## Dial All Seven Digits On Local Calls After Monday, February 22

Beginning Tuesday, Feb. 23, all seven digits of the telephone number will have to be dialed on local calls, according to C. A. Deuschle, local manager. This dialing of all 7 digits of telephone numbers is necessary after Feb. 22nd because of additions and modifications to dial switching equipment in order to bring direct dialing of Wichita Falls calls in mid April. When this work is completed in Burk Burnett on Feb. 22nd, it will be necessary for you to dial the complete telephone number including the JO.

As you know, all Burk Burnett telephone numbers will be changed to the seven-numeral number plan to make them uniform with the system now in operation in Wichita Falls. This change will be made in mid-April when all work has been completed, and it will be necessary for you to dial the complete number in either case. Please remember to dial all seven digits of your telephone number after Feb. 22nd. This will help us give you even better telephone service, Deuschle added.

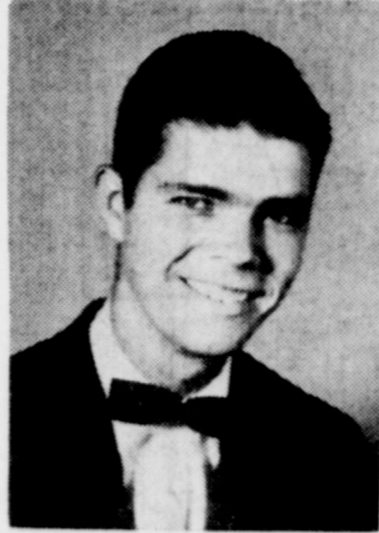

## SHEPPARD - BURK ELEMENTARY SCHOOL TO BE ENLARGED BEGINNING APRIL FIRST

The Burk Burnett School District has received notification from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare that approval has been granted for addition of twelve additional classrooms at Sheppard-Burkburnett Elementary School. The final plans and specifications are being reviewed and the time will soon be set for advertisement for bids. It is anticipated that actual construction will be underway by April 1, 1960.

The addition is badly needed at the present time due to the heavy enrollment from the Capehart Housing project. There are 515 enrolled in Elementary School within the Burk Burnett School District. There are over 100 attending private schools in Wichita Falls and another 106 are being transported to High School in Burk Burnett. In addition to the above students, there are 112 students living in servicemen Trailer Parks within Sheppard Air Force Base that must be furnished schooling for 1960-61.

The Burk Burnett School District has received \$868,219.00 in cash & commitment for school room construction from the Federal Government since September, 1958. This money has been appropriated for 12 classrooms and cafeteria at Sheppard-Burkburnett Elementary School, 11 classrooms and office on new school site by rodeo grounds, 3 room elementary school rooms office and bookroom in northwest part of town, and the new addition for Sheppard-Burkburnett School.

In addition to the above building program the present School Board has constructed a new Vocational Agriculture shop, remodeled the Home Economics department in high school, 2 science rooms and 2 classrooms in old shop area in high school. The added classroom space isn't keeping pace with the increase in school enrollment. The Burk Burnett Schools have an enrollment of 1840 in Elementary School and 502 in High School.

J. S. Mills, in charge of the program, introduced Woodrow Wilson, Executive Director of the Wichita County Mental Health Association. Mr. Wilson stated that 5 1/2 billion dollars are spent annually on the mentally ill, 700,000 or one-half of the total hospital beds in the United States are occupied by the mentally ill. The big need now is for more psychiatrists to speed the return of mentally ill to usefulness in society. An additional 10,000 psychiatrists are needed right now. Only 500 are graduating from colleges each year. In the opinion of Mr. Wilson it is the duty of every one to encourage youngsters going off to college to study for psychiatric work. The speaker said we are 20 years behind times in providing hospital facilities and doctors for mentally ill patients.

Next week V. N. Mills has arranged for a good program. He will present Mrs. P. A. Carpenter and her group of Blue Angels, Junior Nurses Corps.

President C. J. Lippard offered thanks and appreciation from all club members to non-Lions who helped with the pancake and sausage sale last Saturday. They were H. D. Smith, J. C. Hinkle, Clark Gresham, Tom Pearce and Chester Howard, Fire Marshal. The services of these fellows were invaluable making the day the success it was. To date more than \$750.00 has been turned in. Profit, approximately \$500.00, will be used for Lions Club projects which includes sight conservation and youth programs.

## Inspections for Vehicles Falling Behind for Area

Motor vehicle safety inspections in Wichita County have slowed to a snail's pace as only 7788 vehicles were inspected during January.

The inspections brought the total checked since September 1, when this year's sticker went on sale to 16150 or 32% of the 47041 registered vehicles in this county.

Capt. Alan Johnson, Supervisor of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service in this Region of the Texas Dept. of Public Safety has urged vehicle owners to have their vehicles inspected as early as possible to avoid delays in the last minute rush.

