Swimming Club Fund Raising Campaign Begins

Many projects are being planned to complete work on the new Burk Burnett Swim Club. This project is a concern for all of us not just the clubs and administrators, but every parent and citizen of our community. Of our citizens who are sponsoring leadership of this project are Mr. Floyd Marten, Mrs. Ralph White and Mrs. H. C. Preston, Jr.

Mr. Floyd Marten is President of the Burk Burnett Swim Club, and for his outstanding work on the swim club and other civic projects, he was named Man of the Year for 1959. He is President of the Rotary Club, chairman of the 1960 Boomtown Rodeo and chairman of the Boy Scout Drive. Under his leadership of the Burk Burnett Swim Club, the first half of the contract for construction of the pool is being completed this week.

Mrs. Ralph White, who is chairman of the Board of Directors of the Burk Burnett Swim Club, was named Woman of the Year for 1959. Mrs. White is also chairman of the Community Achievement Contest and has been appointed Civic Beautification Committee chairman for the Chamber of Commerce. She is chairman of the Council of Federated Clubs, and Project chairman for the Current Literature Club. Under her outstanding leadership, committees have been set up to carry out plans for park beautification, membership drives, a game night, a style show and other fund raising drives, to complete construction of the pool so that it may be open by the summer months.

Mrs. H. C. Preston, Jr., is a Director of the Burk Swim Club and Beautification chairman of the swimming pool area. Under her able guidance the beautification of the area is under way. Mrs. Preston is also instrumental in compiling information for the Community Achievement Contest which the federated study clubs and all other civic organizations are entering. It is sponsored by the General Federation of Women's Clubs in cooperation with the Sears and Roebuck Foundation. The purpose of the contest is to fulfill a community need by organizations and civic minded citizens working together. The theme of the contest is the Burk Burnett Swim Club and Park Area. Mrs. Preston is past President of the Forum Study Club.

Both clubs, composed of nine girls each, are clad in white bouses and dainty blue & white checked pinafores while performing their various duties.

Each member called four people to remind them to pay their poll tax. They have taken games toys and books to pediatric wards at Sheppard AFB hospital and Wichita General Hospital in Wichita Falls.

They staged a rummage sale, proceeds from which were used to purchase their uniforms. The clubs served tables and acted as page girls at the city federation banquet and for the county schoolmaster banquet.

Smoked turkeys were taken to two shut-ins for Thanksgiving, while gifts were distributed among other shut-ins. The girls took toys to the Fowler Children's Home in Wichita Falls, where they spent an hour reading and entertaining children during the Christmas season.

The girls also delivered Christmas candles and gifts to shut-ins and sang Christmas carols to others. The Blue Angels were honored with a tea at Wichita General Hospital at Christmas when each was presented future nurses' pins.

The girls are making small ceramic tray Easter favors for patients in hospital pediatric wards and "May baskets" for shut-ins in Burk Burnett.

The 'angels', as they could appropriately be called, also have helped in various Burk Burnett fund drives, including the March of Dimes campaign now under way. During cancer drives, the girls collected sheets to be made into bandages. They distributed literature, pins and posters at school for heart and tuberculosis drives.

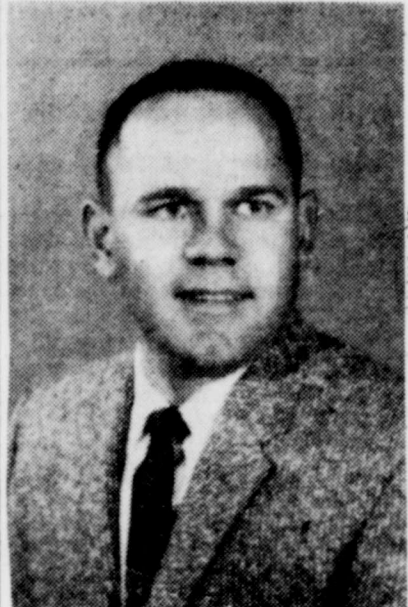

Deeds, Not Words, Count

According to Russian propagandists, the Soviet Union is about to outstrip capitalism in just about every important field of enterprise, and it's only a matter of time before the capitalist countries will have to give up the ghost and admit that communism is the answer to the people's wants and needs.

The head of one of the country's pharmaceutical companies doesn't see things that way. Among the greatest steps forward of our age has been the development of remarkable drugs that cure or alleviate disease. But the Soviets can claim none of the credit. In this spokesman's words: "In 42 years since their October Revolution, Soviet science and technology have been unable to come up with a single major drug discovery. Every one of them has come from the West."

