Ordinance is due for final reading Monday, March 27th.

In its present form, the ordinance will require that dogs be kept under control at all times, and that no person shall not permit such dogs to be at large off the premises or property of the owner, unless on leash and under the control of a competent person.

The Commission has received comments, both pro and con, on whether or not this ordinance should be in the Ordinance Book of the City of Burk Burnett to solve the dog problem that now exists. Can the problem be solved by changing the ordinance to require that only those dogs that otherwise create a nuisance be licensed?

We would like your opinion on whether the ordinance be kept in its present form, or should be amended to require that only those dogs that otherwise create a nuisance be licensed.

We will appreciate your calling the City Hall and letting the City Inspector know your opinion to any of the above mentioned items.

Presented to the City Council for their consideration.

Remember that the laying out of lines and all plumbing work must be done by a licensed plumber and inspected by the City Inspector before any of this work is done. A person may do his own work himself, but he must secure a permit from the City Inspector before the work is inspected and approved by the City Inspector.

Permit must be obtained before the beginning of construction. Your City Inspector is charged with the enforcement of these provisions.

During the month of January and February there are 10,000 building permits issued.

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Telephone Calls Can Be Bounced Off Satellites



Glenn Scott, public information supervisor for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., demonstrated how telephone calls are bounced off satellites in a program before the Lions Club Tuesday night and the High School this morning. His talk is titled "Voices Across Time and Space."

Telephone scientists are looking to outer space to make our world smaller. Scott gave a demonstration showing how long distance telephone calls might be transmitted between this city and Istanbul, Anchorage or any point in the world via a satellite orbiting 3000 miles above the earth.

Using miniature equipment, Scott showed how Bell Telephone Laboratories scientists bounced telephone calls off a satellite orbiting in outer space in a special experiment known as Project Echo.

"Bell scientists believe a system of about 50 satellites in random polar orbits at a height of 3000 miles could provide communications facilities between the United States and all areas of the world," he said. "About 26 transmitter-receiver stations which would work in pairs would be located throughout the world to provide the ground terminals for the system. They might also be used to transmit live television programs to any point in the world."

Safety Inspection Lagging in Co.

Motorists who wish to avoid the long lines to obtain annual motor vehicle inspection stickers should take advantage of empty stalls at inspection stations. Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection supervisor of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said this week.

With the April 15 deadline for obtaining inspection stickers, only 23,040 of the 54,112 vehicles in Wichita County have been inspected, Johnson pointed out.

Any drivers operating vehicles registered in Texas on public roads after April 15 without the 1961 inspection sticker will be subject to arrest and a fine of up to \$200.00, plus court cost, Johnson added.

The captain explained that trailers with a gross weight exceeding 4,000 pounds also must be inspected.

The safety inspection sticker which must be on all registered vehicles operated over public streets, roads, and highways by midnight, April 15 may be obtained at any of the 55 approved vehicle inspection stations in this county.

I. D. Rainey, formerly of Burk Burnett and Electra, was one of the three Texans who recently received a Rural Heroism Award from the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council.

Mr. Rainey now lives at Whitesboro.

I. D. Rainey, 71, a retired oil field worker, is credited with saving the lives of a mother and her two daughters in a Memorial Day incident on Lake Texhoma. He was fishing nearby when Connie Hyman, 4, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Hyman of Gainesville slipped from the lake bank into the water.

Mrs. Hyman, who is not a swimmer immediately jumped into the water to rescue her thrashing daughter. However, a deep unseen hole of water made her a potential victim, too, just as her younger daughter, Diana 2, followed her mother into the water.

Hearing their combined screams, Rainey swam over and grasped Connie by the hair just as she was going under and took her to shore. Then he rescued the struggling mother and her other daughter, all before her husband, who was fishing some 200 yards away, could reach the scene.

LOCAL BUSINESS

A chamber of commerce official has estimated that "seekers after greener pastures" carry ten to twenty percent of a community's wealth into larger cities—often into other states.

"The sad part of this drainage on the community is that, more often than not, the long distance shopper spends more than he would at home," he said.

This comment did not refer to extra money spent on travel costs and the value of wasted time. The speaker was talking about the cost of goods purchased. What is the explanation for the shopping wanderlust which plagues so many communities?

There are several explanations: Some people just want an excuse to go somewhere. Some people think it is smart to say that they went shopping in Metropolis or Cosmopolis.

Some just insist on doing things the hard way. But most of the wandering shoppers are just ordinary hard-pressed consumers who honestly believe the grass is greener over the hill. The realistic local merchant should try to understand the basis for this latter class of out-of-town shopping. It is a situation in which he shares the blame.

