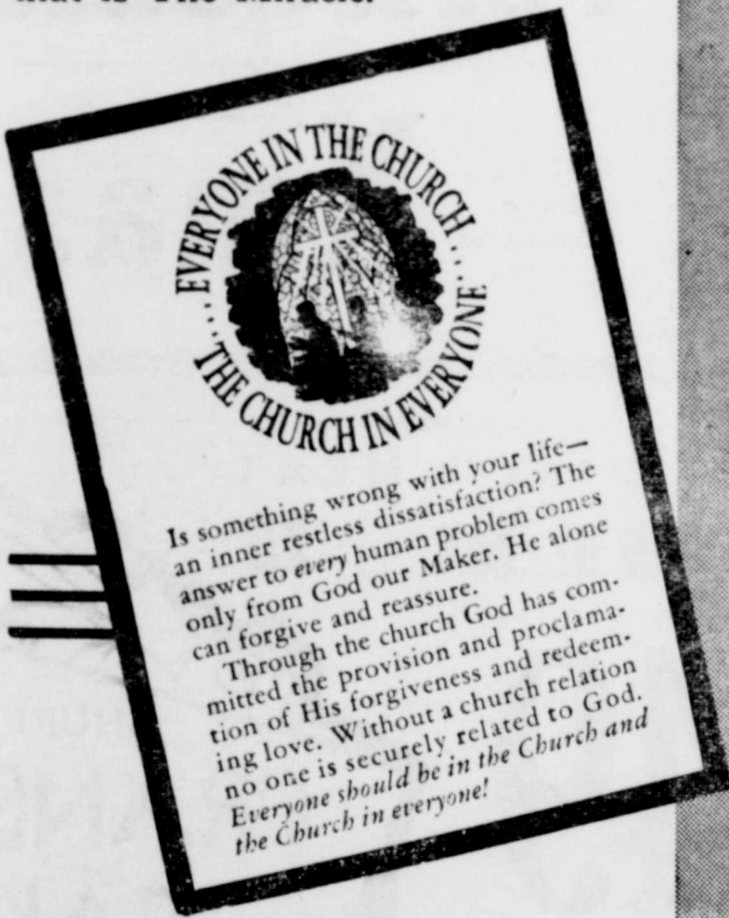

### News From The County Agent

a demonstrator. Mrs. Slama planned and completely remodeled a kitchen. It is not only easy to look at, but is also easy to use. The Barwise Community will provide the next stop. Mrs. Albert Brokreide will show draperies she completed, following a drapery workshop. She will also explain her work as a food demonstrator and will give information on meat cookery.

The last stop will be just south of Electra where Mrs. Alton Holbrook will show her new home. Kitchen planning was her work, as a demonstrator.

While on the tour, Mrs. Claude Taylor and Mrs. Sidney Smith will explain results of frozen food and clothing workshops. Each demonstrator, with the help of the county HD agent, planned her work early in 1959 and is now completing. If interested in making the tour contact one of the demonstrators or Thelma Wirges, county HD agent.

Lovely fall fabrics are now available for every type of garment. Read labels carefully and prepare fabric properly before cutting, suggests Thelma Wirges county HD agent.

Look for labels that state shrinkage control. If sanforized guaranteed not to shrink more than 2 percent, additional shrinkage is not necessary.

Check the grain line of the fabric before cutting. Correct grain line insures proper hang and drape of garment. During weaving warp yarns are parallel to each other and so are filling yarns. The one set of yarns is at right angles to the other set. By the time fabrics are purchased in the store, one or more of these conditions may have been changed. Yarns may have pulled or stretched off grain in the handling process.

To check: Straighten each end of fabric by pulling thread or tearing. Fold fabric lengthwise with selvages together.

Lay folded fabric on flat table. If crosswise yarns are on the diagonal, stretch in place by carefully pulling on the true bias. If after stretching the grain of fabric is on true bias. If after stretching, the grain of fabric is on diagonal it should be steam pressed or dampened, dried and pressed so the grain will return to its correct position.

