



Yardstick Of National Well Being

There's a great deal of controversy over Russia's economic and scientific achievements. But one thing is sure, the Soviet leaders are masters of propaganda. The Russian people are deluged day and night with words designed to make them believe that communism does more for the masses than any other system. And Russian visitors to this country, from Khrushchev down the line, take every conceivable opportunity to try to "sell" Russia's progress and superiority.

Well, no one can blame them for that-it's their job as dedicated communists. But when we get down to facts, the picture takes on a very different hue.

There's only one way to judge the material well-being of a people-and that is by the yardstick of how much the average man's income will buy in the market place. With one month's wages, an American can buy 6 1-2 suits and 24 pairs of shoes. With one months wages, on the other hand, a Russian can buy half a suit and a single pair of shoes. The situation is comparable in the case of most other consumer goods beyond the bare necessity level.

In Russia, the government produces practically everything and practically everything is sold in government stores. Government decides all questions, what shall be produced and sold, of what quality, at what price. There is no competition.

In America, on the other hand, there's competition every inch of the way from the source of raw materials to the finished goods offered at retail. The producer or retailer who is able to offer the widest choice and best quality at least cost gets the trade. And that's one of the main reasons why the American worker, with his month's pay, can buy so many suits and shoes if he so desires, and the Soviet worker so few.

Mass merchandising methods, pioneered in the United States, gives customers super services in foods and all manner of personal and home necessities not enjoyed ETAOI ETAO Ei4 elsewhere.

Potentialities Unlimited

J. Russell Duncan, president of the Minneapolis-Moline Company, a leading producer of mechanized farm equipment, has made some interesting proposals concerning the vexing farm surplus problem.

For one thing, he says, there should be an extensive research program designed to develop new uses for farm products in clothing, plastics, chemicals and so on, and to put existing farm acreage to different crop uses. This field, he points out, is virtually untouched, and the potentialities are almost unlimited.

For another thing, he goes on, we should be far more active, far more aggressive, in selling farm products to other nations. The American farmer is the lowest cost agricultural producer in the world, despite high American wages. So Mr. Duncan urges that the sale of farm products be promoted in times of surplus with the "Same ingenuity of pricing and merchandising" as shown by the automobile industry when it is faced with overproduc-

There will be differences of opinion as to just how to go about such a program as this. But, administrative details to one side, something like it will have to be undertaken, and soon, if order is to take the place of an incredibly expensive chaos in American farm production and surpluses.





Perhaps this bill, more than m e a s u r e, would reduce distressed selling, cut down bankruptcies among inde-pendent retail-ers and wholesalers.

commentary C. W. Harder on the times, but the fact re-It is a sad mains that in the high level of bankruptcies of the past few years, many business firms have gone to the wall which were in a fairly healthy condition except for one thing.

That was lack of liquid cash.

There is an easily understandable explanation for this.

For most businesses, there is no practical way of keeping books on a cash basis. Instead, an accrual system is used. The business is not taxed on the amount of cash it has at the end of the tax year, but rather on the increased assets in the business at the end of the year, of which inventory is a large part.

As an example, it is well to consider a car dealer, although the same principle applies to an appliance dealer, a dry goods merchant, or others.

So, to carry out this illustration, at the start of his tax year an auto dealer has in stock \$10,000 worth of cars. In his area, due to strikes, unemployment, or © National Federation of Independent Business

other factors, his business is de-pressed, so that sales are low.

Yet, due to new models coming in during the year, or to meet terms of a franchise agree ment, or even due to having to take back substantial repossessions, or for other reasons, at the end of the year his inventory has

jumped from \$10,000 to \$30,000. Under the tax formula, his assets have increased \$20,000, thus this is a taxable amount.

But in the meantime, all of his cash has gone into this inventory. Now this may be all ound merchandise, and given the chance to work out this inventory at the proper times, he can recover.

However, tax bills demand immediate cash. So he is forced to cut prices to the bone to raise cash, but sometimes this strate-

gem will not raise sufficient cash.

* * *

Thus, this business becomes bankrupt for the lack of cash, although as far as accountants are concerned, including tax accountants, the assets of the business showed a healthy gain during the year.

It is also possible in a year of big government spending for foreign give aways for inflation during the year to boost the inventory values for tax purposes.

The bill introduced by Sen. Sparkman proposes to permit businessmen who end up a year with increased inventories to deduct up to \$10,000 from taxable income to offset what is often tantamount to disaster.

In the long run, by prevent-ing, or at least mitigating, ruinous price cutting to raise cash, or bankruptcy, the government would gain in tax collections, because once a business goes un der, it is no longer a taxpayer.