Out-of-town shopping is most often the result of advertising which comes into local community in regional publications.

The local merchant who neglects his advertising should not be surprised when potential customers look to outside firms which do provide essential shopping information.

The Meat Dollar

We've all kicked at the price of meat. And there's no doubt about it—the bill for a good steak runs into a substantial figure these days.

But that doesn't mean that profiteers are fattening at the expense of the consumer.

Ross Young, writing in the Marion, Iowa, Sentinel, has something important to say about the meat dollar. A large and typical packing company, he points out, earned a profit last year of 0.8 cents per sales dollar of meat—a little less than one percent. And the profits made by retailers, producers and transporters also were virtually microscopic.

Mr. Young sums up the situation in these words: "If the farmer sold or delivered his live animals at his actual cost, if the packing companies sold meat at actual cost, and if the transportation companies sold their services at actual cost, your meat would cost you just about what it has been costing you. Profits have practically no effect on the cost of meats."

The big item, he adds, is payroll. Wages and salaries account for 80 to 85 cents of the meat dollar, and the same thing is true of the bread dollar. We live in a high-wage, high-cost, high-income economy, and commodity prices simply reflect that fact.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

Once again Whittier, California, has come into the news. This suburban town east of Los Angeles, founded by Quakers, is the home bailiwick of Ronald Cameron, a member of the Legislature of California, who has introduced quite a far reaching bill in the hopper of the current session of the Golden State's Solons.

This bill, if it becomes law, will require all retailers who give trading stamps, to offer their customers the choice of stamps, or cash discounts.

Legislator Cameron, on introducing his bill said the new law he seeks "would free the reluctant customer from the trading stamp hoax."

It is his contention, based on his studies of the situation, that merchants pay from 2 to 3 per cent for the stamps and that this percentage is added onto the price of merchandise.

He points out that a large drug chain deducts three per cent from the sales price of all merchandise returned by a customer unless the customer returns stamps he received on purchase of the goods.

He also states flatly there is no intention to outlaw stamps, as he feels that people who want to continue to buy stamps should be able to do so. "If you want 200 stamps with \$20 worth of groceries, you can have them by paying \$20. But if you don't want stamps, you only have to

pay \$19.40, or 3 per cent less for not buying the stamps along with the groceries."

In another Western state, Wyoming, the matter of trading stamps is also again in the spotlight as one of the nation's largest stamp operators has asked the Wyoming Supreme Court to review the decision reached at year's end upholding the constitutionality of a state law outlawing stamps.

The Supreme Court also upheld the ordinance passed by the city government in Casper, Wyoming, outlawing stamps.

In still another Western state, Arizona, the Supreme Court came to another decision.

On a question involving state sales tax matters, the Arizona Supreme Court rules trading stamps are not cash discounts.

In handing down its decision, the court issued a very interesting viewpoint on the question of trading stamps.

For the court ruled that trading stamps are a "promotion scheme to induce the public to purchase merchandise from its dealers exclusively."

The Arizona court did not touch upon the matter as to whether or not this constituted an attempt at restraint of trade as this question was not raised in the case.

But it is indeed interesting that there is a judicial opinion that the operators of a stamp plan seek to steer up the consumers trade exclusively with the retailers handling their stamps. It would thus appear there is grounds to investigate if these plans enter into the illegal area of restraint of trade.

