



Mr. Tate explained that under the law the definition of disability is "inability to engage in any substantial gainful actiity. The condition must be expected to continue indefinitely or to result in death. It can be either physical or mental, but it must be so severe that it is not likely to be improved by medical treatment to the point of making it possible to return to work.

An example might be a worker who breaks a leg He knows he will probably be off the job for as much as three months. Welcomed to This might have some effect on his social security record, but Burkburnett when his whole working history is considered upon retirement, the effect would be small. This worker would have every reason to believe he would return to work in the foreseeable future. For this reason, his disability, because it is temporary, would not qualify him under the social security disability pro-

On the other hand, a worker who discovers he has a severe case of tuberculosis that prevents him from doing any kind of work, has no way of knowing when he will be able to return to work. Therefore, he should contact the Social Security of prior to his date of fice to inquire about applying for benefits.

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


