## Kenneth Gage Appointed New Chief of Police

Kenneth Gage of Fort Worth has been appointed chief of police of Burkburnett, succeeding Homer Provence, who served in the position for the past two years.

Mr. Gage was a graduate of the old Clara High school in 1938. He attended Central State College at Edmond, Oklahoma, prior to entering the service during World War II. Following extensive training in Washington, D. C., Mr. Gage's service time was spent with the Office of Security Information (OSI). He continued this work after the war, amassing a total of 11½ years in this field.

Mr. Gage and his wife have two children, a boy age 4 and a girl age 13.

## Fifty Plus At C - C Luncheon

More than 50 turned out for the Chamber of Commerce business luncheon Monday noon at the Town Hall.

Special guests were Supt. I. C. Evans and principals from all the Burkburnett schools.

Buddy Byars announced plans are well under way for the Community Clinic to be held here Thursday, September 29th. The Clinic is being conducted by personnel from the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and results from the one day affair should give the local chamber valuable information upon which to base a constructive program of work. Further information on the Clinic appears elsewhere in the paper this week.

I. C. Evans brought the program. He gave a resume of the school's growth since 1950, graphically illustrating his talk with charts for the ten year period.

To give some idea of the rapid growth: In 1952-53 total enrollment in the local schools was 967. In 1956-57 it jumped to 1203. By 1959-60 the total was 2290. This is an increase of 90.6% in a 5 year period.

Mr. Evans stated that 357 students came into the district from May, 1960, to September, 1960. New students have been registering each day since school started. The total as of Sept. 12 was 2716. Of this number, 1537 are classed as military personnel.

High school enrollment has jumped from 253 in 1955 to 610 in 1960.

Plans are in the mill for a new high school building. The need is here now. By the time a building could be put in use, conditions may get drastic for high school students.

## Dog Complaints Swamping Office of City Manager

The City Manager's office has been swamped with complaints of stray dogs.

Mr. Clovis Mann, City Manager states that a study is being made in the hopes of passing an ordinance requiring dog owners to keep their dogs in their yard. "It seems that some such ordinance is necessary to bring our dog problem under control," Mr. Mann stated.

The passage of such an ordinance will necessitate provisions for picking up loose dogs to be destroyed. Mr. Mann states that he hopes to be able to make recommendations to the City Commission in the near future. In the meantime he urges dog owners to cooperate with their neighbors in keeping their dogs at home.

"This has become a serious problem, and one that will become even more serious, if we do not do something about the situation," commented the City Manager. "Citizens have called seeking permission to shoot dogs," Mr. Mann stated. The City Manager advises that such would be a violation of the law, as the shooting of fire arms in the city limits is prohibited.

Chief of Police Ken Gage advises that radar will be put in use next week.

"Due to shortage of personnel in the department, the radar unit will be a tremendous help in enforcing our speed laws," Chief Gage said. "We are more interested in preventing speed violations than we are in issuing tickets," Chief Gage continued. "However, the increase in traffic and in speed violations necessitates more vigorous enforcement." The Chief asks the cooperation of the citizens in driving carefully, in obeying the traffic laws as "the traffic laws are for your protection."

"Patrolmen have been instructed to 'crack down' on traffic violators" Chief Gage stated. "We feel that this is necessary in order to prevent accidents and perhaps a death. Motorists are cautioned that radar will be in operation next week, and we appeal to the public to slow down—obey all traffic laws. Let's make our city a safe city."

## Local Firemen Helped Control Ball Game Traffic

"The traffic was handled more smoothly and moved on faster after the recent ball game than ever before" commented Mr. Roy Silkwood, High School Principal at the Lions club meeting Tuesday evening, commending the Police Department for their work.

Ken Gage, Chief of Police, replied that special thanks should go to the volunteer firemen for their assistance. "We could not have handled the situation as efficiently as was handled without their assistance," replied Chief Gage.