In the past years crowds during the last few weeks before the deadline have lined up for several blocks waiting to get into the inspection stations.

The safety inspection sticker which must be on all registered vehicles operated over public streets, roads and highways by midnight, April 15th, may be obtained at any of the 51 approved vehicle inspection stations in this county.

The main subject of interest at this time is the completion of the swimming pool. Door prizes to be given at the Game Night will warrant purchase of a ticket whether you attend or not. The door and game prizes are valued at \$140.00.

## Burk Man Hurt In Explosion

Dwight Roark, Burk Burnett service station operator, was in serious condition at Wichita General hospital Tuesday night following an explosion at his station.

Roark received severe injuries to his hands and chest when a firing head, used in oil well operations exploded apparently as he worked on it.

Source of the explosion was a blasting cap in the firing head, which sent bits of metal into Roark's hands and body.

The explosion occurred about 7 p. m. in his Gulf service station in Burk Burnett. After the explosion, Roark walked to a nearby restaurant, Dan's Steak House, and employes there called an ambulance.

He was rushed to Wichita General hospital in an Owens and Brumley Ambulance.

About 34 years old, Roark has operated the service station in Burk Burnett for about one month. Owner of the station, Leslie Tuel, who leased it to Roark, said Roark was alone in the station when the accident occurred.

Tuel, who went to the station when he heard the explosion, said he found the firing head and exploded cap near a workbench in the building.

## Two Burk Women Injured In Accident

Mrs. Mae Barker and Mrs. Fannie Wilkerson Freeman, both of Burk Burnett, were injured in a two car accident at 7 p. m. Saturday at Eleventh and Scott in Wichita Falls.

Mrs. Barker suffered a broken knee and cuts on the face. Mrs. Freeman received facial cuts, two broken ribs and a painful injury to her right foot in the accident. Both were treated and admitted at Bethania hospital.

Driver of the second car, Freddie Castillo, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Castillo, 110 Lee, suffered painful injuries to his arm and right leg and had bruises and cuts on the right side of the face. He was treated and released at Wichita General Hospital.

## Freedom Is Congress' Job

Few members of Congress are present to hear the prayers with which the daily sessions of both the House of Representatives and the Senate are opened, observes Editor Glenn Martz in "The Lowdown on Farm Affairs from Washington," nor do these supplications often appear in print.

But Mr. Martz thinks every member should have heard and paid heed to a recent invocation of the Senator Chaplain, the Rev. Frederick Harris, who said, in part: "Give us to know with a solemnity that awes our spirits that if a nation values anything more than freedom under God, it will lose its freedom; and that if it is comfort or luxuries, security or money that it values more in the long run it will also lose them. So in this day of contending values, gird us at any sacrifice to incarnate and exemplify the faith we proclaim and to be ever loyal to the deathless principles for which even the stars in their courses fight."

Editor Martz is urging every Congressman to read these words twice—in case they don't sink in the first time. And he notes that: "Every Federal subsidy, every political handout, carries with it certain controls and mandates which steal away just a little more of the individual recipient's freedom," and that history has repeatedly proved the correctness of the Chaplain's warning that a preference for "security or money" over "freedom" prefaces a loss of both.

Spending for the defense of freedom should have every consideration. Spending for the advantage of special interests or special areas should have none.

## Triumph Of A Busy Man

If you feel you are overburdened, that the odds against you are too much, you may find hope and encouragement in "The Story of George Romney", a biography of the American Motors man by Tom Mahoney just published by Harper's. It is an inspiring narrative containing material for a year's sermons.

Barely three years ago the company Romney headed was losing money at the rate of two million dollars a month and he was building a house and a church. He also took on a project to rehabilitate the Detroit schools which were in a serious plight.

He worried and prayed. He aroused meetings with the Sigmund Romberg song, "Stouthearted Men." He won the confidence of his employees and executives and made salesmen of all of them. He economized even to the extent of emptying waste baskets only every other day. He was not discouraged by rivals who termed him "an insufferable optimist." He fended off Wall street "raiders."

What happened? The house and church were built. The schools were rescued from their difficulties. And the company? Last year American Motors made 40,000 cars and \$60,000,000.

Romney's career, as the book points out, is proof that it is still possible for the old-fashioned virtues to succeed spectacularly in American business, that a corporation head need not be a character from "Executive Suite", and that Leo Durocher's baseball dictum that "nice guys finish last" is not to be accepted as a universal truth.

He asked no help from the government. It was a triumph of private enterprise. Our country and its institutions will survive, life will go forward, we will not need to worry about rockets to the moon as long as we have singing and praying men with the energy and enterprise of George Romney.