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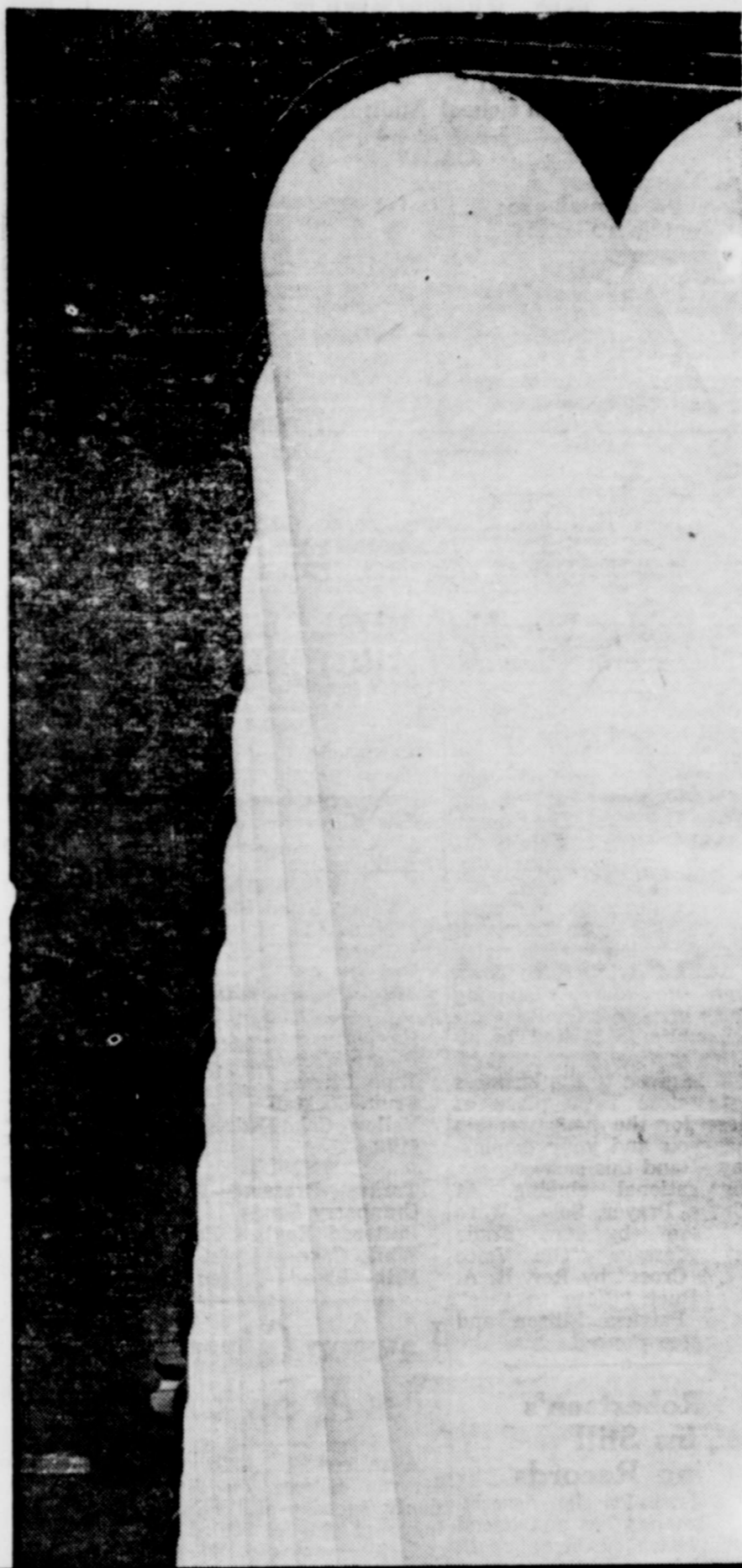

"This Is Your Hour"

What would you do if you were given control of society for a single hour? Imagine the Lord saying, "This is your hour; now all things will respond to your wishes." What motives would prevail? What would be promoted? This will never happen, but we cannot escape the thought entirely, for we are all players in the drama of life, and our acts do have a bearing on society's destiny.

Responsibility is thrust upon us. Circumstances push us into the limelight where we must act with full knowledge that what we do influences others. Life does single one out to say, "This is your hour. The world awaits your decision."

It was such a moment that the accusers of Jesus faced on that fateful early morning. Quickly Judas kissed Jesus and

the crowd closed in. There was a skirmish, the thrust of a hastily drawn sword and then when he had restored order, Jesus said, "When I was with you, in the temple, you did not lay hands on me. But is your hour and the power of darkness." (Luke 22:53.)

Look briefly with me at some who had big moments. When Samson was called into the arena he sought revenge. He prayed, "O Lord God, remember me, and strengthen me, only this once, O God, that I may be avenged." (Judges 16:28) Then leaning his weight upon the pillars he pushed with all his might until the stadium fell, crushing hundreds, including himself to death. But Samson's prayer had been answered. He had had his hour and won.

The hour is never solely one's own. Every hour is shared. Jesus said to his accusers, "This is your hour." It was their hour. They called the plays. But Christ was in that hour, too, and the final verdict is that its victory belong to him.

Stephen was one of the first to carry the Christian message, but men did not want their little games interrupted. After a hasty hearing, "They rushed upon him, cast him out of the city and stoned him." This was their hour! But that hour was shared with Stephen who prayed, "Lord, do not hold this sin against them." (Act 7: 57-60). Those who threw stones thought it was their hour, but history has given it to Stephen.

Because each hour is shared, it is never isolated. Every hour flows immediately into the stream of history where it takes sides. There it stands for good or for evil.

