Primaries are now held the first weeks of May and June, instead of the last weeks of July and August as before. Another change is that a per-

son who wishes to participate in a Democratic precinct convention must already have voted in the Democratic primary held the same day in order to have a poll tax stamped "Democratic.

City precincts won't be affected. There customarily, the precinct conventions have been held after the polls close at 7 p. m. In rural areas conventions usually have been held in the afternoon. This enabled people to come in, attend the convention, vote, buy their groceries, all in one trip, and get home in time to do the milking. Now there is the necessity of
