## This Inflation Is Something New

It was hardly noticed, but even in the days of the earliest Americans prices were rising. Prices have been going up nearly two and a half centuries, according to a study by President Eisenhower's Cabinet Committee on Price Stability for Economic Growth. This historic rise averages out to only one-half of one percent a year, for the last 240 years.

Over so long a period, such a rate of price increase doesn't seem so bad. But there's a catch. While it took 200 year for prices to double—up to a quarter century ago—they have doubled again in the past 25 years.

In other words, inflation—if you could call it that—crept at a snail's pace for two centuries—then flashed ahead at a speed eight times faster, like going from ten to 80 miles an hour.

What's more, said the report, the price declines of the past—usually following wars—are not taking place any more and "rises in the price level are now permanent and cumulative in a way they were not in the preceding two centuries. It is clear that public policies for combating inflation must be more energetic in the future than they have been in the past quarter of century."

## The Essential Difference

In the light of Soviet boasts concerning Russia's productive achievements, and her propaganda campaign designed to persuade the world that before long she will outdo the U. S. and make a monkey out of the capitalist system, some information concerning Russian agriculture is interesting.

Publisher Tom Anderson of Farm and Ranch magazine writes: "The American farmer produces enough on drastically limit acreage, for himself and 20 others. The Russian farmer, under the prodding of his government overseers, produces only enough for himself and four others. The American farmer deserves great credit for his remarkable production records. But much credit also belongs to industry—to free, competitive, profit-making companies vying with each other to produce the most efficient machinery, equipment and chemicals. American manufacturers of farm supplies work in close cooperation with farmers to get new ideas, to learn the farmers' real needs, to learn what will sell at a profit. In Russia the bureaucrats make those decisions. Neither farmers nor mechanics have much influence on the kind of farm supplies and equipment produced."

What Mr. Anderson described here, using farm equipment and other farm tools as an outstanding example, is the essential difference between the Russian system as against the American system. The first is based on brute force, the second on incentive, inducement, free and voluntary action. And, in all recorded history, the second has always triumphed over the first.

## Proof Is In The Pudding

"We were glad to see someone at the Newspaper Advertising Executive Association meeting mention what has seemed to us the most obvious and important selling argument for national advertising.

"Monroe Green, advertising director of the New York Times, told the admen: 'The storekeepers of our country, the people who market the manufacturer's product, know that the one way, the infallible way to sell goods is through newspaper advertising. They have but one interest in advertising—to sell the product. And they know from experience how to get the job done best.'"

"The old cliché is still true—the proof is in the pudding. Retailers—the men on the front line of selling—know that newspaper advertising works, otherwise they wouldn't use so much of it year in & year out to the virtual exclusion of all other media."

## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

MORAVIA, N. Y. REPUBLICAN-REGISTER: "The national debt is presently \$290 billion. The interest on this vast sum alone is \$9.5 billion a year. The present proposed budget calls for spending of 79 billions. If the budget which Eisenhower presented to Congress this week can be maintained, and if the surplus is used to pay off part of the national debt, and if we can continue to show a proportionate surplus each budget year, with not more deficit years, the national debt will be reduced to zero in about a half a century."

## News From The County Agent

The annual Cage clinic, sponsored by the Poultry Science Dept., Texas A-M College System will be held on March 30. The meeting is scheduled for the Ballroom of A-M's Memorial Student Center. B. T. Haws, county agent, says the program will begin at 8:50 and will consist of crisp, current and concentrated discussions by nationally known leaders in their fields. Everyone interested in egg production is invited to attend.

Shortages of adequate and quality roughages and protein supplement have caused excessive weight losses in beef cattle. These shortages coupled with the rough weather of this winter have left cows in such condition that calving and after calving troubles can be expected, says B. T. Haws, county agent.

He suggests that cows be given a daily minimum of 2 lbs of 41% protein supplement and additional good quality roughage may be needed in some instances. Cows should also be checked for Vitamin A deficiency.

Sooty mold disease occurs in all areas of Texas, but is likely to be more common in areas of high rainfall.