### SPORTS BITS

by NORMAN WILSON

Many coaches have pet theories about how to get in shape & how to stay in shape. Some of them have their boys on year round training schedules. Such is the case of Coach Jack Robertson, head football coach in Burk Burnett.

Coach Robertson has instituted a weight lifting program for his charges that has proven its worth, since the injury problem has been less acute induction. The statement was made recently that the past season saw less injuries than at any other time in the history of the school.

One might wonder how lifting weights would help in playing football? The answer is really quite simple. It strengthens muscles and ligaments, makes the boys harder to hurt and makes up some of the difference when the other team is larger than they are. In almost every game last season, the Bulldogs were outweighed from 10 to 20 pounds per man. Yet, they played surprisingly well against such odds. It is due in large part to the weight lifting program.

It is not the intention of coach Robertson to make muscle men out of these boys. Quite the contrary. A man that's too muscled up has a tendency to have muscle spasms, similar to a charlie horse or cramp. Texas A and M had a half back in the early 50's that had that problem with the calves of his legs. He was removed from a game several times for the purpose of relieving muscle spasms.

One of the big problems of coaches is knee injuries. As a rule, this is caused from the straining or pulling of the ligaments that hold the knee in joint. When these ligaments are torn, then the old bugaboo of the "football knee" overshadows the player for the rest of his days. The knee can be operated on, but it isn't the same knee you were born with. Something has been taken out. Some authorities on the subject maintain that the cartilage isn't really necessary, but again, the knee or whichever joint happens to be injured is still not the same. Weight lifting helps prevent such crippling injuries, since the ligaments and muscles surrounding the joints are much stronger for having had the exercise and extra development.

Weights are also used for strengthening injured knees. The weight lifting exercises vary quite a bit, and it should be pointed out that there is a right way and a wrong way to lift weights. There are exercises for the development of the legs called "squats." To do a "squat," a certain amount of weight is placed on the bar and it is put across the shoulders, and you simply squat down and rise again. Try it. Additional weight is added as the legs become accustomed to the strain. Then there is the press for the shoulders. Bench press for pectoral muscles, which are the ones in the area of the chest, front and back curls for forearm and bicep development. The curls also aid in developing the stomach muscles. Set ups are still the preferred way of developing the stomach how ever.

So there you have it. Coach Robertson has proven that lifting weights is something more than a theory. It does hold injuries to a minimum and gives the boys a better chance against a bigger team.

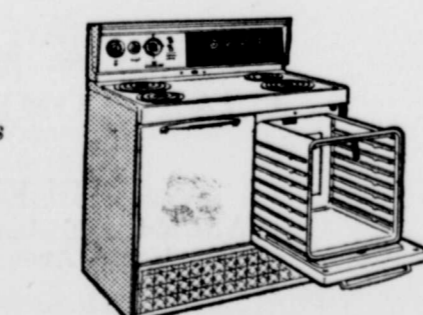

**STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights**

Democratic County Executive Committees will decide on March 14th whether to change the old custom of holding rural area precinct conventions in the daytime.

New election law passed last year has already doomed a number of Texas political traditions, like announcing when the dogwood comes out and serving watermelon at election rallies.

Primaries are now held the first weeks of May and June, instead of the last weeks of July and August as before.

Another change is that a person who wishes to participate in a Democratic precinct convention must already have voted in the Democratic primary held the same day in order to have a poll tax stamped "Democratic."

City precincts won't be affected. There, customarily, the precinct conventions have been held before the polls close at 7 p. m.

In rural areas conventions usually have been held in the afternoon. This enabled people to come in, attend the convention, vote, buy their groceries, all in one trip, and get home in time to do the milking.

Now there is the necessity of giving everyone time to vote before the convention can be held.

State Democratic Chairman J. E. Connally has suggested county committees give thought to holding rural precinct conventions later, possibly not until after the polls close at 7 p. m.

**STICK WITH GUNS**— State Board of Insurance has announced five minor changes in the safe driving insurance plan, but in broad effort, the plan remains the same. Board stuck to its guns despite a barrage of criticism.

Main change is that an insurance company cannot deny liability on a policy if false or inaccurate information is given by the policy holder. For instance, a person taking out a policy might, intentionally or unintentionally, fail to tell the insurance company how many accidents or traffic violations were on his driving record.

However, the company would be entitled to collect the higher premiums or damages from fraud if the policy holder had not admitted to his true driving record.

Premiums go up in proportion to the number of accidents and violations on a driver's record.

**NO LOSS FOR FLU**— Not the least of the worries in schools hard hit by influenza was that the district would lose a hunk of state aid money which is based on average daily attendance.

State Board of Education, however, has worked out an emergency "epidemic formula" to help ease the problem.

In influenza schools, the average attendance for the epidemic period will be adjusted to reflect the percentage difference between actual attendance and attendance which would have been expected had there been no epidemic.