Communism is still pirating the results of our research instead of developing its own. The Soviet pharmaceutical industry today is a show piece for the inefficiency of communism.

In contrast, I submit a spectacular demonstration of efficiency in a democratic environment. This efficiency was not the result of force, fear or totalitarian control—it was due entirely to the willing collaboration of free men and free institutions working together to discover, to produce and to use new weapons of life for the common good of mankind.

Leadership in the production and distribution of things which save and prolong life—a leadership which we and other western nations enjoy—is certainly an index of the quality and worth of any civilization. And, if past history tells us anything, it tells that the willing collaboration of free men and free institutions can out perform dictatorships in any field of endeavor.

Let's Look Ahead

The prospect of a 4.2 billion surplus in the Federal budget has cheered everyone up. To the citizen it would mean that he wouldn't be faced with another inflation-producing Federal deficit to whittle the value of his dollars. But to some open-handed Congressmen it is an invitation to abandon last session's trend toward Government economy.

Already the ardent spenders are coming forth with plans that would assure the surplus never could materialize. These Congressmen seem to think they are never going enough for "the people" unless they put the people's government in the hole.

Their concern for the voters, who double as down-trodden taxpayers, could find a better outlet in the direction of income tax rate reform. Virtually everyone acknowledges that present taxes are too high to permit maximum economic growth. Everyone knows his own taxes are too high.

The bipartisan Herlong-Baker bills now pending in the Ways and Means Committee would bring down everyone's taxes, and do it in such a way that economic growth would be stimulated sharply. More growth will bring more tax revenue from lower tax rates.

This would mean more Federal surpluses to cheer us up in the future years.

The politicians would be doing themselves a favor, too. They could never get all the voters to agree on how to spend the surplus, but one thing everyone will agree on is that taxes are too high.

We Tocqueville Was Right

Writing editorially in The Saturday Evening Post, Oscar Debe, professor of political science at Kent State University, said in part:

"What the Government subsidizes it can also control. As its power increases, our freedom diminishes. Many vigilant persons recognize this peril to their liberties, but in the face of the tremendous voting power of the pressure groups and other recipients of 'free' Federal money, the odds are increasingly against them.

"De Tocqueville was right. It is possible for the people to vote themselves into bondage. We shall be fortunate if this doesn't happen to us!"

From the Office of Lyndon Johnson

Senate Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson said Sunday that water resources development shows a positive and increasing array of benefits vastly exceeding the dollar costs.

The Texas Senator, in a weekly radio broadcast beamed at his home-state constituents, told his listeners:

Such development is a solid investment in America's future. It is the type of investment that pays continuing dividends, by the day, by the month and by the year, to our nation and everyone in it.

Johnson noted that the explosive increase in population, and the ever increasing per capita consumption of water, presents a critical problem and an inspiring challenge to our economists and our engineers.

He quoted figures showing that while the nation's population doubled between 1800 and 1950, the total consumption of water quadrupled. Demand for water, he said, continues to rise.

Studies, based on 1950 levels of water consumption indicate that rate will be doubled by 1975. The situation, he said, calls for far sighted planning and action. There is much to be done. The time is short. The need is great. As responsible Americans we need to get on with the job.

News From The County Agent

Texas ranked third among all states in acreage and production of fresh market vegetables in 1959, according to B. T. Haws, county agent. Onions was the top income producer for Texas with 40,800 acres harvested and worth \$14,192,000. Texas had 14.3% of nation's commercial vegetable acreage and 8.2% of the production.

Electric data processing machines are now being used to process DHIA records. B. T. Haws county agent says use of the machines will relieve DHIA supervisors of much tedious and time consuming book work and at the same time provide dairymen greater accuracy and more complete and up-to-date production and feed information. It represents a major change in DHIA record keeping, he said.

Diseases took an estimated \$147 million bite out of the 1959 Texas cotton crop, according to 15 cotton specialist located thruout even though 1959 growing conditions were generally good and near record yields were harvested in many areas. Major diseases were bacterial blight, root rot, verticillium wilt and seedling disease.

Research workers of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Horticultural Dept. have developed a new erect blackberry for East Texas-Brazos. It matures early, produces good yields and large fruits, maintains fruit size longer through the season and is softer than Lawton. A limited supply of plants and root cuttings should now be available from commercial sources. None is available from the Station.

B. T. Haws, county agent, calls attention to the fact that almost one-fourth of all cows in herds in the DHIA testing program in Texas were removed from herds last year. This points up the tremendous opportunity open to Texas Dairymen to do effective culling and herd rebuilding thru a good calf raising program, Haws said.