## One Way Traffic In School Zones

Ave. F. from North Cottonwood to East College becomes a full time one-way street, and East College from Ave. F to Ave D becomes a part time one way street, controlled by a portable sign. Permanent one-way signs will be installed on Ave F. within a few days.

Clovis D. Mann, City Manager expressed his appreciation to the motorists for their cooperation and patience while the city officials made a study of the traffic problem around the schools. "This does not necessarily mean that the present arrangement is final," Mr. Mann stated. "We are always looking for better methods to ensure the safety of our children. We believe that this will prove to be not only a great safety factor, but will also prove to be more convenient to the parents that pick up their children." The traffic will flow more smoothly with less time involved.

"This new arrangement will of course, necessitate enforcement. The area will be patrolled and tickets issued to violators," Mr. Mann said.

The City Manager also expresses his appreciation to the B and G Welding Shop and the Texhoma Welding Shop, who donated labor and materials in preparing the signs which will be put up in a few days.

## Captive Nations Week's Message

In July of 1959, the Congress of the United States unanimously adopted a joint resolution designating the third week of July as Captive Nations Week. That resolution read in part: "Whereas the enslavement of a substantial part of the world's population makes a mockery of the idea of peaceful co-existence between nations... and

"Whereas the imperialistic policies of Communist Russia have led, through direct and indirect aggression, to the subjugation of the national independence of Poland, Hungary, Lithuania, Ukraine, Czechoslovakia, Latvia, Estonia, White Ruthenia, Romania, East Germany, Bulgaria, mainland China, Azerbaijan, Georgia, North Korea, Albania, Idel-Ural, Cossackia, Turkestan, North Viet Nam and others.

"—The President is further authorized and requested to issue a similar proclamation each year until such time as freedom and independence shall have been achieved for all the captive nations of the world."

One of the greatest ironies of history is the fact that at a time when the old imperialist powers have withdrawn from almost all the formerly colonial areas of the world, the Soviets have built up a greater colonial empire, in population if not area, than all the colonial territories of the world as of 1939 and are steadily and unwaveringly attempting to subjugate the remainder of mankind.

That Khrushchev fear the message of Captive Nations Week was strikingly proven by his outburst in Moscow during his debate with Vice president Nixon. There is no issue on which he is more sensitive.

For Russia violated non-aggression pacts with most of the European satellites when she enslaved them, and in addition violated other treaties and agreements made during and after the war guaranteeing their independence.

The captive nations are Russia's Achilles heels. They hate their brutal masters. They are the allies of the free world. Truly as the congressional resolution stated, their enslavement "makes a mockery of the idea of peaceful co-existence between the nations" and there never can be a true settlement of world issues until they are freed, in one way or another.

## Job Insurance

More and more we read reports that American products are being "priced out of the market." The reports express worry, and with reason. When American products don't sell, American companies fold and Americans are thrown out of jobs.

Who's doing anything about it?

The unions say they are preserving jobs when they refuse to do away with costly feather-bedding work rules. Are they?

The unions say they are helping American workers when they demand the higher wages that force higher prices. Are they?

Certainly union leaders of Jimmy Hoffa's ilk haven't shown much evidence that they really care about the welfare either of their members or the rest of us. Yet as long as unions can monopolize all the jobs in entire industries, labor's Hoffas will be able to impose their demands on all of us.

With inflation and foreign competition threatening American jobs, we could use some inflation insurance and job protection. And we could use it in the form of legislation to put unions under the anti-trust laws like any other type of monopoly that threatens us.

## Fishing For Votes

On the banks of the Potomac these sunny days, members of Congress are cutting up the bait they will use in fishing for votes later in the season.

Many of them, apparently, feel the best way to entice voters is with big spending programs that include something for everybody. Aid to education, postal and civil service pay increases, aid to depressed area, aid to housing, health insurance for people over 65, benefits for post-Korea veterans — these are the programs with which the legislators hope to pull in the votes.