Packaged bulbs make welcome Christmas gifts to a garden-minded friend. Make selections now and store in a cool place until Christmas. Garden tools are wonderful presents, especially the stainless steel or light-weight metal ones.

Many HD members and leaders have made and enjoyed cuttings from their shrubs and have shared with friends. If you want to please a garden loving friend share your shrubs in the form of cuttings.

Mesdames Albert Brockriede, Gale Lowrance, Jud Irby, Raymond Krull and many others have done an excellent job with cuttings. Call on them for their secret or contact your county HD agent for instructions.

Those leaves which are now falling and cluttering yards and gardens can be a help instead of a headache if handled properly, says B. T. Haws, county agent. Burning them may seem to solve the problem, he explains, but the extra time required to put them in a compost pile will return big dividends. This compost can be used next year for increasing the organic matter in the soil or mulching flowers, shrubs or vegetables.

Making a compost pile is a simple operation, points out the agent. Scrap lumber or a few feet of net wire and four posts are the only materials needed. Start with a six inch layer of leaves and for every four square feet of enclosure dissolve a cup of commercial fertilizer, such as 8-8-8 in water and sprinkle the solution over the layer of leaves. In areas where soils are acid, Haws suggests adding a cup of lime to the fertilizer. After the fertilizer is added, apply a 1-2 to 1 inch thick layer of soil then continue adding layers

of leaves and soil until the pile reaches the desired height. Leave the top layer somewhat saucer shaped so it will hold water and cover it with a shallow layer of soil. It takes 3 to 4 mos. before the mulch is completely decomposed into a rich composting material.

The Wichita Valley DHIA Association ranked first in the State this month in average pounds of milk which was 876 lbs and tied for second place in the state in average pounds of fat which was 31 lbs. There are 27 Associations in operation in the state with 21,982 cows.

The Wichita County Junior livestock show will be held at the 4-H barn on Saturday, Jan. 2nd. Mr. R. O. Dunkle, from Graham, will judge the steers and Glen Tole from Wichita Falls will judge the beef heifers.

B. T. Haws, county agent says that lice can drive cattle frantic and will cause a rough, coarse appearance and below normal gains. They recommend treatment now for controlling later build-ups of these profit-robbing parasites.

Two treatments are recommended, depending on whether you are treating beef or dairy cattle. For dairy cattle use Rotenone dust of one-half of one percent to one percent strength. If a spray is desired, mix one pound of five percent Rotenone powder (wetttable) in 100 gallons of water. For beef and non-lactating dairy cattle, Lindane, 0.03%, or a 0.3% solution of Toxaphene, Methoxychlor or Malathion, can be used. The entomologists add that only insecticides especially prepared for use on livestock should be used.

Where recommended practices for the control of cotton root rot have been carried out for a number of years, the damage has been reduced from 75 to 5% or less, according to B. T. Haws, county agent. Ask your agent for a copy of a new extension publication entitled, "Root Rot losses of Cotton can be Reduced." It lists the practices to use which are best for controlling this costly disease.

Do you have questions about tax reporting on certain items of your farm or ranch income? Are you uncertain about handling some deductions? If you need information on

such questions, get a copy of the 1960 Farmers' Tax Guide. This informative booklet is written in easy to understand language and covers many phases of farmers' tax reporting. It is available free from your local county agent. Drop by and get a copy.

Is your farm shop a safe place to work? It can be or it may be an accident or fire trap. Winter is an excellent time to remodel, re-arranged & clean-up the workshop. A little effort now may prevent an injury or even a death, says B. T. Haws, county agent.

Haws lists ways to make your farm shop safer:

1. Reserve one side of the shop for repairing heavy machines.
  2. Paint the interior with a light color and use a large window to improve lighting.
  3. Provide safe heating and adequate ventilation.
  4. Never forget the danger of carbon monoxide gas from operation of a gas engine in a confined space.
  5. Never use fuels to clean the shop floors.
- You can build safety into your farm shop, but careful attention to all known safety practices is necessary to make it a place to work.

