





these functions, the result is always the same: Oppressive taxation, a degraded currency, diminished incentive, and steady whittling away of the free of all citizens.

Once government breaks its historic bonds and goes beyond

perty; to refrain from burdensome and inequitable taxation; to remove the punitive laws and deterrents that previous governments have imposed. Its function is to permit and preserve a sound currency. When it fails to do this, it must bear sole re-

sponsibility for the failure.

Taxes and the "Little Fellow"

There's one fact about taxation which can't be repeated too often: The great bulk of the tax burden is not

borne by the rich, but by people of very modest means. Economic Intelligence tells what happened in a recent year. Total federal individual income taxes came to just under \$30 billion. Of this, more than 85 percent was accounted for by the lowest tax bracket of 20% Less than 15 percent came from the higher brackets which reach a 91 percent top.

Putting it another way, if the per capita exemption in that year had been \$800 instead of \$600, government revenue would have been reduced by a whopping \$5 billion or about 17 percent. It's the "little fellow," in the aggregate, who is important to the treasury.

The point is, of course, that there aren't enough rich and not enough big incomes, to make more than a small dent in the tax burden. It must primarily be borne by families of modest means, simply because there are so many of them. And it is these families which have the most to gain from tax reforms.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

WALDOBORO, ME., PRESS: "Russia owes us ten billion eight hundred million or better than 1-18 of our national debt. "The joker? Our generous taxpayers' representatives have offered to cross off the ten billion and settle for eight hundred milllion. With tax money, by the way, it figures out better than \$60 for every man, woman and child in the country."

Individual income taxes will provide 52c of each dollar collected; corporation income taxes will provide 28c of the tax dollar; excise taxes will provide another 11c and other revenues will provide 9c. 

U. S. Tops World In Production of **Electric Power**

The continued argument about whether the United States or Russia is predominant in the production of guided missiles overlooks another important measure of a nation's strength, the production of electric pow-cr and its efficient distribution, a field in which the U.S. holds a wide margin of superiority, J. B. Thomas, president of Texas Electric Service Company, said today.

At the end of 1959, the United States had more than three times the generating capacity for electric power than the Soviet Union. Thomas reported. This is one of the greatest advantages this country possesses, he added

A report on Russian electric power development just released by the Edison Electric Institute sets out the finding of two delegations of American electrical industry leaders who toured the Soviet Union at the request of the United States State Dept and makes clear that this country will continue to increase its lead over Russia in electric power supply during the next five years, Thomas stated.

The report estimates that the total capacity of the United States in 1965 will be 245 million kilowatts, as compared with the Russian goal of 110-112 million kilowatts. This is a difference of 134 million kilowatts.

Information in the report, Thomas pointed out, tends to correct any impressions that Soviet Russia is in any way likely to out-strip the United States in the production of electric power

In the field of power transmission. Thomas reported that in 1957 Russia had only about 46,500 miles of power transmission lines of 35,000 volts and above. That year the United States, with about one-third Russia's area, had more than five times as many miles of comparable transmission lines, a total of 240.000 miles.

Thomas also said the relative standard of living of the peoples in Russia and in the United States might well be measured by the average residential use of electricity which is about 400 kilowatt hours a year in Russia and 3.500 kilowatt hours a year in the United States.