The black coating on the surface of leaves or fruit of infected plants is easily rubbed off by the hand. The coating is made up of web of black, fungus microscopic threads. The black mold is the result of certain fungi living on secretions (honey-dew) from insects. Scale, aphids and immature stages of white fly are mainly involved. Injury to the plant is indirect in that the black mold prevents sunlight from reaching the leaves. Too, the aesthetic value of the plant is affected. Usually more of the black mold is on the top part of the leaf than the underside.

The disease is apt to occur on arbor-vita, azalea, cape jasmine, cedar, cottonwood, gardenia, lemon, ligustrum, magnolia, oak, orange, peach, pear, pecan, pine and red bud.

Prevent the mold by controlling the insects which leave secretions on the leaves. Dusting with sulfur sometimes helps to remove some of the mold. Local county extension agents can supply additional information.

Several Wichita County Farmers have top dressed their small grain with 20 to 30 lbs of Nitrogen last week. Small grain in the county is looking good but needs lots of sunshine.

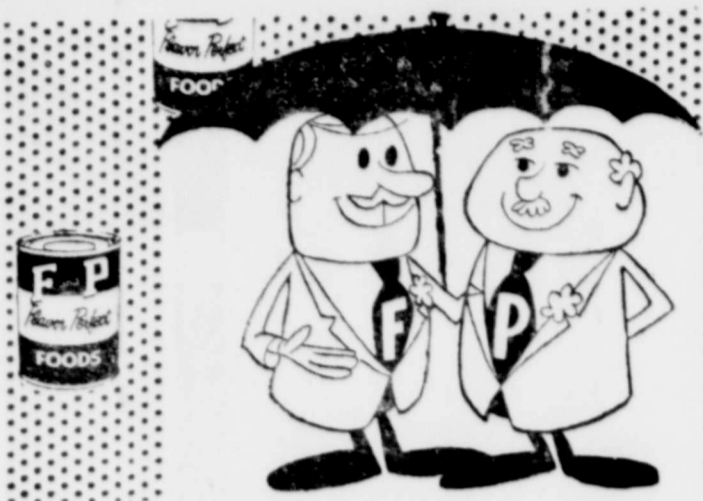

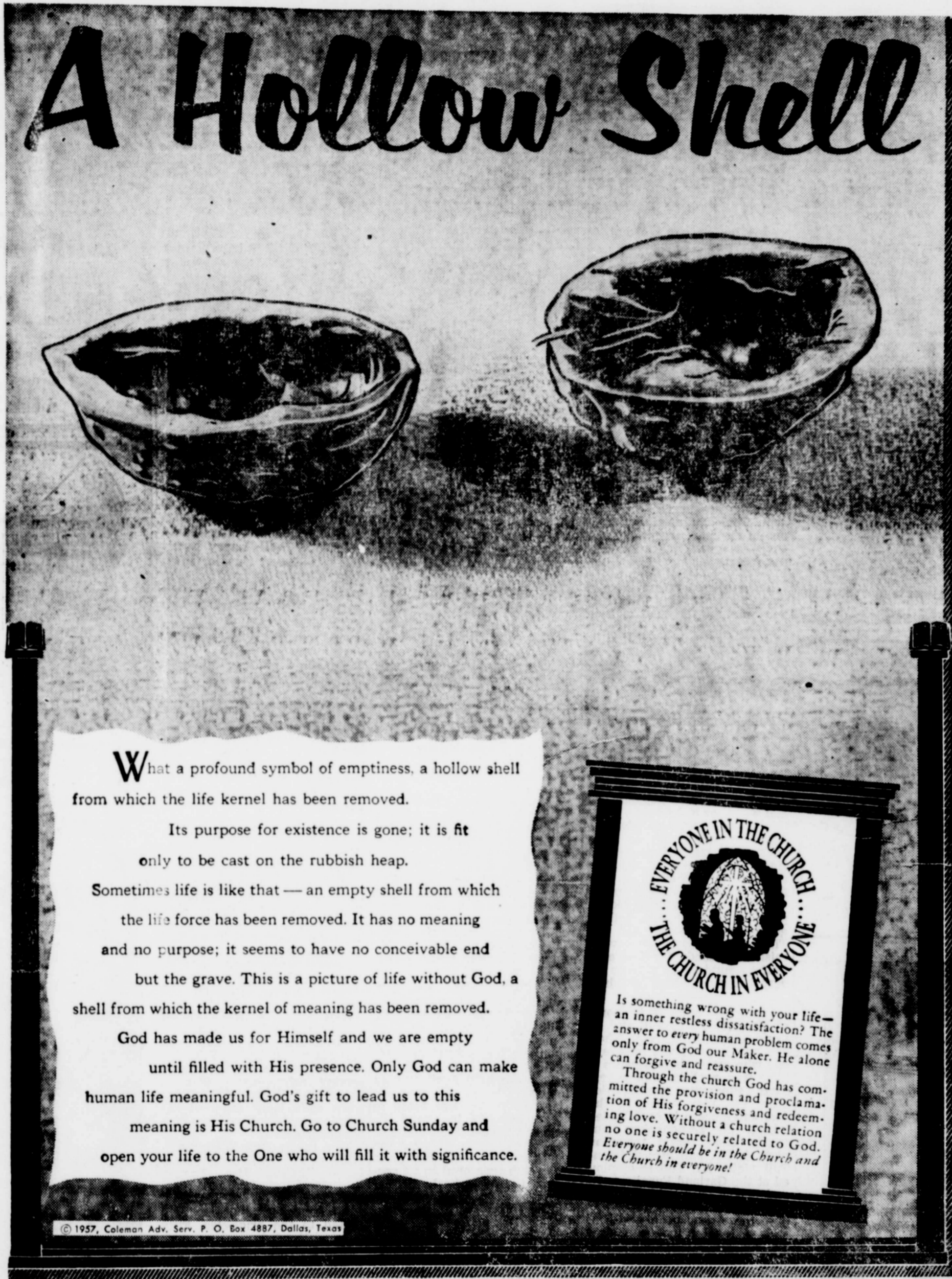

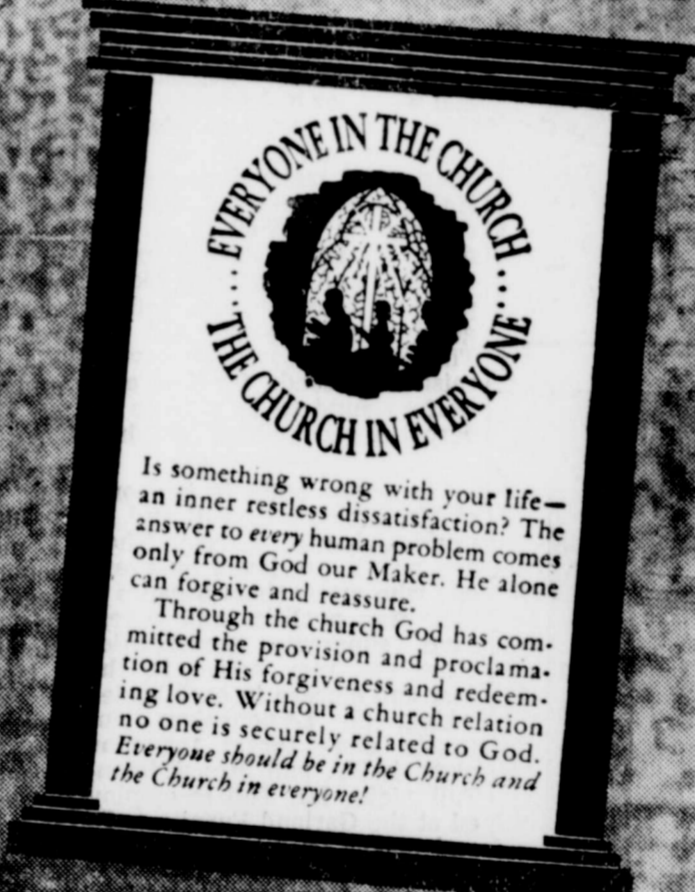
# A Hollow Shell

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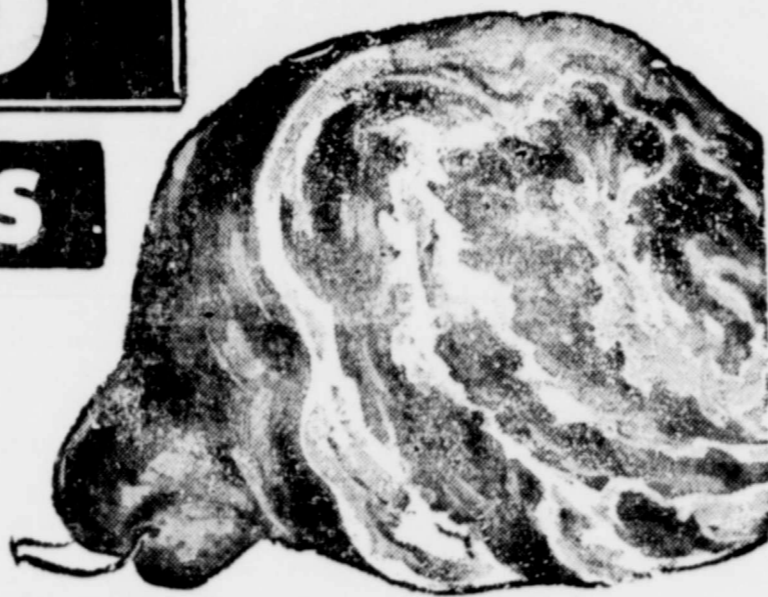

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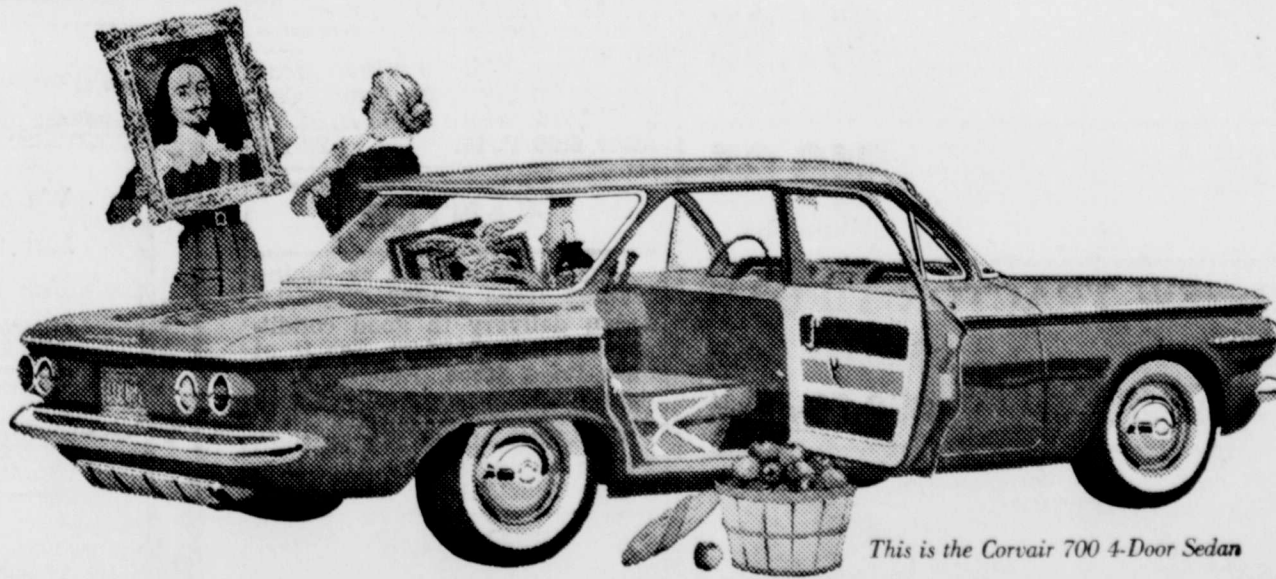
