People, Jobs and Growth

The U.S. population is growing rapidly, and many jobs will be needed to support the new families that are being formed everyday. That is one of the factors behind the drive to improve the nation's economic growth rate. Economic growth means the building of new businesses and the expansion of old ones. This

is the process that creates jobs. President-elect Kennedy has promised that his administration will act as necessary to produce a faster rate of growth. In this regard, we would recommend that he give attention to legislation which has been gaining support over the last three years. It now is being reintroduced into Congress with bipartisan backing from Representatives A. S. Herlong (D-Fla.) and Howard W. Baker (R-Tenn.).

This legislation embodies a tax reform program that would reduce both personal and corporate income tax rates gradually over a five year period-without lowering the present total of

The relationship between tax rates and economic growth is close and direct. Forming new businesses and expanding old ones takes risk capital that is available only from savings. Tax rates that seize up to 91% of an individual's income and take 52% of corporate profits stifle savings.

We agree with economic experts and businessmen who say that tax rate reform as proposed by Rep. Herlong and Baker provides the best avenue toward speeding economic growth and providing more jobs.

Independence Day For Corporations

July 4th, we all know is Independence Day.

Also, in a very diffent sense, it is an independence day for nerican business corporations. For that is the day when these corporations and the people who own them start keeping some profit for themselves.

The arithmetic is simple. The federal corporation tax, on concerns of any size, is 52%. So, for more than half the year, government takes all the profit.

When an individual begins working for himself depends apon his income bracket, deductions and other matters. Each person can figure it out easily enough. 20% is the beginning tax on taxable income-91% is the maximum. State and local taxes come on top of that.

Government absorbs about one-third of the national income. The average man works only two-thirds of the year for himself. The tax collectors demand four months of his services.

The point of this is that the average American today has a good many important papers little tidy record-keeping, you can make life easier for yourself and your family when you

So why not make a New these suggestions:

1. Get a heavily bound noteto operate the state training book folder or file folder as a central collecting point for all the records of your affairs.

2. Put your especially important papers in your safe deposit box, but make a list of those papers and a brief summary of their contents to put in your

home file. 3. Get copies of birth certificates for all members of the family, and add them to the file. Add your marriage license or at least a statement as to when and where you were married and by whom.

4. Insert your will or a copy of it. If your will is kept elsewhere, include a note telling where it may be found.

5. During the year, put into the file your income tax withholding statements and receipts for expenditures which may be deductible. Then keep a copy of each year's tax return in the

6. Make a list of all the stocks and bonds you own and where

they are.
7. List all the places you have lived and worked and the names of persons there you know. Include the schools you have attended and the dates you left. or were graduated.

8. If you may have benefits coming under a profit sharing plan where you work, make a note of that too.

9. If you're in doubt about whether an item should be included, out it in.

This takes time initially, but it will save you both time and worry in the long run.

Wood Floor Maintenance In Homes

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
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