Deeds flow quickly from us to get out of hand and then they come back. They flow out with the tide and with the tide, they return. We are free in our hour to betray the highest but we are never free to escape

the consequences of a trayal. Our hours return us but in the certain return is our certainty of judgement. But it is also God's love therefore in keeping will is to turn into the stream of blessing on mankind. In such responsibility judgement, but in reality is the hope of life.

W. W. Chambers, Is Developer



One of Burk Burnett's best known developers is W. W. Chambers, Magnolia Street. Mr. Chambers has, perhaps, done more real estate developing in Burk Burnett than any one individual. He estimates the property developed and in the process of being developed to be around 3 1/2 million dollars value. His developments include 32 lots in the Chambers Addition, 180 lots in Mimosa Heights and 385 lots in 8 sub-divisions.

Before investing in property to be developed, Mr. Chambers always takes his wife and children to see the property. He values their opinions very highly. He has made it a rule never to purchase property without his wife also looking at the property and expressing her opinion. "Behind every successful man is a woman," is a proverb which Chambers takes literally. The Chambers Addition is named after his family and two of the streets in this addition are named after his wife: Harriett Street and Shannon Drive.

In considering the future potentialities of property, Chambers always relies upon his own method of valuation, and his own considered judgement bas-

ed upon years of experience and his knowledge of Burk Burnett. This is sometime contrary to popular opinion. For example when considering the Mimosa Heights Addition, the majority of the business men advised him against it, not believing the area could ever be developed. Today this Addition is partially developed, with completion of development going at a rapid rate. It has become one of the most promising developments within the city, although all odds seemingly were against it. Chambers (after discussing it with his family) could vision a completely developed addition that would be an asset to Burk Burnett. He is now seeing that vision becoming a reality.

Mr. Chambers is one of the first developers in Burk Burnett, coming here in 1922. His wife's name is Harriett. They have 3 daughters: Mrs. Joe Bowles, Jr., of Austin; Mrs. Bill McLean & Mrs. B. H. Alexander, Jr., both of this city.

He did not, however, go into the real estate business upon his arrival in Burk Burnett. Instead, he bought the first oil well he saw and remained in that business for about five years before getting his start in the building industry.

Chambers came here from Kentucky, where he worked in coal mines and taught school. This helped put him through college. He received his LL.B. degree in law in 1914, and taught high school for 2 years. He was one of 6 children and his father was a school teacher. One statement his father made to his children, which has stuck with Chambers through the years was "I cannot give you anything except a good education." Chambers was born in 1887. He will be 74 years old Sept. 30th.

One incident Mr. Chambers recalls is that when teaching school in Wolf Creek, Ky., he had 68 students. One student was named Roundtree, 4 were

named Thomas and 48 were Moses. The remainder were either named Davenport or Davis. He taught high school in Campbell County, Elk Valley, Tenn. It was here that he composed the songs and yells that the school is still using. From Elk Valley he went to Sterns, Ky., where he opened his own coal mine. He recalls, also that it was in Kentucky on top of a mountain, that he met the future Mrs. Chambers—Miss Harriett Shannon. They were married in 1918, when he was 30 years old.

He got his start in building in the early 20's. He bought old houses, repaired and sold them. He also bought rent houses. One purchase that he made, which has proven to be a good investment, was a house he bought for taxes for \$35.00. He spent \$1,500 in repairs, and has received \$100 a month rent on the house since 1940.

Chambers would not reveal any plans he may have for future developing. He loves Burk Burnett. Burk Burnett has been good to him and he has been good for Burk Burnett. He has always maintained that someday he would "have it made" and live on "easy street." His new home is being built on a street named "Easy," in Mimosa Heights, but he refuses to say that he intends to retire. People who know him best say that he will be active for many more years to come.

Stewart Named to Important Committees

Please take special note of the committees on which I am serving: I will be representing you in these committees, in addition to representing you on the floor of the House:

Oil, Gas and Mining

I have been named chairman of this committee, which is one of the top five committees in the House. And perhaps it is the most important committee as far as our area of the state is concerned. To this committee are sent bills effecting the oil and gas industry on which our section of Texas is so dependent.

Revenue and Taxation

This is considered to be the most powerful and important committee of the House. It is responsible for holding hearings on all tax bills introduced. Every bill effecting your pocket book passes through this committee.

Banks and Banking

Legislation regarding loan sharks, savings and loan companies, and banks are generally referred to this committee.

Municipal and Private Corporations

Congressional and Legislative Districts

This committee has the responsibility this session of redistricting both the Legislative and Congressional Districts. It is incumbent upon the Legislature after each ten year census to reshuffle these districts based upon the new population changes.
