The prospect of a 4.2 billion surplus in the Federal indget has cheered everyone up. To the citizen it would mean that he wouldn't be faced with another inflationproducing Federal deficit to whittle the value of his dollars. But to some open-handed Congressmen it is an invitation to abandon last session's trend toward Government economy.

Already the ardent spenders are coming forth with plans that would assure the surplus never could materinlize. These Congressmen seem to think they are never soing enough for "the peepul" unless they put the people's government in the hole.

Their concern for the voters, who double as downbrodden taxpayers, could find a better outlet in the direction of income tax rate reform. Virtually everyone acknowledges that present taxes are too high to permit meximum economic growth. Everyone knows his own (2n)TH faxes are too high.

The bipartisan Herlong-Baker bills now pending in the Ways and Means Committee would bring down everyone's taxes, and do it in such a way that economic growth would be stimulated sharply. More growth will bring more tax revenue from lower tax rates.

This would mean more Federal surpluses to cheer us up in the future years.

The politicians would be doing themselves a favor, too. They could never get all the voters to agree on how to spend the surplus, but one thing everyone will agree on is that taxes are too high.

We Tocqueville Was Right

Writing editorially in The Saturday Evening Post, Oscar Ibele, professor of political science at Kent State University, said in part:

What the Government subsidizes it can also control. As its power increases, our freedom diminishes, Many vigilant persons recognize this peril to their liberties, but in the face of the tremendous voting power of the pressure groups and other recipients of 'free' Federal money, the odds are increasingly against them.

"De Tocqueville was right. It is possible for the people to vote themselves into bondage. We shall be fortunate if this doesn't happen to us'."





It seems as if a segment of Texas history is repeating itself as the state and numerous gas companies go to court to denew gas tax. Some 80 gas companies have filed suit asking the set for trial beginning Feb. 15th.

They will be tried in the same tax law was passed by the Legislature in 1951 and eventually declared unconstitutional by the S. Supreme Court.

Gas companies are attacking the new severance beneficiary tax on much the same grounds they did the gathering tax. They contend it is in violation of interstate commerce laws.

Passage of the severance tax came after one of the hardest battles of the stormy six months session. It places a 1.5 per cent levy on the pipelines on the grounds that they benefit from the taking out of the gas.
