Is This Deflation

For the first time in the history of the Elmer A. Sperry Awards, this covoted engineering honor will go overseass.

Formal presentation of the Sperry Medal for 1958 has been made to Dr. Heinz Nordhoff, president of the Volkswagenwerk, and posthumously to Dr. Ferdinand Porsche, designer of the world famous little car. Ferry Porsche accepted for his father.

The award citation reads: "To Dr. Ferdinand Porsche (in memoriam), Dr. Heinz Nordhoff and their co-workers in Volkswagenwerk for the development of the Volkswagen automobile which, in concept, engineering design and production, has made available to the world an automobile of small size and multiple uses, with unique attributes of universality; of low initial and operating costs; of simplicity of design having ease of mainten- to step in and ease the plight of union members whose jobs have ance; comfort with adequate performance and suitable for rural gone because foreign workers now make products that the unions

Presented in recognition of a distinguished engineering contribution which, through application, proved in actual service, has advanced the art of transportation whether by land, sea or air, the Sperry Awards are administered by four major US engineering societies; The American Society of Mechanical Engineers. The American Institute of Electrical Engineers, the Society of Naval Architects and Marine Engineers, and the Society of Automotive Engineers.

Previous honorees inlcude William F. Gibbs, designer of the SS United States; Donald W. Douglas, creator of the "DC" series of aircraft and Harold L. Hamilton, Richard W. Dillworth, Eugene Kettering and four cooperating engineering groups who developed the General Motors diesel-electric locomotive.

Implicit in the upcoming Awards is the reminder that the automobile, which has flowered into its present essentiality, economic significance and sartorial elegance in the US came to us from Europe. Probably the first patent on a mechanicallypowered road vehicle was issued in England to Ramsey and Wildgoose in 1619, the year before the Pilgrims landed. For more than a century European inventors struggled with steam driven vehicles and in 1884, 11 years before the famous Selden patent was issued in the US, Gottlieb Daimler patented the first internal combustion engine. Panhard and Levassor in France produced the first internal combustion automobile in 1891, to be followed a year or two later in the US by Duryea and Haynes.

Perhaps the 1958 Sperry Award will jolt us out of the complacent notion that in Detroit (as in that Kansas City song in "Oklahoma") "they've gone about as fur as they kin go." It may even remind our own engineers that Sir Issac Newton's "eolipile" auto of 1680 was a jet job.

Living Costs 6th Hike In Seven Months

A cloud no bigger than a man's hand hove into view Wednesday when the Labor Department announced that living cost rose .2 of 1 percent in October.

But behind that cloud were some others. It was the sixth time in seven months that living costs had risen. The cost of living is now 1 1-2 percent higher than a year ago.

Small clouds, to be sure. But Look again. The cost of living is now 125 1-2 percent of the 1947-49 base period. And if the period a decade earlier had been taken as the base, the cost of living would be more than 200 percent of what it was then. For the value of the dollar is now below 50 cents as compared with 20 years ago

This fact is comparatively painless, of course, to those whose income has doubled or better in the same period. But what about the millions of pensioners and those others living on fixed incomes? To them, even so small a cloud as .2 of 1% is a menace.

And what about our ability to compete in world markets when our production costs, like our living costs already on a high plateau above those of our competitors, keep building up, slowly but inexorably, with the passing of the months and years?

The group has campaigned militantly for federal and state laws requiring open meetings of governing bodies and open access to public records. In the last two years the fraternity has cooperated with other press groups to obtain passage of model "open record" laws in nine states and "open meeting" laws in seven states. It continues to fight for such laws in 22 states where they are needed.

With such an objective, the societty seems assured of continued growth and many worthwhile achievements.

Yarns may have pulled or stretched off grain in the rand-

To check: Staighten each end of fabric by pulling thread or tearing. Fold fabric lengthwise with selvages together.

Lay folded fabric on flat table. If crosswise yarns are on the diagonal, stretch in place by carefully pulling on the true bias. If after stretching the grain of fabric is on true bias. after stretching, the grain of fabric is on diagonal it should be steam pressed or dampened, dried and pressed so the grain will return to its correct posi-
