As an example, he gives the case of a self employed farmer. Farm operators, and certain other self-employed people first came under social security at the beginning of 1950. With the filing of their 1959 tax returns they will have five years of work credit under the law. To get disability protection under social security, five years of work out of the 10 years before disability begins are necessary. A farmer who has filed a tax return every year beginning with 1955 now has that protection.

The farmer he had in mind recently became totally disabled. A friend advised him to apply for social security benefits as he is over 50 and, as his friend declared, "has been in work covered by social security 5 out of the last 10 years." He applied, but he was in for a shock. The reason? He had neglected to file a return and pay the social security tax for 1955. The law says that your earnings must get on the record within three years, 3 months and 15 days after the taxable year in which they were earned. For the year 1955, that time was April 15, 1959.

This man's earnings for 1955 credited to his social security account. He remains one year short of the work requirement of the law. He and his depenhave lost the protection his compliance with law would have given them.

If you are a self employed person, Mr. Tate said, guard against the possibility of this happening to you. Report your net earnings correctly and re-gularly year after year. To freshen Rattan furniture if the finish on your rattan, bamboo or wicker furniture is beginning to look a bit sad, there's still time to freshen it before hot weather really gets underway. Miss Thelma Wirges gives some helpful suggestions for doing the job.

First, remove dust from the weave crevices with the dusting attachment of your vacuum cleaner. If the furniture needs a really good cleaning, you can use a garden hose and brush to do the job. Work fast to avoid soaking the furniture and place pieces where they will dry

If the furniture has a dried out look, it can be revived by a oil and gum turpentine mixture.

The mixture is easy to prepare. Buy linseed oil that is labeled "boiled." Mix three parts day. of the boiled linseed oil with one part gum turpentine. Shake and pour a thin film on top of a cup of hot water. Dip a brush into the thin film of oil and turpentine and apply to the fur-

Wring another cloth out of hot water and wipe off excess mixture. Dip a brush into the hot water and scrub surface. As the oil solution cools, discard it and make up a new hot cupful.

To refinish worn rattan, bamboo or wicker furniture you can apply a coat of thin type penetrating wood sealer to the dry surface with a brush. After it

Profit On Home Sale Taxable?

If you sold or bought a home of Internal Revenue Service, Wichita Falls, has to say.

"Profit on a home sale is the difference between what you He added that a taxpayer who paid for the home, plus your expense on it for permanent improvements and your sale price. "However," Mr. Hall added,

if you use up the profit in buying another home within a year sold the old one, your profit is not taxable.

The Revenue representative explained that the new home cost must at least equal the adjusted sale price of the old home, if none of your profit is to be taxable.

"By 'adjusted sale price' is meant the full sale price, minus commissions and the expense of decorating within 90 days before the date of your sale con-



Trinity Permit Granted-

After the longest and probably most patience straining hearing in State Water Board history, Trinity River Authority and the City of Houston were granted permission to build a \$40.000,000 dam at Livingston.

Also authorized was a \$5,000. 000 salt water barrier at nearby Wallisville.

Conclusion of the matter was a near miracle of compromise and appeasement. Initially Houston alone had sought the permit with stiff opposition from the Trinity people. They got together and agreed on a joint project with a 70-30 split on costs and water use, with Houston taking the larger portion.



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