Expensive bait it is, too. These are no one-shot projects that can be paid for and done with. These are continuing programs that will add billions of dollars to American tax bills. Not just next year, but every year afterward.

Many Congressmen seem to think that the voters will forget—as they have done before—that these programs must be paid for in taxes and that the people who pay taxes are the same ones who vote. It is an odd situation when fishermen expect the fish to pay for the bait.

seed production may offer some irrigation farmers another cash crop, according to Elvy Sargent, Iowa Park Soil Conservationist.

Locally grown seed can be expected to give better results when seeded locally and there are recognized limits from which seed can be moved for seeding. Sargent added. For that reason farmers and ranchers will provide a local market up to their seeding needs. Most seed have had to be purchased from other areas.

W. J. Thompson of Wichita Falls has seeded all cropland on his farm to grass for seed production. Caddo switchgrass and Indiangrass will be harvested this year. Other grasses seeded for seed production are K. R. bluestem and Caucasian bluestem.

Farmer experience has shown a good gross income from grass seed production, however, they have found that there are more steps involved. Harvesting is slower and often more difficult to perform than routine harvest jobs.

Soil Conservation Service will usually have information on growing and harvesting grasses for seed production that is available to Soil Conservation district cooperators.

"In addition," the letter continued, "your initial assistance in preparing the course chart and course syllabus for a 125 day course concurrent with preparing to assume classroom responsibilities has proved invaluable," particularly your text transistors, which is in use in all courses in the Atlas Branch involving electronics.

Sgt. Malone teaches the Missile Systems Analyst Technician course in the Missile Department's Atlas Branch. The course deals with missile guidance and auto-pilot systems.

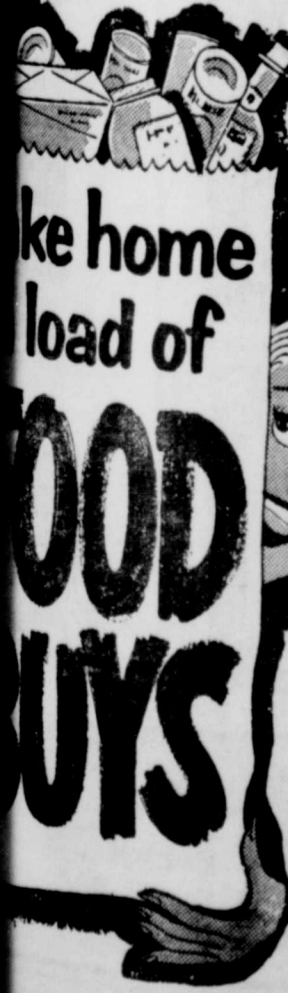

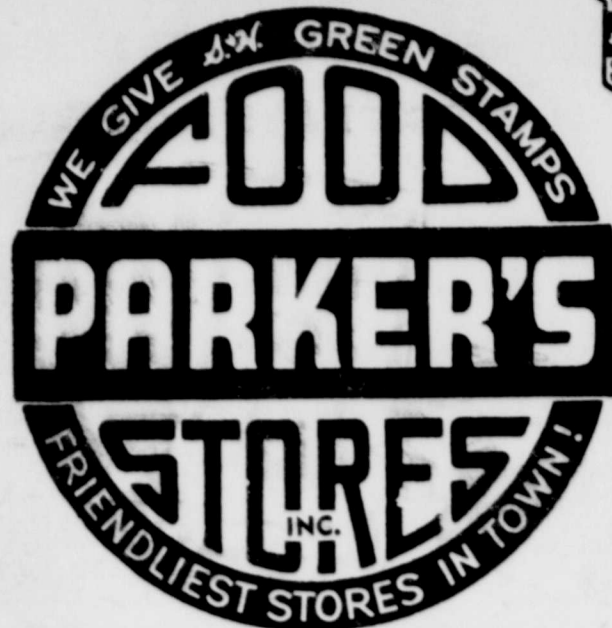