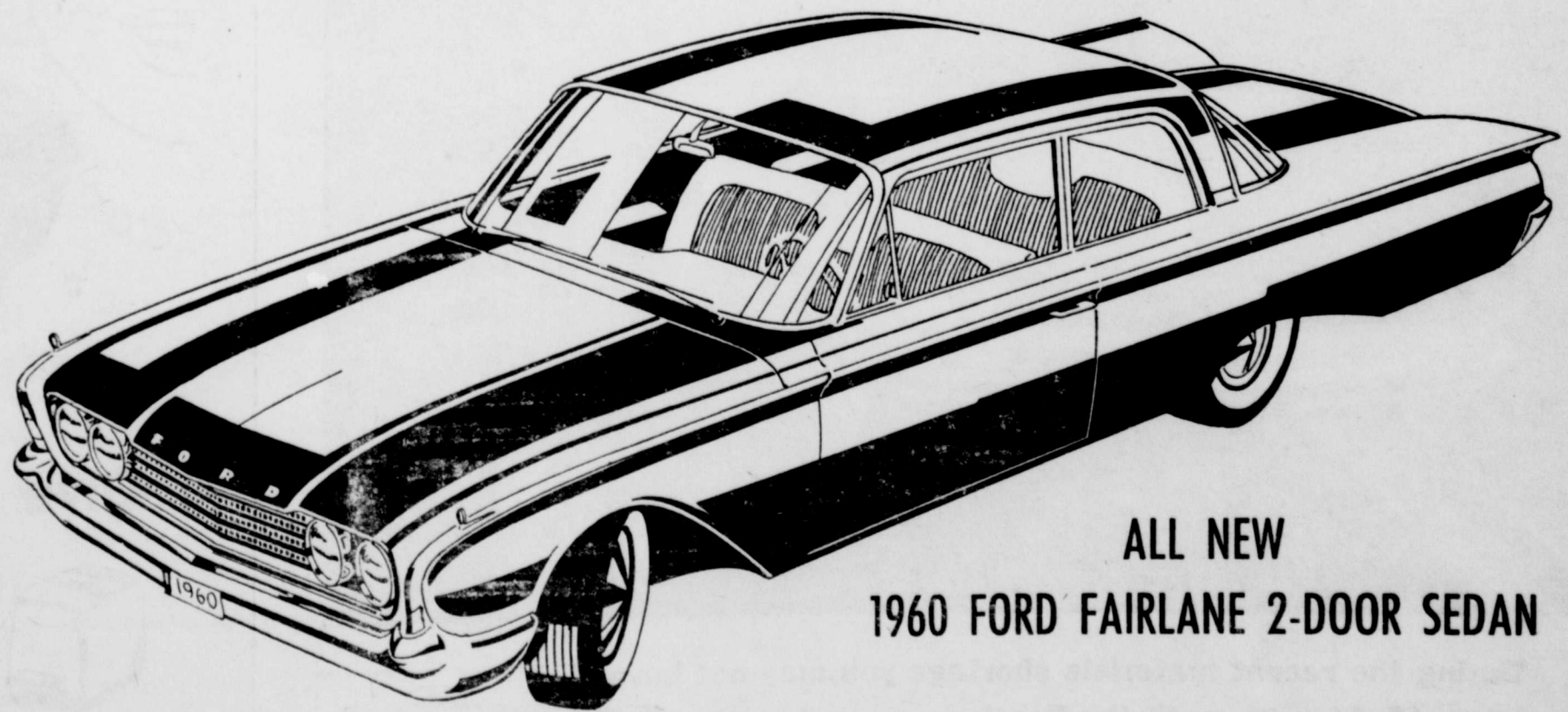
